4. Presentations & Priorities Discussions

- a. San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo provided an update on the regional minimum wage study and discussed a proposed regional minimum wage timeline.
- The Institute for Research on Labor & Employment at UC Berkeley is conducting the regional minimum wage study; a countywide employer survey will also be included and will be conducted by BW Research.
- The Advisory team identified a schedule for purpose of the study:
 - \$12.00 on January 1, 2017

- \$13.50 on January 1, 2018
- \$15.00 on January 1, 2019
- The results of the study will be presented to San Jose City Council on April 18th; the Cities Association plans to include a presentation of the study either at the April 14th Board Meeting or a special meeting in April, depending on availability of Board Members.
- The purpose of the study is to provide jurisdictions with data to support adoption of the proposed baseline.
- In June, the Cities Association may review and take a position on the regional baseline for a minimum wage.

b. Larry Silva of Yellow Checker Cab presented on taxi regulations countywide.

- The taxi industry is finding it hard to compete with the Transportation Network Companies (TNC's), such as Lyft and Uber, due to adherence to regulations in each city across the county despite their similarities.
- Taxi's serve customers who travel between cities but they cannot pick up a customer when they drop off in another city.
- Each city has a taxi code; however not all cities enforce the regulations.
- Eight cities in SCC enforce various regulations; they include requirement of permits, business license, fingerprinting, and periodic vehicle inspections.
- For example, fingerprinting helps to ensure the safety of the rider; six cities in SCC fingerprint taxicab drivers. In order for a taxi driver to provide services throughout SCC, he/she must be finger printed six times. This scenario also applies to vehicle inspections and permits.
- TNC's are subject to considerably less regulation than taxi's; they are licensed by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC).
- TNC's have reduced taxi ridership by 40-50% countywide.
- In addition, TNC's rates are not regulated.
- Taxi drivers want to reduce rates but they can't due to cities regulations; taxi meter rates should be deregulated so that taxi's can compete with TNC's.
- TNC-like technology is available for taxi's, e.g. in app meters, single button ordering, flat rate pricing, promotions, social media.
- To even the playing field, it would be beneficial if there was a single county-wide set of regulations that included:
 - o Countywide driver permit complete with fingerprint background checks
 - Annual vehicle inspection that would apply countywide
 - Companies or third-party driver training with ongoing monitoring
 - o Elimination/reduction of regulation of rates.
- Feedback from Board Members included:
 - Each city should re-evaluate their taxi regulations; City of Sunnyvale found that their taxi regulations were 10 years out of date, e.g. drivers were required to pass a paper map test.
 - How about enacting reciprocal agreements amongst multiple cities, e.g. Town of Los Gatos accepts permits, screenings, and fingerprints from other cities.
 - Cities need to be more cognizant and less regulatory.

- How about considering a model ordinance for all cities to consider adopting;
 we need to weigh in with city managers and police chiefs.
- Are there model ordinances available for review?
- Board Members approved submittal of letter to the Santa Clara County City Managers Association and SCC Police Chiefs Association requesting re-evaluation of taxi regulations and possibility for countywide regulation.

5. Old Business

a. President Jim Griffith led discussion on adopted priorities and organization of subcommittees. Board Members expressed interest in priorities and formed subcommittees based on priorities: affordable housing, age-friendly communities, homelessness, RHNA sub region, transportation, and minimum wage.

6. New Business

a. Board Members approved co-hosting Affordable Housing Workshop for elected officials with Silicon Valley at Home during Affordable Housing Week, May 16-21, 2016. The workshop will provide local policymakers with an overview of the current housing and affordable housing landscape and the solutions available to address the housing crisis.

b. CSC Appointee Report: ABAG Appointee/Board Member Greg Scharff of Palo Alto presented ABAG Report. Board Member Scharff summarized two major items ABAG is focused on: the proposed ABAG/MTC merger and Plan Bay Area 2040. Management Partners is the hired consultant for the proposed merger and will be coming to the Cities Association in March to present the proposal and request feedback. Regarding Plan Bay Area 2040, ABAG is in the process of developing scenarios of growth. The selected growth scenario will likely affect the next RHNA cycle. The considered scenarios include: 1) growth across all cities; 2) growth in transportation corridors; and 3) growth in cities with highest populations and jobs. Board Members provided feedback on each scenario.

- **c. City Managers' Association Report:** City Managers' Liaison Deanna Santana of Sunnyvale reported the City Managers met on February 10th and heard a presentation from SCC Fire Chiefs Association regarding the proposed private-public partnership and new model for Emergency Medical Services in SCC. City of San Jose is working on developing the proposal.
- d. Legislation Report: Betsy Shotwell provided an update on legislative session. The passage of AB 21 (Wood) eliminates from state law the March 1st deadline for cities to pass cultivation ordinances imposed on local governments by last years Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act. Local jurisdictions can now take the time to research, deliberate, and seek community input as needed. Deadline for bill introduction is February 19th. The League is watching three other bills addressing medical marijuana: AB 26 (Jones-Sawyer), AB 567 (Gipson), and AB 1575 (Bonta, Cooley, Jones-Sawyer, Lackey, Wood).

8. Joys and Challenges:

- City of Los Altos has joined to participate in Community Choice Energy (CCE); 10 iurisdictions are now members of the JPA.
- Monte Sereno Council recently instructed staff to study CCE.
- In Cupertino, a measure on the ballot would restrict some new developments, including redevelopment of Vallco Shopping Mall.
- In Sunnyvale, a measure on the ballot in 2016 would require voter approval for the city to sell, swap, or lease public land.

9. Announcements

a.April Board Meeting – Consideration of changing date to April 21st or April 28th – due to League Of California Cities Peninsula Division Bocce Ball on April 21st and schedule conflicts on April 28th, it was decided to proceed with the scheduled April 14th Board Meeting.

REQUEST TO MAKE A PRESENTATION TO THE CITIES ASSOCIATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS

NAME OF ORGANIZATION:

Livermore Amador Valley Transportation Authority (LAVTA) Regional Rail Committee – Mayor John Marchand, City of Livermore

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) system serves the San Francisco Bay Area, connecting cities in San Mateo, Alameda, and Contra Costa counties. Future plans include serving cities in Santa Clara County. In November 2014, Measure BB was approved by Alameda County voters to fund key transportation infrastructure projects, including a BART extension from the Dublin/Pleasanton station to Isabel Avenue in Livermore. The second phase of this project involves an additional 5-mile extension, which would create an inter-regional link between BART and ACE at Greenville Road in Livermore at the base of the Altamont Pass/I-580 Corridor. The BART to ACE project will reduce traffic across regions and freeways, and provide transportation alternatives connecting workforce housing in San Joaquin County to jobs in Silicon Valley.

REQUEST (WHAT WILL BE PRESENTED?):

Mayor John Marchand (City of Livermore), on behalf of the LAVTA Regional Rail Committee will make a presentation discussing the commute patterns from the San Joaquin/Tri-Valley area to Silicon Valley and explain how the proposed BART to ACE project will reduce traffic across multiple regions and connect workforce housing to jobs in Silicon Valley.

RELEVANCE TO THE CITIES ASSOCIATION:

The BART to ACE project will have a positive impact on quality of life for residents living and working in Silicon Valley by enhancing inter-regional mobility, reducing traffic, and connecting workforce housing to jobs.

WHAT ACTION IS REQUESTED OF THE CITIES ASSOCIATION?

The action requested of the Cities Association is to support the BART to ACE project, encourage state legislators to provide additional funding to complete Phase I and II of the BART extension, and advocate for the formation of a Joint Power Authority to plan and implement the project.






Northern California Mega-Regions





Inter-Regional Transportation Demands






Bay Area Destinations

AirSage Distribution Incorporated – 95,100 Round Trips in 2035









REQUEST TO MAKE A PRESENTATION TO THE CITIES ASSOCIATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS

NAME OF ORGANIZATION:

Management Partners, on behalf of MTC and ABAG.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Management Partners (a local government consulting firm) has been engaged by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) to examine the policy, financial and legal issues associated with further integration, up to and including institutional merger between MTC and ABAG. The project is also to set forth specific plans, benchmarks and milestones for implementation.

REQUEST (WHAT WILL BE PRESENTED?):

The presentation will present general background information on MTC and ABAG, discuss the purpose of the study and the schedule and provide a broad analysis framework that will be used to evaluate options.

RELEVANCE TO THE CITIES ASSOCIATION:

All cities in Santa Clara County are members of ABAG and are represented on MTC. Both agencies are responsible for land use and transportation planning in the nine Bay Area county region and may be impacted by the policy issues and decisions associated with the study.

WHAT ACTION IS REQUESTED OF THE CITIES ASSOCIATION?

Merger Study Information Sheet

Why conduct a merger study?

In October 2015, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) adopted a resolution to create an integrated regional planning department as the best near-term approach to carry out the land use and transportation planning responsibilities set forth in SB 375 and reduce duplication of effort. This would result in a functional consolidation of planners working on SB 375 within MTC. The respective SB 375 statutory responsibilities of ABAG and MTC would remain the same. The ABAG Administrative Committee also adopted a resolution expressing support of MTC's resolution. The actions by MTC and ABAG were accompanied by an agreement to conduct a Merger Study and in the event ABAG and MTC approve a Merger Implementation Plan prior to July 1, 2016, the functional consolidation of planning departments shall be pre-empted. In January, 2016, ABAG and MTC hired Management Partners to study the policy, management, financial, and legal issues associated with further integration, up to and including institutional merger between the agencies, and how an integration model might be implemented.

Background Information

About ABAG

The Region's Council of Governments (COG)

ABAG was formed by a Joint Powers Authority in 1961 and is a voluntary association of the Bay Area's 101 cities and nine counties.

As a comprehensive regional planning agency, ABAG works with local governments and stakeholders to develop forecasts of the region's housing, jobs and population growth, identify regional housing needs, address resilience and climate change issues, carry out regional social, economic and land use research and prepare elements of the Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS). ABAG also provides special services to local governments, such as affordable housing and infrastructure financing, risk management and insurance, electricity and natural gas aggregation, energy efficiency programs and emergency preparedness.

About MTC

The Region's MPO and RTPA

MTC was created by the California Legislature in 1970. It is the federally-designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the state-designated Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for the region.

As the transportation planning, financing and coordinating agency for the nine Bay Area counties, MTC collaborates with other public agencies to plan and finance the region's streets, highways, and transit network. It is responsible for preparing a regional transportation plan (RTP) every four years which, under SB 375, must include and support the Sustainable Communities Strategy.

MTC annually programs and allocates roughly \$1.5 billion in transportation revenues and is responsible for an \$8+ billion debt portfolio. MTC also operates a suite of services to help travelers get around, including the 511 traveler information system, FasTrak® electronic toll collection, Clipper® transit fare card and the Freeway Service Patrol's fleet of roving tow trucks.



SB 375 requires each of California's 18 Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) to include a Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) in the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), both of which are required to be approved and adopted by MTC. The SCS sets forth a vision for regional growth that takes into account the region's transportation, housing, environmental, and economic needs. The SCS is the blueprint by which each region intends to meet its greenhouse gas emissions reductions target.

What is Plan Bay Area?

Plan Bay Area is the region's first SCS. It was adopted by the ABAG Executive Board and MTC in July 2013. An updated Plan Bay Area must be completed by 2017.

Why are both organizations involved in preparing Plan Bay Area?

In SB 375 legislation, the state outlined the roles of each organization in preparing the SCS, as well as joint responsibilities.

ABAG's statutory responsibilities:

- Identify the general location of uses, residential densities, and building intensities within the region
- Identify areas within the region sufficient to house the existing and projected population, considering state housing goals
- Gather and consider the best practically available scientific information regarding resource areas and farmland

I'm writing to request that the Cities Association of Santa Clara County Executive Board of Directors appoint two locally elected officials and one alternate for each appointment who reside in the 18th Congressional District of Santa Clara County to the FAA Select Committee on South Bay Arrivals. This is a new committee the Federal Aviation Administration and Office of the Director of the San Francisco Airport (SFO) have agreed to work with to address the ongoing issue of aircraft noise and adopt regional solutions. Santa Clara County and Santa Cruz County do not have representation on a body involving SFO and the majority of the constituent complaints in the 18th Congressional District involve aircraft arrivals into SFO.

Congressman Farr, Congresswoman Speier and I have been working together to address this complex issue and as a result of our collaborative effort with many local cities and community leaders, it has become clear there is a need for a new local committee to assist the FAA in identifying regional solutions. Significant work has already been accomplished by many intelligent, hard-working citizens. Local regional support is building toward solutions that will result in relief for our constituents. This new committee is important to make certain that communities, including those who could be affected in the future, have the opportunity to voice concerns about any proposals or possible changes by the FAA. The Committee will assist in making sure noise is not shifted from one community to another. The Select Committee will be structured as follows:

 The Select Committee on South Bay Arrivals will focus on SFO/South Bay arrivals that impact Santa Clara County, San Mateo County and Santa Cruz County residents that comprise the 14th, 18th, and 20th Congressional Districts.

- The Select Committee on South Bay Arrivals will consist of twelve members, with four appointed to represent each of the three Congressional Districts.
- Members of the Select Committee on South Bay Arrivals will be elected officials (City Council member or a member of the County Board of Supervisors). All alternates must also be elected officials.
- The Select Committee on South Bay Arrivals will hold hearings in locations to be determined by them in communities impacted by arriving flights, including Santa Clara, San Mateo and Santa Cruz Counties.
- Determination of quorum, tie votes and other procedural matters, will be determined according to the SFO Airport/FAA Select Committee.

I write this letter to express my interest in being appointed to the Aviation Select Committee that will be formed with two delegates from the Santa Clara County Cities Association.

The Los Altos Hills City Council has appointed me as their representative to work with the FAA and our elected Representative, Anna Eshoo in our endeavor to convince the FAA to alter their original implementation of the NextGen Flight regimes. I have also been the Los Altos Hills delegate to the Quiet Skies Initiative in Los Altos and Los Altos Hills.

The NextGen system was created with the idea of improving flight efficiency and lowering operating costs and attendant air pollution associated with commercial airlines. However, since its imposition since early 2015, the FAA's redesign of standardized Aircraft Approach and Departure routes has raised the ire of thousands of citizens across the country because of the impact on their lives. Our San Francisco Bay Area Metroplex is just one of those areas that are affected.

With the FAA's imposition of the NextGen flight system, Commercial Airplane Noise has increased significantly. Many of our citizens have been affected. A significant, vocal number of our residents from all over the South Bay Region have had their quality of life adversely affected. As a result, ad-hoc groups have self-organized to marshal their efforts to convince the FAA's leadership that their first incarnation of the NextGen system of Aircraft Approaches to the San Francisco and San Jose Airports are in need of revision.

Last July and again yesterday, as the appointed LAH delegate, I attended a meeting with FAA officials that was convened by Anna Eshoo in Palo Alto and again yesterday in another meeting that was held in Los Altos. I attended as the City Council appointed attendee at each of those meetings in addition to being the appointed spokesman for the citizen groups of five other cities including Los Altos, Los Altos Hills, Palo Alto, Portola Valley, Menlo Park, and Woodside.

As for primary qualifications, I offer the following considerations: I am a retired pilot, with significant aviation domain experience; with both instrument and glider ratings and over 2,000 hours of Pilot-in-Command experience. Prior to retirement, I was also a Lockheed Systems Engineer with considerable aviation and aerospace background.

With my ongoing involvement and interest with this issue, my domain experience and my knowledge of how the changes have affected our residents not only in my city, but in cities all over the region, I express my interest in becoming one of the Santa Clara County Cities Association delegates to the Select Committee.

Since June of 2015, I have been acting as the Saratoga City Council contact person for citizen complaints regarding the increased noise level resulting from the FAA's change in flight patterns in the San Francisco Bay Area early last year. This new plan, which was developed to create a more efficient, stable glide path, reduce fuel consumption, and result in safer landings and take-offs, failed to consider the noise impact on citizens in the new flight paths. In Saratoga alone this tremendously affects areas located in the Summit, Bohlman Road, Montalvo, and Mt Eden areas, just to name a few. Adjacent areas, situated in the County (near Paul Masson) and in the Los Gatos mountains are also greatly impacted.

On July 24, 2015 I was invited as Saratoga's representative to attend the FAA/Community meeting convened by Congresswoman Anna Eshoo. Since that time I have been in contact with Saratoga and nearby county residents and have stayed abreast of various community groups' research as they have worked to find a mutually satisfying answer to the complex issues connected with the NextGen Metroplex airspace design.

On Monday, March 7th I am the designated Saratoga representative at a follow-up meeting with local elected officials from each community in the 18th Congressional District to discuss the "FAA Initiative to Address Noise Concerns of Santa Clara/Santa Cruz/San Mateo/San Francisco Counties." As a member of the Select Committee, I would represent our region and take all cities concerns into effect. We must find solutions that do not shift the burden from one city to another but improve the situation for all.



Dear Honorable Mayor Liccardo, Vice Mayor Herrera and Council members Rocha, Nguyen, Kalra, Khamis, Carrasco, Nguyen, Oliverio, Peralez and Jones:

I write on behalf of the Cities Association of Santa Clara County in support of the City of San Jose's exploration of Community Choice Energy. The Cities Association of Santa Clara County is a collaboration of the 15 cities in the county of Santa Clara and addresses issues of mutual concern across the county to improve the quality of life for the people of our region. We encourage the City Council to explore a Community Choice Energy Program in San Jose.

As you know, Community Choice Energy allows a city to enter into energy purchase agreements from renewable sources, which residents can voluntarily utilize; it has the proven ability to reduce electricity rate and rapidly green the grid. Existing Community Choice Energy programs are providing cleaner energy, at equal or lower rates, while keeping more energy revenue in the local economy, and providing local oversight of programs and rates. Dozens of communities across California, including all 20 of San Mateo County's cities and most of the cities in Santa Clara County, have evaluated Community Choice Energy and have embraced this opportunity.

In Santa Clara County, eleven jurisdictions have now committed to joining the Silicon Valley Clean Energy Authority, a new JPA that will oversee the implementation of Community Choice Energy. SVCEA becomes effective beginning April 1, 2016. However, unlike the San Jose staff recommendation, SVCEA is a self-contained non-profit initiative, and not a third-party for-profit effort.

For San Jose residents and businesses, Community Choice Energy has the potential to offer lower electricity rates. In addition to considering implementing the program through an entity that would develop, finance, launch, and operate the program for

profit, I urge you to also consider implementing the program as a non-profit through your organization. By self-implementing, San Jose can provide power at lower rates for San Jose's residents. While the initial cost can be intimidating, a functional CCE will repay all start-up costs in a very short period of time.

The Cities Association of Santa Clara County strongly supports Community Choice Energy and encourages the City of San José to evaluate the economic and environmental benefits Community Choice may bring to San José.
