## **Mayors Corner**

With the increased traffic to Pt Ruston and Pt Defiance we find our city struggling with significant traffic challenges. We are expecting higher traffic volumes this summer than we saw last year. The Pt Ruston developer has traffic mitigation measures that they will need to implement soon. Tacoma is overseeing the traffic mitigation for the development and there are milestones that trigger the improvements. All the traffic improvements are in the City of Tacoma, but they have a direct impact on Ruston residents getting to and from your homes. The mitigation is in phases and is triggered by traffic counts. Included in the first phase is new curb, gutter, and sidewalks on Baltimore Street from N 49th St to N. 46th St. These improvements will widen the roadway and allow for better traffic flow in and out of Ruston.

Traffic in and around Winnifred St and 51st St led to council evaluating whether a traffic light was needed instead of the current four ways stop. The recommendation was to keep the four ways stop and seek a grant for pedestrian traffic signalization. The plan is to signalize the intersection and allow pedestrians to initiate a four-way directional crossing signal. We will find out in the coming months whether we were successful in obtaining the grant money for this project.

## **From the Police Department**

In recent weeks the Ruston PD has seen an alarming trend in bank fraud against Ruston residents. I have not noted any commonality among the victims. Some have had checks taken and cashed, while another had a debit card used to purchase services online. In most of the cases there is almost no way of identifying the crook because they are purchasing services instead of items to be delivered. These cases are particularly frustrating because the victims are often scammed out of hundreds of dollars before they know the money is gone. So, let me take this opportunity to make some suggestions to keep your hard-earned money secure. Change access codes and passwords frequently. I was once told that when daylight savings time starts and stops is a great time to change your smoke alarm batteries (sorry to steal your thunder Chief Torbet). Why not take that time to also change passwords on your financial accounts.

If you use checks to pay bills make sure you drop those checks off in a mail box like the one in front of City Hall. Don't put them in your mail box in front of your house because it is very easy for someone to stop by and help themselves. When you order new checks have them delivered somewhere secure. Maybe a work address or a relative that is home all the time.

Just a few small changes to the way you do business can save you hundreds of dollars.

#### **Tips for Fire Safety:**

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas
- Test smoke alarms every month. If they're not working, change the batteries
- Talk with all family members about a fire escape plan and practice the plan twice a year
- If a fire occurs in your home, **GET OUT, STAY OUT and CALL FOR HELP**. Never go back inside for anything or anyone

At your request, we will come and help change batteries in your smoke detectors, look for overloaded circuits and talk about escape plans. This is a great chance to meet your firefighters, make sure your kids are comfortable with seeing us in all of our gear and most importantly, make sure your home is as safe as possible to prevent a fire from happening.
