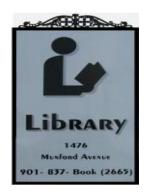

#### **January 2022 Library Report**

#### Overview:

- The library has sold \$116.50 in books with the ongoing book sale.
- The library has collected \$59.20 in library fines, overdue fees, and lost items.
- The monthly collection for copies and faxing was \$305.85.
- The library eared **\$120.00** in donations. **\$10.00** was in memory of Shelby Scallions, \$100 was from Wayne and Lauren Bouler, and the rest was in-kind from various patrons.
- The Library had **218** people use our computers and **153** requiring computer help. In addition we had **225** use the Wi-Fi. The library had **599** reference questions asked and answered.
- Library staff provided 7 one-on-one technology device sessions lasting more than 10 minutes.
- The Library has gained **32** new users, with **2,002** materials checked out (including books, movies, audio, R.E.A.D.S circulation, etc.). We have a total of **4,558** patrons.
- Through Interlibrary Loan **36** books were loaned out, and **34** were borrowed.
- Tennessee R.E.A.D.S. had 957 books checked out.
- Lindsey was used as a Notary Public 9 times.
- The Library had 7 volunteers.
- ❖ The adult book club met, there were **3** people in attendance
- Through in-person and passive programming we had 42 programs with 49 attendees.
  - LEGO Club met twice with 8 in attendance.
  - Passive Programs included: Color Your Own Bookmark, Warm Up with a Book, Let's Cook, Book Spotlight, The Best Books of 2021, Staff Recommendations, and Blind Date with a Book.
  - Eat Smart & Move More classes were held at the Library. This is done through TSU and Tipton County Extensions Program. The Class has had 13 attendees with one class left in February.
- ❖ We continue to offer curbside services to patrons. 8 patrons were assisted curbside.
- ❖ 1 hotspot was circulated in the month of January.
- ❖ We continue to do virtual Story Times. We posted one video with 92 views.
- ❖ We continued take-home crafts and there were 30 crafts given out.

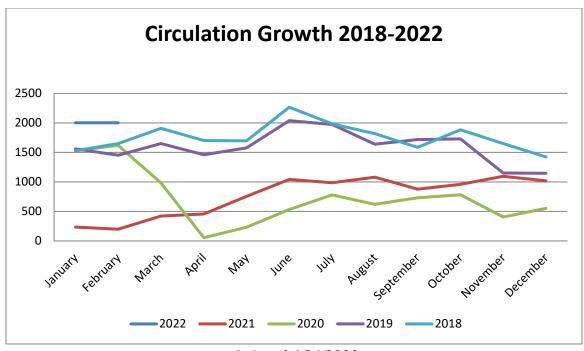

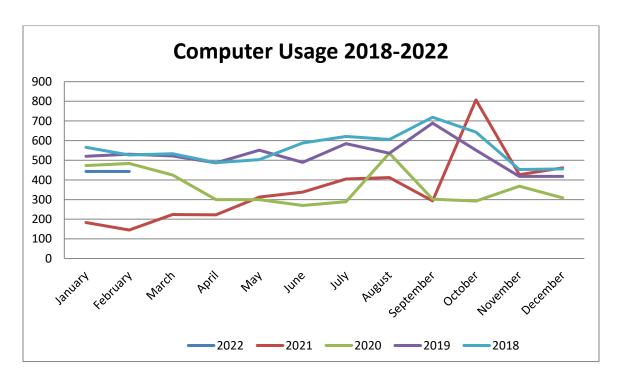

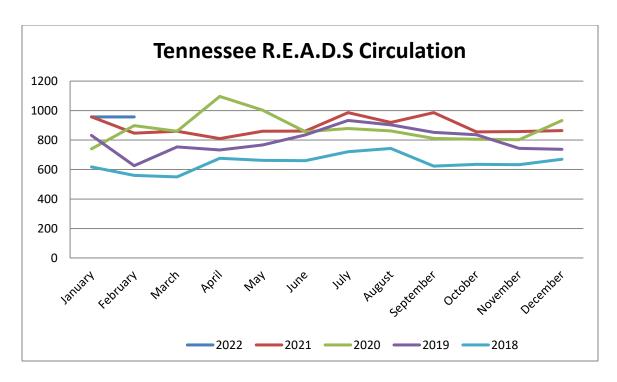

## **RESOLUTION:** <u>2022-02-01</u>

A RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT RESTORING THE HISTORIC REVENUE SHARING
RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE STATE OF TENNESSEE AND ITS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS
AND TO RETURN THE LOCAL SHARE OF THE SINGLE ARTICLE CAP TO LOCAL
GOVERNMENTS

WHEREAS Tennessee's municipal communities are the economic engine of the state and today 92% of the state's total sales tax collections are generated within municipal boundaries; and,

WHEREAS such economic growth is intentional and when it occurs, it is financed largely through city taxes for police, fire, streets, water and sewer, schools, parks, libraries, and other amenities that attract and retain businesses and make Tennessee's communities desirable places for people to raise a family, start a business, and visit; and,

WHEREAS, in 1947, the state began sharing 4.6% of each year's total state sales tax collections with cities for the purposes of recognizing the collective contribution of cities as the state's economic engine; thereby acknowledging that city residents incur a local tax burden that is directly attributable to financing, developing, and maintaining an economic environment that continues to generate a healthy portion of the sales tax revenue accruing to the state; and,

WHEREAS, when confronting serious fiscal challenges in 2002, the state of Tennessee increased the state sales tax rate from 6% to 7%; and,

WHEREAS the state chose not to share a portion of the sales tax revenues generated by the increase from 6% to 7% with Tennessee municipalities; and,

WHEREAS, as a result of this change the state broke a 55-year relationship of sharing 4.6% of all sales tax revenue designated for the state's general fund with municipalities; and,

WHEREAS, at the same time in 2002, the state also doubled from \$1,600 to \$3,200 the amount of the purchase price any single item that is subject to a combined state and local option sales tax of 9.75%; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the single article cap increase from \$1,600 to \$3,200, the state also captured and continues to capture 100% of the state's 7% levy as well as the 2.75% portion of the sales tax levy that is customarily reserved for local government on the added sale of items with a purchase price above \$1,600; and

WHEREAS, in the 20 years since these provisions took effect, these two changes have combined to result in the state realizing nearly \$2 billion in additional sales tax collections -- \$2 billion that would have benefitted local taxpayers had the historic revenue sharing relationship and single article cap not been altered in 2002; and,

WHEREAS, in the 20 years since these provisions took effect, Tennessee's state leaders have managed the budget with great care and a strong fiscally conservative approach to create a dynamic and growing economy with eight consecutive years of surplus revenues; and,

WHEREAS, in the 20 years since these provisions took effect, the State of Tennessee's sustained economic and fiscal performance have erased the conditions which led to these austerity measures in 2002; and,

WHEREAS there is expected to be a surplus of recurring revenues produced by the economic engines of our state and managed by its leaders; and,

WHEREAS, as a result of the accolades bestowed upon the state for its economic success, its fiscally conservative policies and strong leadership, the state has garnered an enviable reputation as the state in which to live, work and play; and,

WHEREAS, a consequence of this reputation has led to continued and substantial economic growth and an increase and realignment of the state's population, thereby increasing the fiscal pressures on municipal governments to meet demands to expand and maintain infrastructure, to deliver essential services, to provide the amenities that allow for continued quality of life for Tennessee's citizens, and to promote an economic environment that allows Tennessee's businesses and communities to prosper; and,

WHEREAS these fiscal pressures create the need for recurring dollars to keep pace with this demand and to counteract the effects of inflation; and,

WHEREAS, correcting the provisions which took effect in 2002 will help to offset these fiscal pressures and to provide relief to local taxpayers shouldering the burden of meeting this demand which is associated with generating the sales tax revenues accruing to the state.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Munford on behalf of its residents, formally supports the restoration of the historic revenue sharing relationship of recurring state shared sales taxes in order for cities to receive once again 4.6% of all state general fund sales tax revenue. The Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Munford also formally supports the state allowing local governments to receive the local share of sales tax revenues realized by increasing the single article cap in 2002 to collect on items with a purchase price between \$1,600 and \$3,200.

# A RESOLUTION TO CHANGE THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF MUNFORD TO DEFINE ELECTED OFFICIALS' TERMS OF SERVICE

AN ACT to amend Chapter 75 of the Private Acts of 2005; as amended by Chapter 112 of the Private Acts of 2006; Chapter 67 of the Private Acts of 2016; and any other acts amendatory thereto, relative to the charter of the city of Munford.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Chapter 75 of the Private Acts of 2005; as amended by Chapter 112 of the Private Acts of 2006; Chapter 67 of the Private Acts of 2016; and any other acts amendatory thereto, is amended by deleting Section 6 and substituting instead the following:

SECTION 6. The city of Munford shall be governed by a board to consist of a mayor and six (6) aldermen. The board is empowered to pass all ordinances necessary for the government of the city, and to have charge of the government, and to do and perform all acts necessary and proper for the government of the city not otherwise provided for by this act.

The board shall be elected by the qualified voters as provided herein at an election to be held at the regular November election. As established pursuant to a prior private act the six (6) aldermen shall serve staggered, four-year terms and the mayor shall serve a four-year term.

The three aldermen elected in November 2022 shall serve a four-year term ending at the first regular meeting following the 2022 election and certification of election. The three aldermen and the mayor elected in November 2024 shall serve a four-year term ending at the first regular meeting following the 2024 election and certification of election. Thereafter all successful candidates for mayor and aldermen shall begin their term of office at the first regular meeting after the election and certification of election and shall continue to hold their respective offices until their successors are elected and certified.

All elections of the city of Munford shall be held by the Tipton County election commission, under the general laws of the state of Tennessee governing elections, or by such officer or officers and in such manner as the laws of the state may prescribe.

If there is a tie vote between the two (2) or more persons having the highest number of votes for an office, the board of mayor and aldermen shall cast the deciding vote, or, in the alternative, the board of mayor and aldermen may, by resolution, call for a run-off election between the tied candidates.

The mayor, subject to the approval of the board, shall employ a recorder who may also be employed as finance director or treasurer or both for the city. The

recorder employed under the provisions of this act shall serve at the pleasure of the board of mayor and aldermen.

The board shall elect an alderman to the office of vice mayor at the first regular meeting after each municipal election has been certified, who shall serve as mayor when the mayor is absent or unable to discharge the duties of the mayor's office, and, in the case of a vacancy in the office of mayor, until the next regular municipal election.

SECTION 2. This act shall have no effect unless it is approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the legislative body of the city of Munford. Its approval or non-approval shall be proclaimed by the presiding officer of the legislative body and certified to the secretary of state.

SECTION 3. For the purpose of approving or rejecting the provisions of this act, it shall be effective upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it. For all other purposes, it shall become effective as provided in Section 2.
