REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
TUESDAY, June 20, 2017**

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

At 7:00PM Mayor Hopkins called the Regular Council Meeting to order. Councilmembers present were: Jane Hunt, Lyle Hardin, and Deb Kristovich. Councilmember Jim Hedrick and Councilmember Lynn Syler were excused. Following the flag salute, Mayor Hopkins called for approval of the agenda. Councilmember Hunt moved to approve the Agenda of June 20, 2017, with a second from Councilmember Hardin passed 3-0.

Councilmember Hunt moved to approve the minutes for the Regular Council meeting minutes of June 6, 2017, with a second from Councilmember Hardin, passed 3-0.

BUSINESS

Metro Parks Tacoma – Point Defiance Update. Andrea Smith, President Metro Parks Commissioner, Debbie Terwilleger, Director of Planning and Development, Marty Stump, Design and Construction Manager and Roger Stanton, Project Administrator delivered Power Point presentation of the Destination Point Defiance and Beyond Projects. See attached.

Ruston – Point Defiance Business District - Joe Atkinson, President, presented an update on the Farmers Market which was moved from its original location in Ruston to an empty lot next door to the Antique Sandwich shop in Tacoma. The Business District remains positive that this event will be success again this year. Mr. Atkinson was pleased to hear that the City continues to move forward with the 51st retaining wall repair and thanked Mayor and Council for all that they do in the community.

RES 651 – Pierce County Solid Waste Plan Supplement - Chapter 70.95 RCW requires Counties, in coordination with their Cities and Towns, to adopt comprehensive solid waste plans for the management, handling, and disposal of solid waste for twenty years, and to review and amend or revise the plans every five years, as necessary. Pursuant to Chapter 70.95 RCW, the Pierce County Executive entered into Interlocal Agreements with the Cities and Towns within Pierce County wherein the County agreed to serve as the lead planning agency to maintain the Solid Waste Management Plan and draft revisions as necessary, and to provide a draft of these revisions to the Cities and Towns prior to scheduled County Council public hearing dates. The City of Ruston entered into such Interlocal Agreement on March 19, 2001 as authorized by Resolution No. 325 which was passed on March 5, 2001.

Pierce County, in coordination with the Pierce County Solid Waste Advisory Committee (SWAC) developed the 2016 Supplement to the 2000 Tacoma-Pierce County Solid Waste Management Plan to replace the 2008 Supplement. As part of this process, the SWAC held 11 public meetings and conducted one public hearing, giving the community multiple opportunities to be involved in the drafting and reviewing of the 2016 Supplement. The 2016 Supplement to the 2000 Tacoma-Pierce County Solid Waste Management Plan is a strategic document, identifying goals, objectives and actions necessary to achieve a community vision. The County submitted a draft supplement to the Cities and Towns for review and comment in April 2016. The Pierce County Council adopted the 2016 Supplement by Ordinance 2016-83 on March 23, 2017. The County has established a deadline of July 13, 2017 for the City to adopt the Supplement. Councilmember Hunt moved to approve Resolution 651, with a second from Councilmember Hardin, passed 3-0.

CLAIMS/PAYROLL – Councilmember Hunt moved to approve Payroll, with a second from Councilmember Hardin, passed 3-0.

MAYOR'S TIME – Mayor Hopkins provided an update on the 51st restriping as the final phase of the sewer project work. Project Manager Kevin Moser has been working on the undergrounding utilities project and inspecting poles throughout the City. City Planner White, Building Officer Barth and Mayor Hopkins met regarding the Silver Cloud project and expect the permit to be ready for issuance the end of next week. The Ruston Tunnel Fill project is currently on hold and the 51st Retain Wall project will begin after July 4, 2017.

COUNCIL TIME –

Councilmember Hedrick – Was excused.

Councilmember Hunt – Recommended that the current router at the Ruston School be upgraded and a second router be installed.

Councilmember Hardin – Appreciated Metro Parks presentation and noted that with the Taste of Tacoma and no available parking it would bring unhappy people looking for places to park. Councilmember Hardin asked Metro Parks what the plan was and Debbie Terwilleger, Director of Planning and Development, responded there would be Tacoma Community College shuttles in place to offset the volumes and parking demands.





**Chief's Report
Ruston Police Department
Tuesday June 20, 2017**

Chief of Police:

During the month of May the Police Department responded to 225 calls for service in Ruston compared to 130 calls for service in May of 2016. This number is made up of dispatched calls, officer initiated calls, and traffic stops, and it does not include any calls for service that took place in the City of Tacoma where Ruston officers responded.

During the month 53 subjects were issued citations for criminal traffic offences, primarily Suspended Driving. Out of those 35 people came to City Hall to redeem their cars out of impound by paying the \$100 administrative fee to the City of Ruston.

Other Personnel Issues:

Civil Service Commission:

The Civil Service Commission certified the list for Sergeant. There were three applicants, all of which had supervisory experience. Rod Baker stood out as superior because he was the Chief of Pierce Transit Public Safety. As a previous Chief in the local area he is already familiar with many of the systems we use, the department heads we work with and the area that we police. He was ranked #1 by the Civil Service Commission and I also ranked him #1 based on the three resumes I reviewed.

Officer Calitis completed a background investigation and Mr. Baker also recently passed his Polygraph Examination. He is scheduled for the Psychological Exam tomorrow and if all goes well I will offer him the job later this week.

This will bring Ruston PD to full authorized manning.

Equipment:

Judge Allen, Cathy and I have been talking about ways to comply with Federal mandates regarding fingerprints associated with arrests. Ruston PD uses Criminal

Citations for most arrests which means the subjects are not booked into jail. That means that no fingerprints are ever collected for these subjects. The FBI will not list a conviction for a subject unless there is a set of fingerprints for that person. The State and FBI are strongly suggesting that all departments begin collecting fingerprints for all convicted subjects.

I have been collecting bids for a "livescan" that can collect the fingerprints and send them to the state and will be applying for a grant next year. The grant is only available at the beginning of each year. In the meantime Cathy is having to collect data from the jail when a subject is booked in order to get the FBI to count the convictions we are getting in our court. The livescan processing would be a regular part of our court process on arraignment day. I contacted several agencies in the area and learned that Puyallup will do it for us at a cost of \$50 per subject, however the logistics and costs made that idea prohibitive.

More to come.

Training:

Jeff Evans attended an 8 hours carbine training class and brought back some ideas to incorporate into our annual training.

I attended a 15 hour International Latino Gang Investigators Association gang training in Ontario, CA. I am a member of the advisory board of the organization so my attendance was covered by the organization.
