#### **SENIOR NEWS**

Seniors need to keep in mind that failing a class required for graduation during the second semester will mean that they will **NOT** be able to participate in the graduation exercises on May 16th. Poor attendance is the cause of most of the failed courses. The solution is quite simple: **ATTEND CLASS!!!** Parents are strongly encouraged to become very active in their student's high school career. Parent involvement and parent expectations have strong relationship to high student achievement. Your student may be 18 years of age, but that does not automatically give them the maturity required to see the importance of attending each and every class and completing the required work.

In the event that your senior does fail a course second semester, summer school and Learning Center will be available for make-up credit. Although participation in graduation exercises will not be possible, a diploma can still be earned. The high school diploma is the ticket to a successful future. #### **MAKING UP CREDITS**

There are several options for students who need to make up credits for graduation. If your student is an underclassman, please encourage him/her to make the course up in summer school. Summer school information will be available in the Guidance office in mid-April. Learning Center is another alternative for students to make-up credit. Learning Center courses are computer based and students must pass courses at 70% or higher to earn credit.

#### LUNCH AND LEARN-Thursday, Feb. 25th during 1st lunch - Nursing

Students at Northwest High School have a new way to gather information on careers. Lunch and Learn, featuring a guest speaker, is a program to talk with students about their future careers. The American Legion Boys State of Kansas was founded in 1937 to foster citizenship and leadership among high school junior males. In 1939, the American Legion Auxiliary offered the first Girls Sate to give young women a similar experience to the men. Modeled around a state and local government simulation, Boys State and Girls State routinely welcome the best and brightest amongst the state's high school juniors as program attendees. The weeklong session of Boys State will be from June 5-10 on the campus of Kanas State.
