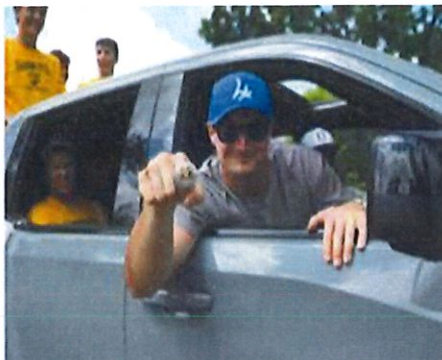
City offices to close for holiday

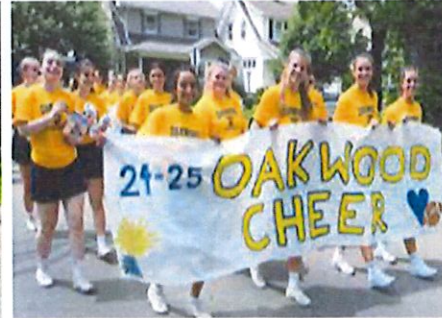
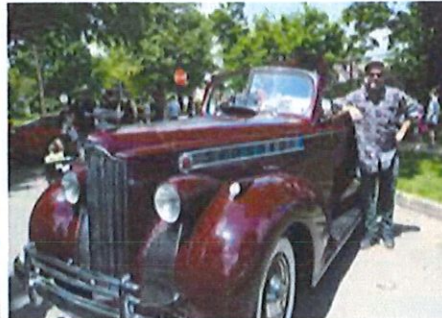

Consultant hired in search for new city manager

The city of Oakwood has selected Management Advisory Group, LLC, to support the search for a new city manager, as mandated by the Oakwood City Charter, which stipulates that the

five-person City Council is responsible for this selection process.

On April 1, City Manager Norbert Klopsch announced his planned retirement in November of this year.

In the coming weeks, Oakwood City Council will collaborate with Management Advisory Group to establish the process for identifying and appointing a new city manager.

Oakwood participating in new Rumpke recycling effort

Rumpke Waste and Recycling recently announced the expansion of their acceptable items by adding hard-to-recycle plastics as part of the Hefty ReNew Program.

The city of Oakwood collects recyclables weekly from residential households and delivers them to the Rumpke material recovery facility for sorting and eventual conversion into new materials. The Hefty ReNew Program allows residents to purchase specific orange bags from local retailers and place materials in those bags that were previously unacceptable in the loose co-mingled recyclable container. Once the orange bag is full, simply place it in your current co-mingled container at your home or in the co-mingled recycle container at the Recycling and Yard Waste Drop-Off Facility located at the entrance to the J. David Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard. The orange bag is delivered to Rumpke where it is removed from the loose

recyclables and separated for delivery to specialized recyclers. This program is optional for those residents who wish to further reduce their waste and recover hard-to-recycle plastics. "The Hefty ReNew Program will allow additional materials to be diverted from the landfill and provide another opportunity for residents to continue

doing their part in responsible recycling," said Doug Spittle, Director of Public Works.

It is important that the co-mingled recycling stream contains only recyclable materials. In years past, the guidance was: "when

in doubt, throw it in the recycling container". The guidance is now: "learn what is recyclable and what is not, but when in doubt, throw it in the regular trash."

Mayor proclaims May as 'Codebreaker Month'

In a nod to Oakwood's remarkable historical figures, Mayor William D. Duncan declared May as "Codebreaker Month" during the scheduled Council Meeting on May 6. This proclamation is in recognition of Joseph Desch, a pioneering American engineer whose groundbreaking work in cryptography during World War II made a pivotal contribution to the Allied victory.

Desch, a Dayton native and longtime Oakwood resident, led the development of the American Cryptanalytic Bombe machine under the United States Naval Computing Machine Laboratory. His innovative work provided the Allies crucial intelligence by breaking complex Enigma-encrypted messages in near-real time, significantly shortening the duration of the war and saving numerous lives. Desch's achievements not only helped to shape the outcome of the war, but also laid foundational stones for modern automated cryptography and computing.

During the ceremony at City Hall, Mayor Duncan delved into Desch's extraordinary contributions and their lasting impact on technology and global cooperation. This event is a significant milestone in celebrating a local hero whose legacy continues to inspire advancements in science and technology.
