A note from the playright

Our story is very simple in its conception and at the same time complex. Simple because the incident takes place literally next door and is easily recognizable, and complex because it speaks about the encounter of people whose pasts, both private and shared, create conflicts that simmer below the surface until a dramatic 'bomb' finally explodes.

Our heroes mark out their own boundaries and claim what they believe is owed to them, their 'piece of the pie,' Overlooking the price they pay for staking their claim. Demanding their rights over what they consider theirs - turning a deaf ear to life itself; proving at every crossroads that, in truth, nothing ever really belongs to us.


Director's note

When I read "170 Square Meters (Moonwalk)," I saw fragments of my own family and the vulnerability of every small community I've been part of. Working with the cast, I wanted our acting to be honest and real—moments that are lived, not performed, with gestures that come from genuine feeling rather than theatre convention—and always in harmony with the natural rhythm of Giorgis Tsouris' writing, letting the ebbs, flows, silences, and sudden bursts of emotion guide us.

The decision to strip away the walls from our set means there's nowhere for anyone to hide; just as in this story's community, everyone's history and secrets are exposed, even as we create invisible walls within ourselves.

By placing the audience right up close, I hope you feel not just like observers, but like silent guests in this family's fragile home, able to sense every shift in emotion and truly share in their intensity and warmth. Thank you for joining us in this space—where truth, silence, and confrontation all feel immediate and real. Ultimately, I hope this play reminds us of the connections, love, and resilience that families share, even in the face of misunderstandings and change.
