- All Valentine cards must be <u>in an envelope</u> with only the "TO:" portion on it written <u>in print writing</u>. (Kindergarten kids can't read cursive!)
- Cards must have the recipient's first and last name and class name (grade then teacher's initial) Example: To: John Doe KW
- Print writing only NO CURSIVE!!!
- <u>No candy or gum</u> is allowed! This is true for all Valentine cards, both in the school mailbox and within your room.
- The Post Office is for cards for children and teachers in **other** classrooms.

Parents, feel free to use the mailbox for your own personal Valentines. What could be more special than a Valentine from Mom or Dad, delivered to your son or daughter at school?

Please remember that Valentine's Day is for everyone! If your child brings Valentines on Thursday, February 14, please be sure that there is a valentine for each member of the class.

## **Class Meetings Are Important**

As a school, we've learned that class meetings are a great way to build community within our building. Meetings give our children a common language for addressing problems and developing their own solutions. Students who are involved in regular meetings learn that simple and difficult issues are best solved from a culture of respect and engagement, and that often those solutions require hard work and a long-term commitment. In turn, those of us who help

facilitate those meetings learn how very wise and resourceful young children can be. We learn to trust that they can be part of, and even lead, the solutions.

Class meetings are one of the most important elements of the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (OBPP) and Restorative Practices. At the beginning of a school year, all classes use the first few meetings to talk about bullying and our individual and collective responsibilities to stop it when we recognize it. But as the year progresses, the challenges our students discuss and resolve vary widely from class to class. Several classes have used meetings to brainstorm about way they can change the individual and class "mindset" -- the way we think and talk about the learning experience. They may solve a problem on a playground, or discuss how their community can better support a fellow student who is struggling with something. Students may revisit why strong, school-wide choices follow behavior expectations make us all feel safer and secure and better able to learn. Or they may just brainstorm reasons and ways to keep their classroom clean! When students are encouraged to problem solve and make some of their own decisions, they are more likely to buy in to the solutions. And this leads to another important payoff: As students assume increased responsibilities in their classroom communities, they also can become more motivated to learn.

Class meetings work because they build a sense of cohesion and community among the students and adults in the building. When you listen to other students and help them solve problems, and share your own concerns, you've started breaking down habits of exclusion. Listen to what students from different grades are saying:

"Class meetings are good. They help me know stuff I didn't know, like you can't have clubs during recess because it makes people feel left out."

"I like class meetings because you get to let the teacher know your feelings and it helps you talk about what is going on."

"I like class meetings because we get to talk about solutions for problems we are having at recess."

"I like to learn new stuff in class meetings. I enjoy learning about my mind and how to stop bullies."

If you ask any child at Old Bonhomme, almost every one can tell you about their meetings and some detail about what they may talk about. Class meetings braid our learning and our character together. Our children learn that community isn't just a debate, a your-way-or-my-way contest, but a careful and sometimes messy path we create and walk together.
