SANTA ANA PUBLIC LIBRARY RECEIVES "BUILDING FORWARD GRANT" FROM STATE LIBRARY

The City of Santa Ana's Library Services Agency has been awarded over \$9.3 million from the California State Library "Building Forward" grant program to fund a variety of critical maintenance and infrastructure needs at the Main Library.

Thanks to this grant and supplementary funding sources, like the Revive Santa Ana pandemic recovery program, the City will revitalize its historic library. The addition of the Building Forward funding brings us one step closer to breaking ground as we continue in the design phase for this project. Over the next two and half years, the restoration will modernize and transform the Main Library while creating a new community hub for interactive learning and technology.

The funding will allow the City to address significant building safety and infrastructure needs for the Main Library that was built in 1960. Residents can anticipate restoration of the building's marble facade, updated windows and restrooms, and multiple ADA compliance improvements. Along with these exciting upgrades, the building will receive treatments for infestations, mold, and hazardous building materials. Systems including HVAC, electrical, plumbing, fire detection alarms, and sprinklers will also be brought up to building code. All upgrades will make the building more environmentally sustainable by using newer and more efficient components.

The Santa Ana Public Library is committed to meeting the City's evolving needs for access, inclusivity, and quality community educational spaces. For more information on the ongoing development plans for the Santa Ana Public Library update, visit Library Services Website or call (714) 647-5250.

### Santa Ana Public Library at the Delhi Center

The Santa Ana Public Library currently has two locations that provide services to residents, the Main Library and Newhope Library. Both locations are slated to be renovated, with design services under way.

To ensure continuity of services during the Main Library closure, the Library Services Agency has negotiated a lease agreement with the Delhi Center to construct a new public library branch within their existing building. Currently, residents in the Delhi neighborhood and surrounding communities have minimal access to library services, as there are no physical library locations in the southern part of the City. Therefore, to enhance equity and quality of life in an underserved area, approximately 2,500 square feet of space at the Delhi Center will be re-imagined as a new, innovative public library experience. A new outdoor activity patio will also be constructed to support library services and programs.

Residents will have access to technology, tools and services that will improve adult literacy, support positive educational outcomes for youth, and prepare our community's present and future workforce for a technology-driven world. Throughout the newly created library space and outdoor activity patio, children, teens, and families will be provided opportunities to learn and connect with their community in positive ways. Services may include STEM and robotics programs geared to neuro-divergent youth, special events and author hours for adults, and a wide variety of cutting-edge technology and computers for use in the library or at home. These new educational spaces and the accompanying programs and services will bring a much-needed community amenity to an area of the City that lacks library services.



# 15th Annual Día de los Niños Saturday, April 29 · 10:30am - 2:00pm







In 2009 the Santa Ana Public Library held its first *Día de los Niños, Día de los Libros*, a celebration that would become an annual event in Santa Ana for thousands of children and their families. This year marks the 15th anniversary of this special event, and the Library has BIG plans! Let's take a look back and a glimpse forward at *Día de los Niños, Día de los Libros* past and present.

The very first *Día de los Niños* at SAPL was a small affair that took place in the library's turn-around area. Inspired by the children's day celebrations held annually across Mexico and Latin America in late April, the library began celebrating this special day to honor children, families, literacy and, cultural diversity.

The first author to take part in the library's *Día* festivities was award-winning bilingual author Amy Costales in 2010. Costales' works have garnered such recognition as the Américas Award Commended Title (2008) and Best Bilingual Picture Book by the International Latino Book Awards (2008). Since then the library has hosted a wide range of respected and award-winning children's and YA authors that have participated in meet and greets with the community and reading their works onstage. Most notable among them are Laura Knight, Sarah Hernandez, Ashley Mills Monaghan, Ernesto Cisneros (2021 Pura Belpré Award winner) and Lilliam Rivera (2021 Pura Belpré Honor winner), to name a few.

The library's main stage has also been a place to showcase local talent and give students an opportunity to perform in their community. Performances have ranged from dance groups such as Ballet Folklórico Renacimiento, traditional Chinese dance from SCCCA/Irvine Chinese School, classical Indian dance from Arpana Dance, and musical performances from RHYTHMO Mariachi Academy and Hikari Taiko drums, and martial arts demonstrations from Toyama Karate, Gracie Barra Santa Ana, and much more.

In 2011 SAPL had the honor of being selected as the recipient of the prestigious Estela and Raul Mora award. This award is given annually to the library or school that puts on the best program celebrating *Día de los Niños, Día de los Libros*. The award was established in 1996 by author and poet Pat Mora in honor of her parents and with the goal of encouraging schools and libraries to promote *Día* events within their respective communities.

Building off the momentum from the past 14 years, this year's Día is sure to delight! SAPL will celebrate the importance of children, literacy, and families with a renowned author, performers, activities, book giveaways, free food and much more! 

A community favorite from our LOT collection has become roller skates! With a valid library card, patrons can borrow a pair of roller skates free of charge! Available in a variety of sizes and colors for all ages, along with protective gear such as helmets and elbow and knee pads, anyone can get involved with the growing community of skaters in Santa Ana!

### Did you know that an hour of roller skating can burn as many as 600 calories?

California State Library Park Passes are also popular items checked out from the LOT collection. # The City of Santa Ana is proud to announce the relaunch of Parks & Recreation aquatics programming for summer 2023!

Thanks to a new partnership with the #CaliforniansForAll Youth Jobs Corps employment program, Santa Ana is bringing back City aquatics programming. Providing the Santa Ana community with affordable and accessible swimming opportunities will once again be a core focus of the Parks and Recreation Agency.

Aquatic programs returning to City operations means affordable, cost effective, and value packed lessons for you! Swimming lessons will be available for ages 6 months to 17 years starting on June 5, 2023. Santa Ana residents will soon be able to enroll in sessions of 8 half-hour classes for \$55. And with the help of an American Red Cross Centennial Grant, swimming scholarships will be available for qualifying families. These scholarships will help families take a full session of swimming lessons for just \$15.


The partnership with #CaliforniansForAll Youth Jobs Corps will also create an intentional new workforce. Participants, ages 16-30 years old, receive priority access to employment opportunities focused on serving their community. Santa Ana Aquatics is partnering with the Santa Ana Work Center to secure this funding, and is now seeking lifeguards and additional aquatics support staff to join the team.

Employees who participate in the #CaliforniansForAll Youth Jobs Corps program will receive additional professional development opportunities and gain critical job skills that will support them as they dive into their future careers. Participants will learn the basic skills of lifeguarding and acquire a Lifeguard Certification with CPR, first aid, and AED training. Firefighters, emergency medical technicians, and police officers are just a few available careers open to those starting their first position as a lifeguard.



## OVER THE YEARS, YOU'VE WATCHED YOUR SANTA ANA ZOO UNDERGO ENORMOUS CHANGES AND DEVELOPMENT.

After celebrating the Zoo's 70th anniversary in 2022, the Santa Ana Zoo will celebrate by completing the most dynamic project in our history.


We've redefined what the Zoo can be with a beautiful and immersive new habitat for giant river otters, a winding aerial trail system for the zoo's family of capuchin monkeys, and new engaging guest experience areas.

The large construction project has modified zoo pathways, closed areas, and moved some animals to new temporary locations. During this process, we're working to minimize impacts, while still maintaining a great experience for visitors and our animals. Construction continues on schedule, with an anticipated Spring 2023 construction completion, and public opening in late 2023. Pictured are photos of the developing water feature and installation of water filtration tanks. In the coming months visitors to the zoo will see the new primate habitat starting to take shape with the installation of metal support poles and crafting of climbing trees for the monkeys.

Another project taking shape in early March with active construction is Goat Trails. The renovation of the goat yard creates a new accessible, and welcoming space for all visitors to engage with the goat herd. This fun area provides climbing areas for the goats and even a rope bridge where goats can demonstrate their agility.

Future projects still in planning and design include a new indoor education space called the "Hive", installation of concrete pathways for improved accessibility, and a major overhaul of the monkey area of the zoo.

# RADIATED TORTOISE

The Santa Ana Zoo is happy to have three critically endangered Radiated tortoises (Astrochelys radiate) join the zoo. You can find Morla, Lumpy, and Sheldon in their newly constructed habitat in the Crean Family Farm. They enjoy soaks in their shallow pool and munching on flowers and cactus provided by the animal care team. The three male tortoises range in weight from 18 to 35 lbs. and are over 40 years old!

Found in forests and scrublands of Madagascar, Radiated tortoises are herbivores and spend their day grazing on grasses. The carapace, or top shell, is marked with yellow lines radiating from the center of each dark plate, hence their name. Their head, feet, and legs also have yellow markings, helping them camouflage among leaf litter. Tortoise shells are supplied with blood vessels and nerves so they can feel when they are being touched and Morla, Lumpy, and Sheldon seem to enjoy a good scratch.

Radiated tortoise numbers are declining rapidly due to habitat loss and exploitation. You can help protect this charismatic reptile by not participating in the illegal pet trade and by discouraging friends and family from doing so.

### SO YOU WANT TO BE A ZOOKEEPER?

How can I be a zookeeper? That is probably the most asked question here at the zoo, and there really is no one size fits all answer. Zoo keeping is very competitive and like other popular jobs, there are usually more qualified applicants than there are openings, so it is important to set yourself up for success to get into this field. A combination of education and hands-on experience will give you the knowledge, skills, and background necessary to get started.

Let's start with education. While in school, choose a degree program in an animal related field like biology, zoology, or ecology. There are even some zoo specific degree programs now, including several in California: Moorpark College, University of California, Davis, and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.

There is no better way to get the hands-on experience necessary than by volunteering alongside a zookeeper. Volunteering can help you gain exposure to the field and clarify your personal career goals. Cleaning animal habitats, preparing diets, and creating exciting animal enrichment opportunities are all tasks volunteers can do at the Santa Ana Zoo. Volunteers can also watch zoo keepers train the animals or observe their veterinary exams.

Animal care is a very rewarding career field, and while folks often have the perception that zookeepers cuddle animals all day, it really is a demanding and difficult job. Zookeepers care for the animals 365 days a year, on weekends and holidays, and in all kinds of weather. They develop deep bonds with the animals in their care, which only strengthens their commitment to the wellbeing of the animals and the conservation of the species.

### **Aloes and Flame Vines**

Winter brings the beautiful floral displays of two very different plants. At the very front of the zoo is a remarkable wall of orange flowers from the flame vine - Pyrostegia venusta. Dense clusters of orange flowers provide nectar for hummingbirds and an Instagram-worthy backdrop for photos. This vine is native to South America and is drought-tolerant once well established, but does best with regular water.

Another striking winter bloomer is the torch aloe – Aloe arborescens. This South African succulent grows near the butterfly aviary and in the parking lot where it has room to spread into a massive 10 foot clump. One of approximately 400 species of Aloes, this species is a relative of the well-known Aloe vera. In winter, red flower stalks rise two feet above the foliage where they provide nectar for hummingbirds and a beautiful show. Many aloes bloom during the winter, have low water requirements, add interest to gardens, and provide food for wildlife.

### Prehensile-Tailed Skinks

On warm afternoons, Zoo Education Specialist **Terri Hernandez (TH)** often holds training demonstrations in or near the prehensile-tailed skink habitat.

**TH:** Prehensile-tailed skinks (aka monkey-tailed and Solomon Islands skinks) do not make good pets. They are difficult to care for due to their humidity and dietary requirements, and as an arboreal species with very sharp claws, they are not easy to handle. When I first started working with them thirty-five years ago, we presented them in-hand while wearing welder's gloves. The way we work with them now is a lot different; we emphasize behaviors that they display in the wild, and free choice to participate.

### Q: Why does the Santa Ana Zoo have prehensile-tailed skinks?

TH: It is illegal to import these skinks or catch them in the wild, but because they reproduce slowly and in low numbers, it is unprofitable to breed them, and smuggling persists. United States Fish and Wildlife called the Santa Ana Zoo for assistance a shipment of 80+ wild adult prehensile-tailed skinks was confiscated at the Port of Los Angeles. The zoo director and curators assisted with resources for placing the skinks, and accepted eight of them to bring back to good health. Six have since left the zoo for new homes at other zoos/aquariums. Like people, PT skinks have a wide range of personalities. The two that live at the Santa Ana Zoo (named Jade and Lucky) were selected for their suitability as zoo ambassadors.

### Q: Why couldn't the skinks go back to the wild?

**TH:** Unfortunately, even though they were illegally caught, the skinks could not be returned to the rainforests of the Solomon Islands. If just one had picked up any kind of disease, it could decimate the wild population. The skinks were likely collected over a very large area and we don't know exactly what forests they came from.

### Q: Since the zoo is not their native habitat, what do they eat?

**TH:** Their diet was a challenge at first, since they didn't recognize most of the food that we could offer. We went through many pothos plants as they became accustomed to a diet of mixed leafy greens, shredded mixed vegetables, and fruit. They still get pothos and other plants, and they really like green beans. As part of their training program, the skinks get incentives (like squishy mango, papaya, and banana) to learn to trust the people that work with them, come down from their places in their habitat and onto a piece of cork bark, transition into a carrier, and come out for animal programs that highlight their importance in the wild.


### Q: What are neat things to know about prehensile-tailed skinks?

**TH:** They are the largest species of skink. Their tails look like vines; they don't hang from them, but use them to lower themselves down. Unusual for lizards, PT skinks live in small groups that protect each other. While not aggressive, they are defensive, and mothers can be formidable. Also unusual for reptiles, they are viviparous, and give live birth to young (which can be 1/3 the size of the mother).

### Q: How can people help?

The prehensile-tailed skink is not only at risk due to the illegal pet trade, but due to deforestation. When buying products that contain wood, you can look for those certified by the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC), or you can explore recycled plastic lumber (RPL) options. The zoo is using RPL in its upcoming elevated goat trails farm feature.
