E. Director of Finance and Operations Report

- The budget was amended last week for the superintendent's salary- updated in budget for the public hearing
- Attended conversation with Jeffery Shapiro challenges and procurement for small, rural communities
- FY25 Draft Budget Discussion and Vote on the Preliminary Adoption of the Budget
 - o 6.9% increase for total administration (U28 level)
 - o 6.7% increase in instruction costs
 - 10.4% food service decrease
 - 3.4 % increase in plant operation maintenance
 - Fixed charges county retirement and health insurance both have gone up by considerable amounts
 - Enchanted forest decrease would like the program to be self-sustaining so it is not influencing the budget each year
 - 1,500 increase for improvement of fixed assets
 - Decrease in charter tuition update number from the preliminary cherry sheets
 - 3.9% increase in the use of funding
 - Did not rely on an increase from Chapter 70 did receive one: \$912,492 to 915,852 (an increase of 3%)
 - Level budget for school choice and E&D
 - o 6.45% increase in for Wendell; New Salem had decreased due to out-of-district placement
 - Enrollment 111 (non-school choice); New Salem up, Wendell down
- Have met with Wendell and New Salem finance committees
- Tonight will be a preliminary vote, next month, the final vote before town meetings
- Steve moves to adopt the budget as presented; Mandy seconds passes unanimously

H. April Items

- School of Choice
 - Currently, possible K, 1, and 2nd seats open for next year
 - Carla moves that Swift River School is a school of choice for the school year 2024-25;
 Beth seconds
 - Commitment date approximately July 1, 2024
 - Receiving applications daily

- It is a difficult decision because it brings money to the school, helps the reputation, drains the surrounding communities, and the system needs to change and indicates a broken system
- The vote is taken and passed unanimously
- o 2024-2025 Academic Calendar Vote
 - Juneteenth will be a no-school day if school is still in session by then due to snow days
 - Feedback that school resumes on January 2 to end the year as early as possible and not take a second full week
 - October curriculum day moved to avoid a four-day weekend; does create a double three-day weekend and a three-week in between- will look at improving this in the future
 - Coordinated professional development dates with surrounding school
 - Mandy moves to approve the 2024-25 calendar; Beth seconds passes unanimously
- Principal Longevity Stipend proposal
 - Discussing a stipend for principal longevity
 - Looked at many surrounding schools, but no longevity stipend is offered apart from Mahar [\$3500]
 - Keeping an effective principal is critical to student success, and the longer they are in the role, the more effective they are
 - Will potentially attract qualified applicants when the time arises
 - Jen proposes at the rate of \$500 5 years, 750 10 years, 1500 15 years, 1750 20 years, 2000 25 years, 2250 30 years
 - Beth wants to stay up with the current school trends, but we are getting closer to our budget caps
 - Nancy the value of a good principal is above the financial amounts; a question regarding when this would appear in the budget
 - o The matter is on the table, not decided -
 - Kate where is Kelley in this yearly range?
 - Kelley is entering 11th year
 - Barbara is this a common practice in the eastern part of the state? Does \$750 make a difference when the principal makes a decent salary?
 - There could be other ways to reward a principal who has stayed for a long time or consider other options
 - Caitlin longevity is portioned throughout the school year; stipends are not
 - Kate longevity payment does factor into retirement pay
 - Carla we appreciate Kelley; the conversation is not a personal commentary on how she has served the community
 - Steve supports the proposal
 - Steve moves to accept the longevity payments as proposed; Kate seconds in favor,
 5; opposed, 2; abstained; 2
- 2024 Swift River Community Action Award Recipient Discussion, Nomination and Vote
 - Additional nominee brought forward from the community
 - Carla recommends one nominee honored through a different avenue
 - Committee deliberated
 - Beth moves to award the Community action award to the committee's recommended nominee; Barbara seconds- passes with one abstention
 - Would like to see the other nominees be honored in other ways
