


Background

- 1954 1984 The Somerville Landfill discontinued operations and has remained stagnant for nearly 40 years.
- 1985 1994 First attempt to redevelop landfill with Rosenshein Associates/Somerville Square, Inc.
- 1996 1998 Renegotiated attempt to redevelop landfill with Rosenshein Associates.
- **2006 2007** Public Visioning effort sponsored by NJT, NJ DOT, Somerset County Redevelopment Plan amended based on Visioning.
- 2007 2008 Borough issues RFP for redevelopment of the Landfill Area.
- 2008 All bidders withdrew due to the 2008 economic collapse.
- **2020** Somerville Borough amended Redevelopment Plan to include remediation and the installation of a Community Solar project.
- January 11th, 2021 Submitted application for two 5MWdc community solar projects in PY2 of the NJ BPU Community Solar Pilot Program.
- May 26th, 2021 The Borough entered into a Redevelopment Agreement with CS Energy/Hathaway Solar for the development of two 5 MW co-located community solar projects.
- October 28th, 2021 Project missed acceptance into the PY2 Pilot Program by two points.
- December 22nd, 2021 Received NJDEP Landfill Closure & Post Closure Plan Approval for this portion of Somerville Landfill.
- November 16th, 2023 Received final permit approval.
- November 27th, 2023 Received interconnection conditional approval to construct from PSE&G Project is officially 'shovel ready'.
- **December 30th, 2023** Received approval of final grant application covering 75% of the projected \$13.4 MM landfill closure cost. Total grants received \$10 million.

Petition Overview

- CS Energy Petitions BPU for Waiver of Rules:
 - Allow for the co-location of two 5 MWdc Community Solar facilities on the Somerville Landfill Site. This was allowed in the Pilot Program.
 - Allow project like Somerville (co-located landfill sites) to receive automatic entry into the Community Solar Energy Program (CSEP).
- Project Benefits:
 - The Somerville project generates great value to the public at no incremental cost to the public relative to other CSEP projects.
 - CSEP is the only realist option to clean up this site which has been non-productive for decades; additionally financiers will not fund the project if it is not in the CSEP.
 - Funds from the CSEP will be used to contribute to cleaning up the site (a public benefit), compared to typical CSEP projects whose value accrues primarily to a private owner.
 - The project has received ~\$10MM worth of grant funds from the NJ DEP/EDA to support the closure of the landfill.
 - Without the developers contribution (rent) capping and closing the landfill would be not viable if Petition refused.
