This Regular Meeting of Council was called to order on Monday, April 8, 2024 at 7:02 p.m. by Steve Michniak, Council President.

The Council President moved Mayor's Report up on the agenda so the Mayor could make his appointments to the Boards and Commissions and the appointees did not have to wait all night. **Mayor's Report**

Mayor Broska said he had five appointments to make tonight and all the candidates were in the audience. The letters of interest and/or resumes had been previously provided to City Council. He introduced Virginia Harris as his appointment to the PARTA Board. She would be reappointed to this Board and had already served in this position for 23 years.

MOTION: TO CONFIRM RE-APPOINTMENT OF VIRGINIA HARRIS TO THE PARTA BOARD FOR ANOTHER THREE-YEAR TERM.

Moved by Mr. Hannan, seconded by Mr. Lombardo. Upon voice vote, motion carried.

The next appointment was to the Civil Service Commission to fill a vacancy. He said Mrs. Pavlick had served the City well in various positions over the years and was familiar with the City's hiring practices.

Moved by Mr. Hannan, seconded by Mr. Lombardo. Upon voice vote, **motion carried**. Mrs. Pavlick was sworn in by Mayor Broska.

The next appointment was actually a shuffle of the Planning Commission Members. There was an opening for the Ward 3 seat, but there were no applicants from Ward 3. Brian Salyer, who is currently in an At-large Planning Commission seat, and lived in Ward 3, agreed to fill the Ward 3 seat, and then there would be a vacancy in the At-large seat that would be easier to fill. Mr. Salyer had already served almost three years on the Planning Commission and wished to continue on the Commission.

The next appointment was to the Planning Commission At-large seat. The Mayor proposed Chris Yonish for the position. The term would expire at the end of December 2024, so the Mayor planned to re-appoint him at that time. He felt Mr. Yonish would be a good fit because he was a long-term resident of Streetsboro (28 years) and had been involved in a few other Commissions and was active with the youth sports organizations at the school and he wanted to be a part of the progress the City was making.

Mayor Broska asked to appoint Rochelle Hartigan to the Board of Zoning and Building Appeals. She was a newer resident of Streetsboro who had lived here four years. She was one of the first people to respond to the social media request for applicants for the vacancies on the various boards and commission. He liked her enthusiasm and interest in getting involved in City government. Mayor Broska said Ms. Hartigan would fill the vacancy created when Matt Bross had to resign from the BZBA.

Reports/Communications from Depts/Boards/Commissions

Mr. Mytinger reported that the Total Eclipse in the Park was a great event today. Even after doing a lot of research and seeing images of what to expect, actually witnessing a total solar eclipse was a very awe-inspiring thing to experience. There was a great turnout of about 800+people from PA, WV, NC, Washington DC and elsewhere. There were no issues in the park today, but there was some traffic congestion after the event.

Mr. Mytinger had distributed a flyer of the winners of the Electrical Box Art. There were five designs that would be installed as vinyl wraps on five traffic light electrical boxes throughout the City. There were 7 or 8 submissions and five winners. He was starting to take submissions for the 2025 program. He would announce the winners on Facebook after tonight's meeting.

Mr. O'Malia requested an executive session during the April 22, 2024 Finance Committee meeting regarding economic development opportunities.

Chief Wain said things went really well during the total eclipse, but there were a few issues after the eclipse. There were about 10 officers working today (about three times the minimum) and they were all busy with issues after the eclipse (drunks, drugs, disturbances, and domestics). She thanked the Feds for paying for all the overtime this weekend. She said the traffic was heavy coming off the Turnpike prior to the eclipse and immediately after the total eclipse, while it was still a partial eclipse, I-480 coming into town was backed up beyond the city limits for people trying to get on to the Turnpike. There were a couple of accidents, which had been expected because there were so many people. For the most part there weren't really traffic problems, even with the traffic backing up on I-480; they got through the Turnpike pretty quickly.

Chief Reinholz said it was pretty quiet during the eclipse. There was a unit stationed at City Park for minor injuries. There were not many calls yet, but the hotels were filled, so there may be calls tonight if people were still partying. The end of March had been busy. There were two separate fires within four minutes of each other and mutual aid from various cities helped, but they were small fires with people on scene quickly so the fires were dealt with quickly. There was a cardiac arrest save in the last two weeks. The new \$706,000 fire engine was to be delivered in July 2024, so he had started working with Brindlee Mountain to sell the used fire engine, #2616. Chief Reinholz had submitted the SAFER grant application for three firefighters today because it was due at the end of this week. Streetsboro did a water shuttle with Geauga County on Sunday. The department had finished the company inspections and would start the spring house cleaning. Chris Fredmonsky was retiring at the end of the month, so the Chief had started working with Human Resources to hire a replacement full-time firefighter.

Mr. Mytinger explained some of the changes: the first section had the

Community Center rental of the event hall(s), the second section was about rental of the picnic pavilions, the legislation gave the Mayor's designee the ability to approve the rental agreements, it gave the Parks and Recreation Director the ability to promote and market the rentals, and it mentioned the existing sections for the athletic fields policy and rentals.

Mayor's Report (continued)

Mayor Broska said the Total Eclipse at the Park event was flawless. It was very well managed because of proper prior planning by all the Parks and Recreation staff, the Senior Citizens that had craft projects inside the Community Center, and all the safety forces across town. There

were no behavior problems until after the eclipse. Mayor Broska thanked Capt. Grimm for his months of emergency planning for safety concerns across the County. Mayor Broska said the entire City was prepared for this event because of the thoughtfulness of a lot of different people. He enjoyed seeing 10 police cruisers active today. There was a lot of traffic afterward leaving town, but it got through. He gave kudos to everybody that was involved in the planning and execution of this event, they did a great job and it was a big team effort of the City departments.

Mayor Broska reported that the banners on the street poles that currently had winter scenes would be replaced soon with spring banners. He said he was excited to see the vinyl wraps of artwork on the electrical traffic boxes soon.

President of Council's Comments

Mr. Michniak commented that the Total Eclipse in the Park was a total success; safe and enjoyable. He noted that the last total solar eclipse visible in Ohio was in 1806; the next total eclipse in Ohio would be 2099 (visible in Columbus and the central portion of the state); the next time Streetsboro will have a total solar eclipse will be the year 2444, so today was a truly rare event for Streetsboro. Mr. Michniak said experiencing the total eclipse in real life was wild and so interesting. He appreciated that the clouds had cleared enough to see it so well.

Council Members' Comments

The Council Members commented on their experiences with the total eclipse today and appreciated the thorough planning of all the City staff. Mrs. Glenn said, after seeing the total eclipse for herself, she understood why so many people traveled a great distance to see an eclipse.

Mr. Lombardo thanked Mr. Hannan for continuing to pursue the sign project for Public Square. Mr. Lombardo also read a thank you card from Mary Kay and Bob Reynolds (Ward 2 residents) to Mayor Broska and City Council to thank them for the new Senior Center at the new Community Center.

Mrs. McDaniel shared some history: the Cackler family settled in the Streetsboro area in 1804, but in 1806 when a total solar eclipse happened the Native Americans in the area didn't know what was going on, so when the moon was covering the sun they thought the bad spirit was overtaking the good spirit so they started shooting arrows at the eclipse to conquer the bad spirit and the story is that the guy that shot the last arrow before the sun started to appear again was made chief because he had vanquished the bad spirit. That story was in Christian Cackler's book which was recollections of an earlier settler/pioneer. Mr. Hannan was impressed with the current technology that could let us know exactly when such an event would be and how long the totality would last in each location on the path of totality compared to the experience of the people living here in 1806.
