# 4. Introduction of proposed plan for Bond issues.

This was a presentation by Ben Oglesby of what the city will be asking the voters to approve in reference to three proposals for a Bond election. These are plans that have been worked on and put together by the Mayor, Vice-Mayor, both Chief's, City Planner, and an Architect over the last several months. There will be three proposals, one for Public Safety, one for City Hall and one for Streets. The Public Safety plans are to use the city property at 42<sup>nd</sup> and MacArthur to build a new Police Department to include the Court Clerks and a Court room. A new Fire Department is proposed for the current property at 49<sup>th</sup> and Hammond as well as an Animal Control facility.

It is important to note that the current City Hall will need to be torn down in order for the Fire Department and Animal Control facilities to be viable. Therefore, the plan for City Hall would be to move to the Community Center, it is not currently bringing in enough money to cover the cost of running the center and 90% of those attending the Salvation Army events each day are residents of Oklahoma City and Bethany. The Community Center would have all city offices, a training facility for all city employees, Police, Fire, Public Works and City hall staff. The current City Hall has been revamped numerous times and does not have an adequate or nice place to bring in potential developers interested in helping build and revitalize the city. It would also have an addition to the northside that would be a new Council Chambers.

Nothing is set in stone the reason for the presentation is to allow the members to have input and state what if anything they would like to have included or removed, this are conceptual plans. Trustee Lipinski asked if the cost estimates for the projects were ready. City Planner Long stated that after tonight's meeting that is the next thing he will be working on, but they needed to have the members input. The Architect stated that in order for the projects to proceed after approval of the voters, City Hall would first have to be moved to the Community Center so that then the current building could be torn down.

The third proposal is for \$500,000 per ward for residential street repairs.

None of these projects would be possible without Bond funding. Attorney Love stated that the city is looking to use property that it already owns and to better utilize those properties. The Community Center loses money each year, the building at 42<sup>nd</sup> and MacArthur is vacant and cannot be used, the city has tried several times to get a new Animal Control facility, these plans are a much better way to improve the city facilities and utilize the properties. Mr. Oglesby explained that after the Bond proposals are approved a few months later bonds will be sold and once money is available the projects can begin. There is a lot of oversight and the city will be required to follow very strict regulations and Bond Counsel will be there to insure things are done correctly. After tonight's meeting the plans will be finalized and cost estimates will be completed and a Resolution

will be written calling for an election. If the election will be in April then the Resolution must be filed by January 31<sup>st</sup>.

Bonds are very restricted and must be used as presented. Trustee Lipinski asked for a time frame as to when they would know approximately what each household for pay. He was told once final numbers were done and ready for the Resolution.

PWD Turman the fuel pumps are good, incinerator is in place just waiting for electric and gas to be done. The new dentist office on the highway is open looks great, Christmas deco is up.

Engineer Wallace application for 63<sup>rd</sup> is on the agenda.

Planner Long item on the agenda and been working on the TIF.

8. Discussion and possible action on a presentation of a storm water permit program and possibly making improvements to the storm water management practices. \*Long & Turman\*

A report is in the packet, the Stormwater program was stated in 2005 and now there are more requirements needing to be met. The street sweeper is out sweeping major thoroughfares as well as residential streets. They want more administration to comply and an audit. Councilman Woolley stated that he appreciates all PWD Turman does and that this program takes up a lot of his time. The city must be updated two times a year and therefore this update today fulfills that requirement.

9. Discussion and possible action on a contract with Smith Roberts Baldischwiler, LLC. for City Engineering services for 2019, to include Planner services through April. \*\*\*\*

The city is requesting currently an 80/20 funding source, but they are working for 100% funding so approving the Resolution this way they will not have to come back if approved for the 100%. Councilman Ryan asked if there would be a turn lane and he was told no, he also asked if the school would be paying for any of it and he again was told no.

Lipinski-happy holidays and excited about the bond issues, the city needs to be updated is way past due. Would like for the city to shoot for the January 31 filing date. What happened with the grower issue. Attorney Love stated that no action was taken by the Planning Commission because it brings a bigger issue of any type of crop being grown and sold downstream.

Ryan-thanks to the Mayor for all his hard work and little pay. Staff does a great job and people don't really know what all they do, but they notice when it isn't done. He asked how often an officer is being used to cover the crossing guard and Chief Patty stated occasionally. Of a morning it is a dispatcher doing it for overtime and the afternoon is the Animal Control officer and only if he is gone does an officer cover. He asked what is going on with the building at 38<sup>th</sup> and Ann Arbor it is still there and he was given 3 weeks. Mayor Mickley stated that it is set for demo on the 14<sup>th</sup> of January, the owner is trying to work on it now but if not then it will come down on the 14<sup>th</sup>.

Knipp-appreciates all the city staff and have a good holiday.

Godwin-thanks to the trashy friends for their work on recycling and we need to keep it going. Thanks to Police, Fire, Mike and Council.

Broadwater-

Woolley-wish all council, employees and staff a Merry Christmas.

Schmidt-thanks Barbara and the trashy friends for all they do. The tree lighting was very nice. January 5 and 6 will be recycling again he asked the rest of the council to please go there and see how much work the ladies do and show your support for them. Thanks to the Staff, Police, and Fire, all the facilities are outdated and need replaced. Everyone needs to get out there go door to door and get the bond issues passed. February will be an election for his council seat in Ward II.

Allsup-their church challenged them to light the world and light the community, she hopes that the citizens realize they are trying to make the city better and be good stewards. Merry Christmas.
