

RESQ team on field







Well-Spotted! A sub-adult leopard was reported to have fallen into a well near Shrigonda. Along with the Forest Department, we successfully rescued the leopard by carefully lowering a trap cage and waited for him to get in. It was released back right after getting a clean bill of health by the veterinarians!









In search of territory. This tiger, born in 2022 at Tipeshwar Wildlife Sanctuary, has travelled from its birthplace all the way to Dharashiv and Solapur districts. Covering nearly 500 kms, this young tiger's search for a new territory underscores the need for connected landscapes. Our teams have been assisting the Dharashiv and Solapur Forest Departments on the ground in tracking and monitoring the tiger's movement, training Primary Response Teams, conducting community awareness and safety sessions to ensure the safety of both the tiger and local communities, with the hope of preventing negative human-wildlife interactions.





Jackal reunion: a howling success! Four jackal pups were discovered in a sugarcane field. Working closely with the Satara Forest Department, our team immediately set up a reunion site, hoping to reunite the pups with their mother. That very night, the mother emerged and successfully carried all her pups back to safety—a perfect outcome, as wild young ones are best raised by their mothers in their natural environment.





Spotted and saved: rusty-spotted family reunites! Three young kittens, discovered in a field during harvesting, were reunited back with their mother thanks to swift action by Pune Forest Department and our teams working in coordination.



A close call: Pangolins, though tough and resilient, face their greatest threat from humans. As their habitats become increasingly exposed due to development, sightings and incidents of exploitation have risen over the years. These elusive and enigmatic creatures still hold many secrets about their behaviour and ecology. Currently, the Forest Department and our team are focused on ensuring pangolins remain in secure habitats with minimal human interference, striving to protect these unique species and the ecosystems they inhabit. This one had a near-miss on a busy road, was rescued and released in a safe habitat nearby.

Strings of doom: the deadly impact of nylon mania! This year, the RESQ team has responded to over 700+ heartbreaking cases of bird injuries caused by nylon manja—with 125+ cases recorded in December alone! As Makar Sankranti approaches, the crisis worsens. The festival, synonymous with kite flying, becomes a nightmare for countless birds as they fall victim to this hazardous thread. Our teams work tirelessly to rescue hundreds of entangled birds, but sadly, not all of them survive. The danger doesn't end there. Birds often use nylon manja stuck in trees to build their nests, putting their chicks at risk of life-threatening injuries when they become entangled. This deadly cycle continues unless we take a stand. It's time to say NO to nylon mania. Choose safer, eco-friendly like cotton thread to celebrate responsibly. Fly kites, honour traditions, but let's do it the right way.









At the RESQ Centres

(Not) Crying wolf! An Indian wolf was gravely injured in a vehicle collision and reported by the Dhule Forest Department. Our team swiftly and safely transported it TTC in Nashik where it was stabilized and treated for its multiple trauma injuries and vision impairment. Though the wolf remains in critical care, we remain hopeful for its recovery.







Hyenas in Peril: Stories of Struggle and Survival. Two recent incidents in Nashik highlight the growing threats faced by Indian striped hyenas. In one case, a male hyena was found severely injured in a canal, likely a victim of stone pelting injuries. Swiftly rescued by the Forest Department, it was brought to the TTC and is now receiving much-needed care. In another incident, a hyena was found injured by the roadside following a vehicle collision. Despite rescue and treatment efforts, it succumbed to its injuries. These incidents underscore the increasing dangers posed by negative human-wildlife interactions.

Purr-severance of the jungle cat! An adult jungle cat rescued by the Forest Department near Satara was brought to our care with a swollen face from head trauma and dehydration. Despite these challenges, the cat is showing remarkable recovery under intensive care. With the rapid progress been seen, this resilient jungle cat is expected to be released soon!







Croc-a-mess.. An injured crocodile was found near the railway tracks in Chiplun by the Forest Department and was promptly brought to the Wildlife TTC in Pune for urgent care. It had suffered a devastating injury to its snout, likely caused by being run over by a train, resulting in the auto-amputation of its upper and lower jaw bones.

Our veterinary team worked tirelessly to stabilise and treat the crocodile, and the wound began to show signs of healing. However, despite these efforts, the crocodile ultimately succumbed to its injuries. While its loss is deeply saddening, we find solace in knowing that its final days were spent pain-free.

Orphans of the Wild: A Journey to Independence

The Wildlife Transit Treatment Centre in Pune is currently home to several orphaned animals, including rusty-spotted kittens, jungle cat kittens, several primates and ungulates. Rescued from diverse circumstances—these animals arrive in vulnerable states, requiring intensive care and rehabilitation. While hand-raising is the crucial first stage, their journey to the wild involves an additional 5-6 species-specific stages aimed at fostering independence and minimising human imprinting. Despite the challenges captivity poses, their successful reintegration remains a hopeful and achievable mission. The ultimate goal — they must be prepared to thrive as nature intended, free and untamed, in their natural habitats.

It's a parliament!

This month, our teams have provided aid for over 60 barn owls in need. With the breeding season for barn owls peaking between October and March, these birds are frequently seen near human settlements. They often choose to roost and nest in man-made structures, bringing them closer to people as they hunt to feed their growing families. Barn owls rely on quiet, sheltered spaces for roosting crucial for conserving energy, staying safe from predators, and raising their young. Unfortunately, their choice of nesting sites can sometimes cause conflicts when these spaces are perceived as inconvenient or unsafe by humans. While our priority is to raise awareness about coexisting with these incredible birds and encouraging people to avoid disturbing them, for owls found in distress or unsafe situations, we respond by admitting them to our care, where they receive medical attention and rehabilitation until they are fit to return to the wild.

















Sticky predicament for the kingfishers! Sticky predicament for the kingfishers! Two white-throated kingfishers were found trapped on glue traps in Pune and were carefully rescued by our team and admitted to the Wildlife Transit Treatment Centre, Pune. Rescues involving glue traps are particularly critical, as improper handling can lead to more severe injuries due to the intensity of the adhesive. Sadly one bird succumbed to the distress and its impact but the other one is under our care at the center, where it has been gently yet meticulously cleaned with coconut oil. It will remain under observation until deemed fit by our veterinarians for release back into the wild.

Parakeets of a feather, free together!

Four rose-ringed parakeets have been brought to us after being rescued by the Forest Department from illegal captivity. Although they appear physically healthy, they show signs of human imprinting, often vocalizing excessively. This behavior makes them vulnerable if released prematurely, as they are likely to seek out humans, putting them at risk of being recaptured. Additionally, their feathers are in poor condition, a common consequence of captivity. Under rehabilitation at the moment, we are hopeful that all four parakeets will regain their natural instincts and subsequent freedom in the wild soon.

Capacity Building & Training

Veterinary Approaches to Wildlife Emergencies and Human Wildlife Conflict @ **SLTC**, **Pune and TTC**, **Bavdhan**, **Pune**. A training session on this critical topic was conducted by RESQ team members, Dr. Kalyani Thakur and Dr. Sushrut Shirbhate, for 70 Livestock Development Officers (LDOs) from across Maharashtra. They covered key strategies for responding to wildlife emergencies, handling conflict scenarios, and ensuring the safety of both humans and animals. Participants gained hands-on insights and practical tools to better equip them for field challenges, making this an impactful knowledge- sharing initiative.





Rescue, On-Field Stabilization, Release and Human Wildlife Conflict @ **Kundal Forest Academy.** A training session on these critical topics was conducted by Nachiket Utpat for over 33 foresters, primarily from the Pune, Kolhapur, and Thane circles. The session focused on effective techniques for wildlife rescue, temporary stabilization, and safe release, alongside addressing human-wildlife conflict scenarios.


