School Nursing Services Come to Sherman County

Sherman County School District recently added a key role to their comprehensive education services - a Whole Child School Nurse. This is a brandnew position for the rural district, which serves nearly 300 students from Kindergarten through 12th grade out of their school in Moro, Oregon. The addition of a school nurse in Sherman County follows a statewide trend of schools providing an increasing array of "wrap around services" to help ensure that all youth have access to educational opportunities.

School nursing is a specialized practice of nursing that focuses on bridging the health care and education gap. School nurses work to protect and promote student health, foster student development, and advance academic success. Depending on the school and student needs, school nursing may include

training staff to administer life-saving medications, working with parents and medical providers to create nursing care plans for students with chronic health conditions, and responding to the day to day health needs of students in the building.

Before moving there to be close to family, he worked in pediatric home care and as an oncology nurse. Upcoming Election May 16, 2023

The 2023 Special District Election will be held, Tuesday, May 16, 2023. The last day to register to vote for this election is April 25, 2023. New voter registration, or registration updates, can be completed online at https://oregonvotes.gov/myvote or by completing a Voter Registration card, which can be obtained at any post office, County Clerk's office, DMV office, or online at https://sos.oregon.gov/ elections/Documents/SEL500.pdf.

Ballots will be mailed between April 26th and May 2nd. It is important to update your voter registration if you have moved or changed your mailing address. <u>The</u> <u>Postal Service cannot forward ballots</u>. An absentee ballot can be requested if you will be away from home and would like to receive your ballot at a different address. On May 6th, Sherman County residents are invited to bring <u>one</u> pick-up load of trash to the Solid Waste Transfer Station without paying a fee with some exceptions.

When: Saturday, May 6, 2023 – 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. <u>NOTE: Station may close</u> <u>early if bin is full before 3 p.m.</u>

Where: Sherman County Solid Waste Transfer Site located at 72526 Welk Road between Highway 206 and Biggs Junction.

- **How**: Upon arrival, wait for the attendant to direct you to the appropriate unloading site.
- **Limited:** One trip per vehicle.

Restrictions:

No <u>household</u>, hazardous, or medical waste will be accepted. No recycling.

North Central Public Health District's WIC office will be holding its traveling satellite clinic at the Sherman County Senior & Community Center in Moro on April 11. The clinic is by appointment only.

Anyone who is interested in the WIC program is encouraged to call ahead at 541-506-2610 to get more information about WIC, and then set up an appointment at the satellite clinic. The length of time the satellite clinic is open varies, depending on how many appointments are made, but it typically runs from 10 a.m. to noon.

WIC offers pregnancy and breastfeeding guidance, wholesome foods, nutrition-focused counseling, free health screenings, and connections to resources. WIC is all about healthy babies, kids and families. If you are pregnant, breastfeeding, or have a child under 5, WIC could be for you! Sherman County FFA Chapter

Sherman County FFA Chapter has had a busy year so far! The year has been filled with CDE events, fundraisers, and holding chapter meetings. Sherman Officers attended District Leadership Camp in Prineville in September to meet our State FFA Officers and develop their leadership skills. During the whole month of October, Sherman County FFA, and the school held a food drive to benefit the Wasco Food Pantry. October was also the month of Homecoming so our FFA chapter held a BBO stand at the football game. We also were asked to help with the annual MCP dinner which allowed us to serve the community. February 5-6, we headed to Redmond for the Central Oregon District Convention. Sectionals were held on February 28th. We geared up for the State Convention on March 16–19 at Deschutes County Fair in Redmond. Jai Carlson-Lange was nominated and awarded a free trip to the State convention and a free FFA jacket by Ag West's 'Adopt a Member' program. We took 14 members to experience leadership workshops, networking with other members from across the state, electing new state officers, bonding as a chapter, and sessions!

This year, officers have been busy developing a small merchandise website for chapter members and families to purchase Sherman County FFA clothing. The website consists of t-shirts, quarter-zips, a backpack, fullzips, and more! Stickers are also available with hats. The link to the website can be found on our Facebook or Instagram accounts. In April, we will open chapter officer applications. We will also be attending the CDE for tractor driving, which will be held in Madras. Chapter officer elections will be held in May, along with the FFA chapter awards banquet that is open to family and community members! The CDE shop skills competition will be held in Redmond, on May 24th. In early June, a fair meeting will be held to discuss fair events, expectations, record books, etcetera. The annual Sherman County Fair will occur from August 23rd through 27th of 2023.

Sherman Development League

Sherman Development League (SDL) has announced the successful completion of grant awards for 2023 committing \$11,645.00 to projects of benefit to Sherman County.

Formed in 2000 as a non-profit 501 (c) (3) organization, SDL's mission is to provide grants and/or loans in support of community-based programs and projects to enhance the social, cultural and educational environment of Sherman County. SDL provides fiscal sponsorship to organizations and/or unincorporated groups for projects which further its tax-exempt purposes and are of public benefit to the residents of Sherman County. A revolving loan fund has been established to provide loans to for-profit and non-profit businesses. SDL also serves as the Sherman County Cultural Coalition Board and provides related fiscal administration of funds received annually from the Oregon Cultural Trust and matching funds from Sherman County.

Two project applications met the requirements and goals established by SDL. Included are projects proposed by the Sherman County Fair and Wasco School Events Center.

Since 2007, the Development League has awarded one hundred (100) grants totaling \$1,199,422.00, emergency funding in the amount of \$78,412.00 for eight organizations and provided several loans to private and public entities.

Applications for the next round of grant requests will be available in the fall of 2023. Requests for loans may be submitted at any time.

Age-Friendly Health Tip: Dealing with Stress

Ever feel stressed out, burnt out, or worn down? We all experience stress in different ways throughout our lives. While stress is not always bad, longterm stress can harm our physical and mental health and disrupt our social relationships. Being aware of and managing our stress is an important way we can take care of ourselves. Here are a few tips to try out:

Identify your signs and sources of

stress: Know the sources of stress in your life and some of the early warning signs that let you know you are starting to feel stressed. Warning signs may be physical (like a headache), emotional (like feeling irritable), or mental (for example, trouble thinking or focusing). Signs and sources of stress can be different for everybody, so it can be helpful to take some time to get to know yours.

Focus on what you can change:

When things get stressful, identify what you have the ability to change. Ask yourself: Is there a way I can change the situation, my perspective, or my response to the stressful situation? Focusing on what we can change, and accepting what we cannot, helps to reduce stress.

Find your stress-busters: Going for a walk, spending time outside, listening to music, keeping a journal, or just taking a few deep breaths can all be helpful strategies for getting through stressful times. Doing the little things that bring you joy can make a big difference.

Talk with your healthcare provider if you have questions or concerns about how stress is affecting your health. If you're feeling overwhelmed or stressed, call the Oregon Warmline at 1-800-698-2392, available 7 days a week 9am – 11pm, to speak with a trained peer.

The Judges Corner



I wanted to give my children all of the experiences of farm life when they were small, so I got a couple of chickens. Wanting to hear the crowing of a rooster in the morning, one of the chickens I bought was a big colorful rooster. Shortly after we bought the chickens, the rooster was crowing almost non-stop one morning. Suddenly, my wife and I heard my son yell out his bedroom window, "Shut up you stupid rooster, I'm already awake!" We laughed until we cried. Some of what we hear these days remind me of that rooster, and sometimes I wish I could act just like my son did. And some of what I hear makes me want to cry.

I seem to be writing a lot of testimony for and against bills in Salem now that the legislative session is in full swing. I urge everybody to do the same or at least check one of the boxes, ether oppose or support on bills they are passionate about. Look up OLIS with the bill's # on the internet to submit testimony. I figured out how to do it without our Court Assistant's help, so it must be pretty simple.

People ask me lot of questions about the fire in Biggs Junction that totally gutted the TA Express. The owners state they plan to rebuild as soon as they can. In the meantime, they plan to bring in a mobile office, C-store, showers and open up the fuel pumps as quickly as possible. I am told that even if the water system was finished, it still would not have saved the facility. The completion of the water project had been held up because Biggs Service District has been waiting for the 430,000 gallon water tank for more than a year. The good news is this week the tank people were prepping the foundation and the tank should be standing above Biggs this spring. We will be happy to get that project off our plate. I have water studies dated 2003 for Biggs Junction, which means that project is 20 years old.

In February, I was in Washington DC for a National Association of Counties legislative conference. While there, I heard President Joe Biden speak. In his opening remarks he stated that he was a County Commissioner years ago and then decided to run for the U.S. Senate because the senate job would be easier. I did spend some time in the senate building on several occasions discussing Sherman County concerns with our senators. Senator Wyden will be coming to Sherman County on April 2nd for a town hall meeting. This town hall will be unique because it will be held on my wife's family farm. Maybe I'll get him in a tractor?

We received some sad news this week. Our Veteran's Service Officer will be retiring at the end of May. Paul has been one of the best VSO's we could ask for and in one of the finest men I have had the privilege to work with. Thank you Paul for both your service to our veterans and your service to our country.

Recently a county employee passed their 30th year anniversary of working for Sherman County. I and the rest of the County Court depend on this person every day. I hope they stay for many more years.

I brought my five year old Granddaughter to work with me one morning last week. As I crept slowly around a stop sign while driving, she said, "Grandpa, you are supposed to stop there! Mom always does." I told her she was right. Then I was informed I was supposed to be using two hands as I steered. I humbly put both hands on the steering wheel and realized I was being lazy. It would not take any more time to come to a complete stop and it was a lot safer to drive with both hands on the wheel. (At least I wasn't speeding) I will remember to stop, look both ways and keep both hands on the wheel while doing this job as County Judge and try not to get lazy. It would be nice if we could count on our legislators to do the same.

First Sort: Commingled:

APRIL

• PAPER - white and colored paper (staples OK) newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, phone books, paperback books, spiral-bound notebooks, cereal & cracker style boxes (liner removed), cardboard tubes, paper bags, egg cartons, milk cartons & juice boxes.

• PLASTIC - plastic bottles, #1 & #2 with a neck. Examples; beverages, milk jugs, shampoo, detergent, cleaners (rinse & remove caps)

• METAL - aluminum cans, tin cans (flattened), clean aluminum foil & foil baking pans, empty aerosol cans (discard cap).

Second Sort:

• All glass bottles & jars - rinsed. No lids.

Third Sort:

• Corrugated cardboard - flattened. No larger than 2' x 2' square

All items should be clean & rinsed with lids removed & flattened if possible.
