**CITY HALL WILL BE CLOSED:
 INDEPENDENCE DAY**

Tuesday, July 4, 2017

NO trash will be picked up on the day City Hall will be closed. Due to the holiday being on Tuesday and Big Trash on Wednesday there will **NOT** be a make-up day for the regular Tuesday pickup but there will be regular pickup on Friday.

JULY IS RESIDENTIAL* BIG TRASH PICKUP MONTH

Items must **NOT** be out for collection earlier than 4 days preceding

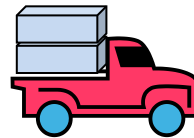
- Ward 1 - Wednesday, July 5
- Ward 2 - Wednesday, July 12
- Ward 3 - Wednesday, July 19
- Ward 4 - Wednesday, July 26

INCLUDES but is not limited to: household appliances, furniture, mattresses, fencing (up to 4 panels) and similar non-contracted items. Compressors must be removed from all appliances **BEFORE** collection. Doors on refrigerators and other bulky items **MUST** be removed.

EXCLUDED items include hospital and medical waste, poisons, acids and caustics, explosives, dirt and rocks, sewage and liquid waste, nuclear materials, gasoline, kerosene, propane tanks, degreasers, lubricants, tires and rims, antifreeze, paint, and commercial construction debris, bricks or concrete. SIZE OF MATERIAL: Lengths not to exceed 10 feet or a weight exceeding 250 pounds. Tree trimmings and branches must be in piles with individual branches not longer than 8 feet and dead trees not more than 6 inches in diameter.

The **TOTAL** amount allowed is 8 cubic yards (roughly equal to 2 full size pickup beds level with the top of the cab). There will be an additional fee of \$15.00 for each cubic yard of bulky waste collected in excess of eight (8) cubic yards.



PLACEMENT AND LOCATION: Place at least 5 feet from mailboxes, cars, shrubs, or anything else that could interfere with hand loading or mechanical equipment. Items shall be placed at least 10 feet away from utility poles, guywires, signs, fire hydrants and gas meters to allow mechanized pick up.

Items cannot be placed out for pick-up earlier than four days preceding the regularly scheduled bulk waste collection day **FOR YOUR WARD.**

*RESIDENTIAL is defined as a SINGLE FAMILY home OR a duplex.

REGISTER YOUR STORM SHELTER - Citizens are reminded to register their storm shelter with the Warr Acres Police Department. In the event of a tornado and you become trapped in your storm shelter, it's imperative that rescue services know the location of your shelter to implement the most efficient search possible of affected areas. DOG DAYS OF SUMMER. Hot weather poses special risks for your dog. **NEVER, EVER** leave a dog unattended in a vehicle in the summer months. The temperature inside a car can rise to over 100 degrees in a matter minutes, causing heatstroke and death.

TEMP OUTSIDE	TEMP INSIDE CAR
75°	= 118°
77°	= 123°
81°	= 138°
90°	= 143°
94°	= 145°

Doghouses and dog crates are **NOT** good shelter during the summer as they can trap heat. You may want to fill a child's wading pool with fresh water for your dog to cool off in. Always provide plenty of cool, fresh water. Help keep the drinking water cool by placing a soft drink bottle filled with frozen water in the water bowl. Try to avoid prolonged exposure to hot asphalt or sand, which can burn your dog's paws.



Short-faced dogs such as Boston Terriers, bulldogs, and boxers have an especially hard time in the heat because they do not pant as efficiently as longer-faced dogs. If possible, keep these dogs in air conditioning.

SAFETY TIPS FOR HOT DAYS OF SUMMER & PREVENTING HEAT-RELATED ILLNESS

Extreme heat can be very dangerous, leading to heat stroke and death. Heat stroke occurs when your temperature rises quickly and your body cannot cool down. This condition is life-threatening, but it is preventable.

1. Check on the elderly, neighbors, family, and pets daily.
2. Stay in air-conditioned space if possible. If your home is not air-conditioned, go to a public library, heat-relief shelter, or other cool locations.
3. Frequently drink water before, during, and after outdoor activities.
4. Minimize time spent outside and take frequent breaks to cool off.
5. Plan laborious outdoor tasks for the cooler parts of the day.
6. Move to a cooler environment at the first signs of heat illness, which includes: headache, dizziness, nausea, muscle twitching/cramps, and dry, hot, flushed skin. Call 911 for emergencies.
7. Never leave a child or pet in a vehicle unattended.
8. Make certain pets have plenty of water and shade.

WATER RATIONING REMINDER



The Warr Acres Fire Department would like to remind residents that Warr Acres uses Oklahoma City water and follows their watering restrictions. We are currently following a mandatory odd/even watering system. If your address ends in an even number, you can water on even-numbered calendar days. If your address ends in an odd number, you can water on odd-numbered calendar days. COOKING SAFETY

The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. Most cooking fires in the home involve the kitchen stove. If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire on the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled. For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 9-1-1 from outside the home.
