







Average Commute Times



Universal Hydrogen has chosen a 50-acre parcel of property northeast of the passenger terminal at the Albuquerque International Sunport to manufacture and distribute its hydrogen storage modules, assemble airplane retrofit kits, perform aftermarket maintenance services, and manage administrative activities. The location includes access to a runway and the potential future reclamation of a rail spur south of the Sunport. New Mexico will be at the heart of the company's mission to decarbonize hard-to-abate greenhouse gas emissions in aviation, ground transportation, and heavy industry to help the United States meet the Paris Agreement goals. The company also has facilities in California, Washington State, and Toulouse, France.

Universal Hydrogen was founded in early 2020 by world-class aviation leaders with the goal of comprehensively decarbonizing aviation. To accomplish this, the Company is building a complete, end-to-end solution including the development of hydrogen fuel cell-based powertrains to convert regional turboprop aircraft to hydrogen power and the fueling logistics to deliver hydrogen to these new aircraft. The Company's fueling network is based on "modular" fueling tanks, which we can be filled at the source of production and delivered to airports via the intermodal freight network, allowing the company to provide hydrogen in a flexible and affordable manner.

Industrial Revenue Bond (IRB)

For companies making large capital investments in New Mexico, an IRB could provide significant abatement of real and personal property taxes, as well as exemption of compensating (use) tax and/or gross receipts (sales) tax for equipment purchases. Terms vary by community.



Job Training Incentive Program (JTIP)

Direct cash reimbursement for 50-70 percent of trainees' wages for up to six months of on-the-job training. Additionally, a significant portion of customized training provided by a New Mexico post-secondary public education institution is eligible for reimbursement.



LEDA Fund Grants

The Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) provides for state and local deal-closing funds targeted toward employers that can demonstrate additional funding is needed to close a competitive cost gap. LEDA closing-fund grants can only be used for reimbursement of eligible expenditures tied to land, buildings and infrastructure. Factors considered include the number of full-time, private-sector jobs, net new payroll, employee benefits, capital investment, and expenditures for local goods and services.






