2018-2019 CUSD 303 Community Preschool Program Lottery

General Information

For the 2018-2019 school year, District 303 will offer a five-day-a-week, ¹/₂ day, morning or afternoon preschool program.

The program will be open to 3-5 year old children who reside within the D303 school boundaries and who are 3 years old by September 1, 2018. Children who are 5 years old by September 1, 2018 will not be eligible for enrollment.

The tuition cost for the program is \$285 per month. A \$100 annual non-refundable registration and materials fee will also be required. **Tuition and registration and materials fee pending board approval

<u>Enrollment</u> <u>Procedure-</u>A proposal regarding elementary boundaries was presented to the School Board on January 18. The School Board is expected to consider the recommendation for approval at the February 12 School Board meeting. One School, One Book, One Community in progress: Feb. 5-16th

This month, our school is inviting all students, K-5, to participate in One School, One Book. Every family has received ONE free copy of the book <u>Ralph S. Mouse</u> by Beverly Cleary. We are encouraging everyone in the Wasco Community to follow the same reading schedule each night- which you received last week along with your family's copy of the book and a student bookmark.

One School, One Book is a unique program because students in all grade levels will be reading and listening to the same book (K-5). Reading professionals recommend reading material out loud that is beyond a child's independent reading level. We also believe that you can, and should, continue reading chapter books with your older children, even when they are able to read by themselves. We have selected a title that can be followed, understood, and enjoyed by younger students, but that will still captivate and stimulate older children.

Reading aloud at home is valuable because it better prepares students to be effective readers and listeners. It is also a fun, worthwhile family activity. We aim to build a community of readers at our school. Everyone- students, parents, teachers and support staff- are invited to participate in this optional event.

How does it work?

- On Monday, February 5, Mrs. Stokke read aloud chapter 1. That day, the youngest or only child in each family took home one copy of the book and the reading schedule.
- During the Wasco Family Math and Literacy Event on Tuesday, February 6th, guest readers read chapter three. If you were unable to attend, chapter three is also posted on the Wasco Website (wasco.d303.org) to listen to at home, or you can read it as a family on your own.
- Nightly readings are posted on the Wasco website (<u>wasco.d303.org</u>) read by a different member of our staff each day. This provides students the opportunity to have a shared reading on any internet device in the event that reading aloud as a family is difficult on a given night.
- In school, your child will be invited to answer daily trivia questions to encourage active listening and participation.

PLEASE MARK YOUR CALENDARS! PARCC Assessments April 2-20

All D303 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students will participate in the 2018 PARCC Assessments **April 2-20**. Please mark your calendars to avoid scheduling conflicts such as vacations, appointments and other absences. Students benefit from testing among their peers within their own classroom environments. Students who miss testing will be scheduled for make up tests which are administered in an alternate location and during classroom instructional periods. Please let your child's teacher know if your child will miss any part of the PARCC assessment.

A Note from the Nurse:

Please note that when calling in a student who is sick, parents should provide details of symptoms the child is experiencing and if he/she has been diagnosed with the flu by a doctor.

The winter months are upon us and flu season is here. If your son/daughter complains about a headache, sore throat, ear ache and/or stomach ache please check their temperature before you send them to school.

If your child is at school with a fever of 100+, you will be contacted to pick him/her up from school. School policy recommends your son/daughter to be fever-free without medication for 24 hours before returning back to school. This policy is strongly encouraged to prevent the spread of germs to the rest of the students and staff.

For sore throats and coughs without a temperature, students will be encouraged to perform a warm salt water gargle and/or will be given a peppermint to help soothe their throat. If you would like your child to have cough drops while in school for their sore throat or cough they need to bring the cough drops to the Health Office. A cough drop is considered a medication (but not one I require a doctor's authorization for) and a choking hazard and the students need to be monitored by myself or the teacher.

For colds, sniffles and runny noses without a fever, students are encouraged to drink water and rest in the Health Office for 5-10 minutes. They usually feel better after that amount of time. If you tell your child 'if you don't feel good, go to the nurse and have her call me,' **PLEASE** follow that up with an email to the student's teacher and/or me.
