I would like to speak during the public comments at tonight's meeting and below are my comments.

I'd like to speak regarding the proposed 15-35 homes to be built on the parcel of land recently sold by Dominican University and the impact such a development would have on the environment and residents. I am concerned that without an approved housing element the build will be able to proceed without input and guidance from the city and residents. My concerns come both as a resident of the Dominican neighborhood and a California Certified Naturalist. Habitat loss and habitat fragmentation are contributors to climate and environmental crisis. Species displaced now have to fight for resources in a more limited area, breeding and hunting grounds are lost, along with the flora and fauna that exist in balance. Given that both the university and a previous developer considered land problematic to develop due to it's previous use as a dump, the grade of the hill, the ravine and a stream that passes through, my alarm bells start to ring wondering what the current developer would have to do to make the land suitable for building. How drastically will they have to chance the landscape, what sorts of destructive actions will need to be taken?

Over the decades much of the open, wild and wonderful places around Marin we all love and enjoy were slated for development. Thankfully residents pushed back and prevented the loss of what makes Marin beautiful. It appears it's now my time to ask you to join the ranks of these conservationists and fight to keep Marin wild.
