STORY LINES

- After not having a spring game last year due to renovations at Ross-Ade Stadium, Purdue Football brings back its annual event for the first time under second-year head coach Ryan Walters.
- The Boilermakers finished tied for fourth in the Big Ten West a season ago.
- Purdue won both trophy games in 2023, beating Illinois (Cannon Trophy) and Indiana (Old Oaken Bucket) for the third straight season. It marked the first time the Boilermakers defeated both rivals in three consecutive seasons since 2004-2006.
- Leading the Big Ten in rushing during conference games (184.6 ypg), Purdue was the only school in the 14-team league to have two running backs rush for more than 500 yards in Big Ten games (Devin Mockobee - 625 yards, Tyrone Tracy Jr. - 624 yards).
- Mockobee (811 yards) and Tracy (716 yards) became the first Purdue duo to eclipse 500 yards in a season since 2018.
- Purdue's 2,029 yards on the ground were the most in a season since 2012.
- The Boilermakers return four starters on the offensive line: Jalen Grant, Gus Hartwig, Marcus Mbow and Mahamane Moussa.
- Mockobee became the first Boilermaker to lead the team in rushing in consecutive seasons since Markell Jones (2015-17).
- The Boilermakers lose NFL Draft prospect Tyrone Tracy Jr., who led the Big Ten in yards per carry (6.3) and all-purpose yards (127.4 ypg) in his first season as a running back; Tracy's 6.3 yards per carry ranked second in program history, trailing only Leroy Keyes (6.6 in 1967).
- Tracy put on a show at the NFL Combine, producing the fastest 3-cone drill by a running back by weaving through the cones in 6.81 seconds. He clocked in at 4.06 seconds for the 20-yard shuttle, ranking second in his position, and his 40-inch vertical jump also ranked second. He ran a 4.48 second in the 40-yard dash, reaching a top speed of 23.01 mph to rank fourth by a running back according to NFL Next Gen Stats.
- Hudson Card returns for his second year as Purdue's starting quarterback. He was All-Big Ten Honorable Mention a season ago, ranking third in the conference in passing yards per game and completions per game.

- On the other side of the ball, Dillon Thieneman and Kydran Jenkins return to lead Walters' defense.
- Thieneman was one of the best defensive players in college football, ranking third nationally in interceptions and solo tackles, breaking Purdue freshman records in both categories.
- Along with earning Third Team All-America accolades by the AP, Thieneman was also named the FWAA Defensive Freshman Player of the Year and the Thompson-Randle El Big Ten Freshman of the Year.
- Jenkins ranked second in the Big Ten in tackles-for-loss with 15.5 on the year, ranking 18th in the country and the most by a Boilermaker since George Karlaftis in 2019 (17.0). He became the first Boilermaker to lead the team in TFLs in straight seasons since Jake Replogle (2014-15).
- Purdue averaged 24.2 yards per kickoff return, the fourth best in program history and the highest return average since 2004.
- The Boilermakers welcomed 25 newcomers at the start of the semester (14 transfers, 11 freshmen).
- As the spring semester began, Walters and his staff put together a consensus Top 10 transfer class, featuring 11 players from Power 5 schools.
- The incoming transfers consist of eight offensive players and six defensive players: WR Kam Brown (UCLA), WR De'Nylon Morrisette (Georgia), WR CJ Smith (Georgia), RB Reggie Love III (Illinois), OL Joshua Sales Jr. (Indiana), OL Corey Stewart (Ball State), OL Joey Tanona (Notre Dame), OL DJ Wingfield (New Mexico), DB Nyland Green (Georgia), DB Kyndrich Breedlove (Colorado), RUSH END CJ Madden (Georgia), RUSH END Shitta Sillah (Boston College), DL Jamarius Dinkins (Kentucky) and DL Jireh Ojata (Franklin).
- Freshmen enrolling early for spring ball include: QB Marcos Davila, RB Jaheim Merriweather, TE Tayvion Galloway, WR Tra'mar Harris, WR Jesse Watson, OL Jaden Ball, OL John Randle Jr., DL Demeco Kennedy, DB Smiley Bradford, DB D'Mon Marable, RUSH END DJ Allen.
- Purdue averaged 58,249 fans for home games a season ago, the highest average attendance at Ross-Ade Stadium since 2007. Season tickets eclipsed 30,000 and were the highest since 2008. The Ross-Ade Brigade, the official student section of Purdue Football, sold out season tickets for the first time since 2018.

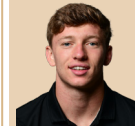

The Boilermaker defense registered 35 sacks last season, the most since 2004 and the third-most in school history. Purdue's 2.92 sacks per game ranked second in the Big Ten and 13th nationally.

As a freshman in 2023, Dillon Thieneman earned AP Third Team All-America honors to become the 50th All-American in Purdue Football history. He was Purdue's first AP All-American defensive back since College Football Hall of Famer Rod Woodson in 1986.

184.6

Purdue led the Big Ten in rushing a season ago, averaging 184.6 yards per game in conference contests. That included back-to-back 300-yard rushing games (353 vs. Minnesota, 303 at Northwestern) for the first time since 1968.

ATX CONNECTION

The Boilermakers have a great history pulling their signal callers from the Austin area, with Card joining program legend Drew Brees on the list of Purdue QBs to hail from the state capital. The pair sat on either side of the Battle of the Lakes rivalry between Lake Travis (Card) and Westlake (Brees) and are amongst a large list of top talent to have come from the two programs including Nick Foles, Garrett Gilbert, Baker Mayfield and Justin Tucker.

ACE UP THE SLEEVE

- In his first season as a starting quarterback, as well as his first as a Boilermaker, Hudson Card completed 19.6 passes per game to rank third in the Big Ten.
- He has also shown off his mobility with his feet, finding the end zone four times on the ground to rank third on the team in rushing touchdowns.
- Card had the biggest game of his career against Syracuse, going 32-for-46 for 323 yards and a touchdown to set personal bests in completions, attempts and yards.
- In the win over Minnesota, Card matched his career high with three passing touchdowns and also added another one on the ground.

- Scored game-winning touchdown on a two-yard rush at Virginia Tech
- Transferred to Purdue January 6, 2023
- Named the starter for the Boilermakers early in spring camp
- Earned a spot on the Maxwell Award Watch List as one of the nation's top quarterbacks
- Chosen for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Watch List
- Tabbed as the top transfer quarterback by Mike Farrell
- Voted a team captain by his teammates

2022

- Played in 12 games with three starts
- Completed 14-of-22 passes for 158 yards against Alabama after entering on the last play of the first quarter
- Led Texas to victory against UTSA after completing 15-of-23 passes for 161 yards and one touchdown, also ran two for 35 yards against the Roadrunners, including a career-long 32 yard rush
- Threw for 277 yards and two touchdowns on 20-of-30 passing at Texas Tech
- Threw for 303 yards and three touchdowns while completing 21-of-27 passes (77.8%) in a victory over West Virginia

FRESHMAN DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

• On the defensive side of the football throughout the 2023 season, the best freshman in the nation was a Purdue Boilermaker. That distinction became official as the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) tabbed All-American defensive back Dillon Thieneman the Defensive Freshman Player of the Year.

• Along with earning FWAA Freshman All-America accolades, Thieneman becomes just the second defensive player, as well as the first Big Ten player, to win a national freshman player of the year award from the organization.

ALL-AMERICAN

• As one of the best players in the country, regardless of class, Thieneman earned Third Team All-America accolades from The Associated Press to become the 50th All-American in program history

• Thieneman was Purdue's first All-America defensive back since Steve Jackson in 1990 (Gannett News Service) as well as the first AP All-America Boilermaker since College Football Hall of Famer Rod Woodson (1986).

BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR

• Following a historic debut season, Thieneman became the seventh Boilermaker to be named Big Ten Freshman of the Year (Brian Fox – 1988, Eric Hunter – 1989, Corey Rogers – 1991, Stuart Schweigert – 2000, Rondale Moore – 2018, David Bell – 2019), including the third Purdue player in the last six seasons.

• He was the conference's 11th defensive player to win the award as well as the fifth defensive back alongside the fellow Boilermaker Stuart Schweigert (2000), Charles Woodson (Michigan – 1995), Jabrill Peppers (Michigan – 2015) and Brandon Joseph (Northwestern – 2000).

• Thieneman was the only Big Ten freshman defender to make one of the three all-league teams, earning Second Team All-BIG honors from the coaches and third team accolades from the media.

FRESHMAN RECORD BREAKER

• Thieneman ended his 2023 campaign ranked third nationally in interceptions (6) and solo tackles (74), leading all freshmen and setting new Purdue freshman records.

• His six interceptions were double the nearest freshmen, as four recorded three apiece throughout the 2023 season, while his 74 solo tackles ranked first amongst all Big Ten defenders.

• With six INTs, Thieneman broke Stuart Schweigert's previous Purdue freshman record of five back in 2000. It was the third most in a single season in program history and the most by any Boilermaker since Ricardo Allen (2013).

• Thieneman's 74 solo tackles broke a 40-year record held by College Football Hall of Famer Rod Woodson, who recorded 67 solo tackles as a Purdue freshman in 1983.

• Thieneman was 15 tackles away from breaking Kevin Motts' record for total tackles by a freshman in a single season. Motts made 121 tackles during his 1976 freshman campaign.

• He became the eighth Purdue freshman to force at least two fumbles in a season, tying for second all-time.

5-TIME BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK

• Thieneman was a five-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week honoree throughout the 2023 season, becoming the first defender in conference history to win any weekly award five times in a single season.

• The Purdue defensive back joined a list of only seven other Big Ten players (six quarterbacks, one running back) to win at least five weekly accolades in a single season and the first Boilermaker to win a weekly conference award five times.

• Drew Brees (Offense – 2000), Travis Dorsch (Special Teams – 2001), Kyle Orton (Offense – 2004), Rondale Moore (Freshman – 2018) and David Bell (Freshman – 2019) collected Big Ten weekly honors four times in a season, tying for Purdue's previous best.

• No defensive player in conference history had earned Big Ten Freshman of the Week accolades more than twice.

ADDITIONAL NUGGETS

• Thieneman led the team with 106 tackles, ranking fifth in the Big Ten among all players and the most by any freshman in the country

• He as Purdue's leading tackler in eight different games, cracking double figures four times

• Thieneman became the first Purdue freshman to record multiple double-digit tackle games since Ja'Whaun Bentley (New England Patriots)

• He made two interceptions in the win over Indiana (Nov. 25). He also added INTs against Fresno State (Sept. 2), Virginia Tech (Sept. 9), Iowa (Oct. 7) and Northwestern (Nov. 18).

• Thieneman led the nation's freshman in forced fumbles, forcing a pair at Nebraska (Oct. 28)

• In his Purdue debut, he tallied 10 solo tackles and an INT vs. Fresno State (Sept. 2)

• Thieneman made a career-high 14 tackles against Syracuse (Sept. 16)

BLEEDING OLD GOLD & BLACK

• "Thieneman" is familiar last name is back on a Purdue jersey.

• Dillon Thieneman joined the Boilermaker bloodline shared by his older brothers, Jacob (2016-18) and Brennan (2017-20), who both were safeties at Purdue as well.

• Jacob recorded 154 tackles over his final two seasons in the Purdue secondary.

• Brennan played in every game over his last three seasons as a Boilermaker.

Considered one of the nation's fastest rising young coaches, Ryan Walters is in his second season as head coach of the Boilermakers. Walters was announced as the 37th head coach in Purdue Football history on Dec. 13, 2022.

During his first season at Purdue, Walters and the Boilermakers faced one of the toughest schedules in the country. As the Boilermakers prepared to play Northwestern in their 11th game of the season, all 11 teams on Purdue's schedule up to that point, including the Wildcats, did not have a losing record. Despite the gauntlet, Purdue tied for fourth in the Big Ten West and won both rivalry games to keep possession of the Cannon Trophy (Illinois) and the Old Oaken Bucket (Indiana) for the third straight season.

In Walters' debut season guiding the Old Gold and Black, Purdue found success in all three phases of the game. The offense led the Big Ten in rushing in conference contests, averaging 184.6 yards per game. That included the Boilermakers rushing for more than 300 yards in back-to-back games for the first time since 1968. The 2,029 rushing yards were the most since 2012, while Purdue became the only team in the Big Ten with two running backs eclipsing 500 yards in conference games (Devin Mockobee – 625, Tyrone Tracy Jr. – 624). Purdue joined national champion Michigan as the only two teams to score seven touchdowns in a Big Ten contest.

On the defensive side of the ball, the Boilermakers recorded 35 sacks, the most since 2004 and the third-most in program history. Individually, Dillon Thieneman became an All-American (Third Team – AP) and was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year after setting school records for interceptions (6) and solo tackles (74) by a freshman; both marks ranked third nationally by any defender in college football throughout the 2023 campaign. In Walters' defense, the duo of Nic Scourton and Kydran Jenkins had more sacks and TFLs than any other teammates in the conference, as both Boilermakers cracked the Big Ten's Top 3 in both categories.

The 2023 special teams unit averaged 24.2 yards per kickoff return, Purdue's best since 2004 and the fourth-most all-time. Tracy returned a kick 98 yards for a touchdown in the season opener, the first by a Boilermaker since 2013, while ranking second in the Big Ten and 15th nationally in kick return average (25.5).

Walters brought energy and excitement to Purdue Football, as season tickets nearly reached 40,000 and broke the 30,000 mark for the first time since 2007. The Ross-Ade Brigade, Purdue's student section, sold out season tickets for the first time in five years. Ross-Ade Stadium averaged 58,249 fans at each home game, the highest average attendance since 2007.

Hired at age 36 after spending two seasons as Illinois' defensive coordinator and creating the nation's No. 1 scoring defense (12.3 ppg in 2022), Walters became the fourth-youngest coach in the Power 5 conferences behind Kenny Dillingham (32-Arizona State), Kane Wommack (35-South Alabama) and Dan Lanning (36-Oregon) and eighth youngest in the FBS.

Walters elevated Illinois' defensive unit from the back of the pack into one of the nation's elite in just two seasons. Following the 2020 season, in which the Fighting Illini ranked 97th nationally in scoring defense (34.9) and 114th in yards allowed per game (466.8), Walters' first year in Champaign saw his side of the ball rise to 29th (21.9) and 49th (367.0), respectively. This past season, the results were shown nationwide as Illinois went into the bowl schedule No. 1 nationally in scoring defense (12.3) and No. 2 in yards allowed per game (263.8).

A former safety at Colorado (2004-08), Walters tutored two of the nation's top defensive backs during his two-year stint in Champaign. Among six Illini defenders to earn All-Big Ten recognition in 2021 was safety Kerby Joseph, who was Illinois' first All-Big Ten First Team defensive back since 1989. Two more Illinois defensive backs accomplished the feat in 2022, with Devon Witherspoon and Sydney Brown earning first team accolades from the conference. Witherspoon, notably, became Illinois' first Jim Thorpe Award (top defensive back in college football) finalist in school history this past season.

Walters spent six seasons at Missouri prior to his tenure with the Illini, including three as defensive coordinator. He oversaw an impressive transformation of the Tigers' defense into one of the Southeastern Conference's top units. His 2019 defense ranked in the nation's Top 20 in several categories, including total defense (14th NCAA; 3rd SEC - 312.0) and scoring defense (17th NCAA; 6th SEC - 19.4), while excelling as a Top 10 pass defense (8th in passing yards allowed NCAA; 2nd SEC - 179.3).

Walters previously served as co-defensive coordinator for the 2016 and 2017 seasons in Columbia before being promoted to defensive coordinator permanently ahead of the 2018 season, with Missouri's overall defensive improvement leading the way to an eight-win season and bid to the 2018 AutoZone Liberty Bowl. Previously during bowl preparation in December 2017, Walters ascended to the role of defensive coordinator before the squad's 2017 Texas Bowl appearance after assuming control of the entire secondary ahead of that season. He had focused on the safeties in his first two seasons with the program.

Prior to making the move to Missouri in 2015, Walters coached at Memphis where he spent the 2014 season as cornerbacks coach and oversaw a defense that was among the most improved in the nation when the Tigers went 10-3.

A native of Aurora, Colorado, Walters was a football student-athlete at Colorado, where he was a standout safety for the Buffaloes (2004-08). He started 33 times in 46 career appearances as a Buffalo and earned All-Big 12 Conference Honorable Mention his senior season. He began his coaching career as a student assistant at Colorado, working with the secondary in 2009, and then spent two years on staff at Arizona, where he was a graduate assistant in 2010 before being promoted to defensive backs coach for the 2011 season.

From Arizona, Walters moved to Oklahoma as a graduate assistant cornerbacks coach in 2012, as the Sooners went 10-3 and played in the 2013 Cotton Bowl. He moved to North Texas for the 2013 season, where he oversaw cornerbacks and helped lead UNT to a 9-4 record in its first year in Conference USA.

Prior to his arrival at Illinois, Walters was one of 12 coaching participants in the National Coalition of Minority Football Coaches' inaugural Coalition Academy in April 2020, a first-of-its-kind mentorship program pairing influential athletic directors with minority football coaches.

Walters earned his degree in history from the University of Colorado in December 2008 with dual majors in history and ethnic studies. Walters and his wife Tara have two sons, Aaron and Cason.
