MAYOR'S LUNCHEON WITH WARR ACRES BUSINESS OWNERS

Last Tuesday, October 11, fifty-six (56) Warr Acres business owners attended the mayor's luncheon. In attendance was the City Staff; City Council members Stewart Shapiro, Bill McClure, Roger Godwin, Jan Blake; Planning Commissioners Barry Curl and Rodney Dahlenburg; 50th and MacArthur SRB Engineering Project Manager Jason Thompson, and Connie Scothorn the project Landscape Architect.

Mayor Woolley explained to those in attendance that Warr Acres has an identity crisis and that for years Warr Acres had been viewed as business unfriendly, all of which has changed over the past two years. Many businesses are making the decision to relocate in Warr Acres. The city must repair the infrastructure of the city to enable the business districts to continue to grow. The city is only three and a half square miles, and by improving the infrastructure and the landscape of the city, additional businesses and people will choose to work and live in Warr Acres.

Jason Thompson outlined the scope of the project, including the widening of MacArthur at the 49th street intersection, allowing for a left turn lane to be incorporated. The entire project will include all concrete (not asphalt) roadways. Connie Scothorn presented a few drawings which included suggested landscaping. Sidewalks and street pedestrian crossings would be brick inlaid, and all four corners will have Warr Acres signs in brick.

Recycling

Recycling dumpsters are available at Dorothy Cavener Park, in the area of NW 52nd and Hammond Avenue on the first Saturday and Sunday of each month. POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS:

During September we experienced a number of daytime residential burglaries. On September 25th, Bethany Police requested our assistance on a burglary in their city. Witnesses provided a description of the suspects/suspect vehicle. Our officers began a search of the area around the offense and eventually checked an apartment complex in our city. Officer Peters, assisted by Officer Markstone, located the suspects/vehicle in the complex. Subsequently, several suspects were taken into custody and a significant amount of property was recovered inside an apartment in the complex, including items taken in burglaries in Warr Acres.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 31, IS TRICK OR TREAT NIGHT:

- 1. Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- 2. Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see the children.
- 3. Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before allowing your children to eat them.
- 4. Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others to see you.
- 5. Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
- 6. Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips and falls.

Because there will be many of our children out about our community, all of us must be careful and watchful. Should anyone see anything suspicious, please don't hesitate to call the Warr Acres Police Department. Drivers, please drive carefully



and watch out for children. Everyone can have a safe and wonderful Halloween if everyone is vigilant.

HOLIDAY TIPS FROM OUR POLICE DEPARTMENT;

The Police Department would like to remind all citizens that as we approach the holiday season the incidents of larceny and burglary will increase. Please be safety conscious and remember the following tips:

- When shopping be sure that your personal property is in your possession at all times. Don't leave your purse or other property such as items from previous purchases in a cart or otherwise unattended.
- When shopping at multiple locations, secure all purchases in your trunk or in an area of your vehicle where they are visible.
- As you are in a parking lot, especially after dark, be aware of your surroundings as you are walking to and from your vehicle.
- At your home, don't leave window blinds/curtains open when you are away that would allow a potential burglar to see inside where there may be wrapped gifts visible.
- Remember to keep your garage doors secure at night. Every year our incidents of garage doors being left open at night increases during the holiday season.
- Finally, if you see anything in your neighborhood that seems out of the ordinary, be it a person, vehicle or other activity that doesn't fit the "norm", call the police department.
