

## Super Bowl, Super Golf

## COMBINE CHAMPIONSHIP COURSES WITH THE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Come and join Your Golf Travel's very own Super Bowl party in 2020. America's biggest sporting event swings into Miami, Florida, home to the Dolphins NFL team and some of the country's most celebrated golf resorts.

It's a measure of the popularity of the Super Bowl—the climax of America's National Football League season—that a recent poll of avid NFL fans reported that more than half would rather watch the game than attend their own child's birthday party.

OK, so quite a few dads I know here in the UK would probably consider giving their son or daughter's birthday bash the swerve if their team made it to the FA Cup final at Wembley, or England were on the brink of an Ashes victory at Lords. But, suffice to say, the Super Bowl grips America's collective psyche in a way that no event on this side of the pond quite does.

Today, thanks to a global TV audience of over 150 million and growing social media hype, the Super Bowl is bigger than ever. And even though your team might not be playing, it's almost impossible not to get caught up in the razzmatazz that surrounds this sporting juggernaut. Following Atlanta's staging of the event in 2019, which resulted in the lowest-scoring match of all time with New England Patriots' 13-3 win over the LA Rams, 2020 sees the Super Bowl roadshow

roll into sunny Miami for the eleventh time in its history, and 'The Magic City' is once again gearing up for an almighty party.

The 54th renewal, which takes place at the Miami Dolphins' Hard Rock Stadium on February 2nd, will have bigger significance than ever, with the NFL celebrating its centenary in 2020 and promising fans a nostalgiapacked programme of events. And while specific celebrations for the week leading up to the big game are still being finalised, the creation of a 54-acre Super Bowl Park in the centre of Miami will certainly help get everyone in the party mood. Spanning 14 blocks, the park will allow visitors to explore Miami's pulsating nightlife while also experiencing 100 years of NFL history for a week before the game kicks off.

For UK-based aficionados of American Football (who don't mind putting up with endless renditions of the Star-Spangled Banner and can stomach a foot-long hotdog), the timing of the Super Bowl is perfect for escaping the mid-winter gloom and combining a trip to the self-proclaimed 'Greatest Show on Earth' to play some top-quality golf courses under cloudless skies. South East Florida and the region around Miami is packed with a superb selection of golf resorts and courses on which to while away the hours either side of the match.

Donald Trump might not be everyone's cup of tea when it comes to politics

or global affairs, but the 45th President of the United States is big news—and not of the fake kind either—when it comes to golf in this part of the world. As owner of the Trump National Doral, he has sunk \$200m since he bought the famed resort for \$150m in 2012, transforming it into a luxurious 800-acre golfing playground where no fewer than five 18-hole golf courses compete for your attention, as well as a host of five-star facilities.

Of course, all visitors will want to tackle the beast that is the Blue Monster, the iconic venue that hosted a PGA Tour event for 55 consecutive years between 1962 and 2016, and if you like a bit of self-flagellation of the golfing kind, then by all means be our guest.

Gil Hanse's stunning redesign in 2013 resulted in the course being lengthened and strengthened in equal measure. Playing 7,608 yards off the back tees, it has been heavily bunkered, even more heavily watered, and boasts ankle-deep rough, so if you like golf on steroids, then this is it.

For a bit of light (though not easy) relief, a game on either of the resort's Red Tiger and Golden Palm courses is also highly recommended. Both are typical Floridian layouts, featuring acres of water, copious numbers of white sandy bunkers, and a high quota of island greens. As ever, Trump doesn't stint on the après-golf, with the resort, which offers over 650 deluxe rooms, boasting a wide range of gourmet dining

experiences, a sumptuous spa, and plenty of swimming pools to lounge by and soak up the Florida sunshine.

Staying with the tour venue theme, the PGA National Resort & Spa, located further up the coast in Palm Beach, is home to the PGA Tour's Honda Classic, with its Champions course having also hosted the Ryder Cup in 1983, where Europe lost out by a single point.

Jack Nicklaus, who skippered the US team that year, was brought into redesign the course some years later, and he toughened up the closing stretch considerably, giving rise to the last four holes being nicknamed 'The Bear Trap'. The resort boasts four other courses—Palmer, Fazio, Squire and Estates—so, like Trump Doral, you could comfortably spend a few days here without ever playing the same hole twice.

Returning closer to Miami's northern city limits, golfers should consider fitting in a game at JW Marriott Turnberry Miami, formerly known as Turnberry Isle, which boasts two 18-hole courses. The showpiece Soffer course has hosted several LPGA events, and following its redesign by Ray Floyd several years ago, presents a typical Florida challenge of water hazards and vast greens.

For those looking for something a little more old school, a stay at the recently renovated Biltmore Hotel, located a few miles west of downtown Miami, has much to recommend it. Opened Clockwise from Left: Miami Skyline at Sunset; Miami Harbour; Trump Doral.







during the 1920s, its iconic 275-bed hotel, with its 300-foot central tower, provides a suitably impressive backdrop to an 18-hole course first designed by legendary architect Donald Ross, but brought up to date by Brian Silva, who has added length and bunkers to present a stiffer challenge, while retaining many of Ross' classical features.

And for those who like to not only play a bit of golf, but watch a bit of golf too, Super Bowl 2020 takes place just before the PGA Champions Tour's Florida Swing gets underway. It tees off the following week at the Oasis Championship at Boca Raton, followed by the Chubb Classic at Lely Resort in Naples. OK, so it's the over-50s circuit, and there are only three rounds, but when else are you going to get the chance to watch Colin Montgomerie getting all hot under the collar when goaded by a group of obnoxious American golf fans? It would be worth the cost of the Super Bowl ticket alone!

## **Destination** Dubai

## DEFINED BY VARIETY AND OPULENCE, ON AND OFF THE COURSE

With its emerald green fairways set against a sandy oasis, as well as a towering city skyline, golf in Dubai turns landscape logic on its head. However, if you're after top class links under cloudless skies, with a heavy dose of pampered luxury, then the UAE's party capital ticks plenty of boxes.

For an understanding of Dubai's immense commitment to attracting visitors to its sandy shores, you needn't look further than the city's real snow indoor ski slope. Despite snowfall being highly irregular in the UAE, if people want to ski when the outside temperature is over 100 degrees, then they absolutely can.

The same principle has been applied to almost every other aspect of human existence in the United Arab Emirates, especially golf, which partially explains why, in a country where fresh water is just as valuable a commodity as the oil that has funded all the development, golf courses have been built at such an incredible rate.

With golf now a hugely popular addition to holidays in the UAE, Dubai's rulers would rather you played here than anywhere else in the world. You want to see the Pyramids or climb the Eiffel Tower? Don't bother going to Egypt or France, just book a flight

to Dubai. Want to eat in a Gordon Ramsay restaurant, drink vodka in an ice bar, sleep underwater, bathe in goat's milk, skydive over a manmade island, or watch Little Mix in concert? You've guessed it, come to Dubai. Golf's growth in Dubai has, not surprisingly, mirrored that of the explosion of the expat community, which currently represents over 90 percent of the total population of two million. Many of the UAE's 20-plus golf clubs, a dozen or so located in Dubai itself, survive on a steady supply or corporate outings, a few local members and a growing number of travelling golfers, who can jump on a plane from the UK and be playing championship courses in just six

One thing golfers visiting Dubai can be assured of is never having to worry about rain affecting their round. During the summer months, especially July and August, temperatures regularly push past 50 degrees Celsius, which can be too hot for most to hit the course. Thankfully, golfing authorities in Dubai thought this through and have built a number of courses which can be played at night under floodlights, making for more sensible golfing temperatures.

Due to its location where East meets West, Dubai has carved itself out a unique place on the golfing map. It's home to a growing number of tour pros who make the most of convenient travel to America, China and Europe, while enjoying a superb winter climate for off-season practice. Dubai is also a handy-stop off for tourists enroute to more distant destinations, with duty-free bargains in vast shopping malls and overnight stays in luxury hotels providing a perfect way to break up a 24-hour flight.

While Dubai is hugely popular with tour players, there's no shortage of amateurs looking to sample the pro experience for themselves, and definitely no shortage of places to do it. Old favourites like the Majilis and Wadi courses at the Emirates Golf Club, which celebrated its 30th anniversary this year, will always be preferred due to the innovative design and links to the annual Dubai Desert Classic tournament. Meanwhile, newer kids on the block, such as the Greg Norman-designed Earth Course, The Els Club, the Montgomerie Course at Emirates Hills, and the most recent openings, Trump International and Dubai Hills, continue to make waves.

While neighbouring emirate Abu Dhabi is fighting to become a golf destination in its own right, thanks to its trio of top-class tracks, including Yas Links and Saadiyat Beach, the majority of visiting golfers still choose to base themselves in Dubai and make the short drive—or even shorter helicopter ride—to play these superb courses.

For a spot of night golf, visitors should gallop off to Meydan, Dubai's only genuine pay-and-play course. The course is located inside the city's racetrack, which is home to the Dubai World Cup; the World's richest horse race. The 9-hole course is brilliant during the daytime but come the evening it is truly something special when the floodlights light up the fairways and your ball can be tracked against the night sky. This isn't the only night-golf experience available in Dubai, though, as the 18-hole Faldo course at the Emirates Golf Club is also fully floodlit.

For those looking to combine a golf holiday with some top-class tournament action, Dubai is also home to the Dubai Desert Classic, which takes place on the Majilis Course in February and has been a mainstay of the European Tour since it began in 1989. If you want to stray away from golf, the Dubai World Cup boasts the richest purse in horse racing, with over





## Lee Westwood's Favourite Holiday Destination

Lee Westwood, Your Golf Travel's Chief Holiday Officer, has played in almost every part of the world during his 25 years on tour, but there's one place that he enjoys playing and staying in above all others: Thailand.

You've travelled all over the world during your career and visited a lot of amazing golf destinations. If you could narrow it down to one country, which would it be?

I've been lucky enough to travel a lot and see so many amazing places, which makes it hard to narrow down to one. However, I've always loved playing in Thailand and have actually won a few tournaments there, especially in and around Bangkok; the whole country is incredible.

## What specifically sets Thailand apart from the other places you've visited?

More than anything, it's the people and the culture. The Thai people are just so unbelievably friendly and welcoming wherever you go. Not just at tournaments and hotels, but whenever you're out and about.

The hotels and resorts are incredible, and so is the food. And, if you like it hot (which I do), the climate is superb too, so it ticks a lot of boxes for me as a golfer and as a holiday destination.

## Which golf courses in Thailand stand out for you?

Amata Spring Country Club, a venue I've been lucky enough to win at a couple of times, is obviously one of my favourites.

Just an hour's drive outside of Bangkok, it has hosted the Royal Trophy a couple of times and is a Ryder Cup-style tournament between Europe and Asia, but I won the first Thailand Golf Championship there in 2011. I remember shooting 60 in the opening round—a career best for me—and then I won the tournament again at Amata in 2014.

The course is pretty flat, but there's a lot of water to contend with, so you need to hit it straight to stay out of trouble and the greens are super quick. The standout hole is the par-three 17th, which features a floating and moveable island green. It's quite a novelty and all presented in incredible condition.

There's also a course called Alpine Golf Club, which is 20 minutes outside of Bangkok, which I really rate. It was originally built on a flat piece of land, so all the hills and elevations are man-made, but it's a really fun course to play. I won the Johnnie Walker Classic there in 2004, and I remember it being very lush, and made you almost feel like you were playing around a tropical garden. Once again, water is a big feature of the course, and I recall a couple of cracking par threes to semi-island greens.

What's more, Red Mountain Golf Club's championship course is less than an hour's drive away and is worth the trip for the highly elevated par-3 17th hole.

In addition to your two wins in Thailand, you've won nine events in Asia during your career. What is it about the courses and the playing conditions out there that suit your game so well?

Yes, Malaysia and Thailand have both been pretty good to me over the years as far as tournament wins are concerned. The golf courses are all presented in superb condition, the greens are always in great nick, and I love playing in warm weather, so it really sets up well for my game.

## Are you keen to try local foods when you travel to more exotic destinations?

You don't get to be the size that I am without going out for a few meals and trying all different kinds of foods!

Having said that, during tournament weeks there is often little time to see the sights or hunt for specific local restaurants, although occasionally we get to go and try more off-the-beaten-track places. I love Thai food, as I like a bit of spice, so I always like to try something new whenever I get the chance.

#### Which is your favourite hotel in Thailand?

I've stayed at the St Regis in Bangkok a few times, and I would have to say that it's not just my favourite place to stay when I'm playing in Thailand, but one of my favourite hotels in the whole world.

It occupies an amazing spot right in the heart of the city and overlooks a golf course and a horse racing track, which is another favourite sport of mine. The rooms are huge, and the floor-to-ceiling windows offer a great view of the city, which looks even better at night. Each room even comes with its own private butler, no matter what size of room you've got.

It also has an open-air swimming pool overlooking the city, and there's a great choice of local and international restaurants on site; it's even got its own train station that comes right to the front door. Not many hotels can say that!

## What are the ingredients for your perfect holiday?

Nice beach, warm sea, decent weather—the usual suspects. While I do like to chill out when I'm on holiday, I also need plenty of places to see and things to do, along with a good choice of restaurants.

## Where is on your bucket list of places to go on holiday?

For sheer relaxation, I'd love to go to Langkawi in Malaysia. It's a group of islands off the west coast, with amazing beaches, luxury hotels and great seafood.

I've also never been to Hawaii, so that's definitely on the list, and not just for the golf courses, which look incredible. I'd also like to see a lot more of New Zealand, as I love the landscape and the outdoor lifestyle.
















## Savouring South Africa

If you're looking to treat yourself to great golf, luxury hotels, stunning scenery, and breathtaking wildlife, not to mention some of the world's finest epicurean experiences, then South Africa has got to be on your golf holiday horizon. Words by Nick Bayly.

Having been fortunate to have travelled the world sampling golf courses for the best part of 25 years, I'm often asked by slightly jealous friends and, quite often, complete strangers, where I'd chose to go back for one last trip should the 19th Hole In The Sky be imminently calling.

And my answer is always the same – South Africa.

Ever since I first went there in the mid-90s to explore the golf courses and wine lands of the southern Cape, to a more recent trip where I got up close and personal with a family of leopards while on a golf/safari trip to the Kruger National Park, South Africa has left a lasting impression on me.

As someone who looks for more than just a heart-stopping par three on their golf trips abroad – although it does have one or two of those, more of which later – it's hard to think of a destination that delivers such a diverse range of stunning landscapes and life-enhancing

experiences than are offered within the vast confines of Africa's ninth largest country, which covers almost half-a-million square miles.

From spotting the 'Big Five' all in one day at a private game reserve in Kruger, to catching sight of a pod of whales off the coast of Durban; and from sipping a chilled glass of Chenin Blanc as the sun sets over the south Atlantic at a beachside bar in Cape Town, to sitting around a camp fire by the Limpopo River eating barbecued steak under the stars, I've got some memories that will stay with me forever. And that's without including the breathtaking golf courses I've played, and the amazing hotels I've been lucky enough to stay in.

But enough about me. This is about you, and the incredible experiences that await anyone wishing to explore this stunning country and meet its generous and welcoming people.

## Safari Golf: Birdies And Buffaloes

For adventure seekers and wildlife enthusiasts, no trip to South Africa would be complete without sampling the thrill of catching sight of a pride of lions basking in the sunshine, a herd of elephants marching in line through the bush, or a family of rhinos rolling about in the mud on a riverbank. Here you can do just that in the wild and at numerous well-managed game reserves, many of which feature golf courses nearby.

'Safari Golf' is a game of its own, with the qualities particular to this version including having to occasionally move your ball away from sizeable animal droppings, navigate your way around ants nests, watching out for spitting cobras when searching through the rough, while keeping a keen eye open for hungry crocodiles when playing near water. Along with these rather novel hazards, there is also the opportunity to view some of Africa's finest wild animals while hunting for birdies and eagles of your own on a variety of stunning golf courses carved out of the Bushveld.


For those set on seeing the 'Big Five'—lion, elephant, buffalo, leopard and rhinoceros—

a visit to the province of Limpopo (formerly Northern Transvaal) is highly recommended. Serving as the border between South Africa and Zimbabwe, this region is home to 80 per cent of the country's private game reserves, as well as a growing number of five-star golf resorts, such as Koro Creek Golf Estate, Elements Private Golf Reserve, Zebula Golf Estate and Spa, and the daddy of them all, Legend Golf & Safari Resort.

Built on a grand scale, with a huge game reserve surrounding the manicured estate, Legend boasts a luxury hotel, plus a number of private lodges, and a 7,100-yard golf course that features 18 signature holes designed by some of the game's top players of today and yesteryear, including Justin Rose, Luke Donald, and Sergio Garcia. Although it's a superb course in its own right, its fame is mainly due to the launch of its 'Extreme 19th', a loosely designated par-3 hole which requires a helicopter ride to the top of a mountain, from where you are required to launch a tee shot over the edge of a 400-metre escarpment to a green shaped to look like Africa on the valley below.

Have a swipe with a driver and wave goodbye to your ball—most never see it again.

No luxury golfing/safari trip to this corner of South Africa would be complete without a game at the magnificent Leopard Creek Country Club, which is located at the southern tip of the Kruger National Park and close to the exclusive Buhala Game Reserve. A four-hour drive from Johannesburg or 40 minutes by plane, Leopard Creek is widely recognised as South Africa's No.1 course. Combining superbly designed holes in a spectacular wildlife setting overlooking the Kruger National and the Crocodile River, this stunning Gary Player design is a wonderland of lakes and streams, scenic vistas and wildlife watching. Sightings of hippo, crocodile, antelope, buffalo and elephant are common, although birdies and eagles are harder to come by on this tour-standard venue, which is a regular host of the European Tour's Alfred Dunhill Championship.

And if we're in the mood for box-ticking iconic venues, no golf holiday should end without a night or two spent in Sun City, South Africa's

most spectacular resort, located 100 miles northwest of Johannesburg in the heart of the African bushveld. By day, this oasis in the semidesert is dominated by two quality golf courses, the Gary Player Country Club, where 30 tour pros compete for the \$1.25m first prize in the Nedbank Golf Challenge every November, and Lost City, where hackers try to hit over a crocodile pit to the green at the infamous par-3 13th. By night, guests at the five-star Palace of the Lost City Hotel gamble at the casino tables, followed by lavish floor-shows in the Cascades. It's a jarring mix of entertainment that seems somewhat at odds with the surrounding countryside, but somehow it works.

With a minimal time difference, no language barrier, a generous exchange rate, and just about the most dramatic scenery to be found anywhere in the world, you are going to be hard pushed not to find a South African golf holiday that you will be talking about for years to come.

## Golf & Wine: A Heady Mix

Golf and wine have long been comfortable bedfellows in South Africa, so it's no surprise that grape and green rub gently alongside each other in the country's main Winelands, offering golfers and oenophiles the chance to sample an intoxicating mix of both activities without having to wander too far from the fairways or, indeed, the tasting rooms.

It doesn't matter whether you are a certified wine snob, or someone who just likes a chilled glass of something white over lunch (and a bottle of red at dinner), it's hard to think of another country in the world that does wine tourism better than South Africa.

The winery tours are informative and entertaining in equal measure, while most wineries boast superb restaurants, offering the chance to pair your favourite wines with the finest cuisine in the region. A glass of Pinotage will taste all the better accompanied by a plate of cured meats, while you'll find a seafood platter slips down a treat with a well-chosen Sauvignon Blanc.

A good place to start your golfing/wine itinerary is Constantia, one of South Africa's most revered wine regions, located 30 minutes southwest of Cape Town. Here, among the numerous wine estates, you will discover Steenberg Golf Club, which, rather handily, has its own winery, hotel and restaurant. Thankfully, the course isn't too hard, and the generous fairways will be a godsend for those feeling the after-effects of an afternoon's tasting. Nearby Paarl offers the chance to sample South African golfing legend David Frost's latest vintage at his winery, after which a game at the wonderful Jack Nicklaus designed Pearl Valley is essential.

If you're still feeling thirsty, you should swing by Stellenbosch, the spiritual home of Cabernet Sauvignon in South Africa, which is home to more than 150 wine estates. One of the most popular stops in town is Ernie Els's eponymous winery, which is also home to the Big Easy Restaurant and a tour-standard chipping and putting green. Surrounded by the beautiful Helderberg Mountains, Stellenbosch itself is a thriving university town filled with gorgeous

Cape Dutch architecture, a huge array of restaurants, and some fantastic nearby courses, including the magnificent Stellenbosch Golf Club, venue for five renewals of the South African Masters and the 1999 South African Open.

If you pick this route, also be sure to stop in Franschhoek, where French Huguenots landed 300 years ago after being chased out of France. The South Africans invited them to stay on the condition they grow their wine—not a bad deal for the South Africans as it turned out.

For those who prefer a lighter style of wine, a trip to the cooler climate of the dozen or more wineries in Hemel-en-Aarde—translated as 'Heaven on Earth'—is well worth the trip east of Cape Town, towards the coastal town of Hermanus, where you can sample some of the region's finest examples of Pinot Noir and Chardonnay. You should also be sure to book a tee time and an overnight stay at the magnificent Arabella Hotel & Spa, located just a few miles away. Featuring high up the course ranking lists, this stunning design is located on the banks of the Bot River lagoon and features rolling fairways, deceptive bunkers and a variety of challenging water hazards. Travel a little further along the beautiful Garden Route and you will find some of South Africa's best

golf, including the three fabulous courses at Fancourt, Ernie Els's Oubaai Golf Club and the breathtaking Peter Matkovich/Darren Clarkedesign at Pinnacle Point.

Located about a five-hour drive from Cape Town on the Garden Route, Gary Player has described Fancourt Links as his greatest design, and who are we to argue? Host course for the 2003 Presidents Cup, The Links is true to its name. Windswept, undulating terrain and dune-style landscape give players lots of opportunities for a variety of shots low to the ground. The Links is spectacular, but exceptionally tough, while the Montagu and Outeniqua courses are more suited to more relaxing holiday golf. All of these immaculatelymaintained courses are only available to guests staying at the resort, so it's essential to check in for the night here if you want to enjoy these iconic layouts.

British Airways and South Africa Airways offer plenty of direct flights to Cape Town and Johannesburg from UK hubs, while the more recent addition of a direct flight to Durban with British Airways has created further itinerary options for those wishing to explore the region around the Eastern Cape and the Garden Route. Direct flights take about 11-12 hours.

## Homing In On The Home Of Golf

#### SCOTLAND'S FINEST GOLF EXPERIENCES

With The Open Championship returning to the Old Course at St Andrews in 2020, there has never been a better time to start planning a visit to the Home of Golf and some of Scotland's other top golf destinations with Your Golf Travel.

Although Old Tom Morris would probably spin in his grave at the thought of St Andrews being called a 'golf resort', the ancient town on Fife's east coast is one in all but name, with golf tourism being its main source of income since the game was first played here 400 years ago.

The fabled Old Course is clearly the sun around which all the other courses in the town draw their heat and getting a tee time on the 'Auld Lady' seems to be as hard as ever. There's rarely a let up in demand for a chance to walk in the footsteps of the great champions that have graced this course at 29 Open Championships since 1873, and will do so again next July, when the tournament returns for the 30th time.

The Old Course remains the ultimate bucket list course and is a must-play for any golfer with a pulse. Half of all of the starting times are selected through a daily ballot, so there's a fair chance of getting on if you haven't pre-booked, but thankfully Your Golf Travel has an exclusive range of packages that offer guaranteed tee times, taking out all of the luck of the draw, and allowing you to plan your trip with absolute certainty. And what a treat you will have in store!

Offering the most nerve-wracking opening tee shot in golf, despite possessing one of the widest fairways in the world, the Old Course sets up iconic shot after shot. From your approach over the burn to the first green, to the drive over the corner of the Old Course Hotel on the 17th tee, and that putt up the Valley of Sin at the closing hole, it's a

beguiling journey through golfing history that will have you wanting to do it all over again as soon as you walk off the 18th.

St Andrews is long on quality and quantity, with the Links Trust offering no fewer than seven other superb layouts on which to test your mettle, with the New Course being the pick of those in the immediate vicinity. Less quirky than the Old, it shares many of its qualities, including several double greens, but the holes are more defined. If you're looking for more thrills and spills, then I'd recommend a game at the Castle Course, a 6,759-yard cliff-top layout which enjoys stunning views over St Andrews from around the bay. Talking of bays, Fairmont St Andrews Golf Resort & Spa, located in St Andrews Bay, is also a popular luxury stopover, with its two championship courses, Torrance and Kittocks, providing 36 holes of cliff-top golf with a links feel, while the five-star hotel offers 209 guest rooms, a spa, and no fewer than six dining options.

For golfers looking to stay more centrally in St Andrews, the MacDonald Rusacks Hotel, which sits half way up the right-hand side of the 18th fairway, is perhaps the more authentically Scottish venue. Although, the Old Course Hotel, which is situated on the dogleg of the Road Hole 17th, with the fabled Jigger Inn within its grounds, is the popular and obvious choice, with its course-facing suites providing a suitably luxurious vantage point from which to soak up the golfing atmosphere.

Moving away from St Andrews, no five-star visit to Scotland should miss out on the chance to visit Gleneagles, the self-styled highland playground of the rich and famous down the years. Golfers have been queuing up to play the resort's PGA Centenary Course ever since it hosted the Ryder Cup in 2014, and interest in the Jack Nicklaus-designed layout will ramp up once again following the staging of the Solheim Cup in 2019.





Although not a classic Scottish course by any stretch of the imagination, you'd be mad not to want to follow in the footsteps of the European and American teams, although make sure you also play the resort's other two more mature layouts, the century-old King's and the Queen's. Both have recently benefited from significant renovations, returning them to the challenge that James Braid first intended.


Whichever courses you play, you can be guaranteed a good night's sleep in the AA Five Red Star Gleneagles Hotel, which is luxury at its most Scottish. Guests can choose to stay in either a range of rooms and suites in the hotelincluding the ten ultra-luxury suites that occupy the top floor of the hotel—or rent one of the two, three and four-bed private lodges that are located on the estate. For those visitors flying in or out of Edinburgh, a stop off for a round at the Renaissance Club has much to recommend it. Located between Gullane and North Berwick, and only a 30-minute drive from the airport, Renaissance opened as a private members' club in 2008 on the Archerfield Estate, a pitching wedge away from Muirfield, but with far better views over the Firth of Forth. Tom Doak, the creative

genius behind Pacific Dunes in

Oregon and Cape Kidnappers in New Zealand, has created a series of compelling holes carved out of the coastal pine forest, and others stretching along the coastline high on the cliff tops above the Firth. After a round, guests can relax in the comfortable surroundings of the palatial clubhouse, while the quality of the accommodation, which comes in the form of 23 suites within a lodge, is well above par.

After tackling the tried and tested Open Championship courses at Carnoustie and Muirfield, golfers looking to test themselves on something altogether newer, but no less challenging, should head over to Trump Turnberry, where a wholescale renovation of the iconic Ailsa Course has been drawing rave reviews since re-opening last year. The most controversial change is to the par-4 9th, which has been converted to a long par three that relocates the entire hole closer to the lighthouse, while several other seaside holes have been pushed closer to the water, to add further to the drama.

Elsewhere, a new Trumpified clubhouse offers diners the chance to chow down on lobster mac 'n' cheese or one of numerous cuts of Scottish-reared steaks cooked on an open grill in the Duel in the Sun

restaurant, while the hotel itself has received a similarly spectacular renovation, although thankfully 'The Don' has gone easy on the gold leaf.

Staying with the Trump theme, it would be a sin to miss out on a trip to the US President's other golfing gift to Scotland, the controversial Trump International Golf Links on the north-east coast. Ranked as the best new course in GB & Ireland when it first opened in 2015, the Hawtree-designed links has softened into its landscape in the intervening years, with the narrow ribbons of fairways that split the mountainous dunes rippling gently under your feet like ill-fitting carpets.

Those looking for weak holes soon accept that they're just not there. From the show-stopping par-3 3rd, which offers one of the rare views of the sea, to the brutal 651-yard par-5 18th, it demands total respect at every turn. The hotel that Trump renovated to accompany the course, Macleod House, is pretty special too. Almost understated by Trump's standards, the boutique residence is the very epitome of Highland cool, with plenty of tartan on show amongst the Italian marble bathrooms, Egyptian cotton sheets, and 50-inch wall-mounted plasmas in

the 19 luxuriously-appointed quest suites.

For a final Scottish fling, golfers should head to the only course in the country to be built on a Site of Special Scientific Interest, Machrihanish Dunes, which transports visitors back over 120 years to a time when golf was at one with nature. Amazingly, only seven of the 260-odd acres of the site have been disturbed to make way for the rumpled fairways and punchbowl greens of the David McLay Kidd-designed 7,082-yard course, which makes for a truly unique links experience, and one that requires pinpoint accuracy to score well, especially when the wind gets up, as it often does on this remote outcrop on Scotland's most westerly coast.

Away from the course, the resort's American owners have set about creating a village atmosphere, with numerous white-walled cottages to rent, two comfortable hotels (The Ugdale and The Royal), and its very own pub in which to drown your sorrows after a tough round.



## To The Manor Born

#### WORLD CLASS GOLF ON THE EMERALD ISLE

Ireland is blessed with dozens of world class links, but it's an inland venue that has been bagging all the golfing headlines of late following the reimagining of Adare Manor, a luxury retreat in County Limerick which has been on the receiving end of a €50 million makeover.

Given that Ireland boasts a fifth of all the true links courses in the world, it seems a sacrilege to travel to the Emerald Isle to play a parkland course, but so great has been the reception given to the renovation of Adare Manor, the Limerick-based resort bought by Irish entrepreneur JP McManus in 2014, that I felt it my duty to find out whether the hype was justified.

And so it was that I found myself flying over the Irish Sea, landing at Shannon Airport, and taking a 30-minute taxi drive south west of Limerick to the closely guarded gates of Adare Manor.

Having stayed and played here 20 years ago, not long after the golf course first opened in 1995, I was eager to find out what impact a reported €50 million renovation would have on the resort as a whole, and on a golf course that, although a pleasant enough track—and host of two renewals of the Irish Open over a decade ago—is currently being talked about as the likely venue for the 2026 Ryder Cup.

The answer is, in short, a lot. The renovation of the hotel has taken place from the

bottom up, with no stone or pane of glass left untouched in the pursuit of luxury. Meanwhile, the reconstruction of the 7,509-yard championship course, which was originally designed by Robert Trent Jones, has taken two years to complete, and is nothing short of a masterpiece in terms of design and presentation.

The par-72 course, which boasts the rare feature of having no rough, is the first in Europe to boast super fine Bentgrass greens, while a similar strain of sward was chosen for all approaches, enabling players to pull their putters out with confidence when they're not short-sided by one of the numerous greenside bunkers.

Adare is also one of only three courses in Europe to feature a SubAir system on all 18 greens. The system, which was installed on Wentworth's West Course two years ago, and is also in place at Augusta, is used to remove moisture through vacuum pumps, guaranteeing firm, fast greens all year round. So firm, in fact, that Rory McIlroy, who played here in a match at the official unveiling last April, along with Shane Lowry, Padraig Harrington and Paul McGinley, said it was like playing in summer conditions, such were the pace and purity of the putting surfaces, which are significantly raised and heavily contoured.

Harrington and McGinley, Ryder Cup captains present and past, were both closely involved in the redesign project, aiding world-renowned architect Tom Fazio on the final routing, contouring and grass and sand selection. It's hard to think that

both players won't have a hand in where the next Ryder Cup will be played.

And what of the course itself? From a visual perspective, the main changes I noted from its presentation for the Irish Open in 2007 and 2008, are to the 9th and 18th holes. The 9th green has been relocated right of the original site, with the effect of creating a stunning backdrop of the extended Manor House, all the way back to the tee. The removal of trees, and considerable cleaning out of the undergrowth, is especially evident around the 18th green. From about 200 yards down the fairway, there is now a beautiful, framed image of the manor partially hidden by a 400-year-old cedar tree on the right, and the charming bridge over the River Maigue, which was constructed in the resort's earlier incarnation.

The par-72 layout features water on 14 of the 18 holes, and while the front nine is packed with impressive holes, including the par-five 7th which curves dramatically around a lake, it saves its most exciting tests for the final stretch. Four of the last five feature water of some description, starting on the par-four 14th, which plays towards a green overhanging a lake, set

against the backdrop of the Desmond Castle, and finishing with the par-four 18th, whose diagonal approach across the same lake is played to a green in front of the castle.

With 50 full-time greenkeepers, it'll be no surprise to learn that there isn't a blade of grass out of place on the entire 850-acre estate, with tees that most club golfers would be happy to putt on, and fairways that gently roll out like VIP carpets at a Hollywood film premiere. It truly is a chance to play a piece of golfing land that has had as much thought and care put into every blade of grass as those at Augusta.

Rebuilt with tournament play in mind, the course will host the JP McManus Pro-Am in 2020, while its formal bid to stage the 2026 Ryder Cup is expected to be announced in the coming months.



Just be sure to get to the course early to secure one of the best locations and its job done for the day. The parkland-style West Course, which first opened in 1923, has recently received a significant makeover by respected architect Gil Hanse—designer of Rio's Olympic course—which has served to open up what had become a very tight, tree-lined layout and made it far more playable, while offering better viewing for fans. Having said that, he's also rebuilt the greens, returning them to their vast original acreage, and added 250 yards to a course that already measured over 7,260 yards when it hosted the US Open in 2006, so expect big hitters to hold sway in the race for the trophy.
