A WIN WOULD

- Give Purdue consecutive nine-win seasons for the first time since 1997-98 when Drew Brees was quarterback.
- Be back-to-back bowl victories, both over SEC teams.
- Improve Purdue to 5-2 over its last seven bowl games.
- Make Brian Brohm 2-0 as Purdue's acting head coach.
- Be the Boilermakers' fifth win away from home this season.

STORY LINES

- After playing in the Big Ten Championship for the first time in program history, the Purdue Boilermakers head south to face LSU in the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl. The Big Ten West champs battle the SEC West champs at Camping World Stadium, Jan. 2. Kickoff is set for 1 p.m. ET on ABC.
- The Boilermakers and Tigers meet on the gridiron for the first time in history.
- Purdue won the Big Ten West outright, which included a pair of victories over ranked teams and three straight wins to end the month of November.
- The Boilermakers are appearing in a bowl game for the 21st time in program history, the fourth over the past six seasons.
- Purdue is 11-9 all-time in bowl games, winning four of the past six including a 48-45 overtime victory over Tennessee in last year's TransPerfect Music City Bowl.
- Purdue had the best passing offense in the BIG, averaging 276.6 yards through the air in league games.

- Brian Brohm, who has served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the past six seasons, will serve as interim head coach following the departure of his brother, Jeff Brohm, to their alma mater Louisville.
- With Brian Brohm moving into the interim head coach role, legendary Purdue quarterback Drew Brees returned to his alma mater to coach the QBs in the Citrus Bowl; Brees broke multiple school records during his time at Purdue (1997-2000).
- Ryan Walters, who spent 2022 season at Illinois as the defensive coordinator of the nation's best scoring defense, was named the 37th head football coach in program history (December 13).
- For the bowl game, Purdue will be without wide receiver Charlie Jones (Second Team All-America), quarterback Aidan O'Connell (Second Team All-BIG), tight end Payne Durham (Second Team All-BIG) and cornerback Cory Trice (All-BIG Honorable Mention).

HEAD COACH RYAN WALTERS

Considered one of the nation's fastest rising young coaches, Ryan Walters was announced as the 37th head coach in Purdue Football history on Dec. 13, 2022.

In his second season as defensive coordinator for Illinois in 2022, Walters emerged as one of the nation's best defensive play callers. The Illini posted an 8-4 record, with five wins holding their opponents under seven points and seven wins at 10 points or fewer. Along with guiding the Illini defense to Top 10 national rankings in 17 different defensive categories, Walters was named 247Sports Defensive Coordinator of the Year and On3 Coordinator of the Year.

Walters, 36, becomes the fourth-youngest coach in FBS football behind Kenny Dillingham (32-Arizona State), Kane Wommack (35-South Alabama) and Dan Lanning (36-Oregon).

Walters elevated Illinois' defensive unit from the back of the pack into one of the nation's elite in just two seasons. Following the 2020 season, in which the Fighting Illini ranked 97th nationally in scoring defense (34.9) and 114th in yards allowed per game (466.8), Walters' first year in Champaign saw his side of the ball rise to 29th (21.9) and 49th (367.0), respectively. This past season, the results were shown nationwide as Illinois heads into the bowl schedule No. 1 nationally in scoring defense (12.3) and No. 2 in yards allowed per game (263.8).

A former safety at Colorado (2004-08), Walters tutored two of the nation's top defensive backs during his two-year stint in Champaign. Among six Illini defenders to earn All-Big Ten recognition in 2021 was safety Kerby Joseph, who was Illinois' first All-Big Ten First Team defensive back since 1989. Two more Illinois defensive backs accomplished the feat in 2022, with Devon Witherspoon and Sydney Brown earning first team accolades from the conference. Witherspoon, notably, became Illinois' first Jim Thorpe Award (top defensive back in college football) finalist in school history this past season.

Walters spent six seasons at Missouri prior to his tenure with the Illini, including three as defensive coordinator. He oversaw an impressive transformation of the Tigers' defense into one of the Southeastern Conference's top units. His 2019 defense ranked in the nation's Top 20 in several categories, including total defense (14th NCAA; 3rd SEC - 312.0) and scoring defense (17th NCAA; 6th SEC - 19.4), while excelling as a Top 10 pass defense (8th in passing yards allowed NCAA; 2nd SEC - 179.3).

Walters previously served as co-defensive coordinator for the 2016 and 2017 seasons in Columbia before being promoted to defensive coordinator permanently ahead of the 2018 season, with Missouri's overall defensive improvement leading the way to an eight-win season and bid to the 2018 AutoZone Liberty Bowl. Previously during bowl preparation in December 2017, Walters ascended to the role of defensive coordinator before the squad's 2017 Texas Bowl appearance after assuming control of the entire secondary ahead of that season. He had focused on the safeties in his first two seasons with the program.

Prior to making the move to Missouri in 2015, Walters coached at Memphis where he spent the 2014 season as cornerbacks coach and oversaw a defense that was among the most improved in the nation when the Tigers went 10-3.

A native of Aurora, Colorado, Walters was a football student-athlete at Colorado, where he was a standout safety for the Buffaloes (2004-08). He started 33 times in 46 career appearances as a Buffalo and earned All-Big 12 Conference Honorable Mention in his senior season. He began his coaching career as a student assistant at Colorado, working with the secondary in 2009, and then spent two years on staff at Arizona, where he was a graduate assistant in 2010 before being promoted to defensive backs coach for the 2011 season.

From Arizona, Walters moved to Oklahoma as a graduate assistant cornerbacks coach in 2012, as the Sooners went 10-3 and played in the 2013 Cotton Bowl. He moved to North Texas for the 2013 season, where he oversaw cornerbacks and helped lead UNT to a 9-4 record in its first year in Conference USA.

Prior to his arrival at Illinois, Walters was one of 12 coaching participants in the National Coalition of Minority Football Coaches' inaugural Coalition Academy in April 2020, a first-of-its-kind mentorship program pairing influential athletic directors with minority football coaches.

Walters earned his degree in history from the University of Colorado in December 2008 with dual majors in history and ethnic studies. Walters and his wife Tara have two sons, Aaron and Cason.

QB1 IN HIS FINAL GAME

- Sixth-year slinger Austin Burton will be Purdue's QB1 for the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl, after Aidan O'Connell elected to prepare for the NFL Draft.
- Burton is in his third season at Purdue following the first three years of his career at UCLA.
- The Citrus Bowl will mark the third career start for Burton. His first start came in 2019 against Oregon State, when he threw for 236 yards for UCLA.
- Burton has started once for Purdue, a 28-26 win over FAU earlier this season.

BURTON OFF THE BENCH

- With All-BIG quarterback Aidan O'Connell unavailable due to injury, fellow sixth-year senior Austin Burton heard his name called to start as Purdue's quarterback versus FAU.
- The start was Burton's first since Oct. 5, 2019 when he was UCLA's starting quarterback against Oregon State.
- The Newton, Massachusetts, native completed 72.4 percent of his passes (21-of-29) for 166 yards and three touchdowns.
- Two of Burton's three touchdown passes were to his roommate, Charlie Jones.
- Burton didn't seem to have much rust, marching the Boilermakers down the field on the opening drive by completing all six of his passes that resulted in a touchdown toss to Jones.

FROM A FOOTBALL FAMILY

- Burton comes from an impressive athletic lineage. His father Steve played quarterback at Northwestern and currently serves as the sports director at WBZ-TV and WSBK-TV in Boston.
- His mother Ginni was an All-American and Big Ten champion swimmer for Northwestern.
- His sister Veronica played basketball at Northwestern, earning Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year honors three years in a row, the 2022 WBCA Defensive Player of the Year and the seventh overall pick to the Dallas Wings earlier this year.
- His grandfather Ron was a consensus All-American running back at Northwestern and played for the Boston Patriots (1960-65). He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1990.

ALL ABOARD THE MOCK TRAIN

- **All-Big Ten Honorable Mention (Coaches & Media)**
- Don't underestimate redshirt-freshman Devin Mockobee. The walk-on running back leads the Purdue rushing attack with 920 yards and seven touchdowns, averaging 5.1 yards per carry.
- In regards to freshman running backs throughout Purdue history, Mockobee set the program record for most rushing yards and attempts by a Boilermaker freshman.
- Mockobee has earned Big Ten Freshman of the Week accolades twice this season, most recently following last week's performance at Indiana. After missing most of the Northwestern game due to injury, the freshman returned to tally 157 all-purpose yards (99 rushing, 58 receiving).
- He has produced four 100-yard games this season, the most ever by a Purdue freshman.

FLOAT LIKE A BUTTERFLY, STING LIKE A 100-YARD MOCKOBBEE

- All four of Devin Mockobee's 100-yard games this season have come in Big Ten games, increasing his output to 89.0 yards per game in conference action; his average ranks fifth in the conference, while leading all BIG freshman running backs.
- In the win over No. 21 Illinois, Mockobee outgained the nation's leading rusher Chase Brown. The Boilermaker ran for 106 yards and a touchdown, while the Purdue defense held Brown under 100 yards for the first time this season (98).
- Mockobee rumbled for 108 yards and a touchdown at Wisconsin.
- The Booneville, Indiana, native had his best game as a Boilermaker in the win over Nebraska, recording 206 all-purpose yards (178 rushing, 28 receiving). His 178 yards on the ground set a new single-game record for rushing yards by a Purdue freshman, and Mockobee was rewarded Big Ten Freshman of the Week for his performance.
- Mockobee produced his first 100-yard game at No. 21 Minnesota, recording 112 yards rushing on only 11 carries to average 10.2 yards per rush. Late in the fourth quarter with Purdue ahead by three points, Mockobee broke free for a 68-yard run and motored into the end zone from two yards out on the following play to put the game on ice.
- The 68-yard rush at Minnesota is the longest run by a Boilermaker since Rondale Moore scampered 76 yards against Northwestern (Aug. 30, 2018).

• Charlie Jones had one of the biggest seasons by a Boilermaker receiver in program history. Jones made an immediate impact since transferring to Purdue from Iowa, leading the nation in receptions (110) and receiving yards (1,361) and ranking fourth in receiving touchdowns (12); his 1,361 yards set a new single-season school record, breaking John Standeford's 20-year old mark. Jones is one of only two receivers to rank in the top 10 of all three categories.
 • Jones has recorded eight 100-yard games this season, including five in BIG play, another school record. His 162 yards in the Big Ten Championship allowed Jones to pass David Bell (2021), Rondale Moore (2018), John Standeford (2002) and Steve Griffin (1984) for the sole owner of the record. In BIG action, Jones has hauled in 76 receptions per game to go along with 91.0 receiving yards per game to lead the league.
 • With a 32-yard touchdown in the win over No. 21 Illinois, Jones became the eighth Boilermaker in Purdue history to record 10 touchdowns and 1,000 receiving yards in a single season; he is 109 yards away from the single-season school record.
 • It's safe to say Jones enjoys the Purdue offense. After making 21 catches for 323 yards and three touchdowns during the entire 2021 season, it only took him three games to surpass last year's totals with the Hawkeyes.
 • With three multi-touchdown games, Jones is just the sixth Purdue receiver since 2000 to have three-or-more multi-touchdown games in a season.

CATCHING RARE AIR

• Since 2000, Charlie Jones is the only Big Ten wide receiver to produce six games of at least 10 catches and 100 yards in a single season. Only four other receivers did it four times in season: David Bell (Purdue), Rondale Moore (Purdue), Braylon Edwards (Michigan) and Jaxson Smith-Njigba (Ohio State).
 • Jones joined former Purdue wide receiver David Bell (2021) as the only Big Ten receivers since 2000 to haul in 85 or more passes through their first 10 games of a season.
 • Since the turn of the century, only five Big Ten receivers have tallied 1,000 yards and 10 touchdowns through the first

BOILER NOTES

BOWL HISTORY

- Purdue is appearing in a bowl game for the 21st time in program history, the fourth over the past six seasons.
- The Boilermakers are 11-9 all-time in bowl games, winning four of their past six including a 48-45 overtime victory over Tennessee in last year's TransPerfect Music City Bowl.
- Purdue won the 2021 Music City Bowl despite missing All-Americans David Bell and George Karlaftis, who opted out of the game to prepare for the NFL Draft.
- The matchup is Purdue's third Orlando bowl game, the first since the 2006 Champs Sports Bowl.
- The Boilermakers are playing in the Citrus Bowl for the second time with the other appearance concluding the 2003 campaign.
- Purdue is facing a ranked team in a bowl game for the eighth time, but its first since the 2004 Sun Bowl (No. 21 Arizona State).

MISSING BOILERS

- Purdue enters the matchup without four Boilermakers who opted out of the game to prepare for the 2023 NFL Draft: TE Payne Durham, WR Charlie Jones, QB Aidan O'Connell and CB Cory Trice.
- Jones, a Second Team All-American, led the Big Ten in receptions (110), receiving yards (1,361) and receiving touchdowns (12), cracking the Top 5 nationally in all three categories; his 1,361 receiving yards set a new single-season school record.
- O'Connell, who earned Second Team All-BIG honors, led the conference in passing yards (290.8 per game) and ends his Purdue career with the best career completion percentage in school history (66.7%).
- Durham earned second team all-conference accolades as one of the top tight ends in the country; he ranked second on the team in receptions (56), receiving yards (560) and receiving TDs (8), ending his Boilermaker career with the second-most touchdowns by a tight end (21).
- Trice, a lockdown corner for the Boilermakers with a team-best 10 pass breakups, also added two interceptions and 34 tackles throughout the season; he earned All-BIG Honorable Mention.

BURTON OFF THE BENCH

- With All-BIG quarterback Aidan O'Connell unavailable due to injury, fellow sixth-year senior Austin Burton heard his name called to start as Purdue's quarterback versus FAU.
- The start was Burton's first since Oct. 5, 2019 when he was UCLA's starting quarterback against Oregon State.
- The Newton, Massachusetts, native completed 72.4 percent of his passes (21-of-29) for 166 yards and three touchdowns.
- He connected with his roommate Charlie Jones for a pair of scores.
- Burton didn't seem to have much rust, marching the Boilermakers down the field on the opening drive by completing all six of his passes that resulted in a touchdown toss to Jones.

WELCOME BACK DREW BREES

- Purdue will have a familiar face on the Citrus Bowl sidelines, as former Boilermaker quarterback Drew Brees will serve as an assistant coach.
- Before his 20-year NFL career, Brees was a record-breaking quarterback at Purdue; he remains the school's all-time leader in passing yards (11,792), completions (1,026) and passing touchdowns (90).
- He concluded his Purdue career by winning the Maxwell Award (nation's most outstanding player) and leading the Boilermakers to the Rose Bowl.
- Taking his talents to the NFL, Brees was the first quarterback in NFL history to throw for more than 4,000 yards in 12-straight seasons, including an NFL-record five 5,000-yard passing seasons. He was selected 12 times to the Pro Bowl, a Saints record.
- Brees can help the Boilermakers reach nine wins for the second straight season; the last time Purdue had back-to-back nine-win seasons, he was the starting quarterback (1997-98) under legendary coach Joe Tiller.

PUTTING UP POINTS

- The Boilermakers have proved to be one of the top offenses in college football by putting up points against the nation's best scoring defenses.
- Against Ryan Walters' Illinois defense, which led the country by averaging only 12.2 points per game, Purdue scored 31 points in a win; it was the most allowed by the Illini all season long.
- Minnesota surrendered 13.3 ppg to rank fourth nationally, and Purdue became one of three teams to score at least 20 points on the Golden Gophers in a 20-10 victory in Minneapolis.
- In the Big Ten Championship, Purdue marched down the field on six scoring drives, the most scoring drives by a Michigan opponent this season. The No. 2 Wolverines enter the College Football Playoff ranked fifth in scoring defense (13.4 ppg).

A NEW ERA

- Ryan Walters, considered one of the nation's fastest rising young coaches, has been named the 37th head football coach at Purdue University (Dec. 13).
- In his second season as defensive coordinator for Illinois in 2022, Walters emerged as one of the nation's best defensive play callers. The Illini posted an 8-4 record, with five wins holding their opponents under seven points and seven wins at 10 points or fewer.
- Along with guiding the Illini defense to Top 10 national rankings in 17 different defensive categories, Walters was named 247Sports Defensive Coordinator of the Year and On3 Coordinator of the Year.
- This past season, Walters guided the nation's No. 1 scoring defense (12.3) and No. 2 defense in yards allowed per game (263.8).
- Walters elevated Illinois' defensive unit from the back of the pack into one of the nation's elite in just two seasons. Following the 2020 season, in which the Fighting Illini ranked 97th nationally in scoring defense (34.9) and 114th in yards allowed per game (466.8), Walters' first year in Champaign saw his side of the ball rise to 29th (21.9) and 49th (367.0), respectively.
- At 36, Walters becomes one of the youngest head coaches in college football; he has hired Graham Harrell as offensive coordinator and Kevin Kane as defensive coordinator.

ALL-BIG TEN HONOREES

- The Boilermakers netted a solid haul of all-league selections ahead of the Big Ten Championship Game.
- Fourteen different Boilermakers were honored by the league's coaches and media.

BOILER NOTES

BIG WINS AWAY FROM HOME

- Playing on the road in Big Ten play hasn't fazed Purdue lately. The Boilermakers have won seven of their past nine conference games away from home, including the four this season against No. 21 Minnesota (Oct. 1), Maryland (Oct. 8), No. 21 Illinois (Nov. 12) and Indiana (Nov. 26).
- Three of those victories were over ranked teams. Purdue beat No. 2 Iowa 24-7 last season (Oct. 16, 2021), knocked off No. 21 Minnesota this October and took down No. 21 Illinois (Nov. 12).
- Last season, Purdue went 3-1 in BIG games away from home, which included a neutral site win over Northwestern at Wrigley Field. The Boilermakers ended the 2021 campaign with five victories away from Ross-Ade Stadium, their most since 1943.

O'CONNELL = BURLSWORTH TROPHY FINALIST

- Awarded to the most outstanding football player in America who began his career as a walk-on, Aidan O'Connell joined Stetson Bennett (Quarterback - Georgia) and Carlton Martial (Linebacker - Troy) as the three finalists up for the Burlsworth Trophy.
- The Burlsworth Trophy was named after Brandon Burlsworth, who went from a walk-on to an All-American at Arkansas. Finalists will be honored and the winner of the 2022 Burlsworth Trophy will be announced on December 5 at 8 p.m. ET at Crystal Bridges Museum in Bentonville, Arkansas.
- O'Connell began his career as a walk-on listed eighth on the depth chart before becoming one of the best quarterbacks in Purdue history.

CHASING RECORDS

- With his 162-yard performance in the Big Ten Championship Game against Michigan, Charlie Jones set the Purdue single-season receiving yard record with 1,361.
- Devin Mockobee enters the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl with 920 rushing yards on 182 carries, both are single-season freshman records at Purdue.
- Payne Durham finished his season two touchdowns away from tying Dave Young for the most touchdown receptions in a single season by a Boilermaker tight end. Young caught 10 touchdown passes in 1979.
- With 290 passing yards against Indiana, Aidan O'Connell became the fifth quarterback in Purdue history to throw for more than 3,000 passing yards in multiple seasons, joining some elite company. Drew Brees produced three 3,000-yard seasons, while David Blough, Jim Everett and Curtis Painter did it twice over their careers.

BOILERS UNDER BROHM

- Jeff Brohm completed his sixth year at the helm of Purdue Football before resigning his role at the university.
- Brohm boasts a career record of 66-43, a .606 winning percentage, with more than half of those wins coming at Purdue.
- Purdue has won 26 conference games under Brohm's guidance after winning only 21 in the 10 seasons prior to Brohm taking over the program.
- A program with a combined nine wins in the four seasons prior to Brohm's arrival, Purdue matched that output in one season - a memorable 2021 campaign.
- The Boilermakers qualified for four bowl appearances in six years under Brohm, joining Joe Tiller and Jim Young as the only Purdue coaches to accomplish that feat. They will make their fourth this year.
- Over Brohm's six seasons at the helm, the Purdue offense has averaged 415.6 yards per game and 27.8 points per game.
- Purdue has had four All-Americans since Brohm's arrival; the Boilermakers only had three All-Americans from 2004-17.
- Boilermakers have won five individual Big Ten honors under Brohm's guidance: Big Ten Freshman of the Year (Rondale Moore - 2018, David Bell - 2019), Big Ten Wide Receiver of the Year (Moore - 2018, Bell - 2021), Big Ten Tight End of the Year (Brycen Hopkins - 2019).

MAINTAINING SUCCESS

- With three straight victories heading into the conference championship, the Boilermakers won at least eight games in consecutive seasons for the first time since 1997-98.
- The victories over Illinois and Northwestern also secured a winning conference record for Purdue, the first time that has happened in back-to-back seasons since 1997-98.
- Purdue has won at least seven games in three different seasons under Jeff Brohm (2017, 2021, 2022), out of a possible five years due to the 2020 season shortened to only six games.

PILOT SACKS

- Senior defensive end Jack Sullivan leads the Boilermakers with 5.5 sacks this season, ranking eighth in the conference.
- Stepping up in conference games, 4.5 sacks have come in against league opponents, the sixth-most in the BIG.
- Sullivan had a crucial strip sack in the win over Northwestern, forcing a turnover late in the fourth quarter to preserve the victory.
- Graduating with a degree in Professional Flight Technology and Aviation Management, Sullivan plans to become a commercial pilot following his playing career.

STRENGTH ON THE LINE

- Purdue's veteran offensive line has been a major factor for success on that side of the ball.
- The Boilermakers allow only 4.0 tackles-for-loss per game, ranking second in the Big Ten and 10th in the nation
- Facing the nation's best defense in No. 21 Illinois (232.2 yards per game), led by then-defensive coordinator and new Purdue head coach Ryan Walters, the Purdue line did not allow a sack and helped the offense rack up 379 yards for the most allowed by the Fighting Illini this season.
- In the win over Nebraska, the line paved the way for 217 rushing yards, the most by a Purdue offense in four years.

PICK SIX CITY

- Purdue is one of nine teams with three pick sixes this season.
- The Purdue defense started the season by returning interceptions for touchdowns in back-to-back games for the first time since 2010 when Ricardo Allen had a pair of pick sixes against Michigan and Michigan State.
- Chris Jefferson's 72-yard pick six against Penn State (Sept. 1) was the longest by a Boilermaker since Ja'Whaun Bentley went 76 yards versus Minnesota (Oct. 7, 2017).
- In the shutout victory over Indiana State (Sept. 10), Cam Allen's eighth career interception became his first pick six as he scampered 65 yards to the end zone.
- Trice's interception return for a touchdown against Indiana was the 56th by a Boilermaker since 1950.

RED ZONE, END ZONE

- The Boilermakers have been successful in the red zone this season, scoring 49 of 53 times for a 92.5 percent rate and ranking seventh in the country.
- Thirty-four of those 44 red zone scores have been touchdowns (64%).
- In conference play, Purdue trailed Ohio State as the highest scoring team in the red area. The Boilermakers are 32-of-34 in conference action with 21 touchdowns and 11 field goals.

BOILER NOTES

ROSS-ADE BRIGADE

- With a win over Northwestern in the home finale, Purdue finished 4-2 at Ross-Ade Stadium for the second straight season.
- Purdue fans, including the Ross-Ade Brigade student section, packed the stadium nearly to capacity (57,282) all season long; an average of 57,129 came to Ross-Ade Stadium throughout the fall, the highest average home attendance since 2007 (59,326).
- Purdue sold out games against Nebraska (Oct. 15) and Iowa (Nov. 5).

FOURTH QUARTER DEFENSE

- The Purdue defense steps up in the fourth quarter, allowing only 37 points (4.6 ppg) in the final quarter over the last eight games of the regular season.
- In the final six games leading into the Big Ten Championship Game, the Boilermakers surrendered only three touchdowns and two field goals in fourth quarters to finish strong.

AIDAN ADDING TO HIS LEGACY

- Beginning his career as a walk-on and eighth on the quarterback depth chart, Aidan O'Connell worked his way up to the starting role and didn't stop there. The sixth-year QB etched his name in the school record books, and he continued to rise up the career charts this season.

- O'Connell finished his career ranked in the program's Top 10 in several career categories: completion percentage (1st - 67%), 500-yard games (11st - 2), 400-yard games (2nd - 5), 300-yard games (2nd - 14), touchdown passes (5th - 65), passing completions (4th - 926) and passing yards (6th - 9,219).

- O'Connell is second in the Big Ten in passing yards and total offense. Completing 26.2 passes per game, he sits sixth in the country. His 284 passing yards per game rank 14th nationally.

- O'Connell kept up his game against conference opponents, throwing for an average of 276.6 yards in BIG games to lead the league this season.

- In his 14 300-yard games over his career, O'Connell has eclipsed 350 yards in 13 of them.

- O'Connell torched the Syracuse defense with a season-high 424 passing yards and three touchdowns. He has five career 400-yard passing games; only Drew Brees has more (7).

RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS

- While Purdue is primarily known for its passing game, the Boilermakers have rushed for 17 touchdowns compared to 25 through the air.

- The 17 rushing TDs surpassed the total from the previous two seasons combined (7 in 2021, 4 in 2020) and is the most in a season since Purdue rushed for 20 touchdowns in 2018.

BROHM KNOWS OFFENSE

- Jeff Brohm produced more 600-yard games than any coach in Purdue history, owning four of the 10 highest offensive outputs of all-time.

- With 608 yards in the win over Nebraska, Purdue recorded the eighth-most yards of offense in a single game and pushed Brohm past legendary head coach Joe Tiller.

- The top two offenses in a game belong under Tiller's watch but four of the next six have been by Brohm's Boilermakers.

SPOILERMAKERS

- Purdue has become known as the SpoilerMakers under Jeff Brohm, collecting seven wins over ranked teams during the head coach's tenure following the 31-24 win at No. 21 Illinois.

- Five of the seven wins have been by double digits, the biggest being a 29-point victory over No. 2 Ohio State in 2018.

- Four of the victories have been on the road, including a pair this season at Minnesota and Illinois; both teams were ranked No. 21 heading into their game against Purdue.

- Three of those wins were against Top 3 teams, while Purdue handed five of those ranked teams their first loss of the season.

- Last season, Purdue knocked off previously unbeaten No. 2 Iowa (Oct. 16) and No. 3 Michigan State (Nov. 6), giving the Boilermakers two wins over Top 5 teams for the first time since 1960.

- The Boilermakers beat three ranked teams during the 2018 campaign, Brohm's second season, for the most victories over ranked teams in a single-season since 2003.

- Prior to Brohm's arrival in West Lafayette in 2017, Purdue only won two out of 27 games against AP-ranked teams over the previous 10 seasons.

KEEPING THE CANNON

- Purdue kept the Cannon Trophy for the third year in a row and increased its chances of winning the Big Ten West with a 31-21 victory at No. 21 Illinois, becoming bowl eligible along the way.

- The Boilermakers improved to 3-1 on the BIG road this season, while beating a ranked team for the seventh time under Jeff Brohm.

- Aidan O'Connell went 25-40 for 237 yards with three touchdown passes, finding tight end Payne Durham seven times for 70 yards and a pair of TDs.

- T.J. Sheffield made six catches for a team-high 72 yards, while Charlie Jones added 66 yards and a touchdown to go over 1,000 receiving yards for the year.

- Devin Mockabee rushed for 106 yards on 28 carries and a score, his fourth 100-yard game of the season.

- Linebacker Kieren Douglas made a late fourth-quarter interception with the help of a tip from Lawrence Johnson.

- Purdue won in Memorial Stadium for the sixth straight time.





BOILER NOTES

SUCCESS VS. NATION'S BEST

• Illinois came into the Cannon Trophy game with the nation's No. 1 scoring (10.4) and total defense (232.2 ypg). The Purdue offense put up 31 points on 379 total yards to earn the win; both marks were the most surrendered by the Fighting Illini all season long.

• On the other side of the ball, the Purdue defense limited Chase Brown to 98 yards on the ground. Brown entered the game as the nation's leading rusher, going over the 100-yard mark in every contest and averaging 149 yards per game.

WALK-ONS RUNNING

• Dylan Downing and Devin Mockobee have rushed for 1,272 yards this season.

• Downing ran for a career-high 113 yards in the win over FAU, the first 100-yard game of his career.

• One week later, Mockobee led the way with 112 yards on the ground that included a rush for 70 yards that resulted in a touchdown and clinched Purdue's victory over No. 21 Minnesota.

• Downing and Mockobee's performances gave the Boilermakers different 100-yard rushers in consecutive games for the first time since 2017 when Markell Jones recorded 217 yards in a win over Indiana and D.J. Knox added 101 yards in a Foster Farms Bowl victory (vs. Arizona).

• While Mockobee's first 920 yards of the year came as a walk-on, new head coach Ryan Walters put the running back on scholarship in his first team meeting.

HURRY HURRY

• The Boilermaker defense has made habit of living in the offensive backfield with 61 tackles-for-loss and 28 sacks.

• Kydran Jenkins leads the team with 8.0 stops behind the line, while Jack Sullivan and Khordae Sydnor add 7.0 and 6.5 TFLs apiece. 22 different players have helped tally a tackle-for-loss this year.

• Sullivan paces the Boilermakers in sacks with 5.5, while Sydnor is right behind his fellow defensive end at 4.5.

• Junior safety Sanoussi Kane leads the team with a pair of forced fumbles. Six other Boilermakers have also forced fumbles this season.

• Purdue's defense has recovered 6-of-8 fumbles it has forced.

SMILE FOR THE CAM

• Senior safety Cam Allen factored in two of Indiana State's three turnovers against Purdue, recovering a fumble on the first play of the game before returning an interception for a touchdown in the third quarter.

• After recording a pair of interceptions to help the Boilermakers earn a 20-10 victory at No. 21 Minnesota, the senior safety was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week.

• Allen earned the accolade for the second time in his career. His other weekly award came following a two-interception game against a ranked opponent as well, Purdue's win over No. 2 Iowa (Oct. 16, 2021).

• Against Indiana State, Allen became the first Boilermaker to record an interception and fumble recovery since Anthony Brown accomplished the feat, also against Indiana State (Sept. 12, 2015).

FOUR IN-A-ROW

• Purdue put together a four-game winning streak prior to the loss at Wisconsin for the first time the 2018 season.

• The Boilermakers won four straight games in 2018, which included the memorable 49-20 victory over No. 2 Ohio State.

• The 2018 and 2022 seasons are the only ones over the past 15 years that have featured four-game winning streaks. The 2006 and 2007 Boilermakers won their first four games of each season under Joe Tiller.

AUSSIE RULES PUNTING

• After Purdue ranked last in the Big Ten a season ago in punting, sophomore Jack Ansell has completely turned around the Boilermakers' punt game and earned a spot on the mid-season Ray Guy Watch List.

• Ansell averaged 38.3 yards per punt as a freshman, but the Aussie has increased his output to 41.8 yards per punt this year.

• Against FAU, Ansell booted a career-long 67-yard punt that was downed at the 4-yard line; the punt was the longest by a Boilermaker since 2019.

• The Australian boomer followed up that performance with a trio of 50-yard punts at No. 21 Minnesota.

• Dealing with difficult, windy days, he added a pair of 59-yard punts in games against Iowa and Illinois.

• In the Battle for the Old Oaken Bucket, Ansell dropped three inside the 20 which tied a career high.

• Ansell has forced 12 fair catches, dropped 12 balls inside the 20-yard line, launched nine 50-yard boots and a trio of muffs.

• Ansell worked with ProKick Australia to prepare to play collegiate football in the United States, following a high school career as a Victoria state champion triple jumper in Australia.

ATTACK FROM THE AIR

• Over the Jeff Brohm era, the Boilermakers averaged 306.8 yards passing per game at a 64.7% completion clip with 159 touchdowns.

• Purdue's passing attack trailed only Ohio State and ranks in the top 20 nationally over the last five years, also considering the program played just six games in 2020.

POPPING CORN

• In the 43-37 win over Nebraska, the Boilermakers popped the Cornhuskers for 608 yards of total offense for the eighth-most yardage in school history.

• The Boilermakers racked up 391 yards through the air and 217 on the ground, just the second time in the past 25 years that they surpassed 350 passing yards and 200 rushing yards (Oct. 13, 2018 at Illinois). Both instances have occurred under Jeff Brohm.

• Purdue rushed for 217 yards, the most on the ground in a BIG game since the 2018 game at Illinois.

• The offense ran 101 plays while tying a school record with 38 first downs.

• Individually, Devin Mockobee set a Purdue freshman rushing record with 178 yards. Aidan O'Connell added 391 yards and four touchdowns through the air, his favorite target being Charlie Jones. The wideout made 12 catches for 132 yards and two touchdowns for his fourth 100-yard game of the season.

SYCAMORE SHUTOUT

• Purdue's 56-0 win over Indiana State was the largest margin of victory since beating Southeast Missouri 59-0 in 2011.

• The victory was the second shutout of the Jeff Brohm era, joining the 49-0 win over UConn last season.

• Purdue allowed only 145 yards of total offense, the lowest output by an opponent since Oregon mustered just 143 yards in 1979.

• The Boilermakers held the Sycamores to just 51 yards on the ground, the third time in the Brohm era that Purdue has held an opponent to less than 60 rushing yards (Nov. 11, 2021 vs. Indiana, 58; Oct. 28, 2017 vs. Nebraska, 40).

300-YARDERS

• Aidan O'Connell started his 2022 campaign with 365 yards passing against Penn State for his ninth career 300-yard game, before adding his 10th with a 424-yard performance at Syracuse.

• With six this season, O'Connell finished with 14 in his career for the second most in program history.

• Last year, he joined Drew Brees as the only Purdue quarterbacks to record multiple 500-yard games over a career, while becoming the only one to reach the 500-yard mark twice in a single season.

• O'Connell threw for a career-high 536 yards in an upset victory over No. 3 Michigan State before ending the year with 534 passing yards to help Purdue beat Tennessee in the Music City Bowl.

• The gunslinger produced six 300-yard games in 2021, the third-most in a single season and the first Purdue quarterback to accomplish the feat since Curtis Painter in 2007.

• Drew Brees owns the record with 16.

• All but one of O'Connell's 13 300-yard passing games have been for 350 yards or more.

BOILER NOTES

BIG PLAY POTENTIAL

- So far this season, Purdue has 20 plays of 30 yards or more, including eight passes from Aidan O'Connell to Charlie Jones and both interceptions returned for a touchdown.
- Devin Mockobee's 68-yard rush was Purdue's longest since Rondale Moore carried 76 yards in his record breaking performance against Northwestern in 2018.
- The Boilermaker offense tallied 29 plays of 30 yards or more in 2020, as well as 11 of 50 yards or more.
- O'Connell has 40 career throws over 30 yards or more and 12 over 50 yards.
- Purdue's three longest plays from 2021 all came in that exhilarating TransPerfect Music City Bowl with O'Connell finding Broc Thompson for touchdowns of 75 and 70 yards and Durham for a 62-yard catch-and-score.

99th SEASON AT ROSS-ADE STADIUM

- The Boilermakers called Ross-Ade Stadium home for the 99th season in 2022.
- A roughly two-year construction process for \$237,500 (\$3.76 million) with funds raised by Purdue alumni David E. Ross and George Ade helped replace Stuart Field, which had hosted Purdue Football since its inception.
- Ross-Ade Stadium had the perfect dedication and opening, a 26-7 drubbing of Indiana for homecoming on Nov. 22, 1924.
- Originally seating 13,500 with an additional 5,000 standing spots, Ross-Ade Stadium now can hold up to 61,320, including non-ticketed personnel.
- At the conclusion of the home slate, construction began on the newest phase of expansion to Ross-Ade Stadium.

OUR MAN MITCH

- Mitchell Fineran is 18-for-24 on field goals with a long of 46 yards.
- Fineran is second among active kickers across all divisions with 85 made kicks.
- Fineran has made 42 kicks during his time at Purdue, the fourth in program history.
- His 79.2% (42-53) field goal clip sits atop Purdue's career leaderboard by kickers with 15 or more attempts.
- Fineran was tabbed honorable mention by the Big Ten coaches and media last season after going 24-of-29 on the year with a long of 49.
- Fineran's 112 points were the second most in a season in program history behind the late Leroy Keyes' 114 in 1967.
- Fineran is a career 79.5% kicker and is 63-of-79 (79.7%) on kicks inside 40 yards.

IN MEMORY OF DAVE BUTZ

- Dave Butz, a legend of Purdue Football who was inducted in the College Football Hall of Fame, passed away Friday (Nov. 4) at the age of 72.
- Butz (1970 to 1972) was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2014. He was a consensus All-American as a senior, the recipient of the Zipp Award as college football's outstanding player and a finalist for the Lombardi Award (presented to the best lineman or linebacker).
- Butz earned the reputation as the NFL's iron man, missing merely four games over the course of his career that included 216 contests. He was named NFL Defensive Player of the Year and was selected to the Pro Bowl after recording a career-high 11 sacks in 1983. Butz played in three Super Bowls with Washington: XVII (a 27-17 win over the Miami Dolphins), XVIII (a 38-9 loss to the Oakland Raiders) and XXII (a 42-10 win over the Denver Broncos).

REMEMBERING LEN DAWSON

- The Boilermakers bid farewell to one of the iconic greats and a pioneer of the Cradle of Quarterbacks in Len Dawson, who passed away Aug. 24 at the age of 87.
- A three-year starter at Purdue, Dawson was named All-Big Ten and led the conference in passing and total offense all three seasons. He set then-records at Purdue with 3,325 yards and 29 passing touchdowns.
- Over a 19-year career for Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Houston/Kansas City, Dawson threw for 28,711 yards and 239 touchdowns and netted numerous honors, including a win in Super Bowl IV, Super Bowl IV MVP honors, his No. 16 retired by the Kansas City Chiefs and induction to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.
- Following his playing career, Dawson served several roles as a broadcaster around football, hosting HBO's "Inside the NFL" for 25 years, landing him back in Canton for a second time as a broadcaster.

BROC'S BOND

- Wide receiver Broc Thompson's bond with his brother Cade prompted him to transfer from Marshall to Purdue in 2021.
- Cade was diagnosed with cancer in the summer of 2020, prompting Thompson to change his number from 88 his freshman season to 13, Cade's number in youth football.
- When Thompson arrived in West Lafayette in 2021, he elected to wear No. 29 for the number of chemotherapy rounds Cade endured.
- Cade was declared cancer-free in April of 2021.
- Thompson switched back to No. 13 for the 2022 season.

CRADLE OF QUARTERBACKS

Many schools boast of tradition. But none can match Purdue's tradition of turning out top-flight quarterbacks.

The Cradle of Quarterbacks has evolved over the last half century as a defining feature of Purdue football. Boilermakers have set numerous NCAA and Big Ten Conference records, many have been chosen as All-Americans and national awards winners or finalists.

In the early 1970s, Purdue Athletics commissioned a university artist named Keith Butz to create a poster featuring outstanding Boilermaker quarterbacks of the previous 30 years. That poster featured Bob DeMoss, Dale Samuels, Len Dawson, Bernie Allen, Bob Griese, Mike Phipps and Gary Danielson.



Brian Brohm is completing his sixth season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Purdue. He will serve as the interim head coach for the 2023 Cheez-It Citrus Bowl, before joining Jeff Brohm's staff at Louisville.

Purdue's passing offense broke several school records during a historic 2021 campaign that featured a 9-4 record, two Top 5 victories and a win in the TransPerfect Music City Bowl. With Brohm as co-offensive coordinator and coaching the Boilermaker quarterbacks, Purdue threw for 4,620 yards to eclipse the old school record of 4,208 set during the 1998 season. That amounted to 355.4 passing yards per game, another program best that surpassed the 1985 mark of 341.6 yards per game. Nationally, Purdue's passing offense ranked fifth in the country.

Brohm's 2021 offense also set school records for completions (407), completion percentage (.708) and passing first downs (221). Emerging from a stiff competition that lasted four games into the season, Aidan O'Connell took the starting reins and turned into a record-setting quarterback. He completed 71.8 percent of his own passes to set a new individual school record, while throwing for 3,712 yards and 28 touchdowns. The Second Team All-Big Ten QB produced six 300-yard games through the air, including a pair of 500-yard games to become the first Purdue quarterback to throw for 500 yards multiple times in the same season. O'Connell racked up a career-high 536 passing yards in the Boilermakers' win over No. 3 Michigan State before ending his season with 534 yards in the Music City Bowl victory over Tennessee.

In 2020, O'Connell and Jack Plummer teamed up to complete 176 of 260 passing attempts (67.7 percent) for 1,854 yards and 15 touchdowns against only four interceptions in six games. The Boilermakers averaged a Big Ten-best 309.0 yards passing per game.

A myriad of injuries saw Brohm start three different quarterbacks in 2019, a task he proved ready to handle. Starter Elijah Sindelar led the nation in passing yards through the first two weeks of the season, throwing for 922 yards and nine touchdowns against Nevada and Vanderbilt. Sindelar missed the third game of the season with an injury and went down for the year in the first quarter of the fourth game of the year. Plummer took over and started the next five games, completing 144 of 241 passing attempts for 1,603 yards and 11 touchdowns on the year. After Plummer went down with an ankle injury against Nebraska, walk-on O'Connell took over under center for the Boilermakers. Starting his first collegiate game at Northwestern, O'Connell passed for 271 yards and threw a pair of touchdowns, leading the Boilermakers to a come-from-behind victory over the Wildcats. Sindelar (423, 509), Plummer (420) and O'Connell (408) all threw for over 400 yards in a game in 2019.

In 2018, Brohm mentored David Blough to his finest season as the Purdue signal-caller. Blough completed 305 of 462 passing attempts for 3,705 yards with 25 touchdowns. His .660 completion percentage was the best in a season in school history at the time, while his passing yards and touchdown totals ranked fifth. Brohm helped guide the Boilermakers to an average of 443.9 total yards per game, the sixth-highest in school history.

Brohm, part of a two-quarterback system himself in college, coached Blough and Sindelar to a combined 3,202 passing yards and 27 touchdowns in his first season at Purdue. The Boilermaker signal-callers completed nearly 60 percent of their passes while cutting their interceptions from 25 in 2016 to merely 11 in 2017.

Brohm came to Purdue from Western Kentucky, where he served as co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the 2016 season. He helped guide a Hilltopper offense that averaged 45.5 points, 336.8 passing yards and 523.1 total yards per game. Western Kentucky won its final eight games.

Prior to joining the Western Kentucky staff, Brohm played professionally for eight seasons with the Green Bay Packers (2008-09) and Buffalo Bills (2009-10) in the National Football League, the Las Vegas Locomotives (2011-12) in the United Football League, as well as the Hamilton Tiger-Cats (2013) and Winnipeg Blue Bombers (2014-15) in the Canadian Football League. He was a second-round pick (No. 56 overall) by the Packers in the 2008 NFL Draft.

Brohm played collegiately at Louisville from 2004 to 2007, and he still ranks among the Cardinals' career leaders in passing attempts (second, 1,185), passing yards (second, 10,775), passing efficiency (second, 157.92), completions (third, 780), completion percentage (third, .658), total offense (third, 10,819) and touchdown passes (fourth, 71) through the 2021 season.

Brohm guided the 2006 Cardinals to a 12-1 record, including a 31-14 victory over Wake Forest in the Orange Bowl, and a No. 6 national ranking in the Associated Press final poll. He was named the Orange Bowl Most Valuable Player after completing 24 of 34 passes for 311 yards against the Demon Deacons. His 30 touchdown passes in 2007 are tied for second in school history with 2016 Heisman Trophy winner Lamar Jackson. Brohm set school records with 45 completions and 65 passing attempts against Syracuse on Sept. 22, 2007, while his 555 passing yards against the Orange rank second all-time.

Brohm led Louisville Trinity High School to three Kentucky Class 4A state championships (2001, 2002 and 2003) and was named MVP of all three title games, including a 555-yard, seven-touchdown performance in the 2002 contest. In 2003, he was named Kentucky's Mr. Football, USA Today's Offensive Player of the Year and Gatorade Player of the Year.

Brohm (born Sept. 23, 1985) graduated from Louisville in 2007 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He and his wife, Ashley, have a son, Weston, and a daughter, Stella.

- Nov. 22, 1924 - Purdue dedicates Ross-Ade Stadium. The Boilermakers win the Homecoming matchup over Indiana 26-7.
- 1975 - Prescription Athletic Turf is developed at Purdue is installed. The PAT system features a network of pipes connected to pumps capable of keeping the field playable, even during a storm dumping one inch of rain per hour.
- Nov. 22, 1980 - The largest crowd in Ross-Ade history, 71,629, views the game against Indiana.
- 2017 - Permanent lighting is installed at a cost of \$5.6 million.
- 2020 - Purdue installed a 150-foot, 4-inches wide and 56-foot, 9-inches high video board at the south end, more than four-times larger than the previous board built in 2007.
- 2021 - The Boilermakers played their 500th game at Ross-Ade Stadium, defeating Oregon State 30-21 in front of a crowd of 53,656.

ROSS-ADE RENOVATION

- The future for the home of Boilermaker Football has come into an exciting level of focus as Purdue Athletics will soon unveil renderings, plans and construction timelines for the upcoming Phase 1 of Ross-Ade Stadium renovations.
- Originally announced on April 8, the \$45.4 million initial phase of renovations will strategically enhance several areas of the student-athlete and fan experience within the Ross-Ade footprint, creating a game day environment that is second to none for future generations of Boilermakers.
- The approval granted for Ross-Ade's phase one includes plans for renovations including the construction of a new team entrance/tunnel from the Kozuch Football Performance Complex to Rohrman Field, the conversion of the existing team store into a student-athlete nutrition/dining facility and the construction of a stadium addition adjoining seating in the south end zone.

SOUTH END ZONE

- The long-awaited addition to Ross-Ade Stadium will connect the east and west sides of the facility in its 100th anniversary season, closing in the south end zone to create a complete bowl.

PLAYER ENTRANCE FROM KFPC

- Serving as the new stadium entry location for Purdue Football on gameday, the new player entrance will aim to improve player safety as well as the gameday atmosphere while also offering a new and exciting recruiting component.

STUDENT-ATHLETE DINING FACILITY

- The student-athlete dining facility will serve as a full production kitchen with an outdoor patio feature and a 150 person capacity.

A late Penn State touchdown with 57 seconds remaining sent the Purdue football team to a 35-31 loss in the 2022 season opener at Ross-Ade Stadium.

The Boilermakers (0-1) held a 31-28 advantage after Chris Jefferson intercepted Penn State (1-0) quarterback Sean Clifford and returned it 72 yards for a touchdown with 8:29 to play. Purdue held Penn State to just seven plays and 14 yards on its next two possessions, taking the ball back on offense with 4:28 on the clock. Penn State's defense forced Purdue to punt with 2:22 remaining.

The Nittany Lions then took eight plays to cover 80 yards in 1:25 with Clifford hitting Keyvone Lee for 10 yards and the game-winning score.

Purdue quarterback Aidan O'Connell finished the night going 30-59 passing for 365 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions. The sixth-year thrower crossed the 300-yard mark for the ninth time in his career, moving him into sole control of fifth in program history. Running back King Doerue found the end zone twice for his second career multi-score game.

Clifford threw for 282 yards on 20-of-37 passing with four touchdowns and an interception.

Both sides had one giveaway that led to points. Purdue's fumble with 30 seconds remaining in the second saw Penn State score with two seconds left in the first half, while Jefferson's interception return for a touchdown swung the momentum in the fourth.

O'Connell connected with former youth football teammate Charlie Jones in his Purdue debut 12 times. Jones posted a career night receiving with 12 receptions for 153 yards and a touchdown.

Purdue's defense forced a fumble on the opening play of the game to set the tone in a 56-0 rout of Indiana State on Saturday at Ross-Ade Stadium. The 56-point margin of victory was the largest for Purdue since a 59-point shutout win over Southeast Missouri in 2011.

The Boilermakers (1-1) tallied 521 yards of total offense with a balanced 232 on the ground and 289 through the air. Purdue's defense held the Sycamores (1-1) to 145 yards of total offense.

The defense posted its second shutout of the Jeff Brohm era. Purdue racked up seven tackles-for-loss, three sacks, two interceptions and a fumble recovery. Sanoussi Kane delivered a punishing hit to Indiana State Tee Hodge on the opening play of the game to pop the ball up in the air into safety Cam Allen's arms.

In the third quarter, Allen picked off an Indiana State pass and took it to pay dirt for a 65-yard touchdown. It marked the first time Purdue has interception returns for a touchdown in back-to-back weeks since Ricardo Allen achieved the feat in 2010.

Offensively, Purdue scored a touchdown on seven of its first nine drives. The only two drives the Boilermakers failed to score on started inside their own two-yard line.

Quarterback Aidan O'Connell was efficient in his one half of action with four touchdowns and 211 yards on 17-of-19 passing. Charlie Jones added to his early haul as a Boilermaker with his second straight 100-yard receiving game. The Deerfield, Ill., native snagged nine passes for 133 yards and three touchdowns.

Redshirt freshman Devin Mockobee led the rushing attack with 78 yards on 13 touches with one score. Dylan Downing added 55 yards from 11 rushes. Purdue topped 200 yards rushing for the first time since Oct. 13, 2018, in a win over Illinois.

A Syracuse touchdown with seven seconds left to play handed Purdue a 32-29 loss in its road opener on Saturday in the JMA Wireless Dome.

The Boilermakers (1-2, 0-1 B10) held a 9-3 lead over the Orange (3-0, 1-0 ACC) at the end of the first half thanks to a Devin Mockobee 15-yard touchdown run and a Mitchell Fineran 41-yard field goal in what looked to be a defensive dogfight. Purdue's defense held quarterback Garrett Shrader and the Syracuse offense to just 134 total yards and a field goal in the first half of play.

The script would flip in the second half however, as both offenses exploded for a combined 49 points, 42 of which came in the fourth quarter. Purdue quarterback Aidan O'Connell posted season highs in completions and yards as he finished 39-of-55 for 424 yards, three touchdowns and one interception.

A back and forth second half saw the lead change hands on five different occasions. The teams traded touchdowns until O'Connell's first career pick-six gave the Orange a 25-15 lead with 8:08 left in the game. The Boilermakers would battle right back, as O'Connell found Charlie Jones for a 55-yard bomb to cut the deficit to three before tight end Payne Durham caught his second touchdown of the day to give Purdue a 29-25 lead with just 51 seconds remaining.

Penalties against Purdue aided Syracuse on their final possession as they took five plays to go fifty yards capped off by Shrader finding wide receiver Oronde Gadsden II for a 25-yard touchdown to win the game for the Orange.

O'Connell's connection with Charlie Jones continues to drive the Boilermaker offense. Jones racked up a career-high 188 yards and added a touchdown to become just the fifth power five player to have 100 yards receiving and a touchdown in his team's first three games. Two 50-plus yard strikes from O'Connell to Jones sparked Purdue's fourth quarter comeback bid that ultimately fell short.

Behind a balanced offensive attack, the Purdue football team capped the 100th Homecoming celebration with a 28-26 win over FAU on Saturday night at Ross-Ade Stadium. The Boilermakers used a trio of defensive stops in the fourth quarter along with a four-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Austin Burton to TJ Sheffield to hold on for the two-point win.

Twice in the fourth quarter, Purdue's defense stepped in front of passes from FAU (2-3) quarterback Nkosi Perry to keep the Boilermakers (2-2) in the lead. Midway through the period, Chris Jefferson intercepted a pass at the Purdue 10-yard line and returned to the FAU 35-yard line. Jefferson's second pick of the season led to a four-yard touchdown catch by TJ Sheffield to extend the lead to 28-20.

Following FAU's touchdown with 5:21 to play that cut the Boilermaker lead to two, Cam Allen dove in front of a double-pass on the Owl's ensuing two-point conversion in the endzone to keep Purdue ahead.

The defense stopped FAU's final drive cold on fourth down with 46 seconds remaining. As Perry reached over a pile on fourth-and-one, linebacker Jacob Wahlberg punched the ball free, and Sanoussi Kane pounced on the loose ball to seal the win.

Purdue quarterback Austin Burton, starting in place of the injured Aidan O'Connell, threw for a career-high three touchdowns on 21-for-29 passing and 166 yards. The sixth-year passer worked around an interception in the third quarter to lead Purdue to a scoring drive in each quarter.

The Boilermakers finished with more rushing yards than passing for the first time since 2018 against Eastern Michigan, ending with 188 yards on the ground and 166 through the air. Running back Dylan Downing crossed the century mark for the first time in his career to end the night with 133 yards on 15 carries and a touchdown.

Downing was the first Boilermaker to rush for over 100 yards since Zander Horvath ran for 101 yards against Rutgers in 2020.

Purdue's defense intercepted three passes, while the offense rushed for 160 yards and two scores to pull off a 20-10 win over No. 21 Minnesota on Saturday afternoon at Huntington Bank Stadium. The Boilermakers moved to 3-2 on the year and 1-1 in Big Ten play with their first win in Minneapolis since 2007.

Purdue's defense stymied Minnesota (4-1, 1-1) all afternoon long with a trio of interceptions, seven tackles-for-loss, two sacks and six pass breakups. Safety Cam Allen delivered a pair of momentum swings with an end zone interception in the second quarter, before the game-sealing pick late in the final frame.

Facing an offense that averaged 294.5 yards rushing over its first four games, the Boilermakers were stout defensively, limiting the Golden Gophers to just 47 yards rushing. It was the first time Purdue held a team to 50 or fewer rushing yards since 2017 when Nebraska recorded 40 yards on the ground.

Linebacker Semisi Fakasiieiki led the way defensively with eight stops, including a pair behind the line. Seven different Boilermakers contributed to a tackle-for-loss. Purdue's defense allowed just three points off three giveaways on Saturday.

The Boilermakers jumped out to a 10-0 lead in the first quarter. Running back Dylan Downing pounded his way into the end zone for a two-yard touchdown to start the scoring. Mitchell Fineran later added a season-long 43-yard field goal. The defense meanwhile stood tall on Minnesota's opening four drives, forcing a three-and-out, interception by Jacob Wahlberg,

Purdue's offense found its rhythm in the fourth. Fineran put the Boilermakers back in front with a 25-yard field goal with 4:57 to play. The Boilermakers made it a 10-point gap when redshirt Devin Mockobee found the end zone with 3:13 left on a two-yard rush, following a career-long 68-yard carry.

Back-to-back fourth quarter touchdown drives for Purdue sandwiched in between two straight stops on point after attempts gave Purdue a 31-29 victory over Maryland on Saturday at SECU Stadium.

The defense for Purdue came up big for the second straight week against a potent offense. The Boilermakers produced three sacks to go with six tackles for loss and four break ups.

Head coach Jeff Brohm's squad produced two crucial stops with their backs against the wall. Safety Cam Allen blocked an extra point in the fourth that kept it at a six-point game. Then the Terrapins were turned away by a stout defensive effort on their two-point attempt to tie it up with 0:35 seconds left.

Senior linebacker Jalen Graham returned to the field for his first action since the opener against Penn State and led the team with nine tackles (one for loss). Defensive end Khordae Synrdon had a big day of his own, recording a career high two sacks.

Redshirt senior cornerback Cory Trice nabbed his first interception of the year to give Purdue a pick in five of six games this season. Trice's takeaway led to the first touchdown of the day for the Boilermakers.

Quarterback Aidan O'Connell led the way for the offense, going 30-of-41 for 360 yards and two touchdowns. He found ten different receivers on the day to drive Purdue another crucial conference victory at the midway point of the season.

His primary target on the day was tight end Payne Durham. The big man went for 109 yards on seven catches and a touchdown and his huge fourth quarter helped seal the win for the Boilermakers. An endzone snag with 3:19 left tied the game and then a season-long 56 yard catch and rumble down to the two yard-line led to a Devin Mockobee touchdown that sealed the game.

Quarterback Aidan O'Connell threw for four touchdowns, running back Devin Mockobee rushed for 178 yards and the defense intercepted a pair of passes as Purdue outlasted Nebraska for a 43-37 win. The Boilermakers pulled within one win of bowl eligibility and improved to 5-2 on the year and 3-1 in Big Ten play.

The Boilermakers are now 3-2 in one-possession games this season.

Purdue jumped out to an early 10-0 lead early in the first after a two-yard touchdown toss from quarterback Aidan O'Connell to TJ Sheffield and a 37-yard field goal by Mitchell Fineran. The Cornhuskers (3-4, 2-2) responded with 10 straight points to even the score midway through the second.

O'Connell started a 17-point run before the half by the Boilermakers with a 31-yard pitch-and-catch to Charlie Jones. Fineran nailed another 37-yard kick before running back Mockobee found pay dirt from one yard out.

After Nebraska rolled off 13 unanswered points to cut the gap to four late in the third quarter, Sheffield danced around the Cornhusker defense for a 28-yard touchdown. Fineran, who went 3-for-4 on the night, tacked on a 34-yard kick in the fourth, before Jones added his second touchdown catch from two yards out with 6:55 to play to open a 43-30 lead.

Nebraska trimmed Purdue's lead down to six with 5:55 left, O'Connell and the offense ran the clock with a 12-play, 53-yard drive.

O'Connell notched the fifth four-touchdown game of his career. The sixth-year thrower connected on 35 of his 54 passes for 391 yards. Receivers Jones and Sheffield both snagged a pair of touchdown passes and finished with 132 and 70 yards receiving, respectively.

The Purdue football team saw its four-game winning streak come to an end Saturday with a 35-24 loss at Wisconsin.

Running back Devin Mockobee topped the century mark rushing for the third time this season and the second straight week. The redshirt freshman carried the ball 23 times for 108 yards and one score.

Wide receiver Charlie Jones grabbed 10 passes for 105 yards. It was his fourth 10-catch game of the season, making him the fifth Purdue receiver to have four or more 10-reception games in a season since 2000.

The Boilermakers (5-3, 3-2) outgained Wisconsin (4-4, 2-3) 431-381 and finished with 111 yards on the ground and 320 through the air. Quarterback Aidan O'Connell threw for 320 yards, his 13th career 300-yard game, on 31-of-46 with one touchdown and three interceptions.

Down 25-in the third quarter, the Boilermakers outscored Wisconsin 21-14 in the second half. Purdue's punt team forced a fumble in the third that long snapper Nick Zecchino pounced on to set up an eight-yard touchdown pass from O'Connell to tight end Payne Durham.

Including Durham's score with 4:12 to play in the third, Purdue found the end zone on three of its final four drives including a pair of one-yard runs by Mockobee and O'Connell.

Wisconsin built a 21-3 lead through the first half, scoring on its first two offensive possessions and returning an interception for a touchdown on Purdue's first drive. Mitchell Fineran gave Purdue its lone points in the opening 30 minutes on a 36-yard field goal late in the second quarter.

On a blustery day in West Lafayette, the Purdue football team could not extend its winning streak against Iowa to three games, falling 24-3 to the Hawkeyes on Saturday at Ross-Ade Stadium. Both sides had to battle gusting conditions that featured constant winds of 25 mph with gusts over 45 mph.

Wide receiver Charlie Jones caught 11 passes for 104 yards. He joined Rondale Moore as the second Boilermaker since 2000 to have at least five games with double-digit catches. Jones also became the sixth player in Purdue history to top the century mark six times in a single season.

Quarterback Aidan O'Connell threw for 168 yards on 20-of-43 passing with two interceptions. Running back Devin Mockobee had 14 carries for 65 yards.

The Purdue defense recorded seven tackles-for-loss, one shy of the season high. Defensive lineman Jack Sullivan led the way, matching his career high with a pair of stops behind the line. Fellow lineman Lawrence Johnson recorded 1.5 sacks on Iowa quarterback Spencer Petras for a new career high.

The two sides traded punts early on without much traction offensively in the first quarter. The Hawkeyes took advantage of a pair of Purdue interceptions to open a 17-0 lead midway through the second.

Mitchell Fineran converted a 34-yard field goal with 1:40 left in the first half for Purdue's only points of the game. The Hawkeyes scored the final points of the game 17 seconds into the third quarter on a 75-yard touchdown run by Keagan Johnson.

Petras connected on 13 of his 23 passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns, while Johnson rushed for 200 yards on 22 touches with one score.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. - The Cannon is coming back to West Lafayette. Purdue went on the road Saturday afternoon and knocked off No. 21 Illinois, 31-24. The Boilermakers became bowl eligible for the fourth time in six seasons under head coach Jeff Brohm.

When Purdue (6-4, 4-3) needed it most, the defense stepped up. The Boilermakers held Illinois (7-3, 4-3) off the board on three of the final four drives in the fourth quarter, including a key interception by Kieren Douglas with 3:37 to play and Purdue up seven.

Sanoussi Kane topped all tacklers with nine on the afternoon with eight solos, one for loss and a forced fumble. The Boilermakers tallied five tackles-for-loss and a pair of sacks.

Illinois came into the game averaging 192.6 yards on the ground, led by running back Chase Brown's 149.3 yards per game. On Saturday, the Boilermakers limited those numbers to 102 and 98, respectively. It was Brown's first game under 100 yards rushing all season.

Purdue tight end Payne Durham had a career day with a pair of touchdown receptions, finishing the day with a team-high seven catches for 70 yards. Quarterback Aidan O'Connell threw for 237 yards on 25-of-40 passing with three touchdowns.

Running back Devin Mockobee notched his fourth 100-yard game of the season, going for 106 yards on 28 carries and a touchdown. Purdue posted 142 yards on the ground to outgain 379-303 overall for the game.

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. - The Purdue football team closed out its home slate at Ross-Ade Stadium on Saturday afternoon with a 17-9 win over Northwestern. The Boilermakers improved to 7-4 on the year and 5-3 in Big Ten play and kept their West Division title hopes alive.

The two clubs battled through 29-degree weather and a steady 20 mph wind as the wind chill crept into single digits.

The Boilermaker defense stood firm in the blustery conditions, allowing Northwestern to score just twice on 11 drives, forcing four three-and-outs. Jalen Graham, Kieren Douglas and Kylan Jenkins led the way with seven stops. Jenkins tallied two of Purdue's four tackles-for-loss, while Nic Caraway and Jack Sullivan recorded Purdue's two sacks.

Purdue turned Northwestern (1-10, 1-7) over three times with a pair of fumble recoveries and an interception. The Wildcats recorded 240 total yards and just 78 through the air, while going 6-of-16 on third down and converting 1-of-2 fourth down attempts.

Purdue held a Big Ten opponent to nine or fewer points for the fourth time in the last two seasons.

Quarterback Aidan O'Connell threw for 159 yards and two scores on 16-of-25 passing. Charlie Jones snagged six passes for 46 yards and touchdown, while Payne Durham scored once on two receptions for 30 yards.

Purdue totaled 299 yards of offense in a balanced attack of 140 yards on the ground and 159 through the air. Running back Dylan Downing carried the bulk of the load with 17 rushes for 49 yards, and Kobe Lewis added 42 yards on 11 carries. The pair stepped up after starting running back Devin Mockobee left the game early in the first quarter due to injury.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (Saturday, Nov. 26) - A big day from Charlie Jones in the receiving game and rushing exploits by Devin Mockobee secured Purdue Football the Old Oaken Bucket, the Big Ten West divisional title and a place in the conference championship game. Head coach Jeff Brohm's Boilermakers defeated Indiana, 30-16, and advanced to the league championship for the first time in school history.

Sixth-year senior quarterback Aidan O'Connell threw for 290 yards on 18-of-29 passing with two touchdowns and zero interceptions, with an abundance of his efforts finding sixth-year wide receiver Jones for 143 receiving yards on four catches and one score.

Leading the way on the ground for the Boilers was Mockobee, as the redshirt freshman running back accumulated 99 yards on 15 carries with one score. He also caught a team-high five passes for 58 yards.

Purdue sealed the win with an incredible defensive play by redshirt senior cornerback Cory Trice, who ripped away an errant pass for an interception and returned it eight yards for a Boiler touchdown to set the score at 30-10 in favor of the Old Gold & Black late in the fourth quarter.

The O'Connell-to-Jones connection was evident in the fourth quarter, as Purdue's QB hit Jones for a 60-yard touchdown with 9:38 left in the game. The big-time play extended the Boilermaker's lead to 24-10.

O'Connell, Durham and Mockobee helped the Boilermakers gain the advantage during the first offensive possession of the second half. The Boiler signal caller connected on two passes to Mockobee and Durham, including the go-ahead touchdown to Purdue's veteran tight end, 10-7. Durham's snag in the end zone, with 10:35 on the clock in the third quarter, was the 21st of his career.

INDIANAPOLIS - In their first appearance in the Big Ten Championship Game, the Purdue Boilermakers fell to No. 2 Michigan on Saturday night at Lucas Oil Stadium, 43-22.

Despite racking up 456 yards of total offense, including 366 through the air, and scoring five times in the red zone, the Boilermakers (8-5) managed just one touchdown on the night.

Receiver Charlie Jones set several records. The Deerfield, Ill., native caught 13 passes for 162 yards, both Big Ten Championship Game records. Jones' performance set the Purdue single-season records for 100-yard receiving games with eight and receiving yards with 1,361 on the year.

Jones provided the bulk of the receptions from quarterback Aidan O'Connell. The sixth-year slinger was 32-of-47 passing for 366 yards. O'Connell moved into sole possession of second on Purdue's all-time list with 14 career 300-yard passing games.

Running back Devin Mockobee tallied 71 yards on 17 carries on the night, giving him 920 yards for a new Boilermaker freshman season record.

Kicker Mitchell Fineran went 5-for-5 on field goals to set a new Big Ten Championship Game record. The five made kicks were a new career high for the righty and tied for second most in a game in Purdue history.


