1.0 Appointment Schedule

1.1 9:00 a.m. 9:22a.m. Fritz Bachman – Sherman County Community Corrections Biennial Plan

Present: Fritz Bachman, Amy Asher, Audrey Rooney, Drew Messenger

Fritz Bachman presented an overview of the Sherman County Community Corrections 2021-2023 Biennial Plan. Fritz stated that on July 1, 2021 Sherman County separated from Tri-County Community Corrections (a partnership with Gilliam and Wheeler Counties) and joined Wasco County Community Corrections (WCCC) following an agreement between both Sherman and Wasco Counties. While State budgeting and reporting for each county is being kept separate at this time, the joint entity is referred to as Wasco Sherman Community Corrections (WSCC.) With this change, the PO assigned to the Sherman County caseload joined the WCCC office as a Wasco County employee. State funding allocated to Sherman County is now managed through the WCCC office.

Wasco County staff has maintained a very good relationship with the Sherman County Sheriff and District Attorney over the years, and WSCC's supervision philosophy is aligned with all parties' expectations. This Sherman County Biennial Plan is being done in its own document so that county-specific services and expenses can be readily identified and compared within each. While WCCC oversees the funding for both counties, client engagement will be tracked separately and program costs applied proportionally. Though numbers fluctuate, Sherman County has approximately 12% the clients as compared to Wasco at

this time. Many of our county residents seek services in The Dalles so we expect to see higher program engagement with the additional options supported in Wasco County.

Approximately 22 residents of Sherman County are on active supervision. WSCC utilizes evidence-based principles and collaborates with community partners to focus resources and supervision strategies on the individuals who present the greatest risk to the community.

Some highlights from the report include the following:

- Transitional Services. This includes both transitional housing and peer recover mentors. Male and female peer mentors are available to assist any client in need, day-to-day, regardless of whether they reside in a transitional house. The transitional housing consists of two stabilization houses one for men and one for women and two "next-step" transitional houses, also one for men and one for women. The stabilization houses are staffed with house managers and peer mentors, and are free to the residents for as long as it takes them to stabilize and work through phases of the program.
- Work Crew. Wasco County has maintained a steady work crew program with a dedicated work crew supervisor for many years. While Sherman County's Work Crew program is in the process of hiring staff and restarting part-time operations, clients of WSCC will have the option to earn hours for community service or as part of their sentence through either county. Efforts will be made to have residents of Sherman County perform their work hours within their community of origin. Work crew also provides WSCC with a non-jail sanctioning alternative in both counties.
- Non-jail sanction. Some examples of non-jail sanctions used at WSCC include: in-office interventions, increased reporting schedules, increased urinary analysis screening, increased home or work visitation, written or verbal reprimands, curfews, zone restrictions, cognitive class referrals, work crew hours, and non-work crew tasks (did greater duty, campus litter pickup, etc.) In this biennium we plan on continuing the use of electronic monitoring for home detention and regulating a client's allowed movement. Our POs ultimately use discretion based on their training and experience to select and apply the most effective sanction, and to try different approaches according to the resulting responsively of the client.

Katie Woodruff presented information to County Court to make them aware of a growing concern regarding impounded vehicles. Katie stated that a few cars each year get stolen and then abandoned here in Sherman County and by the time the owner finds out about it they have a towing fee and a \$50 a day storage fee. This bill can be a big bill before the owner is found and notified. Some of these owners are houseless and their car was their home or sometimes the owners live out-of-state.

Sheriff Lohrey said that a County run impound yard has been needed for many years.

Commissioner Bird asked Katie and Sheriff Lohrey what the 'ask' was for? How can County Court help in this situation? Katie and Sheriff Lohrey responded that 'the ask' is for an impound yard. They would like the Court to keep this need in mind for the future – as other developments come along.

The consensus from the County Court was to go ahead purchase the side-by-side since it was already advertised and fair is this week.

The Honda side-by-side is being purchased as the grand prize for the Sherman County COVID-19 Vaccination Incentive drawings that will take place August 21st at the Sherman County Fair. Prizes are paid for with vaccine incentive funds which are federal dollars passed through the state and on to the county.

3.4 Commissioner Reports and Updates

Judge Dabulskis –

Attended a Safety Committee meeting; a CREA meeting; a Governor Brown conference call, a Senator Bentz Town Hall; a Biggs Assessment meeting; and a Four Rivers meeting.

Judge Dabulskis stated that a resident built something on a piece of property that the County owns and is checking with Judge Dabulskis if the county would vacate the property.

Update on Starvation Boat Ramp – Judge Dabulskis stated that the contract the state has drawn up is stating that the County will do much more than was ever discussed. Judge Dabulskis and Road Master Mark Cole have discussed halting this project at this time.

The City of Moro sent a letter to County Court about handicap ramp project that they will be doing shortly and at the same time the city would like to do a utility pole project. The City of Moro is trying to come up with funding for the utility project but would like to see if the County would be open to loaning the city the money if needed.

Commissioner Miller -

Attended an EOCCO meeting; a Fair board meeting; a Planning Commissioner meeting; and drove around the G line off of Monkland.

Commissioner Miller mentioned that the Veggie RX program has given out 434 booklets to Sherman County residents this year with a face value of \$13,020.

Commissioner Bird -

Attended a Center for Living meeting; a Senator Bentz Town Hall; a NCPHD meeting; a Prevention meeting, and a Public Health meeting.

Commissioner Bird met with Martha McGinnis, Dana Pursley-Haner and Caitlin Blagg.

Commissioner Bird met with a representative from Mid-Columbia Community Action to talk about upcoming meetings at the Senior Center where they will discuss a variety of services they offer.
