Principal's Corner

In South High School's most recent newsletter, the principal wrote about Jonathan Haidt's, <u>The Anxious Generation</u>: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness. As I read his newsletter, I realized that to make a real difference, this must start younger, before our children have smart phones and social media.

Although I have not started the book, it is my next read. I agree with Dr. Almon that it might be the most important book we can all read if we want to create a healthier generation of students.

The book uses the almost undeniable correlation between the rise of smartphones and the sharp and concurrent rise in anxiety, depression, and other mental illnesses. This troubling correlation is then used as the basis for exploring what we can do to reverse this alarming trend.

Haidt urges us to return to the days when we didn't track our kids based on their phone's location, where we didn't text them constantly throughout the day or feel the need to always be able to reach them, and where we trusted they would learn to become independent as a result.

He also advocates for greatly restricting the time kids spend on phones and eliminating almost all access to them until students are at least 16 years old. This may prompt boredom, but that wouldn't be such a bad thing because boredom is often a precursor to creativity and inventiveness. It may also encourage more time spent outside in the open air, where there are fewer restrictions and a greater likelihood that kids would get more exercise, which acts as an antidote to anxiety.

I'll share a short excerpt from Haidt's introduction, which illustrates the need to move away from screens and into the in-person, in real-time, unfiltered real world:

"Succeeding socially in that universe (which revolves around social media) requires them to devote a large part of their consciousness to managing their online brand. This (is) now necessary to gain social acceptance from peers, which is the oxygen of adolescence, and to avoid online shaming, which is the nightmare of adolescence" (p. 6).

If you get an opportunity to read the book, I'd welcome your thoughts in response to it as we consider how to create a more humane world for our students both at school and in the larger community.



2024 AK STAR and Alaska Science Assessment



Each spring, Alaskan students are provided an opportunity to show what they know. When students show what they know, teachers and parents can partner to promote student success. The State of Alaska Department of Education has partnered with NWEA to align and connect the English language arts (ELA) and mathematics tests with the MAP Growth benchmark assessments students take in fall and winter.

This balanced assessment system targets instruction to better support meeting students' individual learning needs. In addition, students will take only one assessment per content area (ELA and math) and be provided two scores as follows:

- 1. Summative assessment result at grade-level
- 2. MAP Growth interim benchmark result, including growth from fall to spring AK STAR, the Alaska System of Academic Readiness, is comprised of English language arts and mathematics and is administered to students in grades 3-9. The Alaska Science Assessment is administered to students in grades 5, 8 and 10. The purpose of a large-scale, summative assessment is to provide parents and schools an overall picture of a student's progress in meeting the Alaska standards at grade level.

Parents can locate resources for AK STAR and the Alaska Science Assessment, including directions for Student Readiness (Practice Tests and Tutorials), student testing times and general assessment information on the ASD website at https://www.asdk12.org/akstar.

Parents can also help by ensuring their children are well rested, eat a nutritious breakfast, and are at school on time for the days of testing. Please avoid scheduling appointments on your child's testing days.

The ASD AK STAR and Alaska Science Assessment testing window allows for school assessment scheduling flexibility. Students! Get ready to show what you know during our school's AK STAR and Alaska Science Assessment testing dates: April 2, 2024, ELA, April 4, 2024, Math, April 5, 2024 Science (5th Grade Only)


