## RANGERS RIP CISCO

The Rangers rode a swarming defense, a ball control offense and the strong leg of kicker Greg Walcher to a 30-21 victory over arch rival and previously undefeated Cisco Jr. College on Sept. 26 in the Benefit Bowl at Breckenridge.

The Rangers drew first blood on a 35 yd. field goal by Walcher. Three field goals and three PAT's net a 12 point output.

A six yd. run by quarterback Allen Rice gave the Rangers a 13-7 lead at the half. In the third quarter Ronnie Hunt plunged in from two yards out. The PAT by Walcher was good. Later Walcher added a 27 yd. field goal. The final touchdown was on a 15 yd. pass from Allen Rice to Dan Sharp. The PAT was good, making the final score 30-21, Rangers.

## RANGERS DECLAW TIGERS

Playing their second game in four days, the Rangers destroyed the Bishop College Tigers in Dallas, Thurs., Sept. 17.

Scoring for the Rangers started when Matt Kent tackled the Tiger punter in the end zone for a safety. Ronnie Hunt capped a 65 yd. drive with a 3 yd. run. The PAT by Ron Otosen was good making the lead 9-0.

After a 50 yd. run, Paul Clayborn scored from 15 yds. out. This 98 yd. drive was engineered by Allen Rice, who also scored the 2 point conversion after a bobbled PAT try.

The Rangers ended their first half scoring when Rice hit Dan Sharp on a 15 yd. scoring pass. The PAT by Don May was good making the half time lead 24-0.

The final touchdown was scored by Don Johnson on a 15 yd. scamper. The kick by Dotson was good for a final score of 31-0 Ranger.

## RANGERS THUMP TECH

The Ranger Rangers boosted their winning streak to 3-1 by beating Texas Tech's JV, 26-20 in Lubbock, Thurs., Oct. 1. Danny Tisdale scored for Ranger on a 3 yd. play capping a 63 yd. drive. The PAT failed and the score was 7-6, Tech.

Later in the second quarter Allen Rice hit tight end Dan Sharp on a 76 yd. pass for a TD. The PAT was good, making the score 19-13, Ranger.

The RJC defense was inspired in the opening moments of the second half. Big plays by Matt Kent and Owen Sewell led to a 4th and 16 situation. Pressure from Everett Bell forced a bad kick by Tech. Mark Ackernacht's 25 yd. reception from Rice set up a 6 yd. romp to paydirt for Tisdale. The PAT was good and Ranger led 26-13. Tech's final score came on a broken play by their quarterback.

## BASKETBALL "LOOKING GOOD"

RJC's men's basketball team will participate in a scrimmage against Weatherford and Cisco in Weatherford on Oct. 10.

Ranger has participated in two previous scrimmages with Cisco and McMurry. Ranger came out on top both times.

"Ithought the team looked pretty good in the scrimmages. They still need a little work before the season starts," reported Coach Larry Gibson.

The season will open Nov. 6-7 with the Weatherford Classic. The first home games will be Nov. 9-10 in the RJC Classic.
