INFORMATION / BACKGROUND

Under Chapter 16.06 of the Ruston Municipal Code (RMC), Ruston adopted the Washington Model Traffic Ordinance (Ch. 46.90 RCW and Chapter 308-330 WAC). Under RCW 46.61.415(3) and WAC 308-330-270, the City Council may change a speed limit to 20 miles per hour ("MPH"). Give that Ruston is becoming more dense with increasing pedestrian traffic, the Mayor's office requested that an ordinance to reduce speed limits on most Ruston streets be brought forward. Lower speed limits support and encourage motor vehicle travel at lower and more appropriate travel speeds and lower travel speeds for motor vehicles lead to reduced risk of motor vehicle crashes, reduced severity of injuries for crashes that do occur, and a reduced risk that such crashes will result in fatal injury for all road users. In addition, crashes involving pedestrians are more survivable the lower the speed of the traveling vehicle.

In order to reduce speed limits, RMC 16.01.020 which establishes a speed limit within the City needs to be amended to reduce speed limits on certain streets. Currently, the city-wide speed limit is 25 MPH with 30 MPH on Pearl Street (a State highway), 15 MPH in the former Ruston Tunnel and in alleys, and 20 MPH on Commercial Street between Winnifred and Baltimore. If approved, Ordinance No. 1579 would remove the redundant reference to the Ruston Tunnel, clean up language to change "town" to "city" and would set 20 MPH as the speed limit on the following streets:

N. 49th Street;
 N. 50th Street;
 N. 51st Street;
 N. 52nd Street;

5. N. 53rd Street;
6. N. Baltimore Street;
7. N. Highland Street;
8. N. Shirley Street;
9. N. Winnifred Street; and
10. Park Avenue.

All alleys would remain at 15 MPH limits with any other streets remaining at 25 MPH, except Pearl Street which would remain at 30 MPH. The City cannot change the speed limit on state highways without the approval of the Washington State Secretary of Transportation.

RECOMMENDATION / MOTION

Adopt Ordinance No. 1579.

MOTION: I move adoption of Ordinance No. 1579 establishing new reduced speed limits to 20 Miles Per Hour on specific city streets, amending Section 16.01.020 of the Ruston Municipal Code, providing for severability, publication, and corrections, and establishing an effective date.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>1579</u>

ORDINANCE OF CITY AN THE OF RUSTON, WASHINGTON, ESTABLISHING NEW REDUCED SPEED LIMITS TO 20 MILES PER HOUR ON SPECIFIC CITY STREETS, AMENDING SECTION 16.01.020 OF THE RUSTON MUNICIPAL CODE, PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY, PUBLICATION, AND CORRECTIONS, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, under Chapter 16.06 of the Ruston Municipal Code (RMC), Ruston adopted the Washington Model Traffic Ordinance (Ch. 46.90 RCW and Chapter 308-330 WAC); and

WHEREAS, under RCW 46.61.415(3) and WAC 308-330-270, the City Council may

change a speed limit to 20 miles per hour ("MPH"); and

WHEREAS, lower speed limits support and encourage motor vehicle travel at lower and

more appropriate travel speeds; and

WHEREAS, lower travel speeds for motor vehicles lead to reduced risk of motor vehicle

crashes, reduced severity of injuries for crashes that do occur, and a reduced risk that such crashes

will result in fatal injury for all road users; and

WHEREAS, RMC 16.01.020 establishes a speed limit within the City and needs to be

amended to reduce speed limits on certain streets; and

WHEREAS, on May 7, 2024, the City Council held first reading of this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, on May 21, 2024, the City Council adopted this Ordinance during its regular meeting at second reading; NOW, THEREFORE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RUSTON DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. <u>New Speed Limits Adopted.</u> Section 16.01.020 of the Ruston Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

16.01.020 Speed limit.

(a) It is unlawful to operate or move any motor vehicle in the TownCity of Ruston, except upon North Pearl Street, at a speed greater than 25 miles per hour, <u>unless a lower speed limit is set by the City Council</u>. It is unlawful to operate or move any motor vehicle on North Pearl Street in the TownCity of Ruston at a speed greater than 30 miles per hour. It is unlawful to operate or move any motor vehicle over or across any street or alley intersection in said TownCity at a speed greater than 15 miles per hour if the operator's view is obstructed. The operator's view is obstructed when at any time during the last 100 feet of <u>histhe</u> approach to such intersection <u>hethe driver</u> does not have a clear and uninterrupted view of such intersection and of the traffic upon all streets and alleys entering such intersection, for a distance of 300 feet from such intersection. It is unlawful to operate or move any motor vehicle in any alley at a speed greater than 15 miles per hour.

(b) It is unlawful to operate any motor vehicle in the Ruston Tunnel area between 51st Street and the Ruston Town limits at a speed in excess of 15 miles per hour. It is unlawful to operate any motor vehicle upon the following streets within the Ruston City limits at a speed in excess of 20 miles per hour:

1. N. 49 th Street;
2. N. 50 th Street;
3. N. 51 st Street;
4. N. 52 nd Street;
5. N. 53 rd Street;
6. N. Baltimore Street;
7. N. Highland Street;
8. N. Shirley Street;
9. N. Winnifred Street; and
10. Park Avenue.

(c) It is unlawful to operate any motor vehicle on Commercial Street, between its intersections with Winnifred Street and Baltimore Street, at a speed in excess of 20 miles per hour.

<u>Section 2.</u> Severability. If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance should be held to be unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance.

<u>Section 3.</u> Publication. This Ordinance shall be published by an approved summary consisting of the title.

<u>Section 4.</u> Corrections. Upon the approval of the city attorney, the city clerk, and/or the code publisher is authorized to make any necessary technical corrections to this ordinance, including

but not limited to the correction of scrivener's/clerical errors, references, ordinance numbering, section/subsection numbers, and any reference thereto.

<u>Section 5.</u> Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be effective five days after publication as provided by law. The speed limit adopted in Section 1 above will be effective only after both of the following have occurred: (1) this Ordinance has taken effect, and (2) signage with the new speed limit have been installed at all applicable locations.
