1.0 Appointment Schedule

1.1 9:00 a.m. Jacque Schei, MCEDD Quarterly Report

Present: Jacque Schei, Marnene Benson-Wood

Jacque Schei, Sherman County Economic Development Coordinator with MCEDD, gave highlights from her MCEDD quarterly report as follows:

- MCEDD CEDS: The MCEDD Board adopted the 2022-2027 Columbia Gorge Comprehensive
 Economic Development Strategy in March. The final document, along with the approved project priority lists
 for Oregon and Washington, will be posted on MCEDD's website. Staff worked with the County Planning
 Director to develop a project list for the County and the Court's prioritizations were incorporated into the state
 rankings for the final CEDS.
- Housing Assistance: Two New Housing Construction Grant applications were reviewed by the Grant Review Committee since the beginning of the year. Staff also discussed status of funds with the Committee. With the approval of both applications, the housing grant fund balance will be fully allocated. The Committee recommended applications continue to be reviewed on a first come, first serve basis, indicating they don't want to lose momentum for the program. Staff will disclose to all applicants that if their application is approved by the Court, any grant payments are contingent upon the housing grant fund receiving more funds (expected in January 2023).
- Water-Wastewater System Technical Assistance: Staff met with the Rural Community Assistance Corporation (RCAC) to discuss water and wastewater systems that may benefit from technical assistance. Staff are following up on several items and will work to schedule site visits with RCAC staff. This may be a good resource for any systems in the County with minor issues or questions such as setting SDCs, rate

studies, or planning. This support can often be provided at no cost to a community due to grant funding RCAC receives.

• Support for Cities:

- O Wasco: Staff met with the City and Business Oregon to discuss issues with their water and wastewater systems and possible funding options. Staff also discussed the possibility of doing system assessments and planning for future upgrades with the City. If the City decides to move forward, staff will support them in applying for technical assistance grants.
- o Moro: Staff reached out to the City to offer support in looking for funding for their water system project and put them in touch with Business Oregon.
- o **Rufus:** Staff met with the City to review progress on current priorities and projects. Follow up efforts are underway on several topics.
 - Staff met with the City and RCAC to discuss where RCAC may be able to offer technical assistance, including support for GIS mapping of the water and wastewater systems, outlining a detailed scope for investigating issues with well #3, drafting a water curtailment plan, conducting system assessments and rate studies.
 - The City is awaiting completion of a feasibility study on well #1 to determine what the next steps are to fix current issues.
 - Follow-up on brownfield project a contractor has been selected and is planning the survey. Staff will support the City with next steps when the survey has been completed and will support coordination with Business Oregon to update their grant agreement to include abatement work if the City wants to move forward.
- o **Grass Valley:** Staff attended the City of Grass Valley's March City Council meeting in which the engineer presented details of the feasibility study for a wastewater system. The Council agreed they would like to move forward and want to get community buy-in before looking for funding. A community meeting is scheduled for April 19 at 7:00 pm at the Grass Valley Pavilion. Staff has been working with the City, engineer, Business Oregon and DEQ to prepare. Staff is also coordinating with Business Oregon to start the process to schedule a One Stop meeting to discuss funding options for the project. The project was not far enough along to submit a request for Congressionally Directed Spending, but could be a good candidate for next year, depending on progress.
- Staff had an initial discussion with the Board Chair from the North Sherman County Fire Protection District
 about constructing a new fire hall on their recently purchased property in Rufus. The current building cannot
 accommodate the larger vehicles they own. Staff will support next steps which include looking into planning
 and permitting requirements, solicitation of an engineer for design work, and looking into funding
 opportunities.
- NEW MCEDD's Microlending program for small businesses offers terms of one- to five-years and full collateralization is not required. Applicants must supply a minimum of 5% towards the project to receive up to a 95% loan from a MCEDD-managed funding source. Interest rates depend on risk criteria and range generally from 8 to 12% with performance incentives to lower the interest rate during the loan term.

Jacque will send a flyer and information to Tammi Gaskey so that she can forward the information to the County's small business email group.

Jessica Richelderfer Wheeler and Brittany Dark are two Sherman County Ambassadors to the Oregon Frontier Chamber of Commerce.

Commissioner Bird stated that Sage DeLong, Field Representative from Congressman Cliff Bentz's Office, has requested the top 5 projects for Sherman County with details of each project. Jacque Schei stated that she would send Commissioner Bird the list and descriptions.

County Court thanked Jacque for all that she does for Sherman County.

QUASI-JUDICIAL MEETING PROCEDURE

I call this Public Hearing of April 6th to order. My name is Joe Dabulskis, and I am the Judge of the Sherman County Court. The County Courts' job is to conduct public hearings for the purpose of making mass gathering decisions and or recommendations according to the ordinances and law of Sherman County and the State of Oregon. The County Court may not vary from the adopted laws and ordinances. If a law or ordinance is considered to be unfair or unworkable, there is a process to amend the ordinances. All county mass gathering ordinances must meet minimum standards of the enabling state statutes and administrative rules. All applications being heard today are being weighed against the law and ordinances in effect at the time the application was filed.

A copy of the rules of procedure for the hearing, the agenda and copies of the staff report are available.

All those in attendance are asked to sign the attendance sheet and please include your mailing address.

Briefly we will begin with a staff report and any additional comments from staff since the staff report was written. The appellant will speak first, followed by proponents or those in favor of the proposal. Next we will hear any opponents, followed by neutral parties or those who are either for or against but have questions they

need clarified. Any agencies comments will be heard last. The applicant will be given the right of rebuttal, then at which time the hearing will be closed and no more public testimony will be taken. The County Court will then deliberate and render a decision. Testimony from all concerned shall be specific to the law that is understandable.

Failure to provide testimony at this hearing will preclude a person from participating on an appeal to the County Court.

All persons testifying must be recognized by the Judge. State your name and address and if you are representing someone else please state who you are representing.

We will now qualify our decision makers.

3.0 <u>Discussion Items</u>

3.1 Extension Position

Commissioner Bird talked about information that Nicole Strong, OSU Regional Director, had put together about the benefits of the Extension Secretary position becoming an OSU position versus staying a County position.

The OSU position starts out about \$30 more, has 10 steps and will top out about the same amount. The insurance for family is a lot cheaper. OSU is contracted so the COLA will go up as negotiated in the contract.

The County position has 7 steps so you get to the top quicker than at OSU. COLA is decided each year by County Court. The insurance is expensive for the employee to cover family since this is a .8 FTE position. There would be about a \$12,000 savings to the County if this became an OSU position because of the cost of benefits. A negative for making the position an OSU position is that county dollars are paying for this position.
