HEAD COACH TONY ERSLAND

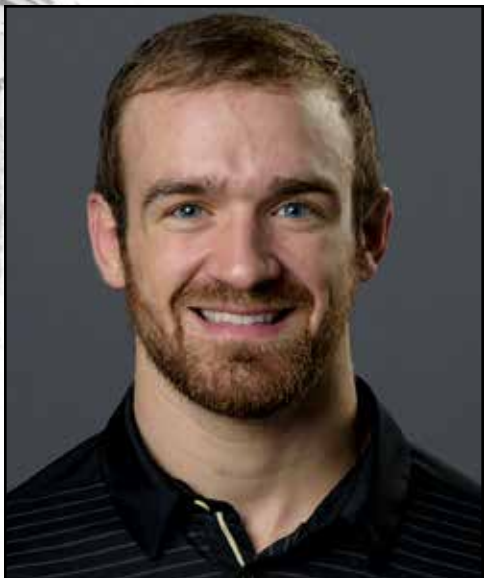


- In his seventh year at Purdue, Ersland set career-high marks for dual victories (12) and conference-dual wins (5) in 2019-20, securing the Boilermakers' first winning conference record since 2013.
- Ersland took the Boilermaker to new heights in the national polls in 2019-20, seeing the team soar as high as fourth in the nation in tournament polls and up to 13th in the NWCA Coaches Dual Poll. The team's No. 13 NWCA ranking is its highest since reaching No. 12 in 1999. Purdue has consistently had four individuals ranked inside the top-eight at their respective weight classes throughout the season after beginning the year with none.
- In 2021, Purdue had as many as eight nationally ranked wrestlers at one time, a first since 2012
- In seven years, Ersland has secured 15 top-100 recruits and four top-25 recruiting classes ... the class of 2016 was ranked No. 6 by FloWrestling, No. 7 by InterMat and No. 8 by WIN Magazine ... the class of 2017 was ranked No. 13 by FloWrestling, No. 18 by InterMat and No. 22 by TheOpenMat.com ... Ersland is credited with two of those top three recruiting classes: 2016 and 2017 ... the class of 2018 was ranked 18th by FloWrestling and 25th by TheOpenMat.com.
- Has sent 37 wrestlers to the NCAA Championships, three times matching a program high with eight qualifiers in 2015, 2019 and 2020 ... Purdue previously qualified eight in 1993 and 2003 ... the eight qualifiers in 2015 were the most since 2010.
- Thirty-two Boilermakers have placed at the Big Ten Championships under Ersland, with eight earning podium finishes in 2020 ... the eight placemen are the most since eight Boilermakers landed on the podium in 2004 ... in 2020, Purdue turned in its best Big Ten Championships performance since 1992, placing fifth with 83 points.
- Seventy-two Academic All-Big Ten Conference honors have been earned by 50 Boilermaker wrestlers ... has twice broken program highs in number of honorees, first with 10 in 2015-16 and then 13 in 2018-19 and 2019-20.
- Purdue has earned National Wrestling Coaches Association's top-30 Scholar All-American Team honors in each of the last two seasons, with the 2018-19 squad ranking 18th and 2019-20 ranking No. 28 ... it was the first time since 2013 Purdue made the list and was the second highest ranked team among six Big Ten Conference programs among the top 30. Five Boilermakers were named NWCA Division I Scholar All-American Award winners in 2018-19, setting a new standard for Purdue wrestling, and three more earned the honor in 2020. During his tenure, seven Boilermakers have been named NWCA Division I Scholar All-American Award winners a combined 12 times.
- Ersland was an assistant coach at Nebraska for eight seasons. While on staff, the Huskers tallied a 102-41-2 dual record, recorded seven top-20 team finishes at the NCAA Championships and grapplers earned 17 All-America honors. Prior to his post at Nebraska, Ersland coached the Cyclone Wrestling Club in Ames, Iowa, working with Iowa State NCAA champions Trent Paulson (157) and David Zabriskie (285) among other multiple NCAA qualifiers and All-Americans, and was at Northwestern from 2000-05, serving as the head assistant wrestling coach and as a coach and board member for the Wildcat Wrestling Club. He also coached at Northern Illinois in 1999 and 2000 after getting his start as a graduate assistant at Central Michigan from 1997 to 1999.
- On the mat, Ersland wrestled for the University of Iowa under legendary coach Dan Gable and was a part of three-straight NCAA team championships (1995-97) and four Big Ten Championships (1994-97). During his senior season in 1997, Ersland finished one match shy of All-America honors at 177 pounds.
- Ersland earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology from Iowa (1997) and a Master of Arts in athletic administration from Central Michigan (1999).
- Ersland and his wife, Carolyn, have twin sons, Mason and Jaxon.

HEAD ASSISTANT COACH A.J. SCHOPP



Three-time All-American A.J. Schopp is in his third season at Purdue, and plays a key role in the Boilermakers' light-weight wrestlers. From his high-level experience as one of the nation's top 133-pounders throughout his career at Edinboro, to his time building a program as an assistant coach at South Dakota State, Schopp brings an exceptional skill set and high level of competitiveness to Purdue.

Schopp spent two seasons as an assistant coach at South Dakota State before coming to Purdue. Numerous program firsts were established at SDSU with Schopp on staff, highlighted by the program's first-ever Big 12 Conference champion and Division I All-Americans in Seth Gross and Alex Kocer. Gross was the NCAA runner-up at 133 pounds in 2017, while Kocer placed eighth at 149 pounds.

Schopp's influence on Gross extended into freestyle, coaching him to a UWW national championship and a spot on the U.S. Junior World Freestyle Team in 2016.

In two seasons with Schopp on staff, the Jackrabbits posted a 28-11 dual record, qualified 10 to the NCAA Championships, totaled 11 Academic All-Big 12 honors and totaled eight NWCA All-Academic distinctions.

Wrestling at 133 pounds at Edinboro (2012-15), Schopp was consistently ranked among the nation's elite. Known for his ability to rack up bonus points and his dominance on top. He was a four-time NCAA Championships qualifier, earning All-America honors three times, and was a three-time Eastern Wrestling League champion.

He placed fourth at the 2013 and 2014 NCAA Championships and had his highest NCAA finish in his final campaign, taking third in 2015. After being upended in the first round, the No. 9 seed stormed through wrestlebacks, winning seven straight to place third. Schopp was bestowed with the Gorriaran Award for the most falls in the least amount of time, sticking four opponents in 11:53 during wrestlebacks. The Fighting Scots' third-place finish in the team standings marked the highest finish in program history at the Division I championships.

Schopp is scattered throughout Edinboro's record book. With a career mark of 133-17, his .887 winning percentage ranks second and his 133 wins are tied for sixth. He tops the career falls list with 67 and he earned a spot on the Fighting Scots' top-20 season falls list in each of his four campaigns.

The Tyrone, Pennsylvania, native earned a bachelor's degree in business administration, along with a minor in economics, from Edinboro in May 2015. He and his wife Katie have two sons, Ryder and Jones.

ASSISTANT COACH JAKE SUEFLOHN



Sueflohn is in his second season as a full-time member of the Boilermaker staff, as he was elevated to an assistant coaching position after three seasons as a volunteer assistant coach.

Ersland sought Sueflohn to join the Boilermakers' staff in July 2016, just as he recruited the Watertown, Wisconsin, native to Nebraska coming out of high school. Wrestling for the Huskers, Sueflohn was a four-time NCAA qualifier and four-time Big Ten Championships placewinner.

During his career at Nebraska, Sueflohn amassed a career record of 109-32 (.773) wrestling all but one season at 149 pounds. He was twice the Huskers' team leader in major decisions, racking up 35 in his career.

Sueflohn qualified for the NCAA Championships at 149 pounds in 2013, 2014 and 2016 after qualifying at 141 as a true freshman in 2012. At the Big Ten Championships, he appeared in the 149-pound finals in back-to-back seasons, finishing as the runner up as a sophomore in 2013 and a junior in 2014. Sueflohn placed three times at the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational, highlighted by a runner-up finish in 2013. That same season he also brought home the Reno Tournament of Champions title at 149 pounds.

Sueflohn was honored numerous times for his accomplishments on and off the mat. Sueflohn received the Nebraska Granite Award, which was bestowed for his toughness, the Most Dedicated Award and the Tom Osborne Citizenship Award. For his work in the classroom, Sueflohn earned a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll four different semesters and was an Academic All-Big Ten selection in 2014.

Ersland recruited Sueflohn out of Arrowhead High School where he was a two-time Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association champion while going 100-1 during his final two seasons. Sueflohn tallied a high school record of 188-10 (.950). He also earned All-America honors in 2011 with a third-place finish at 145 pounds at the ASICS/Vaughn Junior Freestyle National Championships.

Sueflohn received his Bachelor of Arts degree in journalism, with concentrations in communications, psychology and sociology, from Nebraska in August 2016.

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH LEROY VEGA



Leroy Vega joined the Boilermakers as his volunteer assistant coach for the 2019-20 season. A three-time NCAA All-American, Vega works primarily with the lower weight classes.

Vega's name is widely known on the Indiana high school wrestling scene, from his days on the mat and to most recently, his days in the corner. He joins the Purdue staff after eight years as the head coach at his alma mater, Portage High School, in northwest Indiana. During his span as head coach, Vega had 41 Indiana High School Athletic Association state tournament qualifiers, with 10 appearing in the finals and three Portage wrestlers claiming an individual title. In 2015, the Indiana High School Wrestling Coaches Association named Vega its coach of the year.

As a prep at Portage, Vega was a two-time state champion in 1996 and 1997. His success translated on the international scene as well. In 1998, Vega placed ninth at 60 kg the UWW Junior Greco-Roman World Championships. The following year, competing at 54 kg in freestyle, he placed seventh at the world championships.

Vega wrestled collegiately at Minnesota from 1999 to 2002 and scattered his name throughout the legendary program. Individually, Vega earned All-America honors three times at 125 pounds and captured the Big Ten Conference 125-pound title in 2002. His performances helped the Gophers win three Big Ten team titles and back-to-back NCAA team titles in 2001 and 2002.

Vega tallied a career record of 135-26, with his 135 wins ranking fifth all-time at Minnesota and his .839 winning percentage ranking 17th. He owned a career dual record of 65-14, with the 65 wins tied for seventh on the Gophers' individual dual wins list.

Prior to his head coaching appointment at Portage, Vega was named the inaugural head coach at Calumet College of St. Joseph in Whiting, Indiana, with the birth of the program in 2008. He was at the helm through the 2009-10 season before returning to his roots in Portage.

Vega earned his Bachelor of Science degree in elementary education and teaching from Minnesota in 2002. He and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, LillyAnna and Lilah, and a son, Lydon.

GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH DANIEL LEWIS



Four-time NCAA All-American Daniel Lewis joined the Boilermaker wrestling program as a graduate assistant in 2019. The former Missouri Tiger competed at 165 and 174 pounds from 2015 to 2019, graduating as one of the top wrestlers in program history.

"It's not every day you have the opportunity to bring a four-time All-American into your room, and we're thrilled to welcome Daniel to our team," said Ersland. "His success on the mat speaks for itself, his abilities in the classroom are even more impressive and I can't wait to get him around our guys."

The Blue Springs, Missouri native racked up a career record of 118-17 for the Tigers, earning All-America at 165 pounds as a freshman and sophomore and then at 174 pounds in his final two seasons. He's one of only three four-time All-Americans in Missouri wrestling history, joining Ben Askren and J'Den Cox.

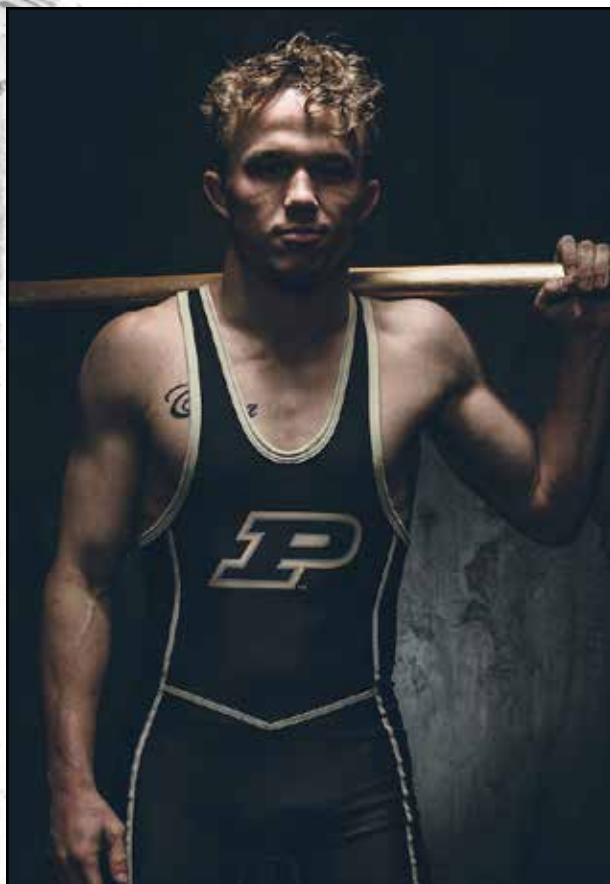
Lewis won four straight Mid-American Conference individual titles, leading Missouri to the team championship in every season and was named the MAC Most Outstanding Wrestler in 2018. Fifty-three of his 118 career wins came by fall (44.9%), good for second-most in Missouri history, and he took home the 2019 Gorarrian Award for recording the most falls at the NCAA Championships.

He earned MAC Freshman Wrestler of the Year honors and Missouri's Marshall Esteppe Most Outstanding Freshman award in 2016, finishing 29-6 at 165 pounds and finishing fourth at the NCAA Championships. He followed up with a 28-6 mark in 2017, again at 165, and took sixth at the national tournament.

After moving up to 174 pounds as a junior in 2017-18, Lewis reeled off 32 straight victories to start the season, including a flawless 26-0 mark in the regular season and his third straight MAC title. His 17 falls were a team and career high, and he went on to finish fourth at the NCAA Championships. Lewis's senior season brought a similar level of success, posting a 28-3 overall mark with 17 falls, earning his fourth straight MAC crown and another fourth-place effort at the national tournament. He went undefeated in duals over his final two years and finished 25-1 in dual competition for his career. He shared Missouri's Most Outstanding Wrestler honors in each of his last two seasons and was named the University of Missouri Male Athlete of the Year in 2019.

Lewis earned his Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering in May of 2019 from Missouri with an emphasis in aerospace engineering and will be pursuing his master's degree in Business Administration from the Krannert School of Management at Purdue. He completed a construction/property management internship with The Kroenke Group in Columbia, Missouri in the summer of 2018, and worked at ProCraft Mechanical in Broomfield, Colorado as a project operations intern in 2019.

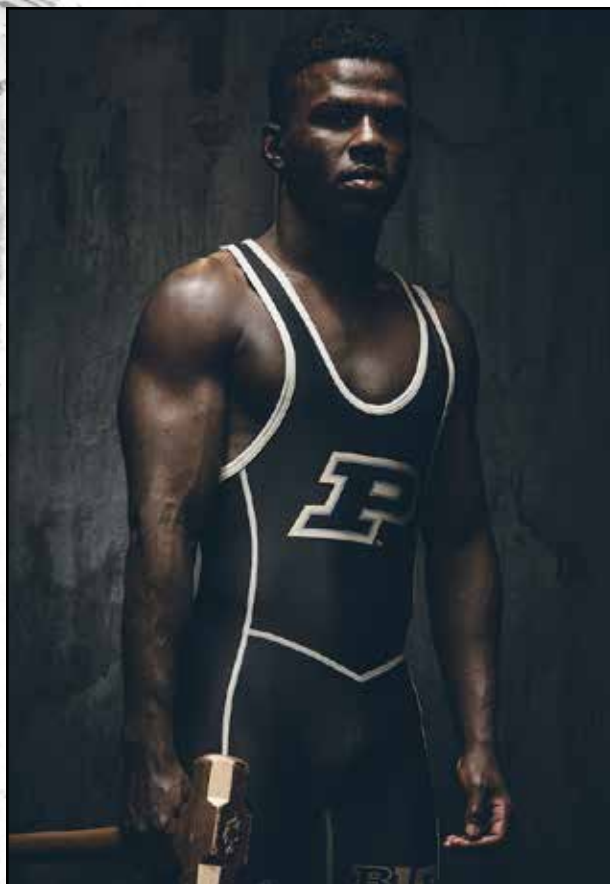

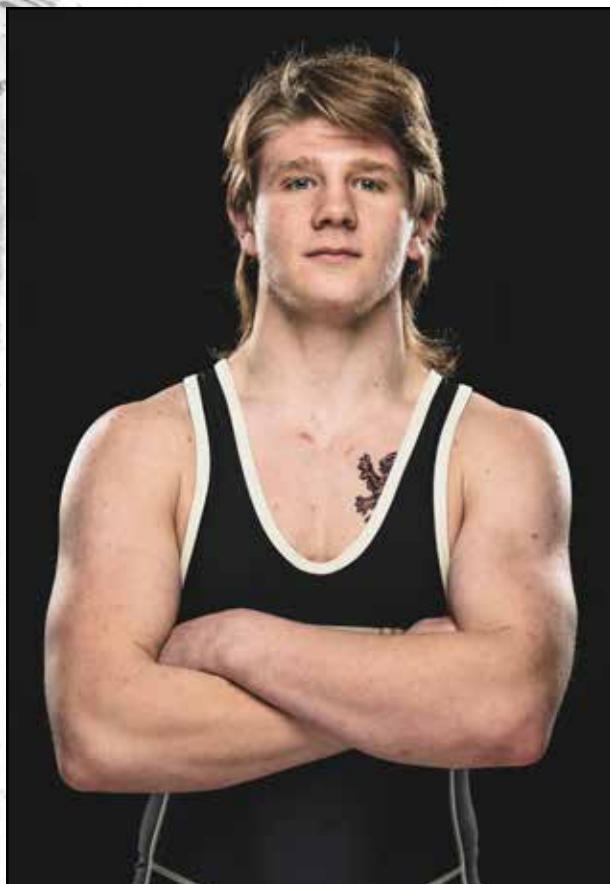

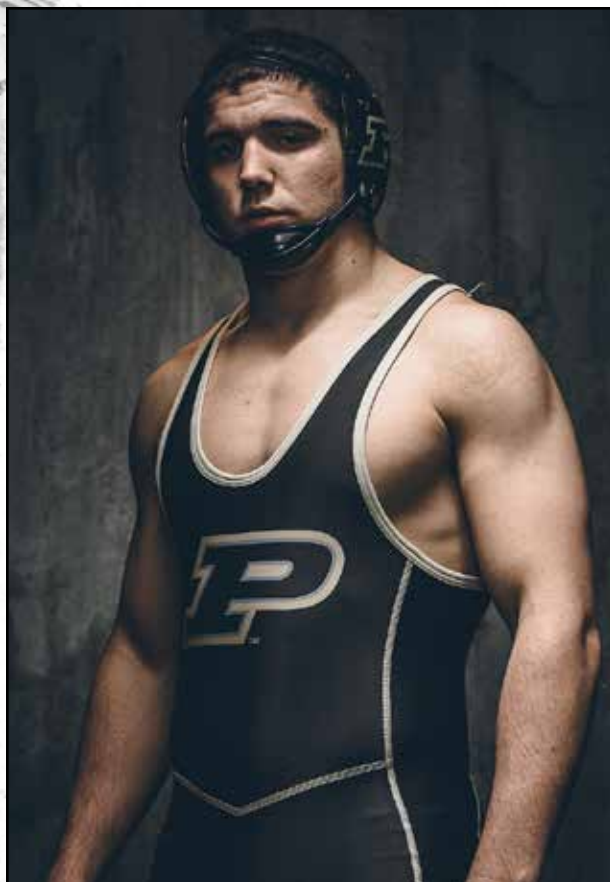
