## Repurposing the Old - A behind the scenes look into the City's demo project - By Courtney Scott, Fire Department

You may have noticed a brand spanking new parking lot where the house at 1309 5<sup>th</sup> Ave once stood. The lot is a temporary fixture until construction efforts begin on projects associated with the newly approved Essential Facilities Strategic Plan. But what you may not have known is the house's **historical** tie to the Fire Department and the salvaging efforts that went into the demolition process.



## Did you know? Historical facts about the house and owner:

- Several members of the Vaning family (the owners of 1309 5<sup>th</sup> Ave) were firefighters including William Vaning, a blacksmith and volunteer firefighter in the 1890's, and his son Walker Bell Vaning, a Battalion Chief who retired in 1960 after 43 years of service to the Department.
- William Vaning sold Fire Station 51's property to the City in 1917.
- It is said that 1309 5<sup>th</sup> Ave and the City's Blue House were originally two-halves of one large house that were both moved to the location in approximately 1884 by William Vaning.
- This home did not meet the criteria for a historic resource.
- The City purchased the house in September 2014 and the home was demolished in June 2015 with special care to reuse and recycle as much as possible.

## What the City salvaged from the house and property:

- 30 cubic yards (equivalent to a rail car!) of materials were reused:
  - Tools and equipment
  - Windows, flooring, sinks, and other building materials
  - o Cabinetry, hardware, and other household items
  - 2 boxes of donated books
- Recycled 166.3 tons of concrete/asphalt and 87 tons of other materials like wood and metal
- Turned 20 tons of green waste into energy

## What you can do:

If you're remodeling, improving, or even demolishing a property, here are some options to consider:

- **Donate** the items you're removing from your house. Sinks, faucets, tubs, flooring, tools, tiles, gardening supplies, and even some appliances can be donated to home-improvement reuse stores like Habitat for Humanity's <u>ReStore</u> or the <u>Away Station</u>.
- Buy your **new-to-you items** from these stores! You can find some amazing antiques and unique pieces at good prices. Check out the options at Zero Waste Marin.
- For demolition projects, consider **de-construction** as a means to reuse building material. There are many contractors who will gently take apart your structure and they often cost the same as a demolition contractor.
