Suggested instructions for the


placement of luminarias is:

# Oakwood City Council approves top salary rates for municipal employees

Oakwood City Council on Monday approved top salary and pay rates for municipal workers. Council noted that the compensation cited is the top salary per position, and some city employees may be paid at lower annual or hourly rates. The top rates of compensation provided for in the newly approved Personnel Schedule take effect with the pay period beginning Dec. 19.

# City Council approves 2023 funding, pay raises

Oakwood City Council on Monday approved a municipal budget for 2023 funding that allocates expenditures of \$20.92 million for major operating funds, including \$14.81 million in general fund expenditures, \$1.49 million budgeted for street maintenance and repair, and \$1.32 million for leisure services. The city is budgeting \$1.5 million in refuse fund expenditures, \$1.99 million for the water operating fund, \$2.6 million in sanitary sewer funds, and \$1.8 million in stormwater funds. Total expenditures across all municipal funds is projected at \$30.39 million, but after a transfer adjustment of \$6.1 million, net total expenditures for the city in 2023 are forecast as \$24.21 million.

City Manager Norb Klopsch noted that the 2023 city budget represents no increase in income or property taxes or user fees for residents next year, adding that all municipal funds are "healthy and in good shape financially." Klopsch added, however, that city officials may have to weigh "potential fee increases" for residential services like water, sewer and refuse collection as they look to plan the 2024 budget next spring.

City Council also unanimously approved 2.95 percent pay increases for all non-bargaining unit employees, except season or temporary employees, for 2023, and authorized 2.95 percent pay hikes for Oakwood Municipal Court employees. The pay hikes are in line with what city lawmakers approved earlier this year for public safety officers and city employees covered by collective bargaining agreements.

"These are responsible increases for our non-union employees that are consistent with the raises authorized by our current collective bargaining agreements for union employees," said Oakwood Mayor Bill Duncan, adding that "pay for temporary, seasonal employees has also been increased to ensure these positions remain competitive in the job market."

In authorizing pay increases at Oakwood Municipal Court, Duncan noted that "by law, the Oakwood Municipal judge determines the actual salary for each court employee, but the City Council is responsible for setting the maximum amount to be paid for each job classification." Council approved maximum pay rates of

\$62,662.07 annually for the Oakwood Municipal Court clerk, \$54,689.42 annually for the deputy clerk of court, and compensations rates of \$646.33 per month for the Oakwood Municipal Court bailiff and \$25.59 per hour for the court's part-time probation officer.

In other business, City Council approved several housekeeping ordinances, including legislation addressing the disposal of lost, abandoned, stolen, seized or forfeited property to eliminate a 60-day holding period, and an ordinance to update traffic and general offenses codes to align city statutes with state codes.

City Council also authorized the renewal of a land lease agreement between the city and Enterprise Roofing and Sheet Metal Co. and Irving Commons Association, both located on Irving Avenue in Dayton. Enterprise Roofing and Irving Commons lease a one-third acre parcel of land owned by Oakwood which is utilized as a parking area. The city owns sub-surface water lines on the parcel in question but permits leaseholders to use above-ground space for parking under terms of the lease agreement.

Employees in the positions covered by the Personnel Schedule who have completed a minimum of one year service, but less than six work years, receive 12 days of vacation. Employees who have completed six work years, but less than 11 work years, are eligible for 14 days of vacation. Employees who have completed 11 work years, but less than 16 work years, receive 18 days of vacation. Employees who have completed 16 work years, but less than 20 work years, receive 20 days of vacation. Employees who have completed 20 work years, but less than 25 work years, receive 22 days of vacation. Employees who have completed 25 work years or more receive 25 days of vacation annually.

Every city employee is entitled to

one additional day of vacation for each three days of unused sick leave that employee may have accumulated in excess of 90 days. This exchange of sick leave for vacation leave is limited to a maximum of five additional vacation days per work year.

City employees also are entitled to holidays on New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Day, Presidents' Day, Memorial Day, Juneteenth Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veterans' Day, Thanksgiving Day, Day after Thanksgiving, Christmas Day, and the employee's birthday. Except as may be otherwise provided by law, if a holiday falls on a Saturday, the preceding Friday will be observed as a holiday; and where a holiday would fall on a Sunday, the following Monday will be observed as a holiday.

## Green Oakwood supports resident recycling efforts

Green Oakwood is keen to support and encourage recycling throughout Montgomery County, but the number of volunteers necessitates limiting support services to residents of Oakwood. Green Oakwood is currently working with other local environmental groups to encourage similar services in Dayton and Kettering; should you live outside of Oakwood, we encourage you to approach your local environmental group.

Current programs Green Oakwood is supporting include a Holiday Lights Fundraiser, Styrofoam recycling, and an electronics and ink cartridge fundraiser.

From Dec. 1, unserviceable lights will be collected from the marked containers at Foell Public Works Recycling Center, Oakwood Community Center (back door) and Wright Memorial Library (back door). Lights are taken to a Five Rivers MetroParks location where they will be forwarded for recycling and Five Rivers Metroparks will

receive a donation.

The next styrofoam collection date is Jan 7th from Public Works. Please hold on to it until then and we request you don't leave loose styrofoam by the sign (Public Works is not storing it, and it blows around our beautiful city). This service is always subject to an adequate number of volunteer drivers (who this year will be dropping off at Elizabeth Hoy Park, Centerville).

A new blue trash container is situated in Public Works Recycling Center for electronics and ink cartridges. Steve Binder collects electronics and ink cartridges and delivers them to Charitable Recycling, an organization which then makes a donation to Dayton Children's Hospital.

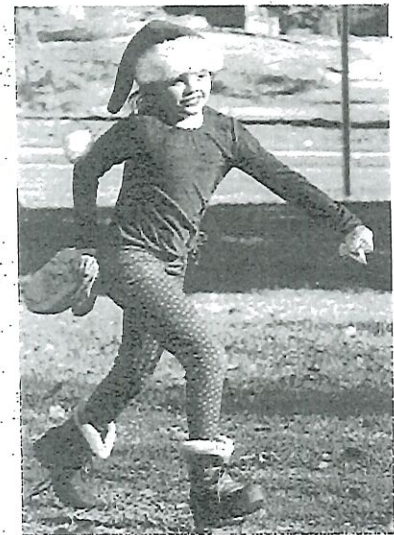

**Subject:** Yard Debris Disposal

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### OAKWOOD, OHIO:

Beginning January 1, 2023, the city of Oakwood will charge a \$150 fee per occurrence to property owners who place yard debris in the street in violation of Oakwood Codified Ordinance 901.01(A)(3). This is an administrative fee for improper debris handling, to recover the costs associated with diverting Public Works resources from regular work to address unscheduled pick-ups throughout the city. This action is being taken to address recurring code violations. Yard debris obstructions in the street pose health, safety and welfare concerns, negatively impact community ambience, and cause delays in the community-wide yard debris collection program. Debris in the street disrupts the stormwater collection system, can be dangerous to vehicles, pedestrians, joggers, and bicyclists, and interferes with on-street parking.

Oakwood offers monthly yard debris pickup by the city where property owners place piles of yard debris – typically brush and branches – at their property frontage just behind the curb or edge of pavement. Under rules of the program, residents may not place yard debris in front of other properties nor in any roadway center medians on boulevard streets, and under no circumstance may property owners or residents place anything in the street or roadway gutter, except leaves during the 10-week fall leaf collection period.

Beginning January 1, 2023, the city's code enforcement officer will respond to yard debris piles placed in the gutter or street by leaving a door-hanger notice at the property affording two business days to remove the obstruction from the street. After two days, the city will remove the obstruction and will charge the property owner \$150.

Property owners who use the city's monthly collection program and wish to construct a hard surface pad (e.g., concrete, brick, paver, etc.) for debris placement should contact the code enforcement officer at (937) 297-2920 for permitting information, or see the city website.

In addition to the monthly city pick-up, Oakwood offers other options for disposing of yard debris, such as the 24/7 Recycling and Yard Waste Drop-off Facility at the J.D. Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard. Also, residents are provided two free special pickups per year, which can be scheduled and used for yard debris. Additionally, dumpsters are available to be delivered free of charge for large amounts of green waste. **GUIDELINES FOR YARD DEBRIS PADS:**

1. **PLOT PLAN:** Since a yard debris pad involves the addition of impervious surface, a plot plan must be submitted showing the dimensions and location of the proposed yard debris pad. The plot plan must also show the lot size, distance from the house to the lot lines, and, the dimensions of any accessory structures and/or existing impervious surfaces.
2. **MATERIALS:** Acceptable materials for yard debris pads include concrete, properly bedded pavers or brick, or approved equals. (The approval of other materials shall be at the discretion of the Director of Public Works, based on compatibility with city yard debris collection equipment and methods.) All concrete work requires separate form and final inspections, and shall provide a minimum concrete thickness of 4 inches.
3. **LICENSED CONTRACTORS:** Contractors working in the Right-of-Way must be licensed by the City of Oakwood.
4. **DIMENSIONS:** Any yard debris pad must be constructed at grade, *i.e.*, it may not be an elevated pad. Allowable dimensions are:
  - Maximum depth of 5' (measured perpendicular to the street)
  - Maximum width of 5' or 1/10<sup>th</sup> of the property's street frontage, whichever is greater
5. **LOCATION:** Yard debris pads must be situated at or within 2' behind the curb (or street edge, if no curb is present). The location must be at least 3' away from any visible utility infrastructure, including but not limited to curb stop water valves, fire hydrants, utility poles, and utility pedestals. Yard debris pads may not abut a service walk if the effect is to expand the service walk beyond dimensions permitted by the Oakwood Zoning Ordinance.
6. **ACKNOWLEDGEMENT:** By submitting this application, the Property Owner acknowledges the following:
  - The owner will maintain the yard debris pad at no expense to the City; if not maintained, the City may, at its option, perform or have such maintenance performed, or remove the pad, with the full cost thereof to be assessed against the real estate as a direct benefit thereto.
  - The owner will not hold the City liable for any damages to the yard debris pad resulting from any of the City's operations.
  - The owner recognizes the City's right to remove the yard debris pad when it may interfere with a public purpose as may be defined or redefined by Council now or in the future.
  - The owner will remove the yard debris pad when it interferes with the use of the right-of-way by the City, its authorized representatives, franchisers, and authorized utility providers. Further, the owner acknowledges that the City, its authorized representatives, franchisers, and authorized utility providers have the right to maintain their existing facilities and/or install new facilities in said location as if the yard debris pad were not installed.
  - In granting permission for placement of a yard debris pad, the City shall have no liability for any damages arising therefrom, and the owner shall indemnify and hold the City harmless from any such damages, including but not limited to direct and indirect expenses incurred in defending the same.

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By law, everyone **MUST** contact the **Ohio Utilities Protection Service, 1-800-362-2764 or 8-1-1**, at least 48 hours but no more than 10 working days (excluding weekends and legal holidays) before beginning ANY digging project.

**Subject:** Use of electric scooters on public streets and sidewalks  
**Date:** December 9, 2022

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OAKWOOD, OHIO:

The Oakwood Public Safety Department is reminding residents of the rules for safe operation of electric scooters on public streets and sidewalks. They are legal on both streets and sidewalks, but different rules apply.

When used on sidewalks, electric scooters are subject to the same requirements that apply to bicycles. This means that scooter operators must always yield the right of way to pedestrians on foot. Reckless operation – which includes erratic riding, hand-held cell phone use or other distracted riding, unsafe speeds, or other careless behavior – is prohibited. When crossing a street, riders should cross with the appropriate light or walk/don't walk signal if one is present. Otherwise, they have the right of way as long as they are in a crosswalk and exercise due caution not to enter the street in front of oncoming traffic.

When used in the streets, the law treats electric scooters the same as a jogger or pedestrian using the street. This means users must ride on the left side of the road to ensure that they can see oncoming vehicular traffic. In addition, while scooters are permitted on most residential streets, they are prohibited on busier thoroughfares including Far Hills Avenue, Shroyer Road, Patterson Road, West Schantz Avenue, and Oakwood Avenue (between Far Hills and Irving Avenues).

"Electric scooters are a lot of fun and a great way for kids to get around, but they can also present challenges in a walking community like Oakwood," said Chief Alan Hill. "Being safety-minded and considerate of others goes a long way towards ensuring our sidewalks are safe for all to use."
