person previously employed in or hired by the office of the assessor during the tax year subject to appeal to BOPTA.

Board members hear petitions for reduction of the real market, maximum assessed, specially assessed, and assessed value of property placed on the

roll by the county assessor as of January 1, 2023. The board will also consider requests to waive penalties assessed for the late filing of real and personal property returns.

An initial training session is required for new members and for those members returning after a break in service. Board members are required to attend training approved by the Department of Revenue at least every other year unless no petitions are filed. The BOPTA board generally meets for one or two sessions during the year between February and June. The one-year term ends on June 30, 2024.

If you are interested in being considered for the BOPTA board, please contact the Clerk's office 541-565-3606 no later than Friday, September 29, 2023. BOPTA pool members will be appointed by the county governing body on October 4, 2023.

2023 Spring Grant Awards Announced by Cultural Coalition

Spring grant awards for 2023 have been announced by the Sherman County Cultural Coalition (SCCC) committing \$6,215.00 to projects that strengthen existing cultural resources or engage the community in the arts, heritage or humanities in Sherman County.

Six project applications met the goals and priorities established by the Coalition in the Sherman County Cultural Plan. Successful applicants and projects are as follows: Sherman County Fair Board – Fair Entertainment; Sherman County 4-H Association – Enrichment Summer Day Camp; Sherman County Garden Club – Luncheons, Projects, Events; Sherman County Worship – Sound System Upgrade; Sherman Kids Zone – Summer Events; Wasco School Events Center – Art at the Wasco School.

Funding for these community projects was made possible with a grant award received from the Oregon Cultural Trust plus matching funds generously provided by Sherman County. Applications for the next grant cycle will be available in the fall of 2023.

Tri-County Hazardous Waste & Recycling Program

In 2022, 58 Sherman County residents took advantage of the opportunity to clean up and properly dispose of 5.141lbs of hazardous waste. So far this year, we have had a total of 21 participants with a total of 8,615lbs of hazardous waste properly disposed of. As of now, that is 3,747lbs more than last year with one more event to go in Sherman County! Tri-County Household Hazardous Waste and Recycling Program sponsors these annual events in Sherman County to give farmers, households and small businesses the opportunity to dispose of leftover, unwanted chemicals such as pesticides, paints, solvents, fluorescent bulbs and batteries. In addition to these events held in rural communities, the Tri-County program also holds quarterly hazardous waste collections at its permanent facilities at Hood River Garbage service and The Dalles Disposal.



When one of my daughters started traveling on her own as a teenager, I, as most parents do, worried. It was tough on me. One of the things I did to relieve some of my stress was to give her a large domination bill - and told her it was to be used "only" in an emergency. Several months later, she asked for more "emergency money". What! I hadn't heard of any emergency. I was quickly informed that there had been a shoe sale at Michael Kors and that constituted an emergency. Sometimes it is all about perspective. Budget season sometimes can be like that.

The members of the Sherman County Court are fully engaged in multiple budget committee meetings. While budgeting many things come up that happened throughout the past year that affect individual department budgets, such as the County Road Department. The Road Department is no longer selling gravel to private Individuals or companies. This decision was made by the county court because there are three local businesses within Sherman County that sell rock and gravel. Governments should not compete with businesses. Also it was mentioned during discussions, the last of the three major projects in the county should be completed soon. The County Courthouse Addition/Remodel, the Fairgrounds Arena, and the School Addition/Remodel were the big three.

The County, in partnership with the school, was just awarded a \$77,000 planning grant for a community resiliency center. This will involve putting solar panels on the school along with battery storage. The project, while lowering the power bill of the school, is designed to provide power to the school facility if there is a major disaster such as a Cascadia type event that shuts down the power grid. The school buildings could then be the hub where all could gather. Kudo's to Jacque from MCEDD for all her help in making our application stellar.

On June 10th, from 1 - 3:00 PM, one of Sherman County's finest will be honored and remembered at the Senior Center in Moro. Sheriff Deputy Douglas E. Smith was tragically taken from his family and Sherman County while preforming his duties protecting the county. You may have noticed a new sign along Highway 97, North of DeMoss Park on top of the ridge, dedicating that stretch of road to him. Please come to the Senior Center to honor Deputy Smith. Bring a dessert to share if you wish.

Cycle Oregon came to Sherman County to ride on our gravel roads, and as luck would have it, they came on the hottest days of the year. The volunteers and the Oregon Frontier Chamber are what made this a great event! Thank you to all that helped. I overheard talk that the stop at Kyle B's was outstanding!!

I recently spoke at a conference in St. George, Utah on "The Potentials and Pitfalls of Renewable Energy" from a county's prospective. This conference was put on by NACo's (National Association of Counties), WIR (Western Interstate Region). Oregon's Malheur County Judge, Dan Joyce was the WIR president. As I spoke, I again felt grateful for the previous County Court members and how they set things up regarding renewable energy. First Sort: Commingled:

- PAPER white and colored paper (staples OK) newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, phone books, paperback books, spiral-bound notebooks, cereal & cracker style boxes (liner removed), cardboard tubes, paper bags, egg cartons, milk cartons & juice boxes.
- PLASTIC plastic bottles, #1 & #2 with a neck. Examples; beverages, milk jugs, shampoo, detergent, cleaners (rinse & remove caps)
- METAL aluminum cans, tin cans (flattened), clean aluminum foil & foil baking pans, empty aerosol cans (discard cap).

Second Sort:

• All glass bottles & jars - rinsed. No lids.

Third Sort:

Corrugated cardboard - flattened. No larger than
 2' x 2' square

All items should be clean & rinsed with lids removed & flattened if possible.
