Remote Learning for Students Rye High School **High School** math teachers Alexa DeVito and Ashley Blanch used Google Jamboard for collaborative synchronous teaching. Jamboard is a digitized whiteboard that allows teachers to work together in real time on a screen shared with students. The teachers used the program to demonstrate to students how to graph trigonometry functions. Then students were able to attempt to solve a similar problem.



**Rye Middle School** seventh grade English language arts teacher April Colarusso used Kami, an online document annotation and markup tool, to help her students break down Act 1 of Thornton Wilder's seminal play *Our Town*. She added text annotations, highlights, text comments, audio comments, and even video clips to help model think-alouds, read-alouds, and text explanations for her students.





**Midland School** art teacher Brett Reilly has been using Padlet, an online virtual bulletin board, to post student's self portraits. Parents and family members would normally admire the student's artwork at a red carpet art show held annually in the spring. Padlet enables art connoisseurs everywhere to view the works and their artists simultaneously.
