Saving Caltrain Means Relieving Traffic Congestion

- Caltrain is essential to the Bay Area's transportation network
- COVID-19 has drastically reduced riders and the financial impact is devastating Caltrain
- The pandemic won't last forever and traffic will return
- Imagine how much worse traffic will be without Caltrain



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Measure RR Fast Facts





1/8 cent sales tax in SF, SCC, SMC to relieve traffic, reduce pollution and save Caltrain Expected to raise approximately \$108 million annually Essentials like groceries, rent and medicine are exempt

30 years



Requires two-thirds majority approval to pass

Strict accountability measures included:

- ✓ Citizens' oversight
- Independent audits
- \checkmark All funds MUST stay local and dedicated to Caltrain





Why We Need Measure RR

- Relieve traffic congestion
- Ease traffic on Highways 101, 280, 380, 85, 87, 92, El Camino Real and local Expressways
- Preserve Caltrain service for thousands of essential workers
- Reduce air and noise pollution with cleaner and quieter electric trains
- Make Caltrain more affordable and accessible
- Create local jobs
- Reduce travel times and provide better all-day, all-week service
- Make fares more equitable and increase diversity of ridership
- Improve Caltrain connections with BART, Muni, SamTrans and VTA
- Increase rider and pedestrian safety






Key Facts + Numbers

- Caltrain is the only rail system without its own source of operating funds
- Relies on 70% farebox recovery and contributions from member agencies like SF Muni and VTA
- Caltrain may have to shut down, at least temporarily, if Measure RR is not successful
- Measure RR is key to working towards Caltrain reaching its potential, tripling ridership from 65,000 to 180,000 riders per day with more frequent all-day service





Caltrain Takes Cars Off Local Highways





Measure RR's improvements would put the equivalent of two lanes of traffic on Caltrain instead of our highways



More Trains Mean Less Traffic

Increasing service from six to eight trains per hour, per direction enables more frequent service to more stations





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A More Equitable Caltrain

 The funds would help keeps Caltrain's means based fares program in place (up to 50% discount)

- More frequent trains to support off peak travel supports off peak commutes, improving Caltrain's reliability and unlocking access to economic opportunity
- Allows for better coordinated connections with BART, Muni, SamTrans and VTA



After the individual components and a short proponent argument, net support shifts +9 points, with the yes vote moving above the two thirds threshold.

Supporters of this measure say that Caltrain will always be an essential part of the Bay Area's transportation network. Traffic will come back after the pandemic, and Caltrain riders help to keep millions of cars off our roads every year. This measure will keep Caltrain running and make it easier to ride, with faster and more frequent trains, and better connections to BART, local buses, and light rail.
