## Smith Gardens 50th Anniversary Celebration and Blanket Concert

The event will start with a group from the Ohio School of Falconry in Columbus who will demonstrate the sport of falconry. It promises to be a great display and performance including several birds of prey. Then at 5:30, Stan the Magic Man will join the celebration. Additionally,



as a part of the celebration there will be a beautiful sculpture on display built by well-known local artist, Michael Bashaw. At 7 p.m. Oakwood City Council will conduct a formal opening of the celebration and will recognize Leisure Services Director Carol Collins for 50 years of public service to Oakwood. Thereafter, by the last blanket concert of the season will commence. It will feature the popular group, the Puzzle of Light. Members of the Smith family will be present to celebrate this 50th anniversary. Refreshments will be served during the event.

Located at the corner of Walnut Lane and Oakwood Avenue, Smith Gardens is open to the public from sunrise to sunset, year around. It provides a spectacular splash of intense color eight months out of the year and is a favorite place for many in our community and throughout the Dayton region.

Just shy of an acre, Smith Gardens includes landscape design incorporating several rock garden areas. The rock for these gardens was transported in the 1930s from the Yellow Springs area and provides the foundation for the overall garden layout and design. Incorporated in the middle section of the Garden is a sloped rock garden with a flowing stream running into a pond stocked with an abundance of goldfish and water lilies. Perennials line the east side of the Gardens with several hundred plant varieties in irregularly shaped and curved beds. On the northwest side of the Gardens is a garden

house with a patio where visitors may sit, rest and enjoy the beauty and tranquility of the setting. The Gardens offer exceptionally beautiful views in the spring, summer and fall months with thousands of blooming bulbs, annuals and perennials.

Smith Gardens was graciously donated to the city by Mr. & Mrs. Carlton W. Smith, who lived on the south side of Walnut Lane, across the street from the Gardens. Receipt of the Gardens was accomplished through two actions of Oakwood City Council. On December 16, 1974, Council adopted Ordinance No. 2899 "to accept the donation of certain real estate from Jeannette H. Smith, and to authorize the creation of a certain trust account for the maintenance of a portion of said real estate." The ordinance goes on to read: "This city hereby accepts two deeds of gift from Jeannette H. Smith donating certain real estate to the City of Oakwood, one parcel of which to be known as Smith Memorial Gardens and the other parcel to be sold to obtain funds for the maintenance of said Garden." On December 30, 1974, Council adopted Ordinance No. 2901 which established the Carlton W. Smith and Jeannette H. Smith Memorial Garden Trust.

The City of Oakwood was honored to receive the gift 50 years ago and is pleased that the community continues to recognize the beautiful gardens as a tremendously valuable and singularly unique public space. It has served as a beautiful venue for countless weddings, proposal and photo shoots and has been nationally recognized in Ohio Magazine and in the book "Green ByWays" as being one of the finest public gardens in the state of Ohio. It has long been considered "a secret treasure on an ordinary street."

The special anniversary Smith Gardens concert this year features Puzzle of Light. Puzzle of Light is a world-flavored quintet with roots reaching deep into jazz, blues, folk, African rhythms, Middle Eastern harmonies, Brazilian chords, and Old-World sounds. The band leaps nimbly from one inspiration to the next, wrapping them all in the signature Puzzle sound; in the course of one set, listeners might hear sources as varied as Van Morrison, Leonard Cohen, Duke Ellington, Sting, Stanley Turrentine, John Hyatt and Dave Brubeck, among numerous original tunes.

## August/September Council Meetings



## Orange Notices on Trash Cans and/or Recycling Containers

Where necessary, the Public Works Department will place orange tags to communicate why your trash and/or recycling containers could not be collected. With our unique back-door collection service, we strive to provide you the service you expect, while keeping our workers safe. The orange tags will list the reason for non-collection such as: vehicle in driveway; locked gate; refuse not out; oversize can; can exceeds 60 pounds; or more than three refuse cans. Once the marked reason is addressed, contact the Public Works Department at (937) 298-0777 so we can come back for collection. The city website provides detailed information on our refuse and recycling guidelines, and our Refuse Handbook is available on the website as well. ## **Brush and Branch Trimming**

Please take time this summer to inspect the trees and shrubs on your property frontage and in alleys. City ordinances require a clear height of 8 feet above the sidewalk and 14 feet above the street and alley. Also, vegetation must be cut so that it does not encroach the sidewalk, street or alley, or restrict your view as you pull out of your driveway. If you live on a corner lot, be sure that motorists have a clear line of sight from each side of the intersection. Citizens residing near stop signs and other street signs must ensure that vegetation does not obstruct the signs.



## NEW Hefty ReNew<sup>™</sup> Program Offering Additional Recycling Options

The Hefty ReNew<sup>™</sup> Program started in April 2024 and provides an option for hard-to-recycle plastics that were previously unaccepted in the recycling stream. The Hefty ReNew<sup>™</sup> Program allows residents to purchase specific orange



bags from local retailers and place acceptable materials in these bags. Once the orange bag is full,

simply place it in your current co-mingled container at your home or in the co-mingled recycle container at the Recycling and Yard Waste Drop-Off Facility, at the entrance to the J. ### Labor Day Refuse Collections

City offices will be closed on Monday, September 2 in recognition of Labor Day. Refuse collection will be one day later than usual that week. Monday's route will be collected Tuesday; Tuesday's route will be collected Wednesday; Wednesday's route will be collected Thursday; and Thursday's route will be collected Friday.



### **Special Pickups**

To arrange for a special pickup (furniture, appliances, etc.), complete the online special pickup form on the city website at www.oakwoodohio.gov or call the Public Works Department at (937) 298-0777. Items for special pickup must be placed on a driveway or other paved surface and must be accessible by city equipment. Special pickups are not available during the published fall leaf collection season from mid-October through the end of the year, so please plan your projects accordingly.

## Lawn Treatment on City-Owned Public Lawn Areas

Well-kept lawns and green spaces within the city are an important part of the health of these areas and maintaining Oakwood's ambiance. The city has used Integrated Pest Management (IPM) practices for a number of years on the city-owned public lawn areas which include parks, boulevards, athletic fields, and around public buildings. IPM is an ecosystem-based strategy that focuses on long-term prevention of pests or their damage through a combination of techniques such as biological control, habitat manipulation, modification of cultural practices, and use of resistant varieties. Pesticides are used only after monitoring indicates they are needed according to established guidelines, and treatments are made with the goal of removing only the target organism. Pest control materials are selected and applied in a manner that minimizes risks to human health, beneficial and nontarget organisms, and the environment. Our practices include adherence to proper mowing heights and the use of sharp blades on mowers which helps reduce the amount of chemicals used in all of the public areas. The city requires that all lawn care contractors, whether treating for pests or weeds, are properly licensed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and follow all applicable laws and rules promulgated by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

In our parks, lawn care treatments require the posting of temporary signage in conspicuous locations at least two days prior to treatment. The day of treatment, the city Horticulturist and/or Recreation Supervisor meet the contractor on-site prior to the application of any treatment. They ensure that children are not present in the area to be treated and that the area is otherwise clear for the application, before allowing the contractor to proceed with lawn treatment. Immediately following treatment, the city verifies that all signs are properly placed, and are then promptly removed 24 hours thereafter. Only areas with weeds and pests are spot sprayed, not the entire green space as this is a part of the IPM practice to limit chemical use yet still keep the community greenspace as healthy as possible. ## Johnny Appleseed Tree Planting Project

The city of Oakwood and the Oakwood Beautification Committee will again offer trees for purchase through the Johnny Appleseed Street Tree Planting Project. Applications and detailed brochures describing the project and the tree species will be available in late September at the OCC and on the city website. Oakwood property owners may choose from four or five varieties of trees. The trees selected will be approximately 2 inches in diameter and will be discounted at 50%. One tree will be allocated for each approved property site at the discounted price but must be planted in the city right-of-way (property frontage). Trees will be planted in the latter part of November or early December. They will be planted by a local nursery, wrapped, staked, mulched and guaranteed for one growing season. ## **Back to School Safety Tips**

As summer comes to an end and students prepare for a new school year, the Oakwood Public Safety Department offers the following back to school safety tips.

#### **Tips for Drivers**

Drivers need to be aware that school is back in session and students will be walking and riding their bicycles to and from school.

- Watch for children running into the street in and around intersections and always come to a complete stop at stop signs.
- Watch for children entering the street from behind parked vehicles.
- When driving your child to school, deliver and pick them up in a designated area.
- Watch your speed when entering school zones. Traffic safety is one of the cornerstones of law enforcement services provided by the Oakwood Public Safety Department and school zone speed limits are strictly enforced.

#### Tips for Walkers

As a walking community, Oakwood pedestrian traffic drastically increases when a new school year starts. Parents and students should be cautious of their surroundings as they commute to and from school.

- Pay attention to all traffic signals.
- If crossing Far Hills Avenue, cross at one of the four designated locations where a crossing guard is located (Far Hills Avenue & Aberdeen Avenue, Far Hills Avenue & Park Avenue, Far Hills Avenue & Patterson Road, and Five Points intersection).
- Plan a safe walking route to school. Choose the most direct route with fewest street crossings.
- Look both ways when crossing a street, even if you have a green light.





#### **Bicycle Safety Tips**

Bicycles are a popular way for students in Oakwood to commute to and from school.

- Don't take short cuts; follow the same path of travel as if you were walking to and from school.
- Always wear a bike helmet that is properly sized.
- Ensure the bike is properly maintained.
- Avoid wearing headphones. Music and podcasts can be distracting and cause a person to ignore potential hazards.

#### Personal Safety for Kids

- Encourage your children to be alert and aware of their surroundings.
- Teach your children to report suspicious persons to you, teachers, police officers or other responsible adults.
- If encountered by a suspicious vehicle or person, children should take notice of the color and model of vehicle, license plate number, detailed description of subject including clothing, and any other distinguishing marks.

In an effort to keep everyone safe, the Oakwood Public Safety Department encourages parents to discuss these safety tips with your children. Do not assume your child knows what to do.

## Historical Marker – Four Mile Tavern

Oakwood's fifth historical marker developed by The Oakwood Historical Society commemorates the Four Mile Tavern, a storied building that dated to the early 1800s. The marker was installed with the assistance of the City of Oakwood in the sidewalk near the corner of Far Hills and Hilltop Avenues.

This marker is the third historical marker that The Oakwood Historical Society has unveiled thanks to a generous grant from The Rotary Club of Oakwood.

The Four Mile Tavern served as a place of respite for travelers and a gathering place for those living in the nearby rural area. The tavern was named for the four mile journey from downtown Dayton along Lebanon Pike. It was demolished circa 1912.

## Leisure Services Director Carol Collins – 50th Anniversary

In conjunction with the Smith Gardens 50th anniversary event, the city will celebrate 50 years of public service by Leisure Services Director Carol Collins. On April 11, 2024 Carol Collins became the longest serving city employee in the history of Oakwood at 49 years, seven months and 23 days, and on August 19, 2024 Carol reaches the amazing 50-year milestone. Carol joined city staff on August 19, 1974 after graduating from The Ohio State University. She served as City Horticulturist from her hire date until March 30, 1998 when Carol was promoted to Leisure Services Director.

As Horticulturist, Carol was responsible for the public landscaping and public space beautification all around Oakwood, with primary emphasis on Smith Gardens. Upon being appointed Leisure Services Director, Carol retained responsibilities for overseeing Smith Gardens and all other horticulture work around the city, and also assumed responsibility for all recreation and leisure activities offered by the city, including community festivals and celebrations, public parks, natural areas, Gardner Memorial Pool, Old River Sports Complex and the all programs at the Oakwood Community Center. #### **Training and Professional Development**

We dove head-first into professional development and learning opportunities. A group of educators took part in a STEM Summit (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) to learn about new initiatives and best practices to prepare our students for the future. We look forward to taking a strategic look at our STEM initiatives at Oakwood and supporting this important work in our classrooms.

We also have teachers who started Ohio's comprehensive training for the "science of reading," a research-backed method for teaching reading. It focuses on essential skills like phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension to help every child become a proficient reader. By enhancing teachers' knowledge and instructional techniques, we know our students will benefit.

#### Safety & Security

Safety and security in a school district go far beyond locking doors and state-of-the-art security cameras. While those things are important, we know to create a welcoming and safe environment for all students, it takes other key initiatives to build a culture of inclusion and respect.

This summer, we reviewed our PBIS (positive behavioral interventions and support systems). #### **Air Quality Monitor**

If you're concerned about off-gassing from pressed wood or particles emitted from wind-blown dust, mold spores, pollen, or wildfires, this monitor can detect dangerous levels in areas such as a baby's room, workshop, or next to a gas fireplace.

#### **Radon Detector**

Monitor your home's air quality for radon, a naturally occurring, radioactive, odorless, and tasteless gas that's around us every day. This battery-operated digital detector can be placed anywhere in your home and the first indication of your radon levels can be seen within 24 hours.

#### Vehicle Diagnostic Reader

## Oakwood Community Invited to Participate in Community Read with Wright Library and Dr. Gupta, Oakwood Schools Superintendent

Wright Library and Oakwood Schools will present a Community Read of *The Anxious Generation* by Johnathan Haidt. All community members are invited to read the book and/or participate in a series of discussions at Wright Library on topics addressed in Haidt's book.

#### **Community Conversations**

October 24 & 30; Nov. 14 at Wright Library (limited seating)

In *The Anxious Generation*, Haidt explores the collapse of youth mental health and presents a plan for a healthier, freer childhood. He discusses the decline of the "play-based childhood" and the arrival of the "phone-based childhood" in the early 2010s — and how this "great rewiring of childhood" has interfered with children's social and neurological development. The book also explains why social media damages girls more than boys, and why boys have been withdrawing from the real world into the virtual world, with disastrous consequences for themselves, their families, and their societies.

Haidt describes steps that parents, teachers, schools, tech companies, and governments can take to end the epidemic of mental illness and restore a more humane childhood.

Copies of the book are available through Wright Library Fast Reads and general circulation.

Wright Library also invites the public to a special panel discussion this fall, **Kids & Tech: A Parent's Guide,** with experts in child psychology, socialization, and technology.
