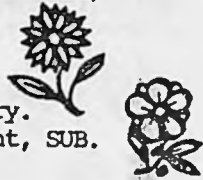

OEA PLACES SIX AT STATE MEET

The RJC Chapter of the Office Education Assn. (OEA) of the post secondary division of Texas was well represented at the State Convention at El Paso Feb. 28-March 2.

The Convention was hosted by El Paso Community College. Each contest was a test of individual and group ability in the business field. Events ranged from Accounting to prepared verbal speeches.

Six students represented RJC with the following results.

Robert Easter placed fourth in General Office Interview, fifth in Extemporaneous Speaking and fifth in prepared verbal communication.

Rhonda Clarida placed sixth in Accounting Clerk. Deann Haynie placed fifth in Computer Literacy, fifth in Computer Programmer II,

Sixth in Economic Awareness and third in General Office Interview.

Patricia Crane placed second in Payroll Accounting. Rachel Marusak placed second in Accounting Clerk, second in Accounting Interview and fifth in Economic Awareness.

Phillip Bitner placed seventh in Business Law.

Three contestants will represent RJC at the National Convention, to be held in Houston in May. To qualify, contestants had to place third or better in their events. Deann Haynie, Patricia Crane and Rachel Marusak will compete at the National level. All other state contestants are eligible for the open events.

"We appreciate the efforts of each one of these contestants. We are proud of our representation at the state level," stated Ms. Linda Gann, club sponsor.

THIRD ANNUAL WRITER'S CONTEST ANNOUNCED

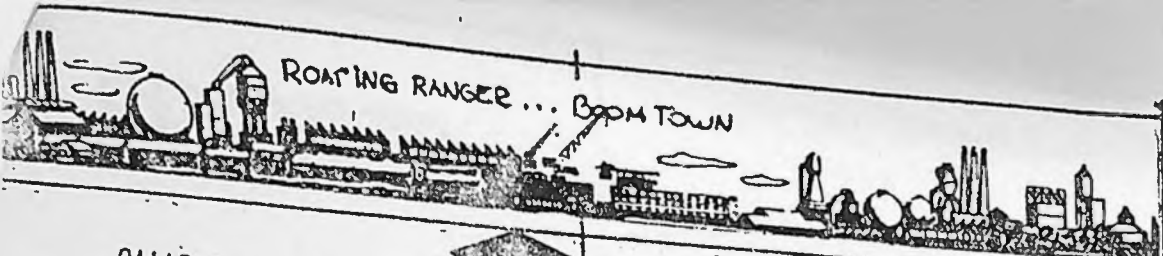
The Robert E. Howard Annual Writing Contest, an annual event sponsored by Mrs. Alla Ray Morris and The Creative Writers Club at Ranger Junior College, is again being announced to all creative writers in this area.

The contest consists of three entry categories: (1) college; (2) high school; (3) community (including surrounding communities). Competition is restricted to two genres of literature: short fiction (1000 to 8000 words) or poetry (4 to 50 lines).

All entrants are requested to submit their texts to the main desk in the JC Library, on or before March 29 at 1 p.m. Contestants should not place their names on the text of their entries. Instead, they should attach their names, addresses, telephone numbers and entry categories to the text on a separate sheet of paper.

This year's prizes will be \$50 for first place winners and \$25 for second place winners in each entry category for either short fiction or poetry. Awards will be announced at a later date.

All awards are dependent upon the submission of sufficient entries in each particular category.

MEN'S BASKETBALL ROUNDUP

RJC vs MCC

It was bound to happen. The Rangers finally lost a close game down the stretch. McClennon JC from Waco, who was ranked 19th nationally, escaped with a 64-62 win to move into sole possession of first place.

RJC vs GRAYSON

For the second game in a row the Rangers failed to produce when it counted most: at the end. Ranger led most of the ball game, but was unable to hold Grayson off at the end. As a result, the Rangers lost their second consecutive game 83-80.

RJC vs WEATHERFORD

The Rangers' losing streak has been extended to three games, as Weatherford JC handed the Rangers a 64-49 conference loss. The loss dropped the Rangers to 4-3 and third place in the conference behind McClennon and Grayson.

RJC vs SWCC

The Rangers broke a three game losing streak by defeating Southwest Christian College 74-65 on Feb. 7. It was the first game of the second half of conference play.

RJC vs HILL JC

The Rangers returned to their recent habits once again this time dropping a three point decision to Hill Jr. College of Hillsboro Feb. 11. It was the Rangers fourth loss in five tries.

RJC vs CISCO

It is official. The Rangers are in a slump and Cisco Jr. College was not about to let the Rangers get out of it. The result was a nine point victory for the Wranglers and a tie for third place in conference with the Rangers. The game was played at Cisco Feb. 14.

RJC vs TSTI

Well, there is one thing that can be said about the Rangers: they sure don't want to make it easy on themselves. They proved that with a 74-70 loss to TSTI at Waco, Feb. 18.

"Those in the weight division did well for this time of the season," Stated Head Track Coach Johnny Gann.

Monica Johnson, Rachel Barr, Tami Riley, Karen Cussins, Portia Wallace and Rebecca Thurston all did well.

The RangeAnns traveled to Laredo for the Border Olympics Mar. 1-2 and will compete at San Marcos Mar. 8.

RJC'S CINDERMEN OFF AND RUNNING

"Excellent times were turned in, even though it is early in the season, reported Coach Johnny Gann.

The men's track team traveled to Abilene Christian University for a practice meet Feb. 15. Most times turned in were above average for so early in the season.

Among those who turned in times were Pat Chester with 3:50.1 in the 1500 meter run and Zac Gwandu with 3:51 also in the 1500 m run. In the distance events Leodgar Martin looked outstanding in the 5000m. run.

Kyong Song had an excellent throw in the hammer event and Lisha Briscoe jumped 25.3 ft. in the long jump and 52.6 in the triple jump.

George Bullard in the 400m. run had a time of 48.7 which was a good time, considering the wind that had to be coped with.

The men participated in the Border Olympics in Laredo Mar. 1-2 and will run at San Marcos Mar. 8.

Scorpio: These women have always been multi-talented. You can do anything you want, except get your dream guy. Now you men, put your stingers away, as there is no more use for them.

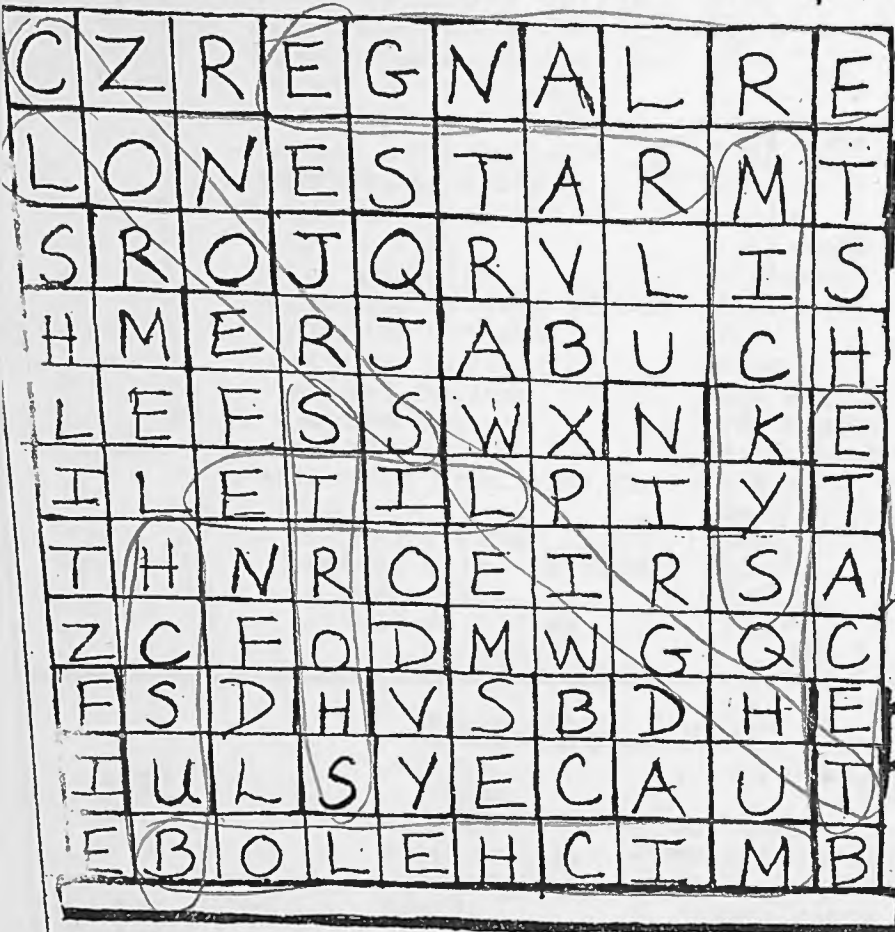

Pisces: Remain in the water for things on land are too extreme for you. Your sweetheart just fell in love with your best friend and will be married on your birthday.

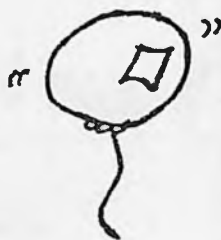

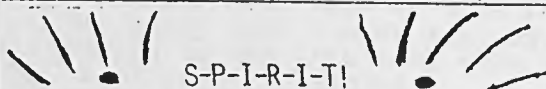

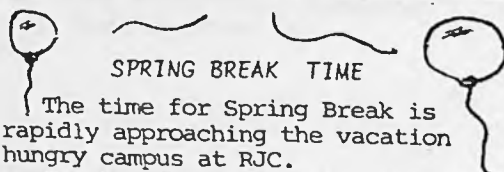


S-P-I-R-I-T!
