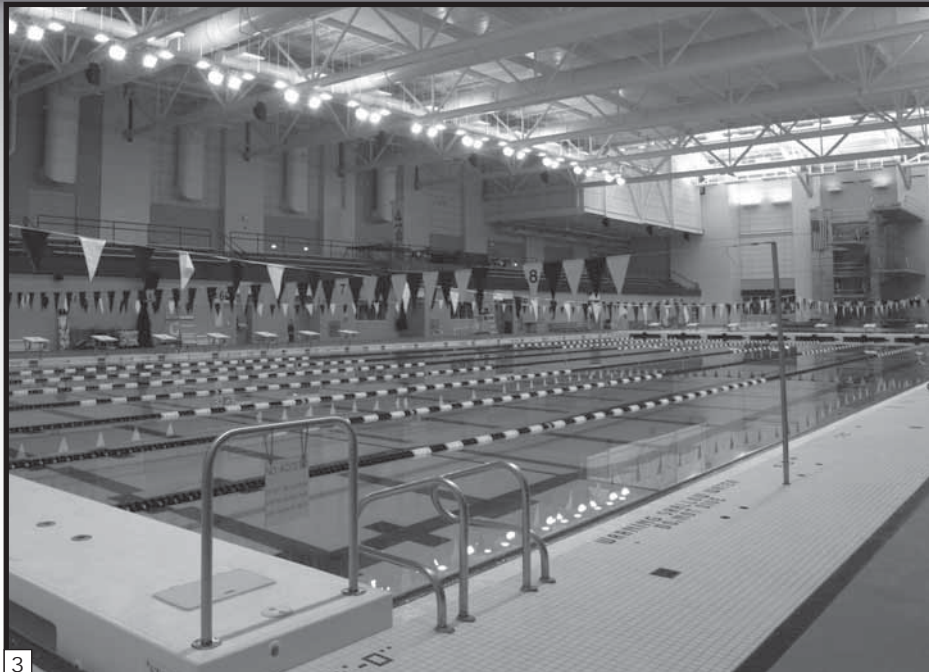

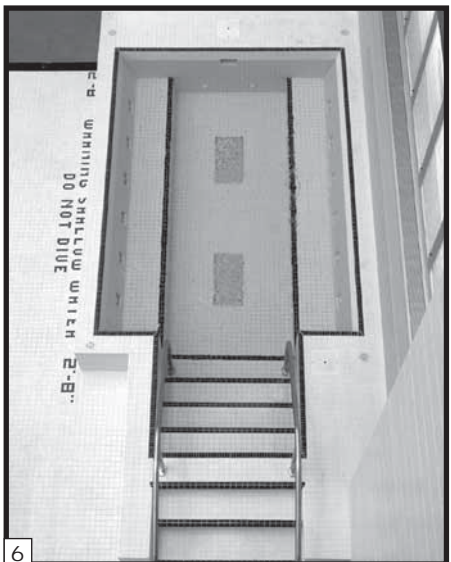

Photo Guide

1.) The center offers permanent seating for 700 fans, expandable to 1,400 with use of temporary bleachers.

2.) The center added a press row prior to hosting the 2005 NCAA Women's Swimming & Diving Championships.

3.) The eight-lane, 50-meter competition pool, with the use of two moveable bulkheads, allows reconfiguration as a 20-lane, 25-yard short course.


4.) An exclusive weight room is provided on site for swimmers and divers.

5.) In just five years, the center has welcomed some of the top national events, including the U.S. Open, two Big Ten Championships and the NCAA's. Purdue will play host to men's Big Ten Championships in 2009.

6.) A 12-person spa is a great asset to the divers who wait their turn during competition.

7.) The diving area boasts towers of 1, 3, 5, 7.5 and 10-meters in addition to two 1-meter and 3-meter springboards.



8.) A Daktronics scoreboard provides state-of-the-art scoring and allows live video coverage of events.

9.) The diving team has its own drydock practice area, which is located on the upper concourse of the center. Several new TiVO monitors were installed in 2005 allowing divers to take note of their form.

10.) A second harness system with rope and pulley was built over the diving well near the 3-meter springboards.

11.) An on-deck TiVO system allows athletes to watch their dives seconds after exiting the water. Above, diving coach Adam Soldati and Amanda Miller review proper technique.

12.) Another luxury for the divers is a trampoline/rope and pulley system, which allows them to practice their airborne movements.

13 & 14.) Record boards for swimming and diving were installed on the north and south ends of the pool shortly before the start of the 2005-06 campaign. The boards, which list varsity and pool records, are updated after the conclusion of the home season.

PRESIDENT FRANCE A. CORDOVA



An internationally recognized astrophysicist, France Córdova was chosen this past spring as the 11th president of Purdue University by a unanimous vote by its Board of Trustees.

Córdova, 59, had served at University of California, Riverside since 2002 as its chancellor, coming from the University of California at Santa Barbara where she had been vice chancellor for research and a professor of physics for six years. Before that, she was the first woman and youngest person to hold the position of NASA chief scientist, working on projects that included the Hubble Space Telescope.

J. Timothy McGinley, chairman of Purdue's Board of Trustees, announced Córdova's selection following a seven-month search for a successor to Martin C. Jischke, who retired this summer after serving as Purdue president since Aug. 14, 2000.

"Our trustees interviewed several very outstanding candidates who would have been excellent presidents, but France Córdova is the right person at the right time for Purdue," McGinley said. "The breadth of her expertise, as we might expect from an astrophysicist, enables me to make a powerful statement. Dr. France Córdova's resume is truly out of this world. She has distinguished herself as a scientist, an administrator and a creative writer. She is truly a Renaissance person."

Córdova said she and Purdue are on the same trajectory.

"I will never forget the day Purdue alumnus Neil Armstrong walked on the moon in 1969," Córdova said, recalling it was the same year she graduated cum laude with a degree in English from Stanford University and a Ph.D. in Physics from the California Institute of Technology. "It

eventually drew me to the California Institute of Technology, where I began exploring the mysteries of the universe. And now I've come full circle - to Purdue, the cradle of astronauts and the place that played a major role in launching my quest.

"The opportunity to lead one of America's great universities is a wonderful privilege for me. I have tremendous respect for the achievements of Purdue under Martin Jischke's leadership, and I look forward to working with the faculty, staff and students here."

After earning her doctorate in physics from Cal Tech in 1979, Córdova spent the next decade at Los Alamos National Laboratory as a member of the Space Astronomy and Astrophysics Group. She then joined Penn State University to head the Department of Astronomy and Astrophysics.

In 1993, she began work at NASA, serving as the primary scientific advisor to the NASA administrator and the principal interface between NASA headquarters and the broader scientific community. During this time, she served on the National Science and Technology Council's Fundamental Science Committee.

Córdova's scientific contributions have been in the areas of observational and experimental astrophysics, multi-spectral research on X-ray and gamma ray sources, and space-borne instrumentation. Her multi-spectral approach uses telescopes on the ground and in space to approach a more comprehensive understanding of cosmic sources of radiation.

She has published more than 150 scientific papers and reports and has a current experiment flying on the European Space Agency's X-Ray Multi-Mirror Mission.

She is the winner of NASA's highest

honor, the Distinguished Service Medal, and was recognized as a 2000 Kilby Laureate for "contributions to society through science, technology, innovation, invention and education."

She was the award-winning author in 1969 of a short work of fiction, "The Women of Santo Domingo," based on her anthropologic field work in a Zapotec Indian pueblo in Oaxaca, Mexico, and a Zapotec Indian cookbook. For that, she won a guest editorship with *Mademoiselle* magazine and the opportunity to write a feature travel article on Israel. She also wrote and edited for the *Los Angeles Times News Service*.

In 1984, Córdova was named one of "America's 100 Brightest Scientists Under 40" by *Science Digest* magazine and was named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by *Hispanic Business Magazine*, which also recognized her with the Hispanic Achievement Award in Science and Technology.

She was a distinguished professor at UC Riverside, where she taught astrobiology. She is a member of numerous professional associations and currently serves on the boards of directors for the American Council on Education and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges. In 1997, she was awarded an honorary doctorate by Loyola Marymount University, Los Angeles.

The oldest of 12 children, Córdova was born in Paris and spent a few years in Germany, where her father served as the Chief of Missions for CARE, a U. S. relief organization. She graduated from high school in La Puente, Calif., east of Los Angeles.

An avid sports enthusiast, Córdova also enjoys running, canoeing, hiking and cross-country skiing. Córdova met her husband, Christian J. Foster, a science educator, while rock climbing outside Los Alamos, N.M. They have two college-age children.



ATHLETICS DIRECTOR MORGAN J. BURKE



Now in his 15th year as director of intercollegiate athletics, Morgan Burke embodies the Boilermaker spirit that drew him back to his alma mater.

During his tenure, the women's basketball team captured the national championship, football embarked on a run of nine bowl games in 10 years and

the men's basketball team achieved an unprecedented string of back-to-back Big Ten Conference championships.

Burke has been called the athletics director who came down from the grandstands because he was an avid fan and member of the John Purdue Club long before he was appointed to lead Intercollegiate Athletics in 1992. No one wants to see the Boilermakers prevail in competition more than Burke, and few expend more energy in cheering them on to victory. But Burke views the academic accomplishments and athletic exploits as far greater than the sum of their parts.

"We strive to make the student-athlete experience as enriching and meaningful as possible," says Burke, who was captain of the Boilermaker swim team his senior year. "These young men and women come to us with great abilities and potential, and we do all we can as coaches and administrators to help them develop fully as leaders and citizens who will make the world a better place than they found it."

In Burke's time at the helm of Purdue Intercollegiate Athletics, performances on and off the field reflect the high expectations that heralded his hiring.

In 1992, the Purdue Board of Trustees voted unanimously to declare the intention to establish "a nationally prominent athletic organization that is excellent in all respects." That meant making up ground on the other schools in the Big Ten and achieving in the classroom at the level of the general student body. It meant winning and playing by the rules. It meant getting to more bowl games in football, more NCAA Tournament basketball games and other postseason contests, and it meant building new facilities and improving the others to attract the top coaching and student-athlete talent to West Lafayette.

A 1973 industrial management graduate, Burke was a member of Phi Beta Kappa scholastic honorary. After graduation, he continued at Purdue and earned a master's degree in industrial relations in 1975. In 1980, he graduated with a law degree from John Marshall Law School in Chicago. He pursued a successful career with Inland Steel Co. after law school, moving through 13 positions in an 18-year span. He was vice president when he departed to become athletics director.

When Burke succeeded George King as AD on Jan. 1, 1993, Purdue had a solid reputation for playing hard and playing by the rules. Burke pledged to build on the foundation already in place. Working with coaches and staff, aggressive goals were set.

On the athletics side, Burke's expectation was to improve the position of Purdue teams in the Big Ten and nationally. During his tenure, squads have made significant strides by both measures. In 2003-04 and 2006-07, 13 teams placed in the upper half of the Big

Ten, a record number in Burke's time at Purdue. That figure compares with six squads in the upper half of the conference standings in 1992-93. On the national scene, the Boilermakers have gone from 81st in 1994-95 to 35th in 2005-06 and 2006-07 among 300 NCAA Division I programs.

Similar excellence was expected in the classroom – to match or surpass the overall grade-point average of the general student body. That goal has been achieved each of the last 20 semesters. Following the 2007 spring semester, the cumulative GPA for all current Purdue student-athletes was a record 2.98. In addition, the four-year average graduation rate has risen to 72 percent.

More specifically, Burke articulated an expectation for all areas of Intercollegiate Athletics to make measurable improvement.

Because Intercollegiate Athletics writes a check to the University for scholarships, financial resources had to be expanded greatly to support all sports. Burke challenged Purdue alumni and fans to get on board to propel Boilermaker athletics to greatness. He set a goal of doubling the size of the 4,350-member John Purdue Club as well as doubling the \$2.5 million raised annually to support student-athletes. Both goals have been achieved, with JPC memberships now at 9,000 and annual dollars raised to support scholarships and academic support services in excess of \$7 million.

Burke and his staff have set a high standard for the future. As a rallying point on the road to preeminence, administrators coined the term "25/75 Club" to articulate a vision of an intercollegiate athletics organization that achieves an average finish in the top 25 across all sports and graduates 75 percent of student-athletes. Precious few institutions achieve this lofty status. They are Duke, North Carolina, Notre Dame, Penn State and Stanford.

Regular upgrades of competition and practice venues are vital in attracting and retaining top-student athlete and coaching talent, and that's why Burke and his staff have identified and addressed a number of facility priorities since the start of the new millennium.

In spring 2001, work started on the \$70 million dollar renovation of Ross-Ade Stadium. The remade Ross-Ade boasts vastly expanded concessions and restrooms along a wider concourse, new concrete throughout, wider aisles and individual seats, and increased seating for fans in wheelchairs. The crown of this project is the Ross-Ade Pavilion, which houses suites, indoor and outdoor club seats, the Buchanan and Shively stadium clubs, facilities for the working press and game-day staff, and offices for the John Purdue Club and marketing staff.

The Boilermaker Aquatic Center – featuring the Doris Z. Holloway Pool – opened its doors to the delight of swimmers and divers in the fall of 2001 and since then has played host to several championship events: 2005 NCAA Women's Championships, 2003 and 2004 Big Ten Championships, 2002 and 2005 NCAA Diving Zones and 2006 U.S. Open.

Purdue's golf complex has undergone several facelifts over the past decade. Pete Dye's redesign of the "north course" – now known as the Kampen Course – instantly placed Purdue's golf facilities on the national map, as the Boilermakers played host to the 2003 NCAA Women's Championships. The Birck Boilermaker Golf Complex is the site for the 2008 NCAA Men's Championships in June. The newest

addition is the Tom Spurgeon indoor training center, which was dedicated in 2005.

Purdue's volleyball program, which advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament in 2005 and 2006, received several major upgrades to its court within the Intercollegiate Athletic Facility. The volleyball court was revamped over the summer of 2006 and named after Boilermaker supporters Ron and Kay Belin.

The Dennis J. and Mary Lou Schwartz Tennis Center opened its doors in December of 2006, just in time to play host to the 2007 Big Ten Men's Championships. The Big Ten will return in 2008 for the women's championships.

Finally, the Mollenkopf Athletic Center got a makeover during the spring and summer of 2006. The 16-year-old AstroTurf was replaced with state-of-the-art FieldTurf, while the walls of the indoor practice facility were repainted and adorned with banners that pay tribute to Purdue's rich football heritage. The field was named after Richard, Alice and Kimra Schleicher.

But there still is work to be done. In May of 2007, the Board of Trustees awarded a contract to HNTB Architecture of Kansas City, Mo., for an \$82 million venture that will result in a complete makeover of Mackey Arena, the venerable home of Boilermaker basketball for the last 40 years. In addition to revitalizing the campus landmark as a basketball arena, the Mackey Complex project will benefit all student-athletes with the addition of new sports medicine and strength and weight training facilities.

HNTB also has been retained to plan the development of the "Northwest Athletics Site" – where soccer and tennis currently reside – to include new stadiums for baseball, softball and track and field over the next 10 years.

Another goal of Burke's was to involve former student-athletes in the life of the department, to counsel and question, and provide ideas to keep the organization sharp. In 1993, he established an advisory council made up of 24 student-athlete alumni. The group meets annually to hear reports and make suggestions to Burke and senior administrators.

In 2003, former student-athletes found a new home in Intercollegiate Athletics with the founding of the Varsity P Club. A subset of the John Purdue Club, the Varsity P Club welcomes back Boilermaker athletes each fall for golf, good times and the Ross-Ade Stadium roar.

Burke, 55, is married to the former Catherine J. (Kate) Mullane, a Purdue alumna and pharmacist. They have three children: Joyce, Morgan Jr. and Patrick. Joyce is a Purdue alumna working as a materials engineer; she and her husband, Ryan, reside in Austin, Texas. Morgan Jr., a Purdue graduate, is a landscape architect and works with a firm in San Francisco. Patrick is attending Purdue in the College of Engineering.

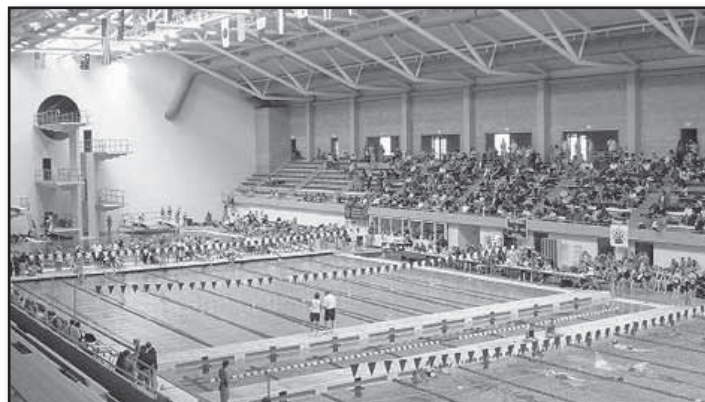

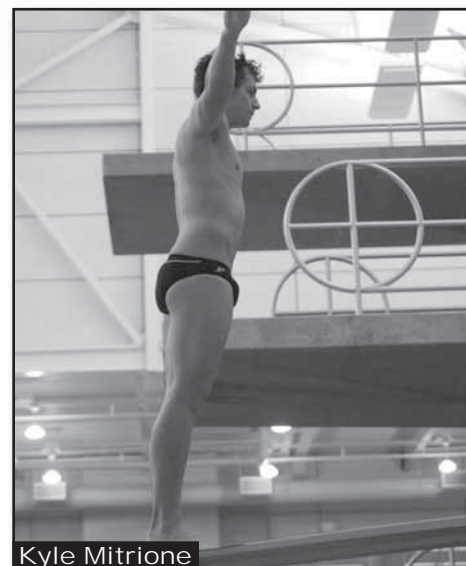

Head Swimming Coach 23rd Season at Purdue

Dan Ross is in his 23rd year as head coach of the Purdue men's swimming and diving team and in his 31st year of association with Boilermaker aquatics. With an all-time dual meet record of 138-114 (.548), Ross has seen and implemented many improvements in the Boilermaker program.

Ross became the longest-tenured of all 14 Boilermaker head coaches following Gene Keady's retirement after the 2004-05 men's basketball campaign. Ross' counterpart on the women's side, Cathy Wright-Eger, has been in place as head coach for the last 21 seasons.

lowering their career bests in the freestyle and Jon Ranochak finishing ninth in the 100 fly at Big Ten's with a personal record of 47.75.

However, it was junior Romain Maire, who made the biggest impact of all on the program. Maire, a three-time NCAA qualifier, erased a long-standing record in the 400 individual medley (3:47.33) and set two more school records with the 400 (2:57.41) and 800 freestyle (6:34.63) relays.

Maire's top 400 IM time earned him runner-up status at Big Ten's and a spot on the all-conference second team. He also captured third in the 200 IM with a mark of 1:46.65.

New Kids Off The Blocks

Purdue was able to maintain its standing at the Big Ten and NCAA Championships in 2006-07 despite an infusion of young and unproven talent. Ross' incoming class of recruits did not take long to adjust to the rigors of collegiate swimming as they splashed their names into the record books and made waves at the conference championship meet in almost every event.

Iliia Ayzenshtok joined the team in January of 2007 and clocked the program's fourth-best time in the 100 backstroke of 49.01 just over a month after his arrival. His time also earned him 11th place at Big Ten's, as did his 200 back mark of 1:46.26.

Aaron Koger appears to be the next in a long line of great Purdue breaststroke swimmers, joining Giordan Pogioli, Tamas Bessenyei and Vilmos Kovacs. As a rookie, Koger was a consolation finalist in both breaststroke races at Big Tens, and he also posted the school's fourth and fifth fastest times in the 100 (54.78) and 200 breast (2:00.29).

Sam Wilcher brought the same spark to the butterfly as Koger and Ayzenshtok did to the breaststroke and backstroke. Wilcher placed seventh at Big Ten's in the 200 fly (1:46.94) and 12th in the 100 fly (48.40). His prelim times were slightly faster at 48.11 and 1:46.77.

Prior to their Big Ten debuts, Wilcher and Koger scored for the Boilermakers at the U.S. Open, which was hosted by Purdue's Boilermaker Aquatic Center. Wilcher took 12th in the finals of the 100-meter fly at 55.55, while Koger placed 14th in the 100-meter breast at 1:05.22.

Last year wasn't just about the rookies. Ross also made sure that his upperclassmen kept progressing through the championship season.

Among the many highlights provided by the veterans were John Schmitt and Eddie Kenney

Bragging Rights

During his career at Purdue, Ross has coached 15 individual Big Ten champions plus one relay team, 15 individual NCAA All-Americans (including honorable mentions) and several international competitors. Among the international competitions that Ross' swimmers have participated in: Olympics and Olympic Trials, FINA World Championships, FINA Open Water World Championships, World University Games, Southeast Asian Games, Pan American Games, Pan Pacific Games and the Maccabian Games.

He has coached nine Purdue swimmers to the U.S. Olympic Trials, including Pogioli, Nick Cenci and 2003 graduate Javier Diaz, who is a three-time Olympian (1996, 2000, 2004). Diaz competed for Mexico at the 2003 World University Games in Korea and was a member of the 800 freestyle relay team at the 2004 Summer Olympics.

At the 1992 Olympic Trials, Brian Daly and John Klinge swam the 200 back. In 1996, Matt Brown competed in the 200 and 400 IM's. And in 2000, Matt Martin swam the 400 free, the 1,500 free and the 400 IM; junior Tad Sayce swam the 100 fly; John Wakefield competed in the 100 back and senior Jon Duncan swam the 100 free.

Adding to his personal success, Ross has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year twice for his leadership of the 1987-88 and 1996-97 squads.

More recently, Ross served as an assistant on Dennis Dale's staff at the 2007 World University Games in Bangkok, Thailand. Dale, who serves as the men's head coach at the University of Minnesota, named Ross assistant coach along with Northwestern's Bob Groseth and Ohio State's Bill Wadley. Ross was joined

at the World University Games by Boilermakers Romain Maire, Amanda Miller, Giordan Pogioli, Zach Schultz and Adam and Kimiko Soldati.

Speedo Smarts

Ross has been able to establish a program known for its academic excellence. He encourages a balance between school, swimming and social activities in all his swimmers' lives. Because of that balance, Ross has produced four CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in Brian Daly (1993), Dean Fredette (1994), Matt Brown (1997) and Louis Paul (2005) and several more honorable mention selections since his start at Purdue. In the spring of 2006, Pogioli was named to a second-consecutive CoSIDA Academic All-America all-district team.

Ross also has mentored over a dozen CSCAA Academic All-America and honorable mention selections, as well as 82 Academic All-Big Ten athletes and five Big Ten Medal of Honor winners in Daly (1992), Brown (1997), Kovacs (1999), Paul (2005) and Pogioli (2006).

At the start of the 2007-08 school year, Ross' team and five other Boilermaker intercollegiate programs were presented with the school's second-annual "25/75" award. Men's swimming and diving was honored because it finished among the national top 25 during the 2006-07 athletic year while maintaining a cumulative grade-point average that met or exceeded expectations over four consecutive semesters, thereby supporting Purdue's goal of reaching a 75 percent graduation rate.

Ross' program has received this award in back-to-back years along with women's

basketball, women's golf and women's swimming and diving.

Of the 36 student-athletes on the 2006-07 roster, 25 either made the Purdue Coach's Honor Roll or Athletics Director's Honor Roll. Coach's Honor Roll recognizes those Boilermakers with a semester GPA between 3.0 and 3.49; the AD's Honor Roll is made of student-athletes with semester GPA's of 3.5 or higher.

Bleeding Gold and Black

Ross' involvement with Purdue swimming and diving began in 1977, when he walked on to the swim team. He competed in the individual medley and middle distance freestyle events. In 1980, Ross received the Most Improved Swimmer Award and was named team co-captain in 1981.

After graduating, Ross continued at Purdue in a quarter-time position during the 1981-82 season and then served as a half-time assistant coach the next year. He was given the full-time assistant position from 1983 to 1985, and in 1985 he landed the head coaching position.

The Family Guy

A native of North Augusta, S.C., Ross earned a B.A. in exercise physiology in 1984 from Purdue and is married to the former Sally Johnson, also a Purdue graduate, former swimmer and 1980 two-event Big Ten champion. Sally is a coach and administrator for Boilermaker Aquatics, West Lafayette's local USA Swimming club. The Ross family resides in West Lafayette and has three sons: Eric (18), Matt (16), and Andrew (12).

SEASON PREVIEW Q&A



How was your first experience working with a U.S. National team?

I never had the opportunity to represent United States swimming prior to this year, so it felt special to wear the colors and to meet important people in this industry such as FINA president George Killian, who knew (former Purdue men's basketball coach) Gene Keady from their days in Hutchinson, Kan. I also got to work with an outstanding staff comprised of Big Ten coaches and hang out with (USA National Team Coach) Mark Schubert.

We left the states in late July and first went to Singapore to train for a week before going to Thailand for the World University Games. We were basically the test group for the 2008 Olympic team in that we trained and practiced in all the same places it will next year. We provided feedback regarding the facilities, hotel, food and everything else.

It was exciting to be around different cultures, but we didn't see much of it in Singapore since we were working all the time and didn't get much of a chance to leave the five-star hotel. Of course, no one will forget seeing monkeys climb on the roof of the country club pool and begin shaking the light fixtures.

Once we got to Thailand, it was completely different. We stayed in the Olympic village with 14,000 others and everyone wanted to get their hands on USA apparel. As for me, I got to work directly with six outstanding student-athletes, including Pat Mellors, who is among the top three fastest American swimmers in the 400 individual medley.

The amount of traveling I did this summer will make all my future trips pale in comparison. Being on a three or four-hour flight to San Diego will seem like nothing.

What are your expectations for Romain Maire as he enters his final season as a Boilermaker?

I'm excited for Romain. Last year was his best as a Boilermaker; he posted the best Big Ten meet of his career and his times at NCAA's were just short of scoring. He's a tough kid, who swims tough events and is in a tough major (aeronautical engineering). He's also still a kid who cares about always doing the right thing, which can sometimes add unwanted stress.

Compared to other years, I think Romain is now at his most comfortable and knows who he is and what he's trying to do. He is taking the role of a team captain very seriously – he even attended a leadership conference with other student-athletes in Orlando, Fla. – and wants to do his very best for Purdue University before he gets caught up in personal

goals such as Olympic Trials.

I think this past summer was tough for him personally, but at the same time, he looked great at the World University games in the 200 backstroke and fared pretty well at the French National Championships. The whole time he was in France, I was over here writing his practices for him over 4,000 miles away – that was hard, but it shows how committed he is to me and his teammates.

Romain has taken the initiative to return in the best physical shape of his career and plans to score at NCAA's and win at Big Ten's. I also believe he should be a contender for Purdue's Athlete of the Year.

How does this sophomore group compare to previous second-year classes you've coached?

It's always hard to compare, but our sophomores remind me of what we had here in the late 1980's with Doug Wagner, Andy Renie and Doug Everhart among others. The similarity is that they're a talented and cocky bunch – in a good way. The difference is that not everyone from last year's freshman class was heavily recruited, and although some were, a lot of these guys are performing at a much higher level than originally anticipated.

Sam Wilcher, a junior national champion, was one of our earliest commitments, and as expected, went out and produced outstanding times in the 100 and 200 butterfly. But there are others we know needed that one year of collegiate swimming experience and will swim faster now because of it.

Aaron Koger's shoulder tightened up on him during the spring and had to have surgery, so he's still in the recovery process and doing whatever the trainers tell him. I know he'll be behind the curve this first semester, but I'm hopeful he'll end up coming back at 100 percent. He's the fastest one as we run the stairs at the pool and is showing a high level of determination.

What's your initial take on the freshmen?

We're not going to count on the freshmen as much in year's past, so it will be nice to receive any help from them. They're a small group of four swimmers – two scholarship, two walkons – plus diver David Colturi, who is one of the best platform competitors out there. The addition of David has solidified our diving group.

Matthew Stewart is a true talent. He can help the team right away and make us look good in the distance freestyle races. The other guys we've brought in are talented, but know they'll be given plenty of time to develop.

Are the expectations higher with bringing back 10 seniors and a number of Big Ten scorers?

There's a lot of experience within this class, and while they're not the most talented I've had at Purdue, I really admire their dedication to the team concept. They are verbal leaders, who are very effective in their words and actions, and I've begun to see changes in the overall team chemistry for the better. They are presented with an unique opportunity to lead a very raw and talented group of swimmers and divers to unprecedented heights at Big Ten's and NCAA's.

It's time for all these guys to think they can be part of a top-three team at the Big Ten Championships and a top-10 squad at nationals. I've put these goals out there for the taking; now they have to attain them.

We've put in a lot of time and resources into diving, and it's more than paid off, now we have to send a couple relays to NCAA's. The challenge is always setting higher expectations and performing to the top of your abilities without going overboard. You have to remain on an even keel.

Who will be on the relays that can get to NCAA's?

Our most improved relay is the 200 freestyle since we've got four guys who have been 20 flat. Our leadoff swimmer is going to be a transfer from West Virginia, Andrew Langenfeld, who we've seen record a 19.8. He'll be joined by Eddie Kenney, Jon Schmitt and John Mullen. These same four should comprise our 400 free relay, but it will be tough to keep off Craig Thompson or Romain.

We have three-quarters of an NCAA-caliber 800 free relay together, which will be Romain, Craig, John Schmitt and then maybe Langenfeld, a new guy like Matthew Stewart, or maybe Luke Zehrung or David Hedge.

Ilia Ayzenshtok is projected to lead off both our 200 and 400 medleys, and sometimes I think he's the best backstroke swimmer I've ever coached. Behind Ilia, we'll want to start Aaron Koger for the breaststroke leg, but if he's not recovered then we can go with Jin-Soo (Kim) or Nate Taylor.

We have three great options for the butterfly. I think we'll see Sam Wilcher on the 400 medley, and either Jon Ranochak or Andrew (Langenfeld) for the 200 - both are very fast in the 50 fly. Andrew and Eddie Kenney are our best swimmers to handle the 50 free of a 200 medley, and we'll go with John Schmitt to anchor our 400 medley.

How do you see diving helping the program this season?

(Diving coach) Adam (Soldati) is working with a full cupboard. As I said before, David (Colturi) is one of the best recruits in the country, and we bring back Kyle Mitrione, J.P. Perez and Zach Schultz - all of whom should flourish this year. We're probably going to redshirt Danny (Cox). He had shoulder surgery over the summer and we have to make sure he heals correctly.

Adam has done a great job of recruiting and adding to prestige of the program that was initiated by Wenbo, who brought us Carrie McCambridge, Amanda Miller and Steve LoBue. Adam's age-group and club experience has truly benefitted our program and I expect we'll continue to receive Olympic-quality student-athletes that will put us over the top. In fact, this year's class of freshman for him, may have been his best yet. And since all these kids are so young, we're going to be loaded by the time we play host to men's Big Ten's in 2009 and all the women's championship meets in 2010; we will have a fearsome group.

And even though J. is not a big talker, he's organized and super smart - he's a true math whiz. I'm excited to have him as part of this team and hope he sticks around for some time.

ADAM SOLDATI



Head Diving Coach 3rd Season at Purdue

Adam Soldati has solidified his reputation as one of the best collegiate diving coaches in just two short years at Purdue.

For starters, Soldati guided four student-athletes to the 2007 NCAA Championships, where they combined for five All-America and three Honorable Mention All-America citations. Senior Amanda Miller shined on the national stage as she was the lone female competitor to earn All-America status on all three boards.

First-time NCAA qualifiers Danny Cox and Zach Schultz showed no signs of anxiety during their highly anticipated debuts. Schultz earned All-America status in his first event with a seventh-place total of 330.10 points off the 1-meter springboard. He followed that performance with a 15th-place showing on 3-meter (332.60) and a seventh-place finish on tower (347.50). Cox took 16th on 3-meter (327.25) and placed 11th on tower (368.15).

Purdue diving also was the talk of the conference meets as Soldati's men's and women's squads combined for 241 points. If Purdue diving were allowed to compete as its own team at last year's Big Ten Championships, it would have outscored four schools on the women's side (Ohio State, Illinois, Iowa and Michigan State) and two on the men's side (Iowa and Michigan State).

The Boilermakers did not earn any conference titles, but they were the most consistent group by far. All four individuals on the men's roster scored in all three events, including freshmen Cox, J.P. Perez and Kyle Mittrione.

Miller did not place lower than third on any board at Big Ten's and received a spot on the all-conference second team for finishing as the runner-up on 3-meter with 378.90 points. After scoring only two divers on one-meter, Purdue responded with five scores on 3-meter and four more on platform.

The Purdue varsity record board experience more upheaval during Soldati's second year. Miller broke Carrie McCambridge's 1-meter record with 340.20 points at NCAA and posted new personal bests of 378.90 and 314.50 on 3-meter and platform. Freshman Ashley Karnes posted the third highest 3-meter score in school history with 326.80 points at the Big Ten's.

Steve LoBue set a new school record on 1-meter in November with 369.95 points, but was eclipsed later in the season by Schultz, who posted a 377.45 against Minnesota and Wisconsin. LoBue, however, did leave the program as its 3-meter record holder, scoring 377.33 points at Northwestern.

Perez, with 368.15 points scored at Big Tens, is second to LoBue on the 3-meter varsity record list. The Ohio native also cracked the program's top-five list on platform with 351.45 points.

Two of Cox' scores at NCAA's are also ranked among the best five in Purdue history. Cox accumulated 368.15 points on tower and 353.90 points during 3-meter prelims.

Cox received one of the program's biggest honors of the season, as he was named Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Year with Ohio State's Berkley Showe. Cox recorded three top-six showings at the

conference championships, including third place on tower with 364.50 points.

Soldati believes that success in the collegiate ranks is only the first step for his student-athletes. Not only does Soldati want his divers aspiring to become conference champions and All-Americans, he wants them to see the bigger picture - the Olympics. And Soldati has the experience to get them there.

Soldati worked through the summer of 2007 to help Miller and Schultz with their scheduled international competitions. Both Boilermakers competed at April's U.S. Nationals and later made their way onto Team USA for the World University Games in Bangkok, Thailand.

Miller competed in two FINA meets in Spain and Italy prior to the World University Games. She and Christina Loukas won silver medals at both meets in the 3-meter synchro; Miller also placed fifth off 1-meter in Rome.

Miller and Schultz both reached the finals of their respective events at the World University Games. Miller received a bronze medal with teammate Christina Loukas after the duo placed third in the 3-meter synchronized competition with a high score of 319.80 points. The duo will continue training together for the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China.

Schultz finished 12th in the 3-meter springboard final. Schultz entered as the 11th seed and scored 353.50 points in the championship session.

Prior to his arrival at Purdue last summer, Soldati worked with Olympic gold-medal coach Kenny Armstrong at the U.S. Diving National Training Center outside Houston. During his tenure, Soldati worked side-by-side with several Olympians, including Laura Wilkinson, Troy and Justin Dumais, Justin Wilcox, and Kimiko Soldati.

As head coach for the Woodlands Diving national team, Soldati guided three divers (J.J. Kinzbach, Harrison Jones and Jessica Livingston) to the finals of 2004 Olympic Trials and five divers (Kinzbach, Jones, Drew Livingston, Jessica Livingston and Whitney Wielgus) to Senior Nationals. Kinzbach also qualified for the U.S. National Team. Soldati finished the summer taking Kinzbach and Jones to the Junior World Championships.

Following his graduation from Indiana University in 1997, Soldati founded Indiana Diving and Youth Development while serving as the Hoosiers' assistant coach and diving events director. Both programs succeeded at the highest levels with his involvement.

From June 1997 to January 2000, Soldati's club program advanced six athletes to the U.S. Senior National Diving Championships, plus four finalists and eight athletes to the U.S. Junior National Championships and earned one national championship. At the same time, he was helping his Hoosiers win three-consecutive national diving titles from 1998 to 2000.

Soldati, 31, is married to Kimiko Hirai Soldati, who was a member of 2004 U.S. Olympic Diving Team. The couple's first child, Blake, was born in November of 2005.

Asst. Swimming Coach 1st Season at Purdue



J. Agnew is Purdue men's swimming and diving new assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. He started working with the Boilermakers on Aug. 1, 2007.

Agnew replaced four-year assistant Bill Weaver, who resigned in May to pursue a master's degree in environmental engineering.

Before accepting the job at Purdue, Agnew was a successful coach with Yorktown High School and the Yorktown Swim Club. Agnew's knowledge of the Indiana recruiting base greatly impressed Purdue head coach Dan Ross.

"Jay is not only one of the most respected coaches in Indiana, but across the nation," said Ross, who is preparing to lead the Boilermakers for a 23rd season. "A lot of people could have taken this job, but J. wanted it the most and is ready to accept the challenge. He's going to work very hard in this position."

Agnew brought the Yorktown H.S. swimming program to unprecedented heights during his seven-year tenure, coaching eight individual state champions and 22 high school All-Americans. In his final season with the Tigers, Agnew produced seven swimmers who are continuing on to compete for NCAA Division I schools.

The Yorktown boys and girls squads combined for 10 top-10 state finishes under Agnew's watch, which included a runner-up showing by his girls' team in 2006. Agnew was named Indiana High School Girl's Swimming Coach of the Year following the 2003-04 season after leading the team to a fourth-place finish.

Ross said he's had his eye on Agnew for a long time and wanted him to

apply for the vacancy that was eventually filled by Weaver in 2003.

"Purdue wasn't the right fit for J. four years ago, but he was more than ready this time around to accept our offer," said Ross. "This was the best pool of candidates I've come across, and I give a lot of credit to Bill and Adam (Soldati) for helping make this program such an appealing one."

Agnew graduated from Ball State University in 1996 with a bachelor of science degree in mathematics education.

J. and his wife Kelly have two daughters, Hayley and Neely.



Vol. Diving Coach 3rd Season at Purdue

A 2004 member of the U.S. Olympic diving team, Soldati's list of accomplishments in athletics and academics is nearly endless. Her most recent accolades include 3-meter championships at the 2004 U.S. National and Olympic Trial meets and a 10-meter synchro title with Laura Wilkinson at the 2004 American Cup.

Soldati began her collegiate career at Colorado State but transferred to Indiana for the start of the 1994-95 season. After one year of redshirting, Soldati qualified for her first NCAA Championship and was victorious in 1-meter competition. For her efforts, she was selected as IU's 1996 Female Athlete of the Year.

Not only was Soldati rewarded by IU for her athletic accomplishments, but her academic endeavors as well. Soldati earned a degree in kinesiology from IU in 1997, sporting a perfect 4.0 grade-point average, and was chosen as her school's valedictorian. In December of 2001, Soldati received her masters degree in athletic administration/sports management again maintaining a solid 4.0. A former GTE Academic All-American, Soldati twice received the Jack D. Tichenor Award (in 1996 and 1997), which is presented to those students who achieve the highest degree of academic excellence.

Soldati earned her spot on the USA national team right out of college in 1998, and became the first female in U.S. Diving history to qualify for finals in all five events at the National Championships. In the fall of 2000, Soldati made the move to The Woodlands, Texas, with her husband, to train with Olympic coach Kenny Armstrong.

Soldati and Armstrong proved to be a winning combination. At the 2001 Spring National Diving Championships, Soldati won the 1-meter title and earned silver medals off the 3-meter and 10-meter tower. These performances qualified her for her first major international competitions, the World Championships and Goodwill Games.

In September of 2001, Soldati shocked the world by winning a bronze medal for the United States on 3-meter springboard at the Goodwill Games after the media had speculated that women's springboard was the least likely event to earn a medal for the United States. Ironically, it ended up being the sole medal the U.S. was able to garner.

In 2002 Soldati went to the World Cup and won a silver medal in the 10 meter platform. She also made the finals in three other events, finishing among the top five of all three. Later that summer at the national championships, Soldati won her first National title on 3-meter springboard.

A two time U.S. Diver of the Year in 2001 and 2002, Soldati again qualified for the World Cup with partner Laura Wilkinson on 10-meter synchronized and brought home a spot for the Olympic Games. She also made the World Cup in 3-meter and 3-meter synchronized with Erin Quinn.

In addition to helping the Boilermaker divers, Soldati serves as a motivational speaker for different groups and causes. In the fall of 2005, Soldati gave the keynote address at the Academy for Eating Disorders national convention in Indianapolis. Soldati also plays an active part on the Revolve Tour, which is a Christian faith-based concert series and program designed specifically for teenage girls.

Soldati jumped into the broadcast booth during the summer of 2007, providing coverage of the FINA/USA Grand Prix and the Kaiser Permanente National Diving Championships for the AT&T blue room web site.

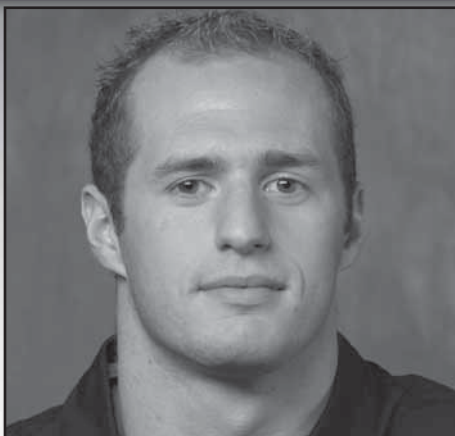

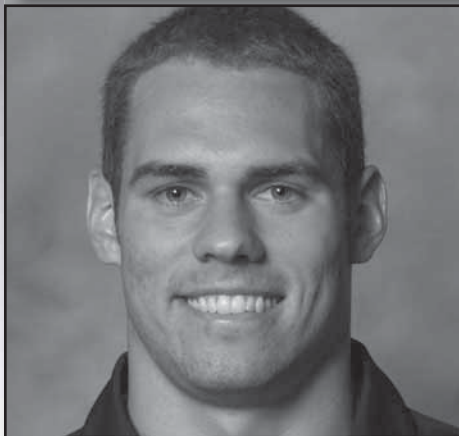

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. – Purdue destroyed the competition at the Indiana Intercollegiate, scoring 940 points. Placing behind Purdue were Indianapolis (256), Ball State (239), IUPUI (212), Vincennes (120), Wabash (112) and Butler (83).

"I was pleasantly surprised at how well we swam considering this is the earliest we've held a meet in quite sometime," said head coach Dan Ross. "What I got from this meet is that our freshmen, Sam Wilcher, Andre Koop and Aaron Koger, came in as good as advertised and will be major players for us this season."

Wilcher won the 100 fly in 50.46 and was second to teammate Tim Watts in the 200 free at 1:44.48. Watts led his team with the most individual victories, winning the 200 free in 1:43.41 and the 100 back in 52.10.

As for Koger, he won the 100 breast in 57.26 and was part of the first-place 200 medley relay along with Joe Colley, Jon Ranochak and Eddie Kenney. Koop took first in the 200 IM at 1:56.73 and placed third in the 500 free (4:45.00) behind Boilermakers Romain Maire (4:41.48) and Craig Thompson (4:41.54).

Also winning for the men was John Schmitt, who took first-place honors in the 100 free at 46.41.

Diving's only competition was themselves. Steve LoBue's zone qualifying score of 320.10 points, led a Boilermaker sweep of the top five spots on 1-meter. On 3-meter, Zach Schultz qualified for zones with his first-place score of 344.65, as the Boilermakers claimed the top three places. Newcomer J.P. Perez and LoBue placed second and third behind Schultz with Zone qualifying scores of 333.95 and 331.35.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. – Purdue came away with a convincing 181-118 triumph over the Arizona State Sun Devils for its first dual win of the season.

"I had us tying at 150-150 when I first scored this meet, but we won some events I didn't think we would," said head coach Dan Ross. "These guys have already been through so much this fall, but they want to be here and they want to win."

Ross was most surprised by the outcomes of the 200 back and 200 breast. Freshman Aaron Koger and junior Jin-Soo Kim finished first and second with times of 2:02.36 and 2:03.35, duplicating their effort in the 100 breast, where they placed first and second with marks of 55.81 and 57.26.

Romain Maire, who had been battling an illness heading into this week, won the 200 back in 1:51.25, with sophomore Tim Watts placing second in 1:53.02. Watts won the 100 back in 51.47.

Freshman Sam Wilcher also continued to impress, sweeping the butterfly events with times of 49.59 and 1:51.07.

The Boilermaker relays started and finished the meet with victories in the 200 medley and 200 free. The 200 medley of Joe Colley, Koger, Jon Ranochak and Eddie Kenney finished in 1:31.67 as Colley led the team with a 50 back split of 23.62.

Kenney and Ranochak, along with John Mullen and Jon Schmitt, won the 200 free relay in 1:23.37 with Kenney posting a leadoff split of 21.11.

Steve LoBue led the Purdue divers, alternating first-place showings with ASU's Micky Benedetti. LoBue won the 3-meter with 358.43 points, beating Benedetti by three points. However, the Sun Devil beat LoBue off the 1-meter, 349.57 to 347.70. Both their scores in each competition were over the Zone qualifying standard.

OUT OF LUCK

SOUTH BEND, Ind. – Purdue lost Notre Dame in nail-biting fashion, 156-144, as the end result wasn't decided until the night's last race.

"I hate losing, but it was a great meet," said head coach Dan Ross. "We can learn more from this loss than we could from a win, and it was nice to see some guys really step up."

Freshman Sam Wilcher led Purdue with a pair of wins in the 100 and 200 fly. Wilcher finished the 100 in 50.06 and the 200 in 1:50.61.

The Boilermakers also were strong in the breaststroke. Aaron Koger won the 100 in 57.02, and in the 200, Jin-Soo Kim beat his freshman teammate to the finish line, 2:03.59 to 2:04.98.

Other pool victories were attained by Eddie Kenney in the 50 free (21.03) and Romain Maire in the 200 back (1:50.94). Ross was impressed by Romain's performance since his junior had battled illness and injury much of the last two weeks.

The reliable diving corps ran into a bit of a wall. Steve LoBue won the 1-meter with a score of 321.60, but the second and third-place points were claimed by Notre Dame's Sam Stoner and Michael Bulfin.

Off the 3-meter, LoBue was second with 308.70 points pipped in between Bulfin and Stoner who were first and third.

Dan Ross' team kept up with No. 8 Northwestern for most of the meet, but didn't have enough horsepower at the end. The 200 free relay team of Eddie Kenney, John Schmitt, Craig Thompson and John Mullen finished two seconds off the lead with a time of 1:24.21.

Despite suffering two close losses during this weekend to nationally ranked opponents, the longtime head coach was pleased with the overall effort.

"Our seniors did a heck of a job stepping up today," said Ross. "Steve Miskovetz had some good times in the breaststroke and Graham Malmgren put together some season bests in the distance races. We battled hard and I think we should be seasoned and ready to go against Georgia next weekend."

Steve LoBue won the men's 3-meter title with an astronomical point total of 377.33, beating the rest of the field by well over 30 points. LoBue placed second to teammate Zach Scultz on the 1-meter, 344.25 to 326.10.

For the second straight night, the breaststroke duo of Aaron Koger and Jin-Soo Kim exchanged wins. Koger beat Kim in the 100 breast, 56.15 to 55.98, and Kim returned the favor in the 200 breast, 2:03.38 to 2:03.65.

Romain Maire also scored a quality win beating NCAA All-American Kyle Bubolz in the 100 back, 50.64 to 50.79.

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. - To no one's surprise, No. 9 Georgia led all four of its duals after day one of competition at the Purdue Duals; however, the Boilermakers were right in the thick of things, trailing the Bulldogs by nine points and the Nittany Lions by five.

Purdue trailed Georgia 88-79 and Penn State 86-81. Georgia's lead over Penn State was a comfortable 102-65. Utah and Louisville both trailed the aforementioned teams, however, the Utes led the Cards in their dual, 108-58.

The meet more than met Purdue head coach Dan Ross' expectations thus far.

"If you can't get excited at a meet like this, then you don't belong in DI swimming," said Ross. "This is fun. We knew these teams wouldn't travel this far to swim slow and Penn State is showing how fast they really are, and I expect Georgia to stay on fire tomorrow."

Purdue's highlights were a three-place sweep of the 3-meter springboard standings and a 1-2 finish in the 100 breaststroke. Once again, freshman Aaron Koger won the 100 breast title in 55.43 seconds with junior teammate Jin-Soo Kim placing second in 56.72.

Another freshman, J.P. Perez, led the Boilermakers off the 3-meter, scoring 332.40 points. Defending Big Ten Diver of the Week Steve LoBue was second with 330.70 points and Zach Schultz was third with 311.80 points.

Georgia won six of nine events, including the opening three races: 200 free relay, 200 IM and 500 free. The Bulldogs also claimed gold in the 400 medley relay, 100 free and 200 fly. Gil Stovall led Georgia win individual wins in the 200 IM and 200 fly with times of 1:50.09 and 1:48.40; defending NCAA Champion in the mile, Sebastien Rouault, won the 500 free with an NCAA provisional cut of 4:22.43.

Patrick Schirk came away with Penn State's lone win, placing first in the 200 back in 1:48.49. Purdue's Romain Maire was second in 1:49.33.

DAWG DAY AFTERNOON

Saturday, November 11, 2006

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. - Georgia won eight of nine swimming events, including three by Sebastien Rouault, during the second day of competition at the Purdue Duals. With four wins this weekend, the Bulldogs improved their season record to 10-0.

Rouault's wins were posted in the 1000 free (9:20.74), 200 free (1:39.29) and 400 IM (3:55.59). Gill Stovall also played an integral role in Georgia's near-perfect afternoon, winning the 100 back (50.25), 100 fly (49.23) and with the 200 medley relay (1:31.40).

Purdue trailed Penn State after the first day of racing, 86-81, but came back strong in the stroke events to finish this weekend with a 3-1 record. Purdue's overall record now stands at 4-3 (1-1 Big Ten).

The Boilermakers beat Penn State, 202-151; Louisville, 292-59, and Utah, 263-90. Georgia beat Purdue 197-156 and Penn State, 234-119. Utah beat Louisville, 244-105.

Penn State increased its first-day lead over Purdue with an early second through fifth-place showing in the 1000 free, but the Boilermakers kept chipping into that lead event after event. Purdue's highlights included second and third-place finishes in the 200 breast and 100 fly, and a pick up of the second, fifth and sixth-place points in the 100 back.

"We found a way to win," said head coach Dan Ross. "Penn State could have easily maintained its momentum after the 1000 and 50 free, but our guys - swimmers and divers - really stepped up. We're going against quality opponents every week, so we're beginning to understand what it takes to win these duals."

Purdue grabbed its first lead over Penn State following Aaron Koger's and Jin-Soo Kim's 2-3 showing in the 200 breast. Koger placed behind winner Neil Versfeld of Georgia with a time of 2:02.52 and Kim recorded a mark of 2:03.44. Versfeld, with a time of 1:59.34, was the sole swimmer Saturday to record an NCAA provisional mark.

The Boilermakers stole the same spots in the 100 fly as freshman Sam Wilcher finished the course in 49.54 and Jon Ranochak in 50.62.

Steve LoBue and Zach Schultz clinched Purdue's win over the Nittany Lions, sweeping the top two places in the 1-meter springboard competition. LoBue recorded a varsity record score of 369.85 points, breaking his previous mark by over 18 points, and Schultz was second with 332.50 points.

The Boilermakers continued to add depth points after diving. John Schmitt placed second in the 200 free in 1:39.70 and Andre Koop and Romain Maire finished third and fifth in the 400 individual medley.

Schmitt, along with Trey Smith, Craig Thompson and Eddie Kenney, wrapped the meet with a victory in the 400 free relay, finishing in 3:03.44. Penn State posted a faster time but was disqualified for an early jump.

"Penn State continued to fight hard all meet and really wanted that last relay, unfortunately for them they jumped early," said Ross.

BUCKS AND OH SHUCKS

Friday, November 17, 2006

COLUMBUS, Ohio - No. 14 Ohio State proved worthy of their ranking with a 171-129 win over No. 18 Purdue at the McCorkle Aquatic Center. The loss dropped the Boilermakers to 4-4 on the season, while OSU improved to 3-0.

"We got touched out in a few races and had a few woulda, shoulda, coulda situations, but Ohio State is a quality team and earned this victory," said head coach Dan Ross. "The guys are still achieving their goals. We did get better this week and there's a lot of personal and season bests to show for it."

In spite of the lopsided score, Purdue won several events and came close to winning two others. The 200 medley relay of Joe Colley, Aaron Koger, Jon Ranochak and Eddie Kenney were beat to the wall by .10 seconds, 1:30.89 to 1:30.99. In the 200 free, sophomore John Schmitt was edged by OSU senior captain Joe Doyle by .05 seconds, 1:40 to 1:40.05.

Koger led Purdue with two individual victories. The freshman kept his undefeated streak alive in the 100 breast with a personal best and NCAA provisional cut of 54.85 and was tops in the 200 breast with a mark of 2:01.24. Junior Jin-Soo Kim placed right behind his teammate with times of 57.07 and 2:02.54.

The Boilermakers also swept the fly events. Ranochak won the 100 in 49.21 and rookie Sam Wilcher touched first in the 200 at 1:49.52. Wilcher was third in the 100 fly with his time of 50.16.

Romain Maire scored a bulk of points for Purdue, as well. The junior Frenchman won the 200 IM in 1:52.07, and earned runner-up honors in the 100 and 200 back.

The divers received a bit of their own medicine as Ohio State's Kellen Harkness and Ryan Jefferson broke into the top three. The Buckeye tandem finished 1-2 off the 3-meter and were second and third off the 1-meter behind sophomore Zach Schultz, who beat Harkness, 326.77 to 326.17.

SEASON RECAPS

THE U.S. OPEN

November 30 – December 2, 2006

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. – An international cast of nearly 1,000 swimmers invaded the Boilermaker Aquatic Center for the three-day U.S. Open. Not only did head coach Dan Ross get to showcase Purdue's top-notch facility, but a few of his world-class swimmers as well.

Ross' team placed sixth in the University Team standings with 85 points.

The first night of the U.S. Open offered a head-to-head matchup in the 100-meter breaststroke consolation finals between Boilermakers past and present: All-American Giordan Poglioli and rookie phenom Aaron Koger.

Poglioli placed second in 1:03.73, which was his third-best unshaved time, while Koger touched sixth at 1:05.22.

"It's pretty cool seeing two of our guys compete against one another at a high-level meet," said head coach Dan Ross. "Aaron is absolutely fearless, racing is fun to him and he's posting some of his best times even without much long-course experience."

Mark Gangloff won the 100 breast title with a U.S. Open meet record of 1:01.07. Scott Usher, who is also Poglioli's training partner, placed second in 1:02.01.

Poglioli posted Purdue's best showing of the meet two nights later, finishing fourth in the 200-meter breaststroke with a time of 2:17.78.

Poglioli's mark was two seconds better than his prelim of 2:19.78, which placed him in lane one within earshot of his Boilermaker teammates and coaches.

"We felt 2:17 would be a good swim, and that's been around his best unshaved time," said Ross. "If I could change anything, I'd like to see him out a little bit more at the start. I counted 15 strokes on his first length and most everyone else was at 18."

Boilermaker Jin-Soo Kim gave an inspired performance in the bonus final of the 200 breast. Kim battled out of last place after the first 50 meters to place second in 2:23.92, which was close to a personal best.

Kim hugged the line between lanes three and four and increased his speed in order to chase down Jo Kupty of the Bolles School, going from eighth to second in a span of 100 meters.

Sam Wilcher improved on his prelim times during the consolation finals of the 100-meter fly and held onto 12th place with a mark of 55.55. During morning prelims, the Arlington Heights, Ill., native posted a 55.88.

The overall winner of the men's 100 fly was Olympian and world-record holder Ian Crocker, who completed the course in 52.78. Crocker's world record mark of 50.40 was set in 2005 in Montreal, Canada.

"I am just so glad to be here at this meet and swimming with this kind of talent," said Wilcher. "I'm used to swimming in meters, but by being at Purdue, I'm also improving on how to swim in yards."

Ross thought Wilcher's Olympic Trial-qualifying

performance was simply awesome.

"That was a lifetime best for Sam, which is incredible because he's just a freshman and that's an unshaved time. He now has Olympic Trial cuts in both fly events, so it's nice to get them out of the way."

Romain Maire, in preparation for next week's European Championships, finished fifth in the consolation final (13th overall) of the 200-meter backstroke with a time of 2:05.83. Maire also had qualified for the bonus final of the 200 IM but opted to concentrate on the 200 back; he finished 200 IM prelims in 2:09.42 – 23rd overall.

The 400 medley relay of Maire, Koger, Wilcher and Trey Smith won the fourth of five heats in 3:51.38 and wound up placing sixth overall.

The relay held its lead from start to finish thanks to a personal best from Maire on the leadoff backstroke leg split (58.20). Maire's teammates had zero trouble keeping their lead.

"I was a bit nervous jumping in, but I was able to stay focused on my kicks and my breaths and keep the lead. It was exciting," said Wilcher.

The 400 free relay concluded the U.S. Open with a sixth-place finish of its own. Maire, John Schmitt, Craig Thompson and Smith combined for a mark of 3:31.43.

"I think our relays did a heck of a job," said Ross. "Our time was about as fast as it was during the summer and that was shaved. Romain, Craig and the rest of the gang were really on it."

FLIP & RIP

December 1-3, 2006

COLUMBUS, Ohio – Boilermaker diving won four of six events at the Ohio State Invitational. Senior Amanda Miller claimed the 1- and 3-meter springboard titles, while Steve LoBue won on 1-meter and Danny Cox took first on platform.

Miller won 3-meter with 325.75 points, then followed with 293.30 points off 1-meter. The Centreville, Va., native did not compete off the platform as she recovered from surgery.

"We made the decision today to hold her off tower; we we're right on the fence," said Purdue diving coach Adam Soldati. "This was a great breakthrough meet for both her and the team. She's just getting back to full strength and it can be frustrating working through the time off and effects of surgery."

"Her scores certainly were not her best, but even when she has an average meet she can still win. Amanda displayed great consistency this weekend."

LoBue's winning 1-meter score was listed at 340.95 points, while Cox led the 16-man platform field with 339.85 points. J.P. Perez, also fared well on tower with a fourth-place score of 311.55 points, and LoBue was third with 317.15 points.

"We got some great results out of both our freshman; Danny showed great mental toughness and improved by about 70-points from his last time on the tower at Indiana," said Soldati. "I'm proud of how our guys did on the platform. They all beat a lot of good opponents; guys like Mickey Benedetti (Arizona State), who are winning medals at FINA meets."

NOT AGAIN, IT'S MICHIGAN

Friday, January 12, 2007

ANN ARBOR, Mich. – The Michigan Wolverines defeated Purdue 153-90. Sophomore diver Zach Schultz recorded the Boilermakers lone wins with 341.47 points off the 1-meter springboard and a personal best of 357.52 off the 3-meter.

The win improved No. 12 UM to 5-4 and dropped No. 19 Purdue to 4-5.

"Zach was our most outstanding athlete today," said head coach Dan Ross. "I'm very proud of the fact that he was able to step up and win for us while Steve (LoBue) and J.P. (Perez) are both hurt. He did a nice job."

FALL OF SPARTA

Saturday, January 13, 2007

EAST LANSING, Mich. – No. 19 Purdue once again had its way with Michigan State, winning its fourth-consecutive decision over the Spartans, 202-98.

The Boilermakers' were dominant as ever except in the freestyle events. Of the five individual freestyle events, Purdue's lone win came from Tim Watts in the 1,000 at 9:27.55.

Purdue was near perfect everywhere else. Freshman Aaron Koger posted another breaststroke sweep this season with times of 56.85 and 2:05.71; newcomer Ilia Ayzenshtok won both backstroke races in 50.46 and 1:51.99 and diver Zach Schultz finished his flawless weekend with two more wins off the springboard.

Rookie Sam Wilcher came close to erasing the name of a legend.

In the 100 fly, Wilcher won the race in 49.45, which was just .14 seconds behind Mark Spitz' MSU pool record of 49.31 set close to 30 years ago. Spitz, one of the most decorated Olympians in U.S. History, recorded his mark at Michigan State while as a student-athlete with Indiana.

DANG VARMINTS

January 19-20, 2007

MADISON, Wis. – Minnesota once again was the class of the annual Big Ten Triangular, defeating Purdue, 206-147, and Wisconsin, 243-110. The Boilermakers beat the Badgers for a third-consecutive year, 208.5-144.5.

Dan Ross was not pleased with the start of day two as Wisconsin beat Purdue in the afternoon's first two events: the 200 free relay and the 400 individual medley. Following the IM, however, the Boilermakers began to awaken from their slumber.

John Schmitt put together a strong race in the 100 free to place second in 45.97; Romain Maire won his third individual event of the weekend with a time of 1:44.14 in the 200 back; freshman Sam Wilcher came back to win the 100 fly over the last 50 yards in 49.66, and rookie Aaron Koger claimed the 200 breaststroke crown in 2:01.96.

Wilcher's mark was only .02 seconds faster than that of runner-up Scott Rice of Wisconsin.

"I was extremely pleased with our comeback, but overall it was a rather unemotional meet," said Ross. "By the end of the day we had taken out a few of our guys with some minor injuries, and I want us to be at 100-percent health next week vs. Indiana."

Romain Maire won the 200 free and 200 IM during the first night of competition, and came within a second of pushing the 800 free relay to victory with an anchor leg split of 1:39.94.

Maire's winning times in 200 free and IM were 1:39.84 and 1:50.09. Schmitt was second to Maire in the 200 free at 1:40.36 and swam leadoff for the 800 free relay with a split of 1:39.73.

Zach Schultz and Danny Cox swapped springboard victories. Schultz took first off the 1-meter with 377.45 points and Cox was tops off the 3-meter with 307.65 points. Freshman Kyle Mitrione became the latest Boilermaker diver to qualify for NCAA Zones with his 1-meter total of 305.00 points.

BEST FOR LAST

Saturday, January 27, 2007

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. – They say a win is a win, but Purdue's 125-118 victory over Indiana was bittersweet for head coach Dan Ross.

The meet got off to a controversial start when two of the Hoosiers' relay teams were disqualified by the relay touch pads, giving the Boilermakers a quick 15-2 lead. IU's top backstroke swimmer Ben Hesen was also DQ'ed in the 200 back for a false start.

"My enthusiasm is definitely dampened. It's tough as a coach to win this way, but rules are rules," said Ross, whose team beat Indiana for the first time since 2001.

On the bright side, the Boilermakers accomplished a majority of their team goals. Ross wanted this to be their best meet of the season and it was, as seven different swimmers posted team and season bests.

"I think IU is the faster team overall, but today it was us and our swimmers deserve nothing but praise," said Ross. "I'm really happy for our seniors, especially Mark Enoch, who shaved down for this meet and proved to be a major factor."

Enoch, a native of Carmel, Ind., tied for fourth in the 200 IM (1:51.87) with teammate Jin-Soo Kim and was third in the 200 fly (1:50.07) behind winner Sam Wilcher (1:48.58) and IU's Nick Walkotten (1:48.78).

Although Purdue was given an early cushion, IU came right back with a three-place sweep in the 1000 free led by Alex Brunfeldt's 9:24.67. That effort tied the meet at 18-18, but Purdue responded with a three-

way sweep of its own in the 200 free, and then claimed the second through fourth-place points in the 50 free.

John Schmitt won the 200 free in 1:39.66, and Trey Smith was the Boilermakers' top finisher in the 50 free with a season best of 20.84.

Schmitt's victory gave Purdue the lead for good, but Indiana was never too far behind. Purdue led by 12 points (119-107) heading into the last relay, but the Boilermakers finished second and third to give their school another point in the Crimson and Gold Cup standings.

Indiana got within seven points at 69-62, following a Taylor Roberts' win off the 3-meter springboard with 390.98 points. Roberts received help from teammates Justin Montrie and David Legler, who finished third and fourth.

Purdue freshman Danny Cox began the meet with a win off the platform with 334.28 points and later finished second off the 3-meter with a season best 349.21 points.

The Boilermakers won just two of the last six events, but were able to secure a number of second and third-place points in order to keep their lead.

Schmitt and Smith were second and third in the 100 free, as were Kim and Aaron Koger in the 200 breast. David Hedge was the runner-up in the 500 free at 4:33.35.

Hesen's false start in the 200 back enabled Ilia Ayzenshtok and Romain Maire to place first and second and collect 13 additional points.

The victory gave Purdue a final dual season record of 7-6 and 4-4 in the Big Ten.

PURDUE UNIVERSITY



Boasting more than 392,100 living alumni, Purdue University graduates have been to the moon, to the highest levels of business and government, and to Sweden to receive the Nobel Prize.

The Indiana link in a nationwide chain of 68 land-grant colleges and universities, Purdue owes its origin to the Morrill Act signed by Abraham Lincoln in 1862 to promote establishment of schools to teach agriculture and the "mechanic arts."

An act of generosity by Lafayette businessman John Purdue secured the college for Lafayette. Purdue pledged money and land for the school. In return, the institution was named for him, and he remained a trustee until his death in 1876.

Classes began in 1874 with a total of 39 students and six faculty members. Since then, enrollment has grown to more than 69,000 on five campuses and a faculty and staff totaling more than 18,700. Some 39,102 students are enrolled at Purdue's main campus in West Lafayette, Ind.

Since its inception in 1869, Purdue has attained widespread fame for the quality of learning, research and engagement in a number of fields. Building upon historical strengths in engineering and agriculture, the West Lafayette campus currently offers 7,400 courses in more than 500 undergraduate majors and specializations in the colleges/schools of Agriculture; Consumer and Family Sciences; Education; Engineering; Liberal Arts; Management; Pharmacy, Nursing, and Health Sciences; Science;

Technology; and Veterinary Medicine. Programs of graduate study and research leading to advanced degrees fall under the jurisdiction of the Graduate School.

Purdue is ranked 21st in the nation in the latest U.S. News & World Report top 50 public universities and, in 2004, was ranked 59th in the world and ninth among American public universities in a survey by The Times of London.

In addition to charting new paths through its instruction, Purdue also pushes back the frontiers of research, from unraveling the molecular structure of viruses to designing a self-supporting food system for space colonies to genetically engineering crops and plants for feeding an ever-increasing global population.

As one of the 25 largest colleges and universities in the United States, Purdue leaves its mark on the world – and beyond – on a daily basis. Long known as the “mother of astronauts,” the University boasts 22 graduates – 20 men and two women – who have been selected to participate in the NASA space program. From the 1960s to today, from the Mercury Program to today’s fleet of space shuttles, Purdue alumni have flown on more than one-third of all manned U.S. space flights. Neil Armstrong, the first person to walk on the moon, and Gene Cernan, the last person to leave it, both call Purdue alma mater. In addition to the astronauts, scores of scientists, engineers and other personnel who help support the space program have graduated from Purdue.

From the steam era to the space age, Purdue has forged a proud tradition of education, research and service to the state, the United States and the world – a tradition that gets stronger every day.

West Lafayette, the location of Purdue University's main campus, is the twin city of Lafayette, the county seat of Tippecanoe County. On the banks of the Wabash River, surrounded by rich, green farmlands, the cities are located 60 miles northwest of Indianapolis and 120 miles southeast of Chicago.

With a population of more than 150,000, Tippecanoe County is one of the largest communities in northwestern Indiana, accessible from Interstate 65; U.S. Highways 52 and 231; and State Roads 25, 26, 38 and 43. Major bus lines and Amtrak trains stop daily. The Purdue Airport opened in 1930 as the first university-owned airport in the nation.

Lafayette-West Lafayette is a regional hub for restaurants, shops, museums and entertainment. The community offers three movie theaters with 25 screens, daily and weekly newspapers, 12 radio stations, a television station and cable system, 150 churches of all major denominations, an art museum, a historical museum, 2,100 acres of public parks and more than 30 miles of trails.

Nearby points of historic and scenic interest include Fort Ouiatenon, on the National Register of Historic Places; Battle Ground, where William Henry Harrison fought the Battle of Tippecanoe; and the Museum at Prophetstown and Prophetstown State Park, dedicated to the preservation of Woodland Native American agricultural and environmental heritage.

Lafayette also is home to the Long Center for the Performing Arts, Clegg Botanical Garden and Columbian Park Zoo. Located on the eastern side of the Wabash River, Lafayette shares the 13-mile long Wabash Heritage Trail with West Lafayette. Nearby Battle Ground, located northwest of West Lafayette, boasts Wolf Park, where people can see live wolves, coyotes and foxes in their natural habitat.

Not only are there places to go in Lafayette-West Lafayette, but there also are plenty of things to do. The area serves as host to numerous community events throughout the year, including the Taste of Tippecanoe, 'Round the Fountain Art Fair, Dancing in the Streets, Global Fest, Feast of the Hunters' Moon, Christmas Parade, Gus Macker 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament, Colt World Series and Trails of Tippecanoe Bike Tour.

West Lafayette has experienced a recent renaissance of sorts in an area called "the levee," located just across the John T. Myers Pedestrian Bridge from Riehle Plaza and downtown Lafayette. More than \$100 million worth of construction has gone into developing Wabash Landing. The result is numerous restaurants, shops and apartments that have made the location a new focal point for locals and students alike.

A diverse mixture of night spots, shopping centers, art museums and restaurants give Lafayette-West Lafayette a distinct and unique flavor. Boasting the convenience of a modern city and friendly "down-home" residents, Lafayette-West Lafayette is one of America's most-livable communities.

Located in the heart of the Midwest, Indiana is welcoming to a variety of people because of its rich history, cultural opportunities and fertile landscape, not to mention its place as one of the major sports metropolises and industrial centers in the nation and world.

In the northwest corner of the state, one can traverse Indiana's 41-mile Lake Michigan waterfront. This area, which boasts the Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore, is good for work and play. It is home to industries that turn out iron, steel, oil, automobile parts and accessories, truck and bus bodies, aircraft engines and pharmaceuticals. Indiana gives to the world from factory to field. The state is a leader in agriculture, with corn as its main crop.

Beneath much of Indiana's rich soil is limestone. A large amount of the building limestone used in the U.S. is quarried in Indiana.

Those looking for a little adventure in Indiana can access more than 1.1 million acres of land available for outdoor recreation. Some of that land can be found in southern Indiana, where Wyandotte Cave, one of the largest caverns in the U.S., is located.

One can work and play in Indiana. But when it comes to sports spectating, Indiana is second to none. Everything starts in Indianapolis, home of the NFL Super Bowl Champion Colts, NBA Pacers and WNBA Fever. The Indians, a Triple-A baseball team, play at Victory Field, while Indianapolis also is home to the Indiana Ice hockey team. During the summer, the city plays host to the Indianapolis Tennis Championships, a precursor to the U.S. Open. The summer starts with the Indianapolis 500, followed by the U.S. Grand Prix Formula One and draws to a close with the Brickyard 400, car races run at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Indianapolis has hosted one women's basketball and five men's basketball NCAA Final Fours. The men's finals return in 2010 and the women in 2011. Additionally the city has conducted at least one Olympic Trials each year since 1984, including those for swimming and diving, synchronized swimming, track and field and wrestling.

Whatever your pleasure is, you are sure to find it somewhere in the state of Indiana.

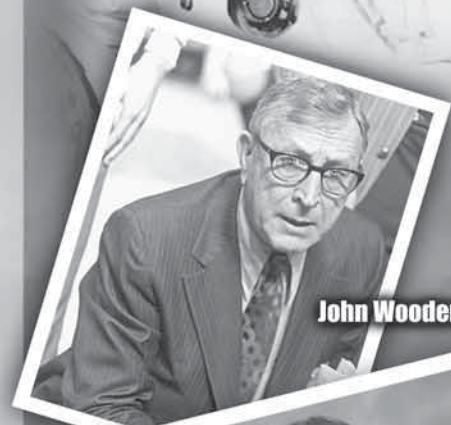

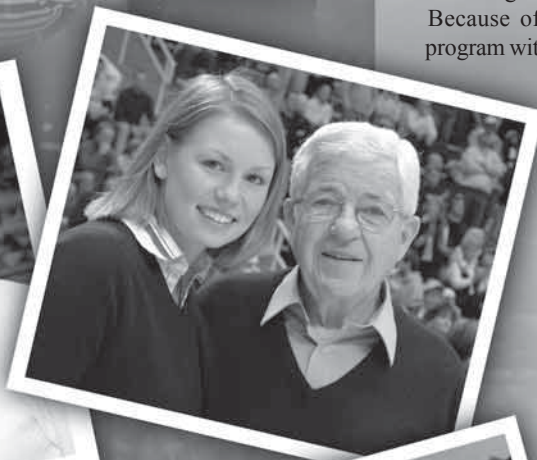
Early in his career he worked in professional baseball as an umpire and then eventually owned and operated several swimming clubs in Kentucky.

Academics

At Purdue University, we place value in the intercollegiate athletics experience of our student-athletes. Academic Learning Center

The facilities in the Jane P. Beering Academic Learning Center and the staff in academic support services are available to help all of our student-athletes reach their academic goals. The Jane P. Beering Academic Learning Center is located on the second floor of the Intercollegiate Athletic Facility and offers a range of academic support services for our student-athletes. Services available include: monitored study tables; individual and group tutoring; 74-station computer lab; walk-in tutoring for math, chemistry and physics; supplemental instruction; laptop computers for traveling; and note-takers.

Tutorial Program

Tutorial Services are offered to all student-athletes free of charge. Our tutorial staff consists of undergraduate and graduate students, instructors from campus, professionals from the community, and retired Purdue faculty. Our objective is to cover every academic discipline to ensure our student-athletes have assistance in all coursework.

Academic Mentor Program

The Academic Mentor Program was developed to provide our student-athletes with even greater support in meeting their individual academic needs. Every student-athlete presents a different academic need, and our staff wants to ensure all are receiving the necessary academic resources to succeed academically at Purdue. Mentors are individually selected to assist the program and are educated to ensure our mission of academic integrity.

CHAMPS/Life Skills Program

Purdue is committed to providing the support necessary to make its student-athletes as successful as possible in the five commitment areas. The Purdue CHAMPS/Life Skills program is designed to help student-athletes realize their full personal, academic and athletic potential. Our staff is dedicated to providing the resources necessary to help all Purdue student-athletes realize their goals.

Commitment to Academic Excellence: To support the academic progress of the student-athlete toward intellectual development and graduation.

Commitment to Personal Development: To support the development of a well-balanced lifestyle for student-athletes, encouraging emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills.

Commitment to Career Development: To encourage the student-athlete to develop and pursue career and life goals.

Commitment to Service: To engage the student-athlete in service to their campus and surrounding communities.

Commitment to Athletic Excellence: To build philosophical foundations for the development of athletic programs that are broad-based, equitable and dedicated to the well-being of all student-athletes.

Program Of Excellence

Purdue was a 2004 recipient of the "Program of Excellence" Award. The award is given to universities whose CHAMPS programs have established student-athlete welfare as the cornerstone of their operating principles.



BIG TEN CONFERENCE

A meeting of seven Midwest university presidents on January 11, 1895 at the Palmer House in Chicago to discuss the regulation and control of intercollegiate athletics, was the first development of what would become one of organized sports' most successful undertakings. Those seven men, behind the leadership of James H. Smart, president of Purdue University, established the principles for which the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, more popularly known as the Big Ten Conference, would be founded.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the control and administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first-known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." This helped limit some problems of the times, especially the participation of professional athletes and "non-students" in the university's regular sporting events. That important legislation, along with others that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for amateur intercollegiate athletics.

Eleven months after the presidents met, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House, and officially established the mechanics of the "Intercollegiate conference of Faculty Representatives", or "Big Ten Conference" of "Western Conference."

Those seven universities were: University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University, Purdue University and the University of Wisconsin. Indiana University and the State University of Iowa were admitted in 1899. Ohio State joined in 1912. Chicago withdrew in 1946 and Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added three years later in 1949.

After a 40-year period of constancy in membership, the Conference expanded to 11 members for the first time. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents voted to confirm its earlier decision to integrate Pennsylvania State University into the Conference.

At the turn of the century, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1906, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence. Freshmen and graduate students were not permitted to compete, training tables (or quarters) were forbidden, and coaches were to be appointed by university bodies "at modest salaries."



Football and baseball were the popular sports prior to 1900. Wisconsin won the first two football championships and Chicago claimed the first three baseball titles. The first "official" sponsored championship was in out-door track. It was held at the University of Chicago in 1906 with Michigan earning the title.

Today, the Big Ten sponsors 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. There have been many different athletic events popularized on Big Ten campuses. Some became extremely popular - football and basketball, for example. Others, like boxing, fell by the wayside.

The office of the commissioner of athletics was created in 1922 "to study athletic problems of the various Western Conference universities and assist in enforcing the eligibility rules which govern Big Ten athletics." Major John L. Griffith was appointed as the first commissioner and served in that position until his death in 1944. Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson, former director of athletics at Northwestern, served from 1944 until he retired in 1961. Bill Reed, an assistant commissioner since 1951, succeeded Wilson until his death in 1971. Wayne Duke became the fourth Big Ten commissioner in 1971 and retired June 30, 1989. Duke was succeeded by James E. Delany on July 1, 1989. Delany came to the Big Ten following 10 years as Ohio Valley Conference Commissioner.

BIG TEN FACTS

- Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- Big Ten Universities have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- Big Ten Universities house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries. Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.
- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.
- See their student-athletes graduate at a rate nine percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006-07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- "Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006-07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.



BIG TEN NETWORK

In June of 2006, the Big Ten announced the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. Available to all cable and satellite providers nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television (HDTV), the network will allow fans to see their home teams, regardless of where they live.

The network is led by President Mark Silverman, a former Disney executive who came to the network after serving as the general manager and senior vice president of ABC Cable Networks Group since April of 2004, managing the company's equity in such channels as Lifetime Television, A&E Network and the History Channel, each of which recorded their best financial performance in 2005. Silverman was also responsible for developing and launching new cable channels, shows and other key initiatives.

The Big Ten Network launches its inaugural season in August 2007 with football, men's and women's basketball, a nightly studio show, classics and coaches shows, along with more Olympic sporting events and exposure for women's sports than has ever been aired on any other network. In June of 2007, the Big Ten announced that the Big Ten Network will become the first national network to commit to "event equality" for men's and women's sports on all network-controlled media within the first three years of launch. This dedication to "event equality" highlights the Big Ten's ongoing dedication to gender equity, which is aligned with the commitment of conference institutions to provide fairness for all female student-athletes.

The programming on the Big Ten Network and alternative network-controlled platforms will include, but is not limited to:

- ◆ More than 35 football games each season
- ◆ More than 105 regular season men's basketball games
- ◆ A nightly studio show including segments from each campus
 - ◆ Women's sports, including basketball, volleyball, soccer and softball
- ◆ More than 170 Olympic sporting events including baseball, soccer, tennis, volleyball, swimming, diving and more
- ◆ Classic games and historical footage from ESPN and ABC libraries
- ◆ Original campus programming produced by Big Ten member universities showcasing their academic excellence, talented students and award-winning programs
- ◆ Weekly coaches shows

Located in the historic Montgomery Ward building in Chicago, the Big Ten Network is the first national television network to call the largest city in the Midwest its home. The original section of the building was designated as a historic landmark in 2000 for its significant role in American retail history. The space includes two studios and three control rooms as well as a 20,000 square-foot office space.

In May of 2007, the Big Ten Network announced its first on-air hire, signing ESPN college sports expert Dave Revsine to be its lead studio host. Revsine joined ESPN in October of 1996 as an anchor for ESPNNews and filled a variety of roles for the network over the past 10 years. The Northwestern graduate has anchored SportsCenter, hosted ESPN Radio's College GameDay for the last six years and hosted ESPN Radio's coverage of several BCS Championship games. He also hosted studio halftimes for basketball and co-hosted ESPN's coverage of the last two men's Final Fours.

In addition to airing more coverage of Big Ten sports than ever before, the Big Ten Network will also provide numerous benefits to communities around the Big Ten. Those include increased exposure for women's sports, providing positive role models for girls; a greater economic impact to the communities from added sporting event production, with the potential to generate higher attendance; and greater national exposure for the excellence that surrounds the academic endeavors of Big Ten universities, some of the most highly regarded in the nation. Also, an internship program at each of the 11 universities will offer students training for careers in sports, television and entertainment.
