Now is the time to start planning for the next wildfire season. Are you and your home, farm, or ranch ready? The above average precipitation that we have continued to receive in 2023 will likely correspond with more abundant fuels across rangelands and crops this coming fire season, making it important that we are prepared before fire season starts. This training will help you better prepare your home, farm, crops and animals, and farm infrastructure for wildfires through improved wildfire behavior awareness, creating strategic fuel breaks and defensible space, and increasing your safety and effectiveness when you have to evacuate or suppress wildfires burning on your property. Join OSU Extension on February 7<sup>th</sup>, 1pm to 4:30pm, Wasco County Extension Office (CGCC, building 2, 400 E Scenic Drive, The Dalles, OR) or virtually on February 10<sup>th</sup> from 1pm to 4pm. The class will cover:

- PAPER white and colored paper (staples OK) newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, phone books, paperback books, spiral-bound notebooks, cereal & cracker style boxes (liner removed), cardboard tubes, paper bags, egg cartons, milk cartons & juice boxes.
- PLASTIC plastic bottles, #1 & #2 with a neck. Examples; beverages, milk jugs, shampoo, detergent, cleaners (rinse & remove caps)
- METAL aluminum cans, tin cans (flattened), clean aluminum foil & foil baking pans, empty aerosol cans (discard cap).

#### **Second Sort:**

• All glass bottles & jars - rinsed. No lids.

#### Third Sort:

Corrugated cardboard - flattened. No larger than
