BACK TO SCHOOL BUS SAFETY TIPS

School Bus Safety for Motorist:

- Motorists coming to a school bus from **EITHER** direction **MUST STOP** when the bus displays flashing red warning lights and extends the stop signal arm. These signals show that children are getting on or off the school bus.
- Vehicles may not pass until the flashing red lights and signals are turned off. Passing when the flashing red warning lights are on and the stop signal arm is extended is illegal and can have tragic results.
- Violation of these laws can result in a citation and fine. In many places, school bus drivers can report passing vehicles.



School Bus Safety for Children:

- Wait for the bus away from traffic and the street.
- Do not head toward the bus until it comes to a complete stop.
- When exiting the bus, walk away from the bus and keep a safe distance. A good rule is to take five "giant steps" out from the front of the bus, or until the driver's face can be seen.
- Look left-right-left when coming to the edge of the bus to make sure traffic is stopped.

School Bus Safety for Parents:

- Supervise children as they wait for the bus, making sure they are away from the street.
- Instruct your child to ask the driver for help if he or she drops something near the bus. If a child bends down to pick something up, the driver may not see him or her.
- Have your child use a backpack or book bag to keep loose items together.
- Check to make sure clothing and backpacks don't have loose drawstrings or long straps that can get caught in the handrail or bus door.

If you think a bus stop is in a dangerous place, you can talk to the school office or transportation director about changing the location.

Recycling

Recycling is available at Dorothy Cavener Park, in the area of NW 52nd and Hammond Avenue. The Recycle center will be open first Saturday of the month only from 8:30am until 11:30am. **The Recycle Center is not open in January or July due to the weather.** Closed during inclement weather. Note from Mayor Douglas:

The majority of city government operations (city hall, public works, police and fire services) are funded through sales tax receipts generated by citizens and visitors to each municipality. Taxes are collected by Warr Acres when items are purchased in Warr Acres, or if purchased in another city, when those items are delivered to your home or business in Warr Acres. Also, purchases through online delivery services such as Amazon, Wal-Mart home delivery, Door Dash, Kroger, etc., generates tax revenue for the city of Warr Acres if and only when the entire nine (9) digit zip code is used (Example: 73122-4327, 73122-4131, 73132-5703). Therefore, when any purchase is made through a delivery service, be sure that you inform the store or restaurant of your full nine (9) digit zip code. Thank you!

A Citizen's Guide for Stormwater Runoff and Pollution Prevention:

Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, and streets prevent stormwater from naturally soaking into the ground. Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies where aquatic habitats live and that people use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

Sanitation News:

Last month, the City Council approved converting residential trash service to curbside polycarts due to post covid increases in costs for labor and equipment. The tentative transition is planned for this November. Details will follow in the coming monthly newsletters mailed with your utility bill.

Stormwater Pollution Prevention Tips:

By practicing these healthy household habits, homeowners can help keep pollutants off of the ground and out of stormwater;

- ☐ Use pesticides/fertilizers very sparingly
- ☐ Don't overwater your lawn
- ☐ Consider collecting rainwater for reuse with a rain barrel
- ☐ Install a native plant rain garden on your property
- ☐ Keep yard waste out of the street, storm drain and ditch
- ☐ Pick up pet waste and properly dispose of it
- ☐ Put litter in the trash and not on the ground
- ☐ Properly dispose of hazardous household chemicals such as paints and solvents
- ☐ Repair vehicle leaks immediately and recycle used vehicle fluids
- ☐ Wash cars on the grass or at a commercial car wash
