Budget Message:

Judge Dabulskis welcomed the committee members to the 2021 budget meeting and presented the budget message noting changes proposed for this year's budget including:

- ➤ A 2.5% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA)
- Recommended Merit Increases by Department Heads
- ➤ Continued Allocation of SIP Funds to Sherman County School District, Local Cities, Resident Incentive Program, Sherman County Museum, Scholarship Committees
- Fiber Project Phase III (Rufus to Biggs)
- ➤ Internet Access Expansion
- Adjustments for Elected Officials (to be Considered by Citizen Members Only)
- Reallocation of Funding for Biggs Service District Water System Project, Sherman County Fair Project and Kent Water District Project

Judge Dabulskis thanked Debbie Hayden for her work in preparing the budget document and to the Budget Committee members for their time and attention to this important process.

Pages 1-2: County General, Non – Departmental

Debbie Hayden stated that the Library has an excess carryover of \$42,000, so their request will be lowered by \$32,000 to leave a carryover of \$10,000. The Sherman County Budget Committee approved a reduced request of \$76,847.

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved the following monetary allocations for Mid-Columbia Economic Development District:

• \$1,306 Local Assessment

• \$45,000 Economic Development Contract

• \$2,000 Gorge TransLink Match

• \$600 Gorge Technology Alliance

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved \$138,934 to North Central Public Health District.

Debbie Hayden stated that the County has switched to a new IT company this fiscal year. The new IT company has recommended using Cloud storage and adding a more secure firewall for added protection.

Page 8: County General, Justice Court - Ron McDermid

Ron McDermid came to the Budget Committee to give an in-person report and to answer any questions. He did not have a monetary ask at this time. Ron did state that it could be up to a year or longer before Justice Court went back to in-person court proceedings. For now, Justice Court is handling most cases phonetically and in the future it will most likely be a hybrid of phone and in-person hearings.

Page 9: County General, Parks

The question was asked about DeMoss Park Maintenance and why the amount was so high. Judge Dabulskis stated that trees need trimmed, there is a need for some additional lighting in the parking lot and there is some money as a place holder in case a building needs to be cleared away.

Page 19: County General, Weed Control/Grounds Maintenance -

SWCD Grant – Grass Valley project amount decreased due to COVID. Department has hired two seasonal crew members for nine months this year.

Page 20: County General, Burnet Building

Page 21: County General, District Attorney

There were no changes.

Page 22: County General, Extension

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved \$103,953 for the Sherman County OSU Extension Office. This includes \$54,720 for the cost of Sue Mabe's position under Sherman County and a payment of \$49,233 directly to OSU. OSU Extension has a carryover of \$26,000. We reduced the proposed budget by \$20,000 leaving a projected carryover of \$6,000.

Page 23: County General, Transfer to Other Funds

There were no changes.

Page 24: County General, Operating Contingency

Reduced the Transfer to the Weed Sinking Fund by \$46,000 and Increased Operating Contingency by same. Reduced Operating Contingency by \$288,544 to offset additional expenditures in the SIP Additional Fees Fund.

Page 25: UNAPP Ending Balance

The money in this line is set aside to start the new year with.

Pages 26-27: Community Transit

Community Transit will be adding another shopping bus. Community Transit received a grant to purchase a new vehicle.

Page 28: Ambulance – Dana Pursley-Haner

Dana requested funds to purchase a new LIFEPAK 15 V4 Monitor/Defib machine for the ambulance. The current AED machine is old enough that replacement parts can no longer be purchased.

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved \$31,892.45 for Sherman County Ambulance to purchase a new Stryker Monitor/Defib machine with SIP Additional Fees.

Page 30: MCCOG Respite

Account is closed.

Page 31: Courthouse Repair & Improvements (CR&I) Reserve

This is a maintenance account for grounds and the courthouse.

Page 32: Prevention Program

Summer Work Crew is OYCC.

This is pass through from the state.

Mark mentioned that gas and chemical prices are hard to predict right now.

Pages 45-46: County Fair Board - Bryce Coelsch

Bryce Coelsch gave an update on the building construction. Jeff Schott from Pillar Consulting Group, Inc., says that they are planning on submitting for land use on May 13, 2021. At this time, the plan is to start site work right after fair – at least the bulk of excavation and to get everything rocked in.

The unspent \$4.5 million previously budgeted for the Fairgrounds Building Project in 2020/21 will be re-allocated for the 2021/22 fiscal year.

Tri-County Community Corrections with Sherman, Gilliam and Wheeler County's is dissolving as of June 30, 2021. Sherman County will be joining Wasco County's Parole and Probation Services.

Page 63: Weed Sinking Fund – Rod Asher

Rod Asher came to the Sherman County Budget Committee with multi requests. He requested a new spray truck with a new spray system. An upgrade to the current sprayer and an additional new truck not associated with spraying.

Sherman County Budget Committee approved funding for the Weed District to purchase a new spray truck/sprayer and upgrade the existing sprayer in the amount of \$146,000. Funding for the second new truck was not approved.

Sherman County Scholarship Association – Molly Belshe

The Sherman County Budget Committee has approved \$20,000 to Sherman County Scholarship Association. The money comes from SIP Additional Fees.

Chris Moore, Gorge Community Foundation

Chris Moore came and talked to the budget committee about creating an endowment fund through Gorge Community Foundation. The foundation was formed in 1999 and has 70 members. Chris stated that it takes a minimum of \$10,000 to start an endowment and then you can take out up to 5% every year to make investments back into the community. You can never withdraw your initial investment.

The budget committee listened to the presentation but did not take any action.

Athletic Foundation – Chris Moore

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved \$25,000 to Sherman County Athletic Foundation to help towards finishing the little league field and walking path. The project is also asking for gravel to be provided for the walking path. In an email on May 14, 2021, Debbie asked if the \$25,000 allocated to them should include the cost of the gravel. The money comes from SIP Additional Fees.

Sherman County Health District - Erin Haines & Caitlin Blagg

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved \$68,915 for Sherman County Health District to purchase an Ultra Sound Machine. The money comes from SIP Additional Fees.

Kent Water District – Elizabeth Mills

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved an increase of \$100,000 to Kent Water District for a total amount of \$250,000 to purchase and install a water storage tank. The money comes from SIP Additional Fees.

Columbia Gorge Community College – Dan Spatz

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved \$62,736 to Columbia Gorge Community College to aid establishment of Construction Technologies and Advanced Manufacturing/Metals Fabrication Training Program. The money comes from SIP Additional Fees.

Condon Chamber of Commerce – K'Lynn Lane

The Sherman County Budget Committee approved a contribution of \$4,000 to the Condon Chamber of Commerce that would normally go to the JDRT.

The Sherman County Budget Committee did not authorize any other contributions at this time. The budget committee would like to extend an invitation to the chamber to come back to the committee next year showing how they spent the money, how the chamber has grown and what more the chamber can offer Sherman County businesses.

Biggs Service District

The previous grant of \$512,000 to Biggs Service District was not just rolled over into the \$1,560,000 loan. The grant has been paid in full and the balance of the loan to Biggs Service District will be reallocated to 2021-22.
