2022 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Project

2022 CenterPoint Gas Line Improvements

CenterPoint (formerly Vectren) continues replacing underground gas distribution pipes and home service lines in Oakwood neighborhoods. Maps on the city website identify work programmed for 2022. In all work areas, CenterPoint is installing new polyethylene pipes in place of old steel and cast-iron pipes and is moving indoor gas meters to outside wall locations. This is the continuation of a multi-year CenterPoint infrastructure replacement project in Oakwood scheduled to be completed in 2023. Oakwood residents personally affected by the work will receive detailed information from CenterPoint. Orange Notices on Trash Cans and/or Recycling Containers

Where necessary, the Public Works Department will place orange tags to communicate why your trash and/or recycling containers could not be collected. With our unique back-door collection service, we strive to provide you the service you expect, while keeping our workers safe. The orange tags will list the reason for non-collection such as: vehicle in driveway; locked gate; refuse not out; oversize can; can exceeds 60 pounds; or more than three refuse cans. Once the marked reason is addressed, contact the Public Works Department at (937) 298-0777 so we can come back for collection. The City website provides detailed information on our refuse and recycling guidelines, and our Refuse Handbook is available on the website as well. 

Lawn Treatment on City-Owned Public Lawn Areas

Well-kept lawns and green spaces within the city are an important part of the health of these areas and maintaining Oakwood's ambiance. The City has used Integrated Pest Management (IPM) practices for a number of years on the city-owned public lawn areas which include parks, boulevards, athletic fields, and around public buildings. IPM is an ecosystem-based strategy that focuses on long-term prevention of pests or their damage through a combination of techniques such as biological control, habitat manipulation, modification of cultural practices, and use of resistant varieties. Pesticides are used only after monitoring indicates they are needed according to established guidelines, and treatments are made with the goal of removing only the target organism. Pest control materials are selected and applied in a manner that minimizes risks to human health, beneficial and nontarget organisms, and the environment. Our practices include adherence to proper mowing heights and the use of sharp blades on mowers which helps reduce the amount of chemicals used in all of the public areas. The City requires that all lawn care contractors, whether treating for pests or weeds, are properly licensed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and follow all applicable laws and rules promulgated by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.



In our parks, lawn care treatments require the posting of temporary signage in conspicuous locations at least two days prior to treatment. The day of treatment, the City Horticulturist and/or Recreation Supervisor meet the contractor on-site prior to the application of any treatment. They ensure that children are not present in the area to be treated and that the area is otherwise clear for the application, before allowing the contractor to proceed with lawn treatment. Immediately following treatment, the City verifies that all signs are properly placed, and are then promptly removed 24 hours thereafter. Only areas with weeds and pests are spot sprayed, not the entire green space as this is a part of the IPM practice to limit chemical use yet still keep the community greenspace as healthy as possible. Brush and Branch Trimming

Please take a few minutes this summer to inspect the trees and shrubs on your property frontage. City ordinances require a clear height of 8 feet above the sidewalk and 14 feet above the street. Also, vegetation should be cut so that it does not restrict your view as you pull out of your driveway. If you live on a corner lot, be sure that motorists have a clear line of sight from each side of the intersection. Citizens residing near stop signs and other street signs must ensure that vegetation does not obstruct the signs.





Johnny Appleseed Street Tree Planting Project

The city of Oakwood and Oakwood Beautification Committee will again offer trees for purchase through the Johnny Appleseed Street Tree Planting Project. Applications and detailed brochures describing the project and the tree species will be available in late September at the OCC and on the City website. Oakwood property owners may choose from four or five varieties of trees. The trees selected will be approximately 2 inches in diameter and will be discounted at 50%. One tree will be allocated for each approved property site at the discounted price but must be planted in the city right-of-way (property frontage). Trees will be planted in the latter part of November or early December. They will be planted by a local nursery, wrapped, staked, mulched and guaranteed for one growing season. Recycling and Yard Debris Drop-off Facility

Late last year, the city opened the new Recycling and Yard Debris Drop-off Facility at the entrance to the J.D. Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard. The facility accommodates the 24/7 drop-off of green waste, cardboard, and co-mingled recyclables such as glass, plastics and metal cans. The facility supplements Oakwood's weekly recycling collection program, and the city's monthly yard debris collection program.



The new facility is very heavily used by Oakwood residents, demonstrating our commitment to best practices in recycling and green waste disposal. While most users engage in the proper use of the facility, the city periodically encounters improper and/or illegal dumping. Security cameras were recently installed at the facility to monitor its use. The city will use these cameras to ensure compliance with dumping rules and will take action when necessary to address improper use.

CodeRED® Now Offers Weather Alerts

The Miami Valley Communications Council recently upgraded its CodeRED system to include CodeRED Weather Warning for its participating cities—including Oakwood—in order to provide residents and businesses with automated severe weather alerts.

Oakwood residents have the opportunity to opt-in to receive automated severe weather alerts via a cell phone. The opt-in service will automatically notify enrollees of tornado, flash flood and severe thunderstorm warnings just moments after an alert has been issued by The National Weather Service (NWS)—allowing residents to take immediate action.



CodeRED already reaches the majority of residents who have a landline phone. However, the City encourages residents and businesses to register their phone number if:

- You have moved or changed your phone number in the last 6 months
- You have an unlisted phone number
- You use your cell phone as your primary phone number
- You use TDD/TTY equipment
- You are a business.

Back to School Safety Tips

As summer comes to an end and students prepare for a new school year, the Oakwood Public Safety Department offers the following back-to-school safety tips.



TIPS FOR DRIVERS

Drivers need to be aware that school is back in session and students will be walking and riding their bicycles to and from school.

- Watch for children running into the street in and around intersections and always come to a complete stop at stop signs.
- Watch for children entering the street from behind parked vehicles.
- When driving your child to school, deliver and pick them up in a designated area.
- Watch your speed when entering school zones. Traffic safety is one of the cornerstones of law enforcement services provided by the Oakwood Public Safety Department and school zone speed limits are strictly enforced.

TIPS FOR WALKERS

As a walking community, Oakwood pedestrian traffic drastically increases when a new school year starts. Parents and students should be cautious of their surroundings as they commute to and from school.

- Pay attention to all traffic signals.
- If crossing Far Hills Avenue, cross at one of the four designated locations where a crossing guard is located (Far Hills Avenue & Aberdeen Avenue, Far Hills Avenue & Park Avenue, Far Hills Avenue & Patterson Road, and Five Points intersection).
- Plan a safe walking route to school. Choose the most direct route with the fewest street crossings.
- Look both ways when crossing a street, even if you have a green light.

BICYCLE SAFETY TIPS

Bicycles are a popular way for students in Oakwood to commute to and from school.

- Don't take shortcuts; follow the same path of travel as if you were walking to and from school.
- Always wear a bike helmet that is properly sized.
- Ensure the bike is properly maintained.
- Avoid wearing headphones. Music and podcasts can be distracting and cause a person to ignore potential hazards.

PERSONAL SAFETY FOR KIDS

- Encourage your children to be alert and aware of their surroundings.
- Teach your children to report suspicious persons to you, teachers, police officers or other responsible adults.
- If encountered by a suspicious vehicle or person, children should take notice of the color and model of vehicle, license plate number, detailed description of the subject including clothing, and any other distinguishing marks.

In an effort to keep everyone safe, the Oakwood Public Safety Department encourages parents to discuss these safety tips with your children. Do not assume your child knows what to do.



Labor Day Refuse Collections

City offices will be closed on Monday, September 5 in recognition of Labor Day. Refuse collection will be one day later than usual that week. Monday's route will be collected Tuesday; Tuesday's route will be collected Wednesday; Wednesday's route will be collected Thursday; and Thursday's route will be collected Friday.



Special Pickups

To arrange for a special pickup (furniture, appliances, etc.), complete the online special pickup form on the city website at www.oakwoodohio.gov or call the Public Works Department at (937) 298-0777. Items for special pickup must be placed on a driveway or other paved surface (not in the street), and must be accessible by city equipment. **Special pickups are not available during the fall leaf collection season from mid-October through the end of the year, so please plan your projects accordingly.**



Veteran Memorials in Oakwood

The city of Oakwood has two memorials to recognize and honor the service of our nation's Veterans.

"Veterans Corner" is located under the flags in the northeast corner of Lane Stadium. Under the leadership of Councilmember Rob Stephens, the memorial was established by the Oakwood Rotary Club and dedicated on October 21, 2017.

"Veterans Memorial" is located in the middle of Orchardly Park. The memorial was created by Girl Scout Troop 30149 and was dedicated on November 10, 2018.



Free Community Document Shred Event

It's time to get rid of those papers you've been saving! Bring the items to the J. D. Foell Public Works Center at 210 Shafer Blvd. on Saturday, September 24 from 8:00 to 11:00 a.m.

Shred-It will be onsite providing document destruction services. In addition to paper products, they have the capability to destroy microfilm, microfiche, and other material of a secure or confidential nature. All material will be destroyed beyond recognition on-site and, if recyclable, will be baled and shipped to paper mills to be manufactured into new paper products. Any non-recyclable material processed will be disposed of in a secure location. If you have confidential papers or other material of a private nature being stored at your home and would like to have it destroyed, please take advantage of this opportunity. There will be individuals on-hand to assist you with unloading your documents. This event is free of charge. Please be prepared to present identification confirming residency.

Wright Library Adds New Gardens

Two new gardens featuring Ohio’s indigenous plants were established this spring thanks to community volunteers and grant funding. The library’s recent ecology education programs galvanized support from local civic groups and individuals interested in adding native plants in urban landscapes to support local and migrating pollinators and birds.

“The community has provided wonderful support. Initially, the scope of the project was much smaller, but once we began to seek funding and volunteers, partners emerged from all directions.” said Kate Chesar, community engagement specialist who has worked closely with this project.



About the Gardens

Sun Garden: Located on the southeast corner of the library’s lot, it consists of 32 different species of plants and meets the qualifications required to become part of the Monarch Waystation Program. Educational signs will be placed within the garden to educate passersby on the importance of pollinators and the benefits of including native plants in the urban landscape.

Shade Garden: Landscaping on the northeast side of the library building will feature shade loving native plants. Pawpaws—the official native tree of Ohio—other understory shrubs and trees, and a variety of Ohio’s beautiful spring ephemeral wildflowers and groundcover will be established in the coming months.


