It is hard to believe that it has been 25 years since the City of Ridgeland celebrated its 100th anniversary. As we begin the celebrations of our 125th anniversary, our challenge has been and remains to ensure that our city continues to be a vibrant place to live.

Or that our City first got electricity in 1928?

Another exciting history project underway, which will come to fruition this year, is a new feature on our city website. Ridgeland's Director of Public Relations, Kim Cooper, and our web team, Think Webstore, are teaming up to create a virtual history room. This will allow anyone to access documentation in the Ridgeland History Room at City Hall from their computer or mobile device. It will also include a Share Your Story component to allow people to add to our City's history in a meaningful, permanent way.

One of the ways that the City of Ridgeland shares information about important happenings in our City is the Ridgeland Alert system. I would encourage each of you to sign up, not only to get information about the 125th anniversary celebrations but also because it provides valuable practical information, such as changes to garbage and recycling collection days, details about major water line breaks and road closures, and other vital information. It is very easy to sign up; for full details, please see page 40 of this publication.

As spring approaches, I encourage you to take advantage of the many opportunities that Ridgeland offers at our parks and on our trails. Whether it be baseball, soccer, tennis, walking the Chisa Foka trail, kayaking in the Barnett Reservoir, or cycling on the Natchez Trace Parkway trails, there are a myriad of wonderful opportunities to be outside to enjoy the fantastic spring weather.

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

TELLING RIDGELAND'S STORY: OUR ROAD RUNS FROM OUR HISTORY STRAIGHT THROUGH TO OUR FUTURE

In 1896, James Brownlow Yellowley sold land that had been in his family's possession since his father, James Burroughs Yellowley of North Carolina, purchased it from William J. Austin in 1853. Austin had obtained

the property through a land grant from the government.

The new owners, Gorton Nichols and Edward M. Treakle of Illinois, saw promise in the fertile, rolling hills with railroad access. They formed The Highland Company and surveyed and mapped the land into 10-acre tracts. The tracts were advertised for sale in markets up north. Hoping to make a better life for themselves and their families, people

came from Illinois, Indiana, Washington, Kentucky, and Tennessee by what was then the Illinois Central Railroad. They could plant pecan, pear and peach trees, strawberries, and vegetables here. The products could be shipped to markets all over the country by railroad.

On December 29, 1899, the State of Mississippi chartered the Village of Ridgeland. At that time, 150 people lived in the village, which encompassed less than one square mile.

Despite a devastating fire in 1902, the first fifty years saw growth in the Village. A one-room schoolhouse was built, electric service was obtained, Highway 51 was paved, and construction was begun on the Natchez Trace Parkway. The population grew to over 500 people even though the size of the Village had stayed the same.

The next fifty years saw exponential growth when the population grew to over 20,000 residents living and working in almost 17 square miles. Growing from a Village, then a Town, Ridgeland


was designated a City in 1975. With the proximity of the Barnett Reservoir, the development of County Line Road, the building of elementary and middle schools and Holmes Community College, and the opening of Highland Colony Parkway, more people and businesses were drawn to Ridgeland.

Since the turn of the century, the City expanded to over 21 square miles. A Master Plan was developed, and improvements in east/west connections were completed. A new City Hall was built. Enticed by increased residential and business development, good schools, and a variety of recreational facilities, more than 5000 more people moved into Ridgeland.

The future that Ridgeland's founders envisioned is now our history. Our present times would have been unimaginable to them. But our future is limitless. Resolve and determination have brought Ridgeland further in 125 years than our founders could have ever hoped. But hold on to your hats...The best is yet to come! We are excited about this year's 125th anniversary celebrations. A special planning committee has been appointed to work closely with the City's History Committee to organize a number of activities highlighting Ridgeland's community spirit and history throughout the year.

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WHERE TO LEARN MORE ABOUT RIDGELAND'S HISTORY:

In anticipation of the 125th anniversary of the Charter of Ridgeland, the Historical Society has prepared an exhibit in the History Room at City Hall honoring the First Families of Ridgeland. It can be viewed anytime City Hall is open. Later this year, the History Room will also be available virtually on the City's website.

With support from Ridgeland Tourism and the City, the Society has mapped out a History Trail that will utilize existing sidewalks and trails and some off-trail sites. Over 20 trail markers will tell the history of people, places, and events in Ridgeland's history. The first sign has been erected at City Hall, and the rest will be installed later this year.

A CITY'S VISION FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS

The City of Ridgeland's plan to establish a Performing Arts Center (PAC) is a significant cultural and community development project.

The City of Ridgeland's plan to establish a Performing Arts Center (PAC) is a significant cultural and community development project. The facility will include a 1,000 to 1,200-seat auditorium, a black box theater, meeting space, a multipurpose room, and administrative offices that will provide a versatile venue capable of hosting a wide range of performances, community events, and meeting space. The plans for this 60,000-square-foot facility are strategically designed to be located across from the Ridgeland City Hall on West School Street, emphasizing the City's dedication to creating a vibrant city center.

Dean Architecture's involvement in the project, given their broad history with Ridgeland's development, adds a layer of connection and expertise to the project. Dean's prior work in Ridgeland includes the new Ridgeland City Hall, the Township at Colony Park, Renaissance at Colony Park, the Horne building, and St. Andrew's Science Center, to name a few, indicates that the PAC will be designed with a profound appreciation of the local context and growth.

The idea for the facility first came out of the 2008 Ridgeland-Area Master Plan, which addressed the city's long-term needs. The PAC is not just a standalone development but is part of a larger vision and strategy for the City's future growth. The vision of a "city center focus area" will provide our residents and visitors with a sense of community, making the PAC a potentially transformational development for Ridgeland.

As the City moves into the fundraising phase, the success of the Capital Campaign and support from the community will be of great importance. Developments of this scale involve a substantial financial investment but also the support of the community to ensure their relevance and impact. The PAC represents a vision for enhancing Ridgeland's cultural future and will provide a center for community engagement and creativity.

"This opportunity to build a PAC will inspire innovative new art-making, enable unprecedented artistic collaboration, and serve as a host for world-class performance and community events," stated Mayor Gene McGee. The arts are increasingly recognized for their ability to promote community engagement. This stateof-the-art performing arts center will allow Ridgeland to attract performances, audiences, and events that might not otherwise have a venue in the City.



NATCHEZ TRACE CENTURY RIDE CELEBRATING 25 YEARS

The Natchez Trace Century Ride is one of the largest spring cycling events in Mississippi. Wheels will roll again this year on May 4, 2024 in Ridgeland, Mississippi. With approximately 1,000 riders, the bike ride starts and ends in Ridgeland.

The Natchez Trace Century Ride has something to offer for all types of cyclists and provides riders the unique opportunity to ride a portion of the Natchez Trace Parkway. A few of the beautiful scenery opportunities on the ride include riding around the Ross Barnett Reservoir, under a canopy of pine trees, and along-side cypress trees and lily pads.







Residential Rental Inspection Code

As many of you may know, the **Residential Rental Inspection Code of** the City of Ridgeland was implemented on January 1, 2023. This code was implemented to assure potential renters have a nice and well-maintained place to call home. Our rental inspectors inspect every rental home before a tenant moves in to ensure that the house is safe and meets all life and safety codes. We appreciate our rental property owner's efforts to comply with the ordinance and provide a nice home for future Ridgeland residents. We have made much progress this year and are excited and hopeful to see what the next year brings.

Reminders for registration renewal of all rental properties were sent out on November 15, 2023. All payments were due on January 1, 2024. EyeOnWater



The City of Ridgeland has been working to upgrade water meters throughout the City. We have attempted to do this with the least disruption possible. The project is approximately 95% complete. It is important that your community invests in the proper maintenance of the water system for its long-term sustainability. Providing quality water is a top priority of the City of Ridgeland. Ridgeland's water and sewer systems are entirely funded by ratepayers who pay water bills. Maintaining water meters is paramount to ensure customers receive accurate water bills. Grants offset some improvement costs. The water meter improvement project is being funded in part with some water and sewer funds, but the most significant expenses are covered by ARPA and MCWI funds. With these improvements come advancements in technology for users to enjoy. Our new system allows you to connect to

your water meter through an app called EyeOnWater. This app will enable you to monitor your usage, which helps lead to a better understanding of the usage to make decisions about water conservation and lowering your water bill. Its best feature is the leak detection. You can set customized notifications for your water meter to alert you of a leak, saving you hundreds to thousands of dollars. A leak as simple as a leaking toilet valve can cost you hundreds of dollars. The leak detection can be set to inform you of as little as a leak that produces 1 Gallon/hour for 24 hours.


Drought's Toll on Pine Trees

The recent drought from late summer through fall has taken its toll on many of our local plants and trees. As you drive around Ridgeland and other parts of central Mississippi, the devastation to the pine tree forest is evident. What may not be obvious is what killed the trees. Our conversations with local foresters have revealed that most of the tree deaths resulted from the engraver beetle (Ips Beetle). Long periods of drought conditions will stress pine trees, decreasing their ability to fight off insects and disease. Engraver beetles mostly attack pines in the late summer and during fall droughts as compared to the southern pine beetle,

which more commonly attacks healthy pine trees earlier in the year. For more information on the engraver beetle, contact the Mississippi State University Extension Center or the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

The City has begun removing dead trees from public property and rights-of-way, and we are now asking homeowners to inspect their personal property(s) for any dead or dying trees. Dead and dying trees pose a significant risk of damage to property during storm events and, in the worst case, loss of life. If a tree or trees on your property are 'hazard trees,' it is your responsibility to have them removed promptly. The City recommends contacting a local licensed, bonded, and insured tree professional to remove any dead trees. Large groups of dead trees can also increase the fire risk, and these areas should also be considered for removal.

Please make the City aware of a hazard tree. Contact Public Works at 601-853-2027 for a public tree. Contact Code Enforcement at 601-856-3877 for privately owned trees.


