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POLICE SUCCESSION PLANNING UPDATE

The Police Chief Succession Committee formed in January 2018 to review the work of the Wendell Police Department and prepare for the retirement of Chief Ed Chase, who has led the department for over 30 years. Based on data from the 2014 Wendell Public Safety Survey anecdotes, the Committee reached a consensus that residents have been very satisfied with Chief Chase's service. We appreciate his emphasis on de-escalation, mediation, care, and understanding of the community.

The Committee reviewed possible models for police coverage and is proposing that we contract police services from the Town of Leverett. Following is a summary of our research. Before we make a final Wendell recommendation to the Selectboard, we ask for and welcome community input. You can share your thoughts by emailing the Succession Committee

Using a state grant secured with assistance from FRCOG, the Committee hired the consulting firm Municipal Resources, Inc. (MRI) to help research our options for moving forward once Chief Chase retires. MRI compiled a list of options to consider; below are the models we looked at in-depth.

- 1. Maintain our current model of an independent part-time police department & part-time chief Like with many other small towns in our region and nationally facing a similar situation, this option would require a significant increase in our police budget. The amount we would need to offer to attract a new part-time chief as well as update the department to modern policies and practices is considerably higher than our current police department budget.
- 2. Disbanding the Wendell Police Department

This option would reduce our police budget to zero, and the MA State Police would answer any 911 calls originating from Wendell. Committee felt that it would be better for there to be a local department available to respond to requests for police services, with officers who would know the community and citizens. The state police concerned that they do not have the resources and administrative staff to accommodate this option.

3. Share a chief with another town
The committee initially hoped we
could create something similar to the
model of the Fire Chief role in
Wendell and New Salem. The state
grant used to hire MRI was issued to
New Salem and Wendell collectively
to conduct the research. In the end,
the timing was not right to undertake
this project together.

4. Contract police services from a neighboring town

The committee is optimistic about the possibility of contracting police services for several reasons:

- a. Such a business arrangement between two towns could be renegotiated regularly if/as needed.
- b. The amount of police services contracted can be matched to the amount desired by the town.
- Economically this is feasible and could be similar to the Police Department's current budget.

Based on this research, the Committee decided to look deeper into contracting police services. After interviewing several neighboring towns, we have focused on the Leverett Police Department. The Town of Leverett expressed interest in providing this service, and the Committee met multiple times with Selectboard Member Julie Shively and Police Chief Scott Minckler. The Committee was impressed with Chief Minckler's professionalism and commitment to knowing the community in which he serves.

The Leverett Police Department strives to deliver the best public service possible to our residents. We run our department on a community policing model, working hand in hand with the public. As the Chief, I keep the Police Department as transparent and forthcoming with information as the law will allow. Officers from this department are highly trained and continue with yearly mandatory trainings. De-escalation trainings are areas where officers will continue to get more specialized skills to as a means for achieving peaceful outcomes. "Verbal Judo" is a technique that teaches police to de-escalate situations with words not actions. I was trained with and still use this technique to this day and it has proven very effective throughout my nearly twenty-year career.

THE WENDELL ROAD COMMISSION WRATS:

The Road Commission continues to work with the Franklin County Waste Management in an effort to make the WRATS more efficient and to keep the costs as low as possible. Costs to the town are going up and we need to make adjustments.

Beginning October 1, 2020, the cost of the yellow bags will go up \$.50 per bag, from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per bag; this cost is still lower than most towns in the area. Another increase that we have decided on is to increase the cost of Stickers to \$20 per family/household, and there will be no additional cost for persons that use additional vehicles; this increase will not take effect until the new stickers are required at the new year.

KENTFIELD ROAD - The Town recently was awarded a grant from the MA Municipal Bridge Program for the design and replacement of the Bridge on Kentfield Road. The award is for \$500,000 and, due to the escalation of costs associated with working around the state's rivers and streams, the Highway Commission will hope that the project can be done for the award amount. The Commission also has contracted for the replacement of the culvert on Mormon Hollow Road, near the Diemand Farm, and for the culvert at intersection of Morse Village Road and New Salem Road.

FOOT CARE FOR SENIORS

The Wendell Council on Aging has started having foot care clinics again. A specially-trained nurse from FootCare by Nurses of Greenfield provides foot care and recommendations for at-home foot treatments each month at the Senor and Community Center. According to FootCare by Nurses, "Everyone deserves great foot care."

BROADBAND COMMITTEE NEWS

Wendell NET has been successfully installed and activated in over 100 homes in the southern third of town and residents have provided very positive feedback. The network's installation company, TriWire, has continued to implement safety protocols as installation teams enter homes and are working diligently to install those who have scheduled appointments.

Over 125 homes are already enjoying service and receiving their first bill. Keep in mind your phone service bill includes additional federal and state taxes. Internet service does not. Residents are able to explore alternative phone service options offered by companies other than Whip City Fiber.

The committee is communicating with schools to prioritize installations for homes with students in time for the upcoming virtual school year. The Town Office

parking lot, the Library's parking lot, and the Senior Center continue to provide a high-speed access point for all residents.

We are eager for the completion of testing and certification for the remainder of town, anticipated in the coming weeks. At that time, the remaining 250 homes that have signed up will be released for install scheduling. The committee will announce the release on the list serv and by emails to our current subscribers.

The Board of Health is pleased to announce the hiring of a nurse to conduct our state-mandated disease surveillance. Paul Wanta, MSN, RN, joined us in August. Paul's responsibilities include computer monitoring for disease cases that could threaten the public health, notifying the Board of Health when positive cases occur, working with the town's contact tracer, coordinating with nurses from other towns as necessary, and acting in an advisory capacity. Paul has been a nurse for over 40 years and brings a great deal of knowledge and experience to the job. In this age of COVID-19, he serves an essential role in preserving the health of our citizens. We are fortunate to have him with us. Welcome, Paul!

COVID-19 and EEE Updates

At the time of this writing (Sept. 9) we still have no confirmed positive cases of COVID-19 in Wendell. The Board of Health is greatly appreciative of the concern for our health and that of others which is consistently shown by the residents of Wendell. This virus is likely to be with us for

some time, so please- wash your hands, wear masks, practice social distancing, and especially, avoid crowds. We also advise getting a flu shot as soon as possible. Keep up the good work, Wendell. Our efforts are definitely paying off!

So far, Franklin County has also been free of cases of Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE.) We are still considered to be at moderate risk for EEE, so please continue to protect yourselves by avoiding being outdoors from dusk to dawn, covering your skin with clothing, and using mosquito repellant. This is a rare but dangerous mosquito-borne disease, so please take care. More information can be found at www.mass.gov/EEE.
