Leadership. What is it? Why is it important? There are many definitions, books, college courses, and seminars on this multifaceted concept. Having studied it in graduate school, the military, and my business career, I now have the privilege to be part of it first hand here in Montgomery.

So what is it? The definition I often use is contained in the 6 E's leadership model.

Envision Scanning the environment and looking 5 or more years into the future and where you want your purpose (i.e. city) to be. For example, our successful Montgomery Quarter is part of a vision conceived over 5 years ago.

Enroll Getting the organization and community to participate, input and help develop the vision and the goals and strategies to achieve that vision. Our community survey, numerous open houses, open council meetings, and citizen staffed commissions are essential to this process.

Energize Providing positive support and feedback. Developing a winning and constantly improving team culture. Having open and honest communication. Building trust. Our city volunteers and employees are an excellent example of this culture having won a fifth consecutive best workplace award in 2023. Our 5 written values guide how we act and treat each other.

Engage Working with the entire organization and network to achieve goals, remove barriers, and adjust work to meet the changing environment and needs. It's getting your hands dirty and doing the detailed work. Our 6 goals, strategies, and action plans that support them, show the level of detail needed for success.

Educate Providing clear, concise communication along with training and the skill development needed to achieve goals. One of our strategies provides our employees with the training and knowledge they need for now and the future. Our monthly Montgomery Bulletin, website, and social media are excellent resources for keeping our citizens and community informed.

Execute Doing the work. Revising, adjusting, learning, staying in touch at all levels. Continuous improvement. Our 11 commissions with over 70 citizens, our 6 committees, and our 2 council meetings each month are open meetings that help us stay in-touch and actively looking for ways to support and improve.

In addition to those 6 E's, there's another integral part of leadership. It's doing the right thing. On December 8 last year, we had our city's first menorah lighting that was held in city hall. Some speculated that we would only have a dozen or so of attendees. Some thought maybe 30-40. Well, we had standing room only with over 50 people celebrating Hanukah with songs and prayers. A new tradition was started. Now that's leadership.

Our city's mission statement is: "Working together to strengthen our premier community." Key words are "together" and "strengthen". With **leadership** at all levels we will continue to make Montgomery great for now and future generations.

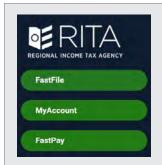

LEADERSHIP ACADEMY KICKS OFF NEW YEAR

PARK SHELTER RESERVATIONS **OPEN MARCH 1**

Enjoy your next outdoor event in one of Montgomery's Park Shelters. Reservations are available on Friday, March 1. Reservation requests end October 31.

Park shelter reservations may be made online or in person at City Hall. Reservations are not available over the phone.

Reservations are only available to Montgomery residents, businesses, and employees of Montgomery businesses. Non-residents may use the shelters on a first-come, first-served basis as long as there is no reservation. A reservation list is posted each week at every park shelter.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION RESUMES MARCH 4

Beginning Monday, March 4, weekly yard waste collection will resume at no charge for all one and two-family residential homes.

The program limits collection to three bags, cans, or bundles at each residence (or one 90-gallon yard waste toter). Additional bags, cans, or bundles require one \$4.00 Rumpke waste sticker per item. Additional 90-gallon toters will require three stickers each after the first toter. Stickers are available at Montgomery City Hall during regular business hours.

· Loosely place yard waste in trash cans or in paper yard waste bags, which are commonly available at grocery or hardware stores. Do not place bags in the curb lane on the street. If the material is being placed in a garbage can or toter, please label it as "yard waste," so it is not inadvertently collected as trash. Do not dispose of plants in plastic planter tubs; separate plants for yard waste and plastic for recycling.

- · Place yard waste on the opposite side of the driveway from regular trash. Leave the lids off cans containing yard waste. Freezing conditions seal the lids, which does not allow for easy removal of yard waste. No plastic bags will be accepted.
- · Place your cans, bags or bundles at the curb no earlier than 5:00 p.m. the night before your pickup and remove your containers by 9:00 p.m. the day of your pickup.
- Brush should be bundled in sizes up to 4 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter. The material should be fastened with cotton twine (No wire or plastic ties, please).
- · Limbs must be cut into 4-foot lengths and no larger than 6 inches in diameter.

ENSURING MEDICATION SAFETY: A VITAL ASPECT OF SENIOR HEALTH

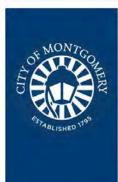

CONGRATULATIONS, OFFICER PAUL PAYNE

Officer Paul Payne was awarded the 2023 Hamilton County Police Association Award for Service.

Since 2001, Paul Payne has served as the school resource officer for Sycamore High School and previously served as the president of the Ohio School Resource Officers Association.

During a banquet in January, the HCPA Board presented Paul with the Col. Emil J. Otting Service Award. The award recognizes members



of the Hamilton County Law Enforcement for their outstanding job performance that exemplifies the goals of the Hamilton County Police Association.

The award recipient, through act or accomplishment, must have contributed to the HCPA mission of "Cooperation in Operation" and positively impacted the citizens of Hamilton County, either directly or through interaction with other law enforcement agencies.



Tax season is upon us, and the Montgomery Police Department wants to remind everyone that scammers look forward to it more than you do. They use a variety of scams to steal from the government and you. The most prevalent scams involve filing fraudulent tax returns. This form of identity theft allows criminals to receive tax refunds from Uncle Sam using your tax identification number. They input fraudulent deductions and income to maximize the amount of the return.

Here are six warning signs that someone might be trying to steal your identity to file a fraudulent return:

- You get a letter from the IRS inquiring about a suspicious tax return that you did not file.
- You can't e-file your tax return because of a duplicate Social Security number
- You get a tax transcript in the mail that you did not request.
- You get an IRS notice that an online account has been created in your name.
- IRS records indicate you received wages or other income from an employer you didn't work for.
- You've been assigned an Employer Identification Number but did not request an EIN.

Another common scam involves scammers posing as 'IRS agents' by phone. The scammers state that the victim owes money for past returns and often directs them to pay for it with gift cards or cryptocurrency. They threaten immediate arrest and try to keep the victim on the phone without letting them contact family, friends or the police department.

Four Quick Tips to protect you from scammers

- File your return as soon as possible. Filing early limits the amount of time a scammer has to file a fraudulent return.
- The IRS does NOT accept cryptocurrency or gift cards.
- Don't give out personal information to people who call or email you.
- If you suspect your identity has been stolen or a scammer threatens your arrest, please contact the Montgomery Police Department at (513) 985-1600.



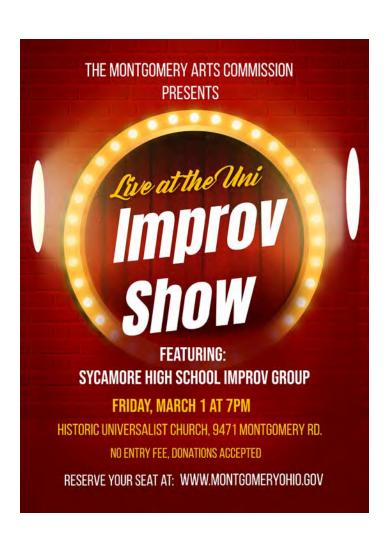
MONTGOMERY'S DRIVE-IN MOVIE THEATER

You may be streaming most of your movies these days, but when it opened in 1939, the Montgomery Drive-In was the place to be and be seen. The Montgomery Drive-in was one of the county's earliest drive-in theaters, with one of the area's widest screens. The drive-in was a popular community gathering place. Events, such as weddings and Easter services, were also held there. A large fire damaged the drive-in in the summer of 1948, but the theater continued to operate until it closed in 1971.

The property was sold after another fire damaged the property in the fall of 1975.

Today, the site is the location of Columbia Chevrolet at 9750 Montgomery Road.

WINTER ICE, SECURE SAFETY AND HEALTH: STEM THE WAVE OF SALT ENTERING OUR WATERWAYS

When the temperature dips and snow is falling, that may have you reaching for the rock salt.

Rock salt is a coarser form of table salt, used to melt ice on our roads and sidewalks.

But what impact does Rock salt have on our environment?

Rock salt is sodium chloride, which is a pollutant. According to the US Geological Survey, the use of salt has more than doubled in the last four decades, which led to the discovery of troublesome impacts.1

- More salt on land and surface water means higher levels of salt in groundwater and drinking water, which can elevate blood pressure. Salt is not removed during the traditional water treatment process! Stormwater is rain or snow melt that travels across the land into sewers or streams that lead to the Ohio River.
- Salty water also affects infrastructure. Metal pipes and pumps corrode more quickly. Our vehicles and other property also corrode faster.
- Rock Salt is not safe for pets to eat! Also, salt attracts deer and other animals to the roads to lick the salt and increases 'road kill' and accidents with animals.
- · Soil and plants can be damaged or killed. Salt reduces the permeability of soil. This causes nutrients to leach out of the soil into the environment. Plants will struggle to grow in salty soil and may not survive.





And what can we do to reduce the quantity of salt from entering our waterways?

- Shovel Straightaway: Do not wait until the snow melts and turns to ice.
- · Watch the Weather: Normal rock salt only works in temperatures above 15° F.
- If ice forms, do not apply if the temperature is 15°F or less.
- Reduce quantity of salt: "A 12once mug is enough to treat ten sidewalk squares or a 20-foot driveway".2 Salt is very effective when spread evenly! A fertilizer spreader is an efficient way to distribute the salt evenly and reduce clumps.
- · Reuse excess salt: Once the ice melts, sweep driveways and sidewalks to collect the "undissolved salt" and properly store it in a bucket for reuse.
- Use non-sodium, non-chloride alternatives.
 - o Coffee Grounds: Sprinkle the "grounds" from your morning coffee onto the ice.
 - o Bird seed or sand: Create Traction by spreading birdseed or sand over the ice. Note: Sand can create other water issues and should be swept up after use.
