4. Presentations & Priorities Discussions

- a. Manny Cappello, Chair of the Equitable Communities Subcommittee, presented the Board with a Draft Resolution for cities to consider adopting. The Board approved sending the Draft Resolution to our 15 cities for consideration of adoption along with a Matrix of Information regarding Local, Regional, State and Federal actions taken thus far. Cities are requested to update the informational matrix as actions by their city are taken.
- b. Steve Preminger, Office of the County Executive, presented how the City of San Jose and Santa Clara County are working on a coordinated immigrant communications campaign. Steve introduced Maria Love, Santa Clara County Manager of the Office of Immigrant Relations. Maria spoke on how the county is supporting its Immigrant Population and distributed resource information for member use. Steve then introduced Jane LeFevre who discussed the Coordinated Immigrant Communications Campaign for the City of San Jose and Santa Clara County. Following Jane, David Campos, Deputy County Executive, discussed the County lawsuit, along with San Francisco, against the Trump Administration's order to pull funds from cities that refuse to assist in U.S. Immigration enforcement. The suit will be heard on Friday, April 14 in San Francisco. Dozens of cities have filed briefs in support of the suit or filed suits of their

5. New Business

- a. May General Membership Meeting, May 11, 2017: Rod announced the May General Membership Meeting on May 11 will be held at the Institute for the Future in Palo Alto from 6-9 pm. All elected council members, state and local elected legislators, city managers, assistant city managers, and senior staffs are invited. The event is cosponsored by the Institute for the Future and the League of California Cities. Food and drink will be provided, guests will have an opportunity to informally tour the Institute at the beginning of the event, which will be followed by formal presentations by: Marina Gorbis, Executive Director of the Institute; Pratheepan Gulasekaram, Santa Clara University Law Professor, a specialist in Constitutional Law, Immigration Law, Citizenship and the Rights of Noncitizens, and State and Local Immigration Laws; and Carolyn Coleman, Executive Director of the League of California Cities. Professor Gulasekaram will discuss the political and legal dynamics of state and local immigration regulations, including their constitutionality and their effect on federal immigration lawmaking. Carolyn will discuss the League's Blueprint for Housing. The Invitation will be sent out this coming week.
- **b. LAC Report:** Pat Showalter announced there will be a **LAC Meeting** on Thursday, May 11 at 5 pm, an hour prior to the General Membership Meeting. The LAC will meet at the Institute for the Future and discuss pending legislation. Pat is gathering bills for discussion and asks Board Members and Cities to send bills to her they want the LAC to consider for Support or Oppose Positions.

- c. Co-Partnership with SVLG 6th Annual Regional Economic Forum on June 15⁷ 2017, 7:15 am 12 pm at the Computer History Museum. The Cities Association has co-partnered this event in the past. The Board approved the non-profit cosponsored rate of \$1,000.
- **d. Update on Hiring a new Executive Director**: Rod reported five applications were received and the Executive Board will be interviewing the candidates. Joanne, as Interim, has agreed to train the new ED.
- **e. City Managers' Association Report**: In the absence of James Keene, Interim Executive Director Joanne Benjamin shared the City Managers Association met on Wed., April 12 and discussed the County's Measure A Implementation Plan.
- **f. Legislation Report**: Betsy Shotwell gave the Legislation Report. All efforts were on the Transportation Funding Bill this past month, but now committees are starting to meet. The list of housing bills is staggering and Board members should look at the League's Hot Sheet of Legislation. The Governor's Budget May-Revise will be out next month.

6. Joys and Challenges:

- Campbell Liz Gibbons announced the Silicon Valley Business Journal's event, "The Commerce of Cannibis – what does it mean for Silicon Valley?" will be on Thursday, April 27, 7:30-9:45 am at the Silicon Valley Capital Club. Cost is \$50.
- Gilroy Peter Leroe-Munoz commented he attended a nice event outside the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Office in Morgan Hill where activists and interfaith leaders came together around activities of Holy Thursday to express opposition to ICE enforcement and deportations.
- Palo Alto Pat Showalter announced in Palo Alto's absence that the city participated, along with several other cities in the county, in the National Flood Insurance Program. The Santa Clara County Water District has a Community Rating System and performs audits. Palo Alto scored at the top, allowing residents of the city to receive a 20% discount.
- Mountain View Pat Showalter announced a ribbon cutting for a new store, Total Wine and More.
- Los Altos Jan Pepper announced a ribbon cutting for a new sculpture in Lincoln Park, donated by the Assyrian Arts Institute. Hon. Anna Eshoo participated.
- Cupertino Rod Sinks announced only 1% of the city's residents opted out of the Silicon Valley Clean Energy Program and stay with PG&E.
- Campbell Liz Gibbons voiced caution as the atmosphere is changing and Town Hall Meetings are being disrupted by a small group of loud, vocal dissenters. Assembly Member Low held a Town Hall Meeting in Campbell recently, and was saddened this small group disrupted the assembly member in his presentation.
- Santa Clara Debi Davis announced the city has been sued over lack of diversification of its council. It is an all-white council. However, there were a number of candidates from different backgrounds who ran, but didn't get elected. The city is going through a process to study the issue and look at the city charter.

- Sunnyvale Jim Griffith commented the city may face a labor strike over the issue of supplying low interest loans to city staff.
- **7. Announcements:** Interim Executive Director Joanne Benjamin announced the Membership Directory has been published and sent to the cities, elected state and federal legislators, county, and countywide and regional organizations. REQUEST TO MAKE A PRESENTATION TO THE CITIES ASSOCIATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS

NAME OF ORGANIZATION:

Silicon Valley Community Foundation and Silicon Valley Leadership Group

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Organization Information

Silicon Valley Community Foundation advances innovative philanthropic solutions to challenging problems. As the largest community foundation in the world, we engage donors and corporations from Silicon Valley, across the country and around the globe to make our region and world better for all. Our passion for helping people and organizations achieve their philanthropic dreams has created a global philanthropic enterprise committed to the belief that possibilities start here.

Silicon Valley Leadership Group is a public policy trade association. The Leadership Group was founded in 1978 by David Packard of Hewlett-Packard and represents more than 400 of Silicon Valley's most respected employers on issues, programs and campaigns that affect the economic health and quality of life in Silicon Valley, including education, energy, environment, health, housing, tax policies, tech and innovation and transportation. Leadership Group members collectively provide nearly one of every three private sector jobs in Silicon Valley and contribute more than \$3 trillion to the worldwide economy.

Project Information

Developed by the Silicon Valley Leadership Group and Silicon Valley Community Foundation in 2014, the SVCIP seeks to proactively identify a data-driven economic strategy to reinforce the region's competitive advantages in innovation and ensure continued job growth. Study details, including a downloadable PDF of the study can be found at SVCIP.com.

Guided by an advisory council and a series of discussions with legislators, business and civic leaders, the SVCIP team developed an Indicator Dashboard and public policy agenda to evaluate and promote the health of Silicon Valley's innovation ecosystem. The SVCIP represents a first step in identifying key public policy issues to address in the near term.

REQUEST (WHAT WILL BE PRESENTED?):

We request 15 minutes during your board meeting to present findings from this year's SVCIP Report. The last five minutes of our presentation will be devoted to Q&A. A sample of key findings from the report include:

- Silicon Valley is the world's leading innovation region based on a composite measure. At the same time, other regions like Berlin, London, Tel Aviv, Chicago, and Boston scored higher on the Compass Report's Growth Index, meaning they are gaining ground on Silicon Valley by measures such as venture capital investment, talent pools and entrepreneurial networks.
- Silicon Valley also has a much higher concentration of STEM talent than other innovation regions. The concentration of STEM talent measures the proportion of STEM workers in the overall workforce relative to the national average. Silicon Valley is almost three times more concentrated in STEM workers than is the nation as a whole, nearly twice as concentrated as the Boston region, and over one and one half times more concentrated than

both Seattle and Austin.

- For the first time, the report included a measure regarding women entrepreneurs in innovation regions. In 2015, women made up 42 percent of new entrepreneurs in Silicon Valley, placing the region second to Seattle, with 51 percent. But between 2013 and 2015, Silicon Valley had the biggest drop in the share of new female entrepreneurship, from 46 percent to 42 percent.
- Between Q3 2015 and Q3 2016, total venture capital investment in Silicon Valley companies fell 46 percent. Moreover, venture capital funding levels dropped in four of the five quarters leading up to Q3 2016. The number of venture capital deals in Silicon Valley declined too, but by a much smaller 4.6 percent between Q3 2015 and Q3 2016.
- Using the San Jose Metropolitan Statistical Area to represent Silicon Valley home and apartment prices, we see that median home values continued to increase quickly in the first half of 2016. In fact, median home values rose to \$935,180, according to Zillow, exceeding home values in San Francisco (\$799,150), and all innovation regions by a substantial margin.
- The average Silicon Valley worker spends an hour and 10 minutes commuting per day (both ways), second only to New York City workers, who spend an hour and 14 minutes commuting.

RELEVANCE TO THE CITIES ASSOCIATION:

This presentation is relevant to the Cities' Association because it provides a thorough evaluation of indicators that measure the quality of life and business competitiveness of each board member's community, identifying areas of strength as well as opportunities for further improvement.

Our region's economy is strong by any measure and this presentation will provide some key action items that stakeholders--including the leaders of cities within Santa Clara—may take to further the region's vitality and increase prosperity.

Submitted for your consideration is the proposed Fiscal Year Budget 2017-18 of the Cities Association of Santa Clara County. The Executive Board of Directors is to review and recommended approval of the Budget at its June 2, 2017. Once approved by the Board at its June 8 meeting, the Adopted FY 2017-18 Budget and Dues Schedule will be distributed to all City Managers with the request of payment of the dues.

Background/Highlights of the Proposed 2017-18 Budget:

- 1. In 2010, it was observed that Reserves had grown over the previous four fiscal years and exceeded the Cities Association Financial Policy of six to nine months of projected operating expenses.
- 2. The Subcommittee on Use of Reserves recommended a decrease in dues by 4.77% for three fiscal years in order to attain a level of Reserves consistent with the organization's financial policy.
- 3. FY 2013-14 marked the end of the 3-year budget with reduced dues. FY 2014-15 Budget resumed the original dues schedule, which was an increase of 4.77% of the prior year's dues schedule.
- 4. New for FY 2014-15, the Cities Association started utilizing a virtual office as an effort to reduce expenses; office expenses were reduced by 19% from the expected budget.
- 5. For FY 2015-16, with the continued dues schedule, it was proposed and approved to use Reserves to meet operating expenses. It is Cities Association policy to maintain a Reserves fund that covers 6 9 months of operating expenses (\$42,000 \$63,000).
- 6. For FY 2016-17, the dues were increased by 5% in order to resume operations without using increased Reserves to meet expenses. Projected Reserves at the end of the FY 2017-18-budget year is \$53,771.32. This is assuming the New Executive Director is not hired until July 1, 2017.
- 7. The income from the May 11 General Membership Meeting covered expenses. Income from sponsorships for the Holiday Party, 2017, will be utilized to cover the Holiday event expenses.



8. Article VII, Section 2 of the Cities Association Bylaws states "the dues schedule shall be revised every three (3) to four (4) years." There is no projected dues increase for the FY 2017-18 Proposed Budget.

AB 1598 (Mullin) Summary: Existing law authorizes certain local agencies to form a community revitalization authority (authority) within a community revitalization and investment area, as defined, to carry out provisions of the Community Redevelopment Law in that area for purposes related to, among other things, infrastructure, affordable housing, and economic revitalization. Existing law provides for the financing of these activities by, among other things, the issuance of bonds serviced by property tax increment revenues, and requires the authority to adopt a community revitalization and investment plan for the community revitalization and investment area that includes elements describing and governing revitalization activities. Existing law requires a community revitalization and investment plan to include a 30-year limit for establishing loans, advances, and indebtedness by the authority. This bill would authorize a city, county, or city and county to adopt a resolution creating an affordable housing authority with power limited to providing low- and moderate-income housing funded through a low- and moderate-income housing fund, as specified. The bill would prohibit certain local government entities form participating in the authority. The bill would authorize an authority created pursuant to those provisions to have boundaries that are identical to the boundaries of the city, county, or city and county that created the authority. The bill would require the authority to adopt, after holding a noticed public hearing, an affordable housing investment plan that includes, among other things, an affordable housing program. The bill would require an authority created pursuant to these provisions to include a 45-year limit for establishing loans, advances, and indebtedness by the authority. The bill would authorize specified local entities to adopt a resolution to provide tax increment revenues to the authority. The bill would also authorize specified local entities to adopt a resolution allocating other tax revenues to the authority, subject to certain requirements. The bill would provide for the financing of the activities of the authority by, among other things, the issuance of bonds serviced by funds received pursuant to those tax increment revenues or other tax revenues allocated to the authority.

AB 1585 (Bloom) Summary: The Planning and Zoning Law require a city or county to adopt a general plan for land use development within its boundaries that includes, among other things, a housing element. Existing law provides for various reforms and incentives intended to facilitate and expedite the construction of affordable housing. Existing law requires the Department of Housing and Community Development, in consultation with each council of governments, to determine existing and projected needs for housing for each region and requires each council of governments or, for cities and counties without a council of governments, the department to adopt a final regional housing need plan that allocates a share of the regional housing need to each city, county, or city and county and is consistent with specified objectives. This bill would establish in each city, county, and city and county in the state an affordable housing zoning board and procedures by which a public agency or nonprofit organization proposing to build affordable housing units, as defined, or a developer proposing to build a housing project that meets specified affordability criteria, could submit to that board a single application for a comprehensive conditional use or other discretionary permit. The bill would require the board to conduct a public hearing, as provided, and issue a decision approving, approving with conditions, or denving the application and to issue a comprehensive permit if the application is approved or approved with conditions. The bill would require the board to consider the general plan and zoning ordinances of the affected local agency, the share of the regional housing needs of the affected local agency, whether the applicant has made specified certifications relating to the payment of prevailing wages and employment of a skilled and trained workforce, as provided, on the affordable housing units or housing project development, documents or other evidence presented at the hearing, and the recommendations of experts or consultants, if any, retained by the board. The bill would

provide that the comprehensive permit would have the same force and effect as a conditional use or other discretionary permit issued by an affected local agency, but would prohibit the board from abrogating a provision of the general plan or zoning ordinances of the affected local agency except to grant a density bonus, as provided. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.
