1. Call to Order:

The regular meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Deputy Clerk Barb Burke, and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

3. Roll Call:

Council members Brandon Lanyon, Tommy Pratt, Scott VanAllsburg, Dan Rhines, and Tammy Gilroy. Absent: Terry Hansen and Steve Jenkins.

10a. Williamston Community Schools Correspondence:

Williamston Community Schools (WCS) Board of Education member Deborah Wolf read aloud the letter dated November 6, 2023, included in the Council packet, from the WCS Board of Education to Williamston City Council Members. The school board will be in touch with the City and Williamstown Township after the holidays to determine a time to get together.

Council members had feedback/comments on this letter. The City is open to suggestions and is willing to work with and has been meeting with developers. Housing has been discussed and the City is doing a lot to bring people into Williamston. We all want the schools to succeed, but it is our entire community that makes Williamston what it is. It was noted that the City is 2.3 square miles with the average township being 36 square miles. Mayor Gilroy thanked the school board members for attending.

10b. Road Diet:

Manager Hanifan reported he is meeting with MDOT tomorrow for a staff update.

Jeff Kodet spoke on losing parking spaces on South Putnam and how this is not good for

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I. INTRODUCTION

Purpose

The purpose of the 2024 – 2028 City of Williamston Parks and Recreation Master Plan is to set the direction for Williamston over the next five years in the acquisition, development, renovation, and provision of outdoor recreation opportunities. The plan builds upon the recommendations of the prior plan that covered years 2018 – 2023, while featuring new input received from residents through a 2023 community survey and input from the citizen-led Parks and Recreation Commission.

Ultimately, this updated plan will act as an outline for enhancing parks and recreation opportunities in Williamston, while maintaining eligibility for certain funding sources. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources requires an updated park and recreation plan to be submitted for approval every five years to be eligible for state and federal park and recreation grants, such as those from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund and the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Plan Preparation

The 2024 – 2028 Parks and Recreation Master Plan for the City of Williamston was prepared by the City of Williamston Parks and Recreation Commission with assistance from the staff of the City of Williamston.

II. COMMUNITY DESCRIPTION

Size and Location

The City of Williamston is a small town located in the north central area of Ingham County in mid-Michigan. Incorporated as a village in 1877 and then as a city in 1944, Williamston today encompasses 2.56 square miles and has a population of nearly 4,000, according to the 2010 U.S. Census.

Williamston has the feel of a small, urban town with its unique downtown and dense neighborhoods within the City's core. Yet one will find a strong agricultural tradition within a stone's throw of the City limits, giving the Williamston area a rural sensibility.

The main route in and out of town is M-43, or Grand River Avenue, a busy state trunkline that connects Williamston's downtown corridor to Livingston County to the east and the East Lansing - Lansing



metropolitan area to the west. Williamston is a 20-minute drive to the capital city of Lansing, and just 15 minutes from East Lansing, home to Michigan State University.

The I-96 expressway is another major route connected to the City of Williamston. Williamston's southern border extends to the interchange (exit 117) of this interstate highway. This connection provides another link to the Lansing metropolitan area, as well as an expressway route to large employment and population centers like Ann Arbor and Detroit.

Natural Features

Topography

The topography in Williamston has little relief, but the Red Cedar River and its tributaries do have a defined floodplain. This lack of topographic change minimizes concerns about water erosion due to slope. However, it also makes areas of higher elevation especially valuable, such as the sledding hill in Howard Dahlstrom Memorial Park.

Water Resources

The principal water resource in Williamston is the Red Cedar River. It is fed by a number of tributaries, including Deer Creek, which is the most extensive tributary in the City, flowing from the southwestern part of the City (adjacent to the City well field property) northward through Howard Dahlstrom Memorial Park. McCormick Park provides the

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principal public access to the Red Cedar River in Williamston. Wetlands are found in the Red Cedar River floodplain and in the southern part of the City near Linn Road, both east and west of Williamston Road. The Tobias-Linn Drain (an Ingham County Drain) also traverses the southern part of the City of Williamston.

Soils

The Soil Survey of Ingham County indicates that three predominate types of soil (Marlette, Oshtemo and Capac) are found in Williamston. The Marlette and Oshtemo soils are found in the well-drained areas, and the Capac soils are found in the more poorly drained areas especially in the floodplain and wetland areas.

Climate

The Michigan State Climatologist reports that Williamston's climate is sub-humid temperate. In January, the typical daily temperature is 20.1 degrees and in July the typical daily temperature is 70.5 degrees. The total annual precipitation is 29.7 inches with most falling between April and September in the form of rain. The average seasonal snowfall is 40.2 inches. Williamston's four distinct seasons provide the opportunity for many recreational activities, including sledding in the winter.

Vegetation

The vegetation in Williamston is typical of south-central Michigan, dominated by deciduous trees where other land uses (e.g. agriculture, turf, development, etc.) do not preclude the typical forest species. This is especially apparent in the Red Cedar River floodplain where silver maple, American elm, cottonwood and green ash are common. There are many street trees in Williamston, and they provide valued shade in the spring and summer, vibrant fall color, and habitat for birds and other wildlife year round. Key street tree species are sugar and Norway maple, red and white oak, white ash and honey locust. A key vegetation concern is the emerald ash borer, which dooms all green, white or exotic ash (e.g., mountain ash), regardless of size unless expensive insecticide treatments are regularly applied. Except for large specimen trees, the City should continue to identify and remove ash from the landscape. In public park areas, dead and dying ash trees could present a safety hazard. As a result of the 2007 tornado, 39 trees (including many ash trees) were removed from McCormick Park.

Wildlife

The Red Cedar River floodplain provides some of the most valuable wildlife habitat in the City. Mammals found there include whitetail deer, gray and fox squirrel, raccoon, coyote, red fox, muskrat and mink. A wide variety of birds also use the floodplain, highlighted by waterfowl. Fish species in the Red Cedar River include rock bass, smallmouth bass, northern pike and bluegills, as well as catfish, carp and suckers. Turtles include the common map turtle, musk turtle, Blanding's turtle, and eastern painted turtle and spiny softshell. The floodplain is important habitat for reptiles and amphibians including northern water snake, eastern garter snake, and blue racer.



Socioeconomic Characteristics

All socioeconomic characteristics cited are based on data provided by the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

Population

There were 3,760 people residing in Williamston in 2023. This is a 1.55% decrease from the 2010 census population of 3,820, influenced by a slowing housing market, aging population and constrained Williamston City limit.

The City of Williamston is bordered by Williamstown Township, Wheatfield Township, Leroy Township, and Locke Township. Residents of these townships use the City of Williamston as the hub for goods, services, and education. It is also reasonable to suggest they use City parks, which along with the Williamston Community Schools (also in the City limits) provide the venue for youth and adult sports leagues. With the exception of Williamstown Township, the other adjacent townships also lack a park and recreation infrastructure. In total, almost 12,000 people were reported in the adjacent townships in the 2010 Census. Coupled with Williamston's 3,760 residents, it is reasonable to picture Williamston's park and recreation infrastructure and programs serving more than 15,000 potential users.

Education and Economics

The population of Williamston is well-educated according to the State of Michigan statistics, with 67.50 percent of adults 25 and over having attended college. Of these, over half have earned a bachelor's or graduate college degree. The median household income in 2021 for City households was \$65,129, above the median of \$63,498 for households in Michigan.

Demographics 1 4 1

The age distribution of Williamston's population is gradually getting older with the single greatest population increase in the 45-64 age groups over the past two decades. Somewhat surprisingly, the proportion of elementary and middle school aged residents has stayed relatively constant. The largest decline continues in the 25–34-year-old group, likely reflecting people who relocate for employment reasons.

Females comprise the majority of Williamston residents with 54 percent, compared to 46 percent for males. The racial make-up of the City is predominately Caucasian with 91 percent reporting their race as white to the U.S. Bureau of the Census in 2020. In summary, every age category and men and women are well represented across the population. Hence, the City needs to take into account the full range of residents in their provision of outdoor recreational opportunities. The City does not have enclaves of population with disproportionately high levels of persons with disabilities, seniors, those with lower incomes or specific ethnic identities.



III. ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE

City Council

The Williamston City Council consists of seven elected members, of which one serves as Mayor, and one serves as Mayor Pro-Tem. The City Council is responsible for establishing the policies, laws, and spending authority for the community, including parks and recreation services and projects. This elected body has the sole authority to commit funds for parks and recreation, accept grants, and purchase land on behalf of the community. The City of Williamston operates under a Council/Manager form of government, whereby the City Council appoints a City Manager to manage the day-to-day operations of the City government.

Parks and Recreation Commission

The Parks and Recreation Commission is an advisory committee for the City Council, which is specific to parks and recreation services. The Commission consists of seven members, including one Council representative and one representative from the Planning Commission. This board can also have up to one representative from the neighboring townships. As a body, the Parks and Recreation Commission offers advice and makes recommendations to the City Council.

City Staff

The administration, maintenance, and operation of the parks and recreation services are carried out by the staff of the City of Williamston. The City Manager is responsible for the overall administration of the community and serves as the staff link to the Parks and Recreation Commission. The Department of Public Works (DPW) carries out the maintenance and operation of the parks system. The DPW consists of five full-time employees and up to two seasonal staff members in the summer months. City Hall staff coordinates activities in the parks, such as rental of park lands or facilities.

Role of Volunteers and Other Private Entities


The Williamston parks system has benefitted greatly from volunteers over the years. The community is served by many civic organizations and non-profit entities. These groups provide programming such as concerts in the park or a week-long town celebration at the parks. They have also coordinated everything from beautification efforts like the maintenance of flower beds to complete renovations of playground equipment to installation of new amenities such as sand volleyball courts. The Williamston Area Beautification Fund (WABF) is a non-profit that originally raised funds to construct the band shell. It continues to raise funds annually to organize the Williamston Summer Concert series. Another non-profit group called the Friends of Williamston Parks (FOWP) recently formed, which is dedicated to raising funds for significant improvement projects throughout the parks system.



Relationships with Other Public Entities

The City maintains a formal relationship with the Meridian Township Parks and Recreation Department. Through a contract, Meridian Township provides youth sports opportunities such as baseball and basketball to the Williamston community.

Funding and Budgets

The parks and recreation budget is funded annually through the General Fund. The current annual budget is approximately \$200,000. This amount represents about six percent of all General Fund expenditures. A detailed copy of the parks and recreation budget is included in the Appendix section.

Capital Improvements


In order to fund capital expenditures, the City of Williamston relies on a combination of General Fund dollars, grant funds, and donations from local citizens and organizations. The City has been fortunate that the community has done extensive fundraising over the years to pay for both new construction and rehabilitation of existing infrastructure. To continue to earn the trust of donors, the City must keep the facilities safe and well-maintained.

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IV. INVENTORY OF EXISTING PARKS, NATURAL AREAS, AND FACILITIES

The City of Williamston is a primary provider of recreation opportunities in the Williamston area. The City offers over 37 acres of park land and natural areas. This acreage is spread out over five parks with amenities and several other natural areas owned by the City. These areas are discussed in more detail in the following inventory listing. The method used to conduct the inventory was a review of existing descriptions, property files, and visual inspection.

McCormick Park

McCormick Park is a 7.21 acre park that is centrally located within the City of Williamston on North Putnam Street. It is one block removed from the downtown corridor along Grand River Avenue and within walking distance to most neighborhood streets. It also features frontage along the Red Cedar River. McCormick Park is Williamston's most utilized park, as it is regularly frequented by residents of the City and neighboring townships. The park provides both active and passive recreation opportunities.

Memorial Park

Memorial Park consists of about 9.8 acres of park land, which is located on Highland Street next to the Williamston Elementary School. It features almost a quarter-mile of frontage on the Red Cedar River. The park terminates at a pedestrian bridge that crosses over the river to connect to the south side of the City. The park largely consists of passive recreation opportunities along the river, including an unpaved trail with minor site improvements throughout. The park serves the entire community, as it is accessible from neighborhoods north and south of the river via the pedestrian bridge.



Old Mill Park

Old Mill Park features just under an acre of park land. The park is bounded by a public parking lot serving the downtown district to the south and the banks of the Red Cedar River to the north. Its primary use is for passive recreation by use of the boardwalk along the river. The park primarily serves visitors to Williamston's downtown corridor. The Red Cedar rapids are located within the Red Cedar River adjacent to this park. The History Plaza features the mill stone of the original grist mill from the 1800s and interpretive signage on the story of the mill and Putnam Street Bridge.

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Howard Dahlstrom Memorial Park

Howard Dahlstrom Memorial Park contains about 1.4 acres of park land, located on Mechanic Street to the west of the City's downtown corridor. The park is adjacent to a football field and track that is owned by the school district. This park serves the community at large, as it is primarily used as a support facility for the school football field and track and for community events such as the annual Red Cedar Jubilee.

Volunteers Community Park

Volunteers Community Park is approximately an acre in size. It is located at the southwest corner of Putnam Street and School Street, adjacent to The Commons, a private enterprise that was once a former community center and school. This park is envisioned as a neighborhood-level park that primarily serves the newer developed subdivisions to the south of the railroad tracks and the historic neighborhoods to the immediate north. It features primarily active recreation opportunities.

Dedicated Natural Area

The Dedicated Natural Area is not an official park, but rather a natural area owned and dedicated to such use by the City of Williamston. The 17-acre parcel is located to the east of the Department of Public Works campus on the eastern edge of the City limits. It is accessible from Industrial Park Drive. There are currently no recreational or support facilities at this area. This site was dedicated as such in 2015, when the City undertook a grant conversion process for the former Community Center building. The former Community Center had received a Recreation Bond grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) in 1991, when it was still owned by Williamston Community Schools. The MDNR allowed the City to transfer the grant restrictions from the Community Center property to another City-owned site, specifically, the public/wetlands area in the Industrial Park, through an Amendment to the Project Agreement, calling for a conversion of the grant-assisted site, when the Community Center building was sold to another party.

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Red Cedar Bend Landing

Red Cedar Bend Landing is a new kayak landing on the Red Cedar River with a parking facility, bench and interpretive sign. Completed in 2022, the park was conceptualized in the previous parks plan update (2019 - 2023).

Other Recreation Providers and Resources

Williamston Community Schools Recreation Resources


Williamston Community Schools operates two elementary schools, one middle school and one high school. All of these schools are located within the City of Williamston. These school sites are designed primarily to meet the needs of the students, but they do provide extensive recreation facilities and opportunities for school district residents. The schools have indoor and outdoor recreational facilities such as gymnasiums, basketball courts, baseball diamonds, football fields, a track, a pool, and soccer fields. School facilities are used by community members on many occasions when not in use for school functions.

Williamstown Township Community Park

Williamstown Township Community Park was built in 1996 and consists of 132-acres located approximately three miles west of downtown Williamston off Grand River Avenue. The park lies on the banks of the Red Cedar River and currently has a sledding hill, nature trails, wildflower prairie, two soccer fields, a baseball field, dog walk, an open turf area for various activities, an informational kiosk, and a parking area (includes port-o-john facility.)

Private Golf Courses

There are two privately-owned and operated golf courses that are near the City limits: the Brookshire Golf Club and the Wheatfield Valley Golf Course.



Accessibility Evaluation

The following summaries address the accessibility of the City's parks and recreation facilities in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Standards for Universal Design. Facilities were ranked according to a visual inspection by staff utilizing the following ranking system and based on a review of standards from the New England ADA Center.

- 1 = none of the site elements meet 2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design
- 2 = some of the site elements meet 2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design
- 3 = most of the site elements meet 2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design
- 4 = all of the site elements meet 2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design
- 5 = the facility meets the Principles of Universal Design

McCormick Park (Ranking: 3)

McCormick Park is a diverse park with many elements scattered throughout its more than seven acres of park land. Thanks to a 2008 Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund Grant, it is also the most accessible of Williamston's parks. The 2008 grant created a paved pathway throughout the park, which provides multiple means of access from the City's sidewalk network and the parking areas dedicated to McCormick Park. The wide pathway meanders through the park, creating an accessible path to every one of the park's amenities. The paved pathway is lighted at night. The grant also paid for the construction of a concessions building that features accessible restrooms.

As the community moves forward with park design and implementation of improvements, future site amenities should be connected to the existing pathway. Attention should also be paid to the type of surfaces used for playground equipment to ensure universal access to new or improved features.

Memorial Park (Ranking: 1)

Memorial Park is largely a passive recreation destination, with an unpaved trail along the Red Cedar River. The baseball field and tennis courts are outdated and are not connected to a paved parking area. As such, none of the site elements meet the standards for accessible design.

As this park moves forward, most of the attention has been focused on the trail concept. The trail should be made of accessible material, with a pathway along the river's edge connecting to a parking lot that features accessible parking spaces and connections to local school property. Eventually, the paved trail system would connect to the pedestrian bridge over the Red Cedar River, which may require its own upgrades to ensure universal access.

Old Mill Park (Ranking: 3)

Old Mill Park primarily consists of a brand-new ADA compliant boardwalk that connects from the City's sidewalk network and along the Red Cedar River to a terminating point on the west end of the property. The boardwalk itself is accessible from the sidewalks and from the paved parking lot that connects to the park with viewing platforms with picnic tables extending from the boardwalk.



Howard Dahlstrom Memorial Park (Ranking: 3)

Howard Dahlstrom Memorial Park consists of a paved parking lot with sidewalk access to a small pavilion. The remainder of the park is a sledding hill, which is not universally accessible at this time.

Volunteers Community Park (Ranking: 2)

Volunteers Community Park features basketball courts as its one and only recreational amenity. The basketball courts consist of a flat surface surrounded by City sidewalks. There is not a dedicated parking lot with accessible parking spaces at this park. As this park develops, consideration should be given to linking the basketball courts directly to the sidewalks or a future parking area. The vision for this park includes the creation of a playground amenity adjacent to the basketball courts. Care should be taken to ensure the playground amenity features universal design considerations for access.

Site Development Plans and Other Plans

There are no definitive site development plans for the current parks in the Williamston parks system. There is a conceptual City-wide trail plan that has been proposed. A copy of the City-wide trail plan is included in the Appendix section.

V. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLANNING AND PUBLIC INPUT PROCESS

The goals, objectives, and action program outlined in the forthcoming pages are based on a variety of planning documents and public input. City staff consulted the State Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) 2018-2022 to ensure that the Williamston action plan will help to address the key state priorities of resource conservation, collaboration, awareness, accessibility of recreation, quality experiences, and health benefits. Staff also consulted local plans such as the Red Cedar River Corridor Trail Plan and the Ingham County Trails & Parks Comprehensive Report.

In the past, National Recreation and Park Association standards prescribing a minimum level of recreation land or infrastructure (e.g. 10 acres of locally owned public parkland per 1,000 residents) were used in a prescriptive approach to define community recreation needs. While these standards were consulted, this approach is not outlined in this plan. Rather, a more modern level of service (LOS) approach is adopted. In LOS, the community is fully engaged in the process. Acquisition and development are tailored to meet community identified needs and link with recreation opportunities provided in neighboring jurisdictions. For example, the older standards approach would not take into account that the City of Williamston is defined by more than political boundaries. It is a community, public school, and recreational hub for 15,000 people, only 3,854 of which live in the City.

Public Input Process

Planning for the public input process for this plan began with initial discussion by the Parks and Recreation Commission. The Commission reviewed various options for involving the wider public in the planning process. Ultimately, the Commission recommended that the City of Williamston distribute a survey to the community to receive input to be used in developing the plan. The City contracted with planning consultant firm McKenna to design and administer the survey to ensure the survey was designed in a professional manner.

Survey Process

City staff developed a survey instrument for the City staff and Parks and Recreation Commission to review prior to distribution. The survey attempts to gauge the community's priorities regarding parks and recreation in the City of Williamston, while soliciting specific feedback regarding park facilities, programming, and improvement areas. The survey also provided an opportunity for open-ended answers.

The final survey was delivered to the community utilizing SurveyMonkey.com. The survey link was shared across multiple online platforms, including the City's website and social media pages. The link on Facebook was shared dozens of times by other community organizations and residents. To reach the entire community, the City also delivered printed surveys to areas where the community gathers, including the Williamston Senior Center, the Williamston branch of the Capital Area District Library, and City Hall. Signs with a QR code link to the survey were placed at City Hall and other public areas. This multi-pronged approach ensured that the survey was available to the entire community.





Survey Results

A copy of the survey and the detailed results are included in the Appendix section. There were over 200 responses submitted by the deadline. A summary of the survey results is discussed below.

The overwhelming majority of residents value the parks and recreation system and believe that they are vital to the community, with McCormick Park ranking as extremely important among all parks. All other City-owned parks were ranked as somewhat important.

The majority of respondents (73 percent) stated they are satisfied with the number and types of parks available in the City of Williamston. Respondents noted that they visit McCormick Park very frequently. However, all other City parks were occasionally or rarely visited. Those who frequented each park have noted the good to fair condition of each park, as follows:

- McCormick Park: Good-Excellent at 82 percent
- Memorial Park: Fair-Good at 74 percent
- Howard Dahlstrom Memorial Park: Fair-Good at 85 percent
- Old Mill Park Good Excellent at 84%
- Volunteers Community Park: Good Excellent at 90 percent
- Red Cedar Bend Landing: Good Excellent at 90 percent

Respondents who did not frequent City parks noted the main reasons as the availability of parking, lack of familiarity with the park, not knowing where the park is located, and lack of desired amenities.

When asked if the current park amenities exceed or fall short of meeting the needs of the community, respondents stated eight of the 13 amenities meet the City's needs, while five of the 13 fall short. The majority of respondents didn't think that the current amenities exceeded the City's needs.

Respondents noted that they would like to see an increase in the following amenities:

•	Paved biking/walking pathways:	50 percent
•	Splash park:	43 percent
•	Ice Skating Rink	30 percent
•	Dog Park :	27 percent

Responses were spread evenly among the desired goals of the master plan. The creation of paved biking/walking pathways held the highest importance, while the expansion of the Red Cedar River Boardwalk was ranked as important.

It was clear in reading the results that the City and its supporters can improve its communication methods regarding park projects and programming. Residents were asked to provide their preferred method for receiving such information. Social media and the City's website were among the highest ranked.

Finally, the survey asked respondents to report the jurisdiction in which they live, if not the City of Williamston. A significant number of the responses came from neighboring townships like Williamstown and Wheatfield, showing that the Williamston parks system does indeed reach a wider user base than just those within the City limits.

Incorporating Survey Feedback into the Plan

Once the survey results were received, the Parks and Recreation Commission met to review the results. The Commission set up a subcommittee to further dive into the results and guide the development of goals. This feedback was ultimately incorporated into the plan.

Draft Plan Publication

The draft plan was posted on the City of Williamston's website and at City Hall for citizen review and comment for a period of 30 days. The notice of availability of the draft plan was published in the *Williamston Enterprise* periodical. Two written comments were submitted to the City. The Parks and Recreation Commission met on January 9, 2019, to review the feedback.

Public Hearing

Following the review and comment period of the draft plan, the Parks and Recreation Commission voted to recommend adoption of the plan to the City Council. A formal public hearing date was set and advertised in the *Williamston Enterprise* periodical. This hearing was to be held at the City Council meeting on January 28, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. However, due to extreme winter weather the day of January 28, 2019, the meeting was cancelled. The City of Williamston received permission from the State of Michigan to postpone its public hearing and planned vote on adoption until its next regular meeting on February 11, 2019. The revised public hearing date was advertised in the *Williamston Enterprise* periodical. The public hearing was then held on February 11, 2019.

Plan Adoption

Following the public hearing process, the City Council formally adopted the plan by passing a resolution on insert date when complete

VI. GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Developing goals and objectives is an important part of the recreation planning process. Goals are described as a desired state of affairs for the community in the future. Goals are broad, public purposes toward which objectives and implementation strategies are directed. Objectives are steps designed to achieve goals. These are more narrowly defined statements of public purpose to clarify and identify appropriate implementation measures to achieve the goal.

The overall goal of the City of Williamston's parks function is to provide recreation opportunities for the community and broader region around Williamston. Specific goals are based on the demographics and characteristics of the community. The objectives that flow from the goals were developed based on broad community input in the form of surveys. The goals and objectives were further refined by the Parks and Recreation Commission.



Goal 1: Provide recreation opportunities and parks facilities that are safe, well-maintained, and accessible to people of all ages and abilities.

- Objective 1: Continue to replace, upgrade, and add amenities to the parks based on community input and recreational trends and available funding.
- Objective 2: Better communicate opportunities provided by the parks and recreation facilities to the public to ensure they are aware of the value of the parks system.
- Objective 3: Ensure that improvements and upgrades to park facilities comply with accessibility standards outlined in the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- Objective 4: Explore diverse park facilities that will create opportunities to enjoy the park facilities and lands by people of all ages and abilities.

Goal 2: Encourage an active, year -round lifestyle including walking, biking, and river activities.

- Objective 1: Continue to develop a network of paved pathways and trails that will remove accessibility as a barrier to maintain an active lifestyle.
- Objective 2: Provide linkages between the City's sidewalk network and paved pathway and trail network to provide a walkable community.
- Objective 3: Explore creation of water-based recreation activities.
- Objective 4: Explore creation of ice-skating rink and other winter activities

Goal 3: Build a strong community through social interactions within parks and natural areas.

- Objective 1: Expand recreation opportunities for children and families to continue to utilize the parks system and foster interaction.
- Objective 2: Explore recreation experiences for youth during summer months.
- Objective 3: Increase universal access to parks to ensure the parks are accessible to all stakeholders.
- Objective 4: Better advertise the availability of park facilities and programs, utilizing methods of communication most identified in survey results (e.g. social media).
- Objective 5: Continue to encourage use of parks for public events and gatherings such as the Red Cedar Jubilee, Summer Concert Series, and National Night Out.

Goal 4: Pursue grants and enhance partnerships with community members and organizations to help with park improvement and development needs.

- Objective 1: Explore linkages between City of Williamston park lands and other public lands such as school-owned lands.
- Objective 2: Establish a list of desired projects that could be funded and built by civic organizations and clubs or carried out by volunteers such as National Honor Society students.
- Objective 3: Collaborate with the Downtown Development Authority of Williamston to determine areas of shared goals and improvements.
- Objective 4: Work with parks-oriented organizations like the Friends of Williamston Parks to plan and coordinate improvement projects.
- Objective 5: Develop distinct park donation policies to establish clear guidelines for donations and long-term donation maintenance.
- Objective 6: Actively seek grant funds for needed park improvements and upgrades by maintaining a Five-Year Recreation Plan in accordance with Michigan Department of Natural Resources standards.

Goal 5: Provide environmental education opportunities

- Objective 1: Develop identity for the Dedicated Natural Area in the Industrial Park near the Department of Public Works campus.
- Objective 2: Enhance appreciation of the Red Cedar River by encouraging preservation of the riverfront areas and recreational access to the river.
- Objective 3: Provide education through interpretative signage and partnerships with other community groups and schools.



VII. ACTION PROGRAM

The Action Program is the section of the plan where the City of Williamston identifies how it intends to work toward meeting its goals and objectives over the next five years and beyond. The program presents a variety of proposed projects, estimated costs, and connection to goals and objectives to continue to improve parks and recreation facilities and programming from 2024 – 2028. Decisions regarding the projects included in the Action Program were based on recreational trends, national standards, community input and opinion, and demographic trends of the town and region.



In lieu of specifying an exact year that projects will be considered, the Action Program presents projects on a short-term, mid-term, and long-term basis. Short-term projects are those that should be considered in the first year or two of the five-year period. Mid-term projects are those that should be considered during the next five years. Long-term projects are those that may require significant planning and coordination that could begin in the five-year period, but would likely not be constructed until after the five-year time horizon.

Projects are first presented in a capital improvement and programming table, followed by a discussion and rationale for each item listed. The following schedules are not fixed and represent the best ideas generated at the time the plan was developed. The projects listed are not meant to be all inclusive or exclusive.

Funding the Action Program

It is generally assumed that any of the above projects or programs would need to rely on a combination of General Fund dollars, donations from civic and business organizations, fundraising from the community, and grant applications to be completed. These funding sources and other funding options are discussed in greater detail in the pages that follow.

Action Program Rationale

The rationale for each item referenced in the capital improvement and program planning table is briefly discussed.

Short-Term Items

• Develop list of priority projects needing funding: Municipalities are increasingly relying on outside funding to complete park improvement projects. It is important to be proactive about the types of projects and improvements needed.



- Generating a list of priority projects for fundraising would be the first step in planning for the completion of the mid-term projects.
- Develop better communication methods for information regarding parks and recreation: It was clear in reading the survey results that the City can do a better job of communicating parks and recreation opportunities and programming. Many residents were unaware of the existence of certain parks facilities and opportunities. The survey asked residents to list their preferred ways to receive information about the parks. The City should use this feedback to improve communication with the public.
- Add signage to parks that do not have signs: Several parks either have no signage or outdated signage. The City should explore cost-effective ways to provide an identifying sign for these park areas.
- Continuation of riverfront/rain garden WildType maintenance plan: The City annually contracts for the preservation and maintenance of the riverfront at McCormick Park and Old Mill Park, as well as rain gardens in McCormick Park. These actions help to preserve these important natural resources and provide an opportunity for environmental education.
- Resurface basketball courts at Volunteers Community Park: The City
 allocates funds to resurface these basketball courts on a regular schedule to
 ensure they are safe and well-maintained.

Mid-Term Items

- Pursue funding to complete the Honor For All Trail within Memorial Park; enhance public parking opportunities by removing tennis courts: A plan has been developed to path the undeveloped trail within Memorial Park. The path would ultimately connect to a pedestrian bridge that crosses over the Red Cedar River to connect to the southern side of town. The trail would meander through Memorial Park's riverfront area before traveling north to a potential parking area on the current site of the underutilized tennis courts. This ambitious project will require significant outside resources to complete but would create a critical pathway linkage from the City's south side to the north side and to the schools, while creating an amenity at the little-used Memorial Park.
- Connection from Grand River Avenue to High Street/Pedestrian Bridge through City-owned 835 Grand River Avenue: The City owns 835 Grand River Avenue, which is bordered by Grand River Avenue on the south and High Street on the north side of the parcel. This parcel connects to the dead-end side of High Street, near the existing entrance for the pedestrian bridge over the Red Cedar River. Creating a connection through the City-owned property, even if just crushed millings, would provide a link from the main route in town to the riverfront.
- Replace supporting infrastructure at parks such as picnic tables, benches, and trash receptacles as needed: These items should be evaluated annually to continue to present a positive image at all parks.
- Develop identity and long-term plan for Dedicated Natural Area: This area comprises over 17 acres near the City's Department of Public Works campus. It was dedicated in recent years to remain as a natural area. The land contains a

large wetlands area and wooded areas. The City should develop an identity for this area, along with an access plan that would connect it to neighborhoods.

Long-Term Items

- Pursue easements along the south side of the Red Cedar River behind commercially-zoned properties for creation of paved pathway along river on the Grand River Avenue corridor: The City does not have property control over several properties that would potentially link Old Mill Park to the former car wash site on the western edge of downtown owned by Williamston's Downtown Development Authority. Control is necessary to effectuate the goal of providing a river trail along this corridor. Several steps have been taken toward achieving this eventual goal, including surveys and appraisals of the easement areas.
- Explore water-based recreation activities for the parks system: Several survey respondents liked the idea of creating a water-based recreation activity like a splash pad. The City should further explore this concept based on survey feedback.
- Explore ice skating rink to enhance year-round activities: Adding an ice skating rink would enhance the winter outdoor recreation experience.
- Update Five-Year Recreation Plan: This plan must be updated every five years to remain eligible for most grant awards.
- Acquire additional park land, if necessary: The City has ample room to accommodate new or improved amenities within its existing parks. That said, it is important to think long-term, and additional park land may one day be needed to accomplish certain goals, or to link areas within the City limits together. Real estate transactions and opportunities are difficult to predict. The City should engage or at least be willing to listen to land owners for possible donations or dedication of land to the park system.



Funding Sources

- **General Fund:** This fund provides the entirety of the maintenance and operations budget for City parks. Due to stagnating revenues and rising costs, this fund will continue to struggle to invest in large capital improvements on its own.
- Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) Grants: MDNR annually offers grant opportunities to fund recreation improvements. The City has been successful in applying for such grants in the past, but it is difficult to get an award every year, and most grants require at least some local matching dollars.
- **Fundraising/Donations:** The City will need to rely on fundraising and donations to complete needed improvements and maintenance of City park facilities.
- Partnerships: In lieu of a direct donation, organizations may be asked to take on a project in an area of their expertise within the parks system.







Q20: By which methods do you prefer to learn about Williamston's parks, facilities, recreation programs, and special events?







Q22: How do you usually get to the parks or facilities?







Q23: What is your age range?









2023 Annual Report

2023 began with great anticipation that the master plan for Volunteers Community Park would come to full fruition after five years of promoting, fundraising, and installing the project. Remaining funds from the picnic shelter campaign, which included a Public Spaces Community Places grant through the Michigan Economic Development Corporation, allowed Friends of Williamston Parks (FOWP) and the City of Williamston to complete the final phase of the park overhaul. Work included a new main entrance for the park, walkway connecting the sidewalk to the playground to make the park more accessible, bike rack and new sign.

After another successful park clean-up day in May, focus turned to the 52nd annual Red Cedar Jubilee. The Jubilee Committee asked FOWP to plan and cohost the Community Service Awards Dinner for the first time. Held on Monday of Jubilee week, the event kicks off a week of festivities throughout Williamston. It was an honor to be a part of an important event that recognizes those that serve the Williamston community in so many ways. Board member Earl Wolf was named FOWP Volunteer of the Year and FOWP President Heather Galecka was named Citizen of the Year.

Also during Jubilee week, FOWP held its annual euchre fundraiser. Proceeds from the tournament will be spent on a permanent cornhole set to be placed near the picnic shelters in McCormick Park. It will be installed in spring 2024.

After another productive year, FOWP looks forward to an exciting project in 2024 to replace the unique tree sculptures in McCormick Park. They have reached their lifespan, and new creations will be carved using a more solid wood with the hope the public can enjoy them throughout the park for many years to come.
