This aroused the Sugarbabies' emotions to come back and score as halfback Roxie Jackson caught a 58 yd. pass from Q.B. Terri Moore to even the score at 6.

A strong defensive stand assured the Sugarbaby victory but Doll halfback Essie Jackson was a threat as the game leading rusher with 117 yds. on 10 carries.

RANGERS TRAMPLE NTSU JV

The 1983 Lions' Benefit Bowl champs deserved to be just that. With a rangy defense that held NTSU J.V. to 33 yds. total offense and a goose egg on the scoreboard, the Rangers walked away with an impressive 34-0 victory.

The Rangers scored first as QB Bart Ryan sneaked from one yd. out. The extra-point attempt failed but was the only miss for kicker Troy Milburn. The next score came as Keith Shannon exploded for 55 untouched yards. This would not be all for Shannon as he danced for another score from 4 yds out.

With excellent defense by line-backer Gary Anderson, end Willie Harris and safety Joe Mullins, a good field position was a dessert for the offense.

This led to reserve back Tony Burton's 10 yd. scamper to make the score Ranger 27, NT-0. The final TD came as halfback Jerry Kyles covered 15 yds. to run the final score 34-0.

Good defense was also played by Darrell Manigo, Dalton Cook, Robert Reagins and A. J. Lewis.

NEO MANHANDLES RJC

After Saturday's Homecoming game, the Ranger football team probably felt as bad as Rodney Dangerfield. The Golden Norsemen from North Eastern Okla. J. C. showed no respect by slamming RJC with a score of 50-6.

The first half's most exciting moments for Ranger fans were the crowning of Homecoming Queen Connie Martinka.

NEO scored on each of its first three possessions to run up an early first quarter lead of 21-0. By halftime, the score read 37-0 with NEO singing the same verse over and over again, like a broken record.

Still the Rangers were determined that Homecoming would not end in a shut-out as halfback Buddy Nauls caught 2 passes from Q.B. Bart Ryan to put Ranger close enough for fullback Oscar Riggins to carry over for RJC's only score. The extra point attempt failed.



RJC CROWNED BENEFIT BOWL CHAMPS

The RJC Rangers were once again crowned winners of the Zone 6 Lion's Club Benefit Bowl by a score of 14-12 against the Cisco Wranglers.

Cisco scored early in the first quarter to go ahead 7-0. Only minutes later Darrell Manigo blocked a punt as Todd Owens recovered. This set up Joe Johnson's first field goal of 29 yds. after a 15 yd. pass from Bart Ryan to Charles Mott. Ranger scored again with 5:00 remaining in the first quarter. Manigo intercepted a pass and returned it 29 yds. for a T.D.

On the next RJC possession Ryan was chased out of the pocket from his 29 and tackled in the end-zone for the safety. With 16 seconds remaining in the half, Cisco moved ahead on a field goal to make the half-time score 12-9, Cisco.

The second half turned out to be a Buddy Nauls show as he carried for 60 yds. and was the leading RJC rusher. Although Nauls' efforts were great, the RJC offense would not score in the third quarter.

With the defensive help of Manigo, Robert Reagins and A. J. Lewis, Cisco scored no more.

The next Ranger score came after runs of 31 and 4 yds. by Nauls and a 34 yd. pass from Ryan to Keith Shannon. Johnson was called on once again, this time from the 20. With a perfect hold from Troy Milburn, it was good to even the score at 12.

The game's winning points should be credited to the RJC defense as they forced Cisco to punt deep in their own territory. With the snap sailing over the punter's head, Manigo chased it out of the endzone to break the 12-12 tie.

Cisco then had chance after chance to be crowned 1983 Benefit Bowl Champs, but missed field goals of 16 and 41 yds.

Ranger will travel to Lubbock Nov. 3, to take on the Texas Tech J. V.

In the open division Sam Obwocha took 1st place; Carlos Quinones, 2nd place; and Felix Kadiri, 4th place.

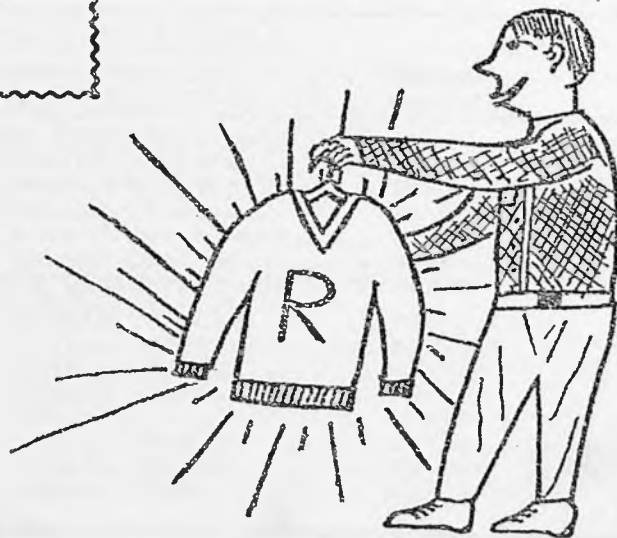
MEN'S BASKETBALL OPENS SEASON NOV. 1
