Musical Auditions Announcement:

Musical Auditions will be held on Monday, 12/17/18, and Tuesday, 12/18/18 from 3:15pm-5:45pm and 6:15pm-7:45pm each day. (There is a half hour dinner break scheduled for the musical team helping with auditions). Information sheets and musical commitment contracts are aoing home with interested 4th and 5th graders on Friday, December 7th, and will be due back prior to auditions. Students will be able to sign up for an audition time slot beginning Monday, December 10th, with a sign up deadline of Thursday, December 13th. The sign up sheet will be located outside the music and drama room door. Auditions will last 30 minutes each. Once all students have signed up, a note will be sent home on Friday, December 14th, indicating your child's audition time. With the exception of a school absence the day of their audition, students who miss their audition will not be able to reschedule. The day of auditions, students should enter through the doors closest to the music room--Entrance E. There will be middle school helpers and a musical team member to auide your child through the paperwork procedure and answer any questions. It would be a good idea to arrive about 5 minutes early to fill out the information we will need. Since auditions are closed, parents are not required to stay during the audition time, but we will have chairs set up in the hallway if you wish to wait. Is it mean, rude or bullying?

This title may seem like a silly question because, you might be thinking isn't this all the same? There are similarities in these behaviors in that none of this feels good. However; there is a difference and it's important to distinguish between rude, mean, and bullying behavior.

<u>Rude</u>: inadvertently saying or doing something that hurts someone else. <u>**Mean**</u>: purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone once, usually based on angry feelings.

Bullying: intentionally aggressive behavior, repeated over time, that involves an imbalance of power.

The key points with bullying are:

- Purpose
- Pattern
- Power

Bullying can take on many different shapes and forms. It can be physical, verbal and social just to name a few.

It's important to understand that peer and social conflicts are not bullying, this is more that rude or mean behavior. Some examples of peer and social conflicts may include: not liking someone, rough play, and arguments. Trudy Ludwig has a great definition and it's that bullying is a conscious choice to be cruel. It's normal for peers to have social conflicts, to argue, and to even want things done a certain way thus leading to telling others how to play a game. It's important to understand the difference and talk to your student about the difference. Encourage them to talk to school staff when they feel like someone is displaying rude, mean or bullying behavior.

Eugene Field A+ Elementary Dance Newsletter December 2018

Ask Your Child About:

- K-1st: Ask your child about making their own movement cards and creating a class dance using movement cards. Students worked hard to draw three symbols that represented a dance move. The dances had a beginning, middle, and an end. Ask your child what always comes at the end of a dance, so the audience knows the dance Is finished!
- 2nd: Ask your child about how a dance can have a theme or a main Idea. We have been working on learning a
 dance with the main Idea of confidence. We also have discussed how we can show confidence through the
 movements in our dance.
- 3rd: Ask your child about their favorite kinds of dance and how we made human bar graphs with our bodies, and then recorded our data on paper to create our own graph! We have also been learning how a dance can communicate a main Idea or theme to an audience.
- 4th-5th: Ask your child about the differences they are noticing between two styles of dance such as ballet and jazz. Also ask your child about the two dances we are working on for the winter concert!

What have we been working

<u>on...</u>

In dance class we have been focusing on the style of jazz. We have also compared ballet and jazz and found similarities and differences between the two styles. We have learned different jazz dances and traveling steps. Some of the steps we have learned Include: Jazz walk: Posture is low, and feet slightly drag across the floor in this modified walk used for traveling across the stage. Variations include the jazz run and jazz drag

Ball-Change: A ball change is a change of weight distribution on the balls of the feet. This is a popular transitory step in many jazz dance routines.

pivot turn: One-foot steps in front of the other, and then the body pivots around back into the original position.

body Isolations: Movement of one part of the body independently of the rest.

What is coming next...

In the next coming weeks, we will continue to study jazz dance and learn new steps such as a kick, jazz square, contractions, and curves. 4th and 5th grade will continue to practice the dances we have learned in preparation for the winter concert. 2nd-3rd will begin to learn their dances for their winter concert in January. k-1st will begin working on a new dance piece for a musical performance.

School Related Cancellations and Postponements

It is important to be prepared for the winter storms and extreme cold that every South Dakota winter brings. Please read the following information so you are aware of the procedures for school related cancellations and postponements.

District leaders rely on experts from the National Weather Service and city/county officials when we make decisions on school cancellations, late starts or early dismissals.

Cancelling School/Late Start

When a severe storm hits the area, or is forecast, we start contacting local officials as early as 3:00 a.m. We communicate with our Operational Services Department, the Weather Bureau, the City Street Department, Sioux Falls Transit, and our transportation contractors. It is our goal to decide whether or not to cancel school by 5 a.m. to allow time for parking lots and sidewalks to be cleared, food services to prepare meals and the bus company to begin operations. In the event that school needs to be cancelled or delayed, families will be alerted via a ParentLink phone call. These calls will generally be sent between the hours of 6 a.m. and 6:30 a.m. to accommodate families whose children are picked up by buses at 6:45 a.m. Announcements are also made on the District's website, the app and over the local radio and television stations.

Because the public schools have a limited rural area, it is often possible for Sioux Falls to have school when nearby towns may not.

Early Dismissal

Storms occasionally move in during the day, making it necessary to assess whether or not to dismiss school early. We choose early dismissal only under the most extreme circumstances. In most cases, it is safer for students to remain at school due to the need for transportation and proper supervision. In the rare instances when schools are dismissed early, families will receive a ParentLink phone call and the information will appear on the District's website at <u>www.sf.k12.sd.us</u>. Announcements are also made over the local radio and television stations.

Notifications refer to dismissal "one hour early" or "two hours early" because of the number of different building schedules. In addition to noting the early dismissal, announcements about evening activities are normally included.

It is very important that every family has a plan for early dismissal. Be sure your student knows where to go in case no one is at home. Parents/Guardians are urged to talk with their student about his/her safety during winter weather emergencies.

Be Safe This Winter

The school system offers these suggestions concerning cold weather and emergency situations:

1. Listen for a ParentLink phone call regarding school closings, late starts, or early dismissals. Check the District's website at <u>www.sf.k12.sd.us</u> for updated information. Announcements will also be made on local radio and television stations. (Please avoid calling schools or the Instructional Planning Center. Phone lines are needed for emergency communications.)

2nd semester REGISTRATION for Elementary Specialized Schools "Fee" busing, is open from December 3-14. (Registration closes at 3:00 pm on December 14.)

PLEASE NOTE: Some routes are close to being full. If necessary, any current 1st semester rider who registers and pays for 2nd semester will be approved to continue riding, prior to accepting new 2nd semester registrations on these routes.

Elementary Specialized Schools:

The list of AM & PM stops available are listed on the Elementary FEE bus flier, attached. There is also a Q&A sheet, attached, to help answer any questions you might have about using the Google FORMS registration and PayPal process.



Google FORMS and PayPal Registration Questions & Answers:

- Q: Can I start the registration process, close, and finish it later?
- A: No. Due to the * required* fields on the form, you need to START and FINISH at the same time. There is no save button and you will be forced to start over.
- Q: Can I do 1 registration for all my children?
- A: No. You need to start a new form for each child you need to register. Remember to choose the correct registration form for each child. (Edison or Elementary)
- Q: I do not have a PayPal account; can I still make a payment with any credit/debit card?
- A: Yes, you do not need a PayPal account to make a payment.
- Q: I am not yet qualified for free or reduced lunches but I have applied. Can I still take the reduced rate?
- A: No, you need to be qualified at the time you make payment. Free & Reduced applications will be confirmed.
- Q: Can I sign up on-line but drop off a check or cash at the school?
- A: Yes, you can pay at your child's school but <u>your bus request is not considered complete until</u> <u>payment is received</u> and it needs to be received before the deadline.
- Q: After I completed the PayPal payment, I didn't receive the email confirmation that my payment went through.
- A: Check your Junk mail box for a receipt from <u>service@paypal.com</u>.
- Q: I've completed my registration and I'm in the payment section but I clicked on the wrong payment link. Can I go back to AM/PM payment options?
- A: Yes, you can go back by choosing the THANKS tab across the top, and then choose a different AM/PM payment link.
- Q: How do I finish the registration when I have 3 kids and have marked "3rd child no charge"?
- A: After you register the 3rd child, in the same family, just check the confirmation box and end the registration. Do not proceed on to the Pay Pal portion below to make a payment. (Even if you registered some students at Elementary and some at Edison.)


