

As winter weather approaches it is important to drive safely to protect you and your family. In 2020, the United States had 374 fatal crashes and about 25,000 injury crashes that took place in wintery conditions (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration statistic). Preparing you and your vehicle is an important step in the right direction.



Check to make sure all the lights work so you can be seen by other motorists. Inspect the tires to make sure they have enough tread and replace them if necessary. This is also a good time to fill up the windshield washer fluid and replace your

wiper blades. You

Parents should know

that putting children with thick winter coats can interfere with car seats. Instead, consider putting a blanket around them after they are buckled in. Inspect the car seat to make sure they are installed and adjusted for your child.



Keep your gas tank

full in case you get

stuck in traffic or slide off the road. If you have an electric car keep it charged as well. Cold temperatures decrease battery effectiveness and using the heater and heated seats will decrease your range. Remember these cars will self-heat the batteries in cold temperatures, further decreasing your range.



The most important thing you can do is slow down!

Most of the crashes are a result of drivers operating too fast for the conditions. Decrease your speed and increase the gap between you and the vehicle in front of you. Stopping distances can be up to nine times greater on snowy or icy roads. When you do brake, brake early and slowly. Slamming on the brakes can cause you to lose control.



Lastly, use caution around snowplows.

Give them distance and give them room to work! Remember these vehicles are large and the drivers will have decreased visibility due to blind spots. Generally, you should avoid passing snowplows. Remember snowplows may not stay exactly in the center of a traffic lane. To better clear all of the road. they may not travel in a predictable path.
