'Baby pictures' of universe possible

SAN DIEGO

— The University of California, San Diego has received \$40 million in gifts to create and lead an observatory in Chile that's expected to greatly improve scientists' ability to study how the universe evolved after its calamitous birth 13.8 billion years ago.

The university and its collaborators will link and strengthen two major telescope projects in Chile's Atacama Desert that have been pressing to see and understand remnants of the Big Bang.

Over the next five years, the consortium also will develop additional telescopes that will be placed at Atacama, a plateau whose clear, dry skies make it among the best locations on Earth to look back in time.

The collective array of equipment will be known as the Simons Observatory in honor of James Simons, the New York billionaire-mathematician who donated \$38.4 million for the project. An additional \$1.7 million was donated by the Heising-Simons Foundation.

Simons earlier gave UC San Diego \$4.3 million to develop telescopes that will be part of the new observatory.

The observatory will be led by UC San Diego astrophysicist Brian Keating, who said, "We want to capture the earliest 'baby picture' of the universe, which means we need to look for ancient photons from the Big Bang."

Mark Thiemens, dean of physical sciences at UC San Diego, is eager and excited.

"The deepest view into the birth of the universe is going to come from this fantastic new telescope array," Thiemens said.
